3 Kinds Of Atomic Defense Are Named

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 5 (AP)—Rear Admiral William S. Parsons, Navy director of atomic defense, declared today there were three kinds of defense against an atomic bomb.

In an address prepared for delivery at a luncheon meeting of the 15th annual convention of the Edison Electric Institute, Parsons said:

"The first defense, which would be positive against a surprise attack, is political and would be accomplished by operations under the Baruch plan.

"The second form of defense is the ability to retaliate.

"The third defense is passive and consists of taking steps to minimize the effect of atomic attack. The Bikini tests come in the third category of passive defense. The technical reports of these tests are now clearly complete and have been acted on by the joint chiefs of staff evaluation board."

FARMERS WATCH PRICE TRENDS AS BASIS FOR SAFEST FUTURE PLANS
Florida farmers, like everyone

else, are vitally interested in price trends on manufactured commodities as well as agricultural products. Their future welfare depends on these price trends and how well they can adjust their operations to them before it is too late.

Just how long current high prices will continue no one knows, but nearly everyone knows the factors involved in or associated with the farm price situation. Prices for farm products in general now are slightly higher than they were at the peak following World War I, a year and a half after the shooting stopped. Now, as then, prices are supported by wide employment, a high national income and strong foreign demand.

American farm products are being exported at a high rate compared with pre-war. The national income is nearly as high as at the end of the war and much higher than ever before. As long as exports remain large and the national income is high, demand for farm products is likely to continue strong. Prices will tend to fall when foreign demand slackens, substantial unemployment occurs or production overtakes demand.

Dr. H. G. Hamilton, agricultural economist at the University of Florida, who studies prices closely, believes, however, that if agricultural prices fall as low as

Russian Decree Lists New Penalties For Crimes Of Violence

LONDON, June 5 (AP)—A Moscow radio broadcast heard here last night by the Soviet Monitor outlined a decree fixing new penalties in Russia for crimes of violence which, it was said, aims at "strengthening the protection of private property of citizens." The decree was issued by the presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR. In Russian quarters here it was recalled that the last session of the Supreme Soviet there was a complaint that penalties for crimes were not uniform throughout the country. It is believed that the new decree brings about standardization of the administration of criminal law.

Lessons Learned At Anzio To Aid Doctors In Atomic Warfare

By FRANK CAREY Associated Press Science Reporter WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Lessons learned at the Anzio Beachhead, in saving precious time and blood-transfusion materials in treating wounded men, will be valuable in case of future atomic warfare, a Boston doctor said today. Describing how techniques introduced at Anzio allowed a 50 percent reduction in the amount of blood and plasma required and also allowed men to be operated on sooner than previously, Dr. Henry K. Beecher of Massachusetts General Hospital declared in an address prepared for an Army Medical Department symposium: "This economy of time and material, economy in the use of blood and plasma, so important in resuscitation, will be clearly necessary if military action ever takes place in difficultly accessible regions of the world, say, the Arctic or Antarctic, where problems of supply will always doubtless be great."

Burnett, another member of the board, found that surgery could be undertaken before a wounded man who had fully recovered from the initial physiological effects of "wound shock." Wound shock is the prostrating condition which results from loss of blood volume. When blood is lost, fluids are drawn unnaturally from body tissues into the blood system, and this causes shock. Plasma and whole blood are used to treat and cure this condition, but many of the severely wounded also require surgery for the repair of damaged blood vessels and organs if life is to be saved.

3 New 'Letter Bombs' Received By Britons

LONDON, June 5 (AP)—Scotland Yard said today that three more explosive "letter bombs" like those delivered to British cabinet members and high Army officers yesterday had been uncovered by investigators trying to stop the "murder by post" packets from Italy. One of three bombs was sent to a prominent person, while the other two were directed to persons less well known, a Yard spokesman said. He did not identify them. He declined to say whether they had been delivered to their intended victims or uncovered by the intensive screening of incoming mail instituted by British postal inspectors. We suppose it is all right to get tough with Hungary (and Russia), but some of these brave speeches would sound better if Congress weren't cutting the Army and Navy to the bone.

West Indian hurricanes which sometimes hit Florida shores are bad enough, but we prefer them to the tornadoes which recently have been playing havoc in Arkansas and Oklahoma. At least you can tell when a hurricane is coming, two or three days before it arrives.

The Census of Agriculture reveals that 30 Florida counties are among the first 50 in the entire United States in the production of oranges. And what is more, little Seminole ranks 24th in the whole United States. There will be no Revolution in India, as there was in this country, to break away from British rule. But if freedom for Indians means freedom to wage racial and religious wars, if it means dividing the country into two or three hostile camps which will go on throughout the years slitting each other's throats, the freedom the Indians gain will be of little value and probably short lived. For, if the British do not return to rule, the Russians will.

The number of persons who knock their home towns, and their home town institutions, seems to be growing almost in direct proportion as Sanford grows and prospers. With more people here than ever before, with more new construction, with more progressive organizations and enterprising plans for the future, there is also more criticism, more belittling of the other fellow and more pessimism. The buzzard's roost, we have always had with us, but there seems to be more roost on it now for insect buzzards. If you can't boast, climb up on the buzzard's roost, where misery loves company.

Waterway for Peace

The St. Lawrence Seaway is under discussion again. By its construction, Great Lakes cities, both in the United States and Canada, would become ocean ports. A committee headed by Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin recently listened to arguments for the seaway by Henry La Liberté, a Duluth business man who estimated it could be built for less than \$400,000,000 with the United States and Canada paying for it on a two-to-one ratio.

The cost to this country would be about \$270,000,000, which could be paid off within 53 years, La Liberté estimated, through toll charges on traffic. The rates would range at first from 75 cents to a dollar per ton, on 20,000,000 tons per year. When the tonnage rose above 30,000,000 tons, the rates could go down to about 30 cents. Construction would probably take about seven years. Proponents of the seaway hope it can be started next year. There are plenty of good reasons for it, and few against it.

An interesting note was added in the hearings by Undersecretary of War Kenneth C. Royall who said that "while the water route would be helpful in war time, it would not be vital." Plainly, a proposal like this to link the lakes with the Atlantic ocean is viewed by some people chiefly in relation to its contribution to needs of war. But the idea of war merely emphasizes the need for this waterway; long and seriously needed to further the pursuits of peace.

Man of Efficiency

The death of Mrs. George B. Cortelyou recalls a political career which, contrary to popular belief, was based on pure efficiency. Her late husband began his connection with Washington as a stenographer for President Cleveland. President McKinley made him his private secretary, an office not highly considered till then. Cortelyou brought out its real possibilities of usefulness.

This pioneering achievement caused Theodore Roosevelt to pick him as first Secretary of the new Department of Commerce and Labor. (Labor was set up separately in 1913). This was in 1903. Next year he ran the President's campaign for re-election. He became Postmaster-General, and in 1907 Secretary of the Treasury. His office-holding ended with Taft's presidency. Cortelyou then was chosen president of the Consolidated Gas Company of New York, a post which he held till his death in 1940.

Everywhere that Cortelyou served, he did well. None of his offices, however, came from popular election. This would probably have handicapped him severely, had the occasional mention of him for the White House ever got beyond the talk stage. Sad experience has taught the United States that the presidency is a political office, requiring political experience.

False Economy

Taxes should be reduced. But discretion is needed. In two instances at least it appears that the House Appropriations Committee is recommending cuts in the wrong places.

One is the slashing to \$1,400,000 of the two and a half million asked under advice of the U. S. Public Service for a mental health program including: research into causes of mental illness; training of mental therapists; establishment in Washington of a hospital for treatment of mentally ill, and to serve as a national model.

The other cut is elimination of the radio program in 25 languages to 67 foreign countries, with particular regard for Russia, aimed at promoting international understanding and interpretation of the American way. Its cost, it is said, if continued 10 years, would equal that for the first hour of the war it seeks to prevent.

Loud noises, will, of course, be heard from every group whose service appropriation is threatened. Its people hope for more money than it needs, and the appropriation can be trimmed accordingly. But trimming is one thing and cuts without care are another. Serious consideration is needed at this point.

Plane Hopes To Make 1000 Miles Per Hour

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 5 (AP)—The Army Air Forces, its experimental tests of the X-1 rocket ship completed, still hopes to attain the plane's full speed of 1,000 miles per hour.

In an announcement made public by the Bell Aircraft Corporation last night, the Air Force said further research with rocket craft was made possible by completion of 20 powered flights over Muroc, Calif., field, together with delivery of the second of the airplanes by Bell. "Precisely how fast the X-1 will be flown is conjectural and dependent on many factors, but it is to be noted that the airplane is designed and powered to reach a maximum speed of 1,000 miles per hour," the Air Force declared.

Soldier Caught After Being AWOL 5 Years

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., June 5 (AP) Deputy Sheriff Andy Casto said today he had arrested a soldier who went AWOL in September of 1942 and has lived almost five years since then in a desolate cave in the nearby hill country.

Casto identified him as Jesse W. Starr, 30, of Mount Clare, about five miles from Clarksburg, a soldier who went AWOL in Camp Reynolds, Pa. eight months after being drafted.

The deputy sheriff and a detail of MP's caught the soldier yesterday at the home of a friend at Mount Clare, where Starr turned up four days ago after deciding to abandon his life in the cave about a mile outside the hamlet. Casto reported Starr had let his hair grow long and wore women's clothes on occasional trips into Clarksburg for supplies. Today he had a fresh haircut and a manicure.

PLAYER BANNED FROM BASEBALL BY TRAUTMAN

COLUMBUS, June 5. (AP).—Marion Allen McElreath, outfielder with the Muskogee, Okla., club of the Western Association, today was banned permanently from baseball by President George M. Trautman of the National Association of Professional Baseball Clubs.

Trautman's action was taken under Major-Minor rule 21 (A) which decrees that a player must give his best efforts toward winning, and that he must not "Solicit or attempt to induce any player to lose or attempt to lose."

The Muskogee player, said President Thomas Fairweather of the Western Association reported to him May 10 that McElreath had approached a fellow player with a proposition that they join in a wager on the outcome of a game.

Trautman said his investigation ascertained that on May 4, at St. Joseph, Mo., McElreath told a fellow player that "We can make some good money if we throw some of the games." He played one of the games and he played that afternoon. The player declined.

Trautman said his investigation of the May 4 game showed that the Muskogee leading 5 to 1, and St. Joseph at bat with the bases loaded, McElreath missed a high fly which went for a triple, three runs scoring.

Later in the game, Trautman reported, with Muskogee at bat and leading 5 to 4, with a man on first, batter McElreath signaled for the "hit and run" but failed to swing at a called strike and the runner was thrown out at second.

Trautman's announcement said McElreath at first denied having any recollection of the missed catch but "a few minutes later, however, he recalled the play in great detail, stating that the ball had been an extremely difficult one to handle and that despite his best efforts to reach it the ball fell untouched behind him, a few feet from the centerfield fence."

Regarding the hit-and-run signal, the decision said McElreath "admits that he gave the 'hit and run' signal to the baserunner, but states that he did not strike at the ball because it was a bad pitch and the runner was safe." "In both cases," Trautman's decision said, McElreath's statements were "refuted" by other observers.

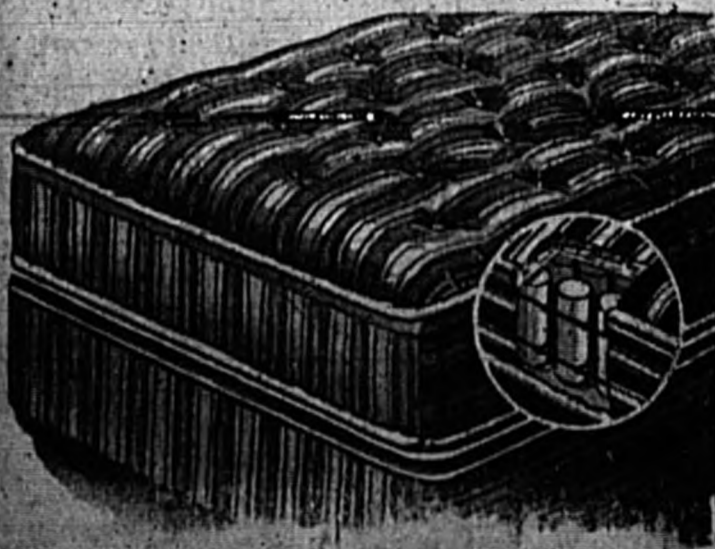

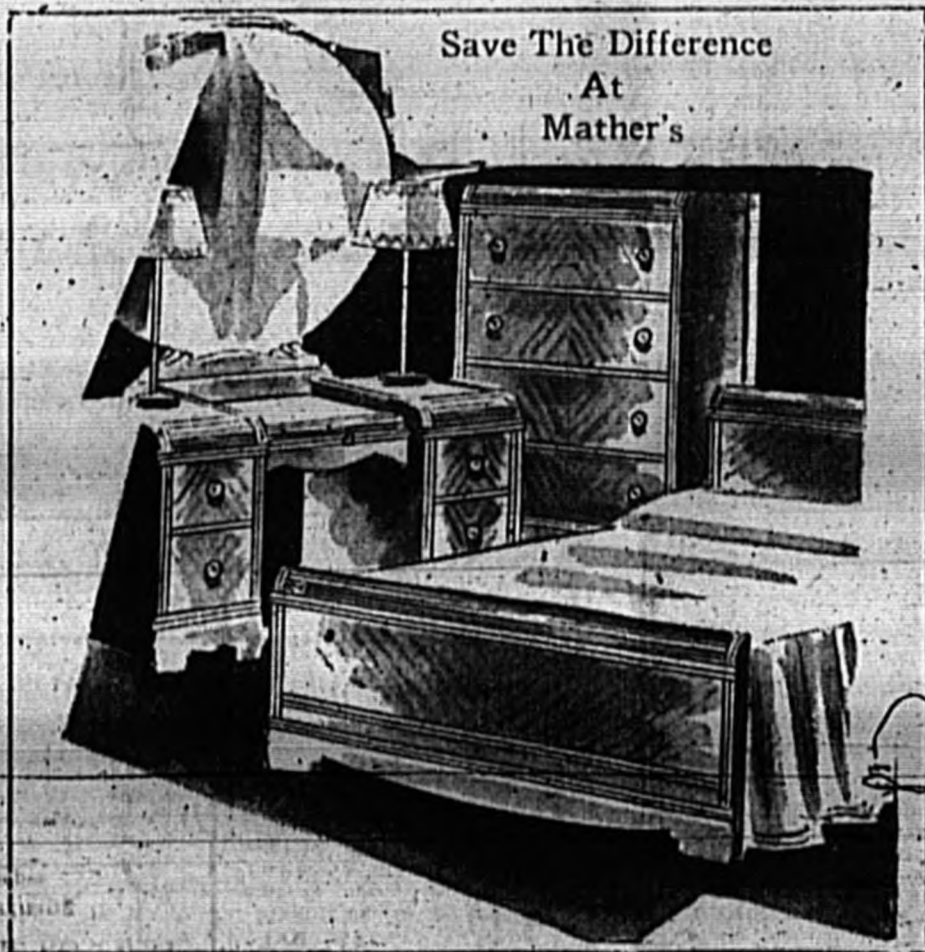
