Officials said Kennedy wants Gromyke to take back to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev a very clear understanding of the extreme peril, involving the possibility of nuclear war, if the Kremlin miscalculates the Allied determina-

There may be some written message for Khrushchev, officials said, but they thought it more likely the President would simply tell Gromyko what he wante him to report to his boss.

The State Department arranged the White House meeting after Secretary of State Dean Rusk in three New York talks with Gromyko found evidence that the Russians might be getting some ides of the basis on which the Allies would be willing to enter formal negotiations.

Rusk was said to have reported to Kennedy that while there was no real "give" in the tough Russian position, there was a somewhat beter atmosphere with Gromyko inclined to discuss issues instead of dictating terms. Officials, cautioned, however, against expecting any early diplomatic
