### 3 arrested in robbery of Steak and Shake

SANFORD — The Steak & Shake restaurant. 40 Towne Center Circle, was robbed early this morning. Sanford and Lake Mary police have already arrested three persons in connection with the case.

According to police commander Dennis Whitmire, at approximately 2:05 this morning, two white men entered the Steak & Shake, armed with a knife, and subsequently forced manager David Caron into a freezer. Whitmire said the men knew to bring a lock with them as there was none on the freezer.

The two were then said to have ordered the cook. Victor Maurice Nathan, to open the cash registers. The two then fled on foot in opposite directons taking an estimated \$800 to \$1,000 in cash.

Whitmire said a short time later. Lake Mary police officer Todd A. Moderson was at the Crystal Restaurant on Lake Mary Boulevard, and spotted two men in the business who matched a description radioed by Sanford police.

He waited until the two drove off then conducted a traffic stop, citing the driver, Danny Wayne Shepard, with having an expired license tag.

Officer Moderson also contacted Sanford police who arrived at the scene, and between the two departments, were able to associated the two men in the car with the Steak & Shake robbers.

They were listed as Danny Wayne Shepard. 19, of 450 Sand Cove Drive, said to have been a former employee of the restaurant, and Larry Dean Griggs. 20, of Hanson Parkway. Each was charged with one count of armed robbery.

Following an investigation, Sanford police said they learned that the restaurant cook, Victor Nathan, reportedly had recognized Shepard, but had been given \$40 by the two to keep him quiet.

Nathan was located at his home at Dorchester Square in Lake Mary this morning and has now been charged with being an accessory to an armed robbery. Police were able to recover much of the money.

# Pit expansion defeated

Neighbors happy over county's decision

SANFORD — The citizens living in the area surrounding the Marquette Shores borrow pit are happy this morning. The Seminole, County Commission has denied a request to expand the pit from 11.9 acres to 27 acres and extend the pit operation for four more years.

The meeting got underway at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday. Each side made lengthy presentations and many citizens, both area residents and others, expressed their opinions. This was subsequently followed by rebuttal from both sides.

As a result, the meeting didn't conclude until shortly before 8 p.m.

Pit owners Sid Vihlen Jr. and Ben Benham were well prepared to convince the commission that the pit expansion would not injure the surrounding area. Represented by Orlando Attorney Ken Wright, expert after expert addressed the commissioners. As each presented his case, a series of documents was given to the clerk for submission on the record.

A number of visuals was also presented. One was a colorful artist rendering of what the pit would look like if the expansion were allowed 



# Education questioned in hiring of chief

SANFORD — Whether or not the Sanford City Commission will change qualifications for hiring a police chief remains questionable. Discussion of the matter during Monday's work session indicated only a three-to-two vote might be forthcoming.

The only change bought up for discussion is to return to the requirement of a full four-year college degree. The job originally called for a four-year degree, but was changed to a two year requirement plus extensive law enforcement background in 1993.

The present police chief, Ralph Russell, would not be effected in the change. While he has a two-year degree, he would be grandfathered in and the change would only come into effect whenever the city began to pursue hiring a replacement.

Each of the commissioners gave their viewpoints on the degree matter during work session discussion.

"Our Seminole County Sheriff doesn't have a four-year degree." said Commissioner Whitey Eckstein. "yet we want to require our police chief to have one. I don't think the ability of a person to handle the job should be limited to a college education. I don't think that alone assures a good chief of police.

Commissioner Kerry Lyons responded, "Comparing this to an elected official is irrelevant," he said. "The city provides the opportunity for all of its employees to go to college, and I think we should expect people to do that."

Commissioner Bob Thomas took the opposite

side. "I don't think a four-year degree should be imperative. A four year degree doesn't mean he or she is a dynamic leader. I don't feel we need to look into it."

Regarding the sheriff's requirements, Commissioner Lon Howell commented, "The only thing a sheriff needs is one vote more than his opponent," he said.

#### Anti-semitic acts down in Fla.

MIAMI - There was a 4 percent decrease in anti-semitic acts in Florida in 1995 - an improvement but not as promising as the 11 percent decrease nationwide, according to the Anti-Defamation League.

There were 152 incidents in Florida of violence, vandalism and harasement against Jews, compared to 158 in 1994.

"While any decrease in anti-Semitism is welcome, there is less cause for optimism in Florida," said Arthur Teitlebaum. ADL's southern area director.

In 1995, Florida had the third highest number nationwide of harasaments, threats and assaults against Jews with 102; New York ranked first with 200, followed by California with 175.

In vandalism. Florida ranked fourth (50) behind New York (170), New Jersey (131) and California (69).

#### Jury asks to be sequestered

MIAMI — A federal jury deciding the fate of two Miami men accused of trafficking \$2.1 billion of cocaine has asked to be sequestered for the remainder of the trial.

The jurors did not specify reasons for the request Tuesday but said "pressure outside the courtroom is tempting." Since we made a promise to you that we would abide by

your orders, this is the only way to go," said a one-page, hand-written note to U.S. District Judge Federico Moreno. Jurors four months ago began hearing the case against Augusto "Willie" Falcon and Salvador "Sal" Magiuta, charged with smuggling 75 tons of Colombian cocaine for the Medellin cartel into the United States for 13 years. Prosecutors said they

were the top U.S. traffickers in the 1980s. Moreno sent the panel home after closing arguments finished Tuesday, but he said he would sequester them beginning Wednesday when they start deliberations.

#### Age discrimination at TV station

MIAMI - A Miami television station was guilty of age discrimination when it threatened to cut an anchor's \$80,000 annual pay in half in an effort to give the station a younger image, a federal judge said.

U.S. District Judge Ursula Ungaro-Benages ruled last week that WPLG-Channel 10 violated Art Carlson's civil rights.

Carlson quit in 1993. The judge ordered the station to pay

Carlson more than a year's back wages.
"I'm absolutely delighted ... " Carlson said Monday night from his home in Bozeman, Mont. Carlson, 46, moved his family there in 1993 where he is a news director for a radio

Carlson was daytime anchor and part-time medical reporter when image consultants told management in 1992 that Channel 10 viewers wanted younger-looking news people on the air, Carlson said.

He says he played along, darkening his hair and mustache and spending \$3,000 on new clothes.

He said the station threatened to cut his pay and demote him to a full-time reporter.

The judge threw out a breach of-contract claim and an accusation that WPLG management slandered Carlson in comments about his leaving.

#### \$100 million produce loss

With losses pegged at more than \$100 million to Florida's fruit and vegetable crops from last week's freeze, shoppers are beginning to see prices climbing in grocery stores, agriculture

Among the hardest hit when subfreezing temperatures gripped the state's 86 billion agriculture industry Feb. 4 were tomatoes and strawberries, said Terry McElroy, spokesman for Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford.

Tomato farmers suffered a \$20-\$30 million loss; strawberry farmers lost \$15-\$20 million because of the weather, agriculture officials said Tuesday.

With both items now in shorter supply, there are scattered reports that market prices have begun to inch upward,

McElroy said. Mexican imports, however, have been an offsetting factor, said Victoria Holesovsky of the Florida Fruit and Vegetable Association.

"You really aren't seeing that much of a loss at the grocery store with fruits and vegetables coming in from Mexico," she said. "There's so much out there, the freeze hasn't hurt the market. It's hurt the farmer."

Holesovsky said the price increase averages about \$4 per 25 pounds.

Losses to vegetables such as bell peppers, potatoes and squash grown in southwest Florida's trucking farming area were estimated at about \$10 million.

The rest is expected to show up as loss to the citrus crop. But it may be weeks until extent of that damage is known, particularly in low-lying areas. Growers are waiting to see if the fleshy part of the fruit froze, if new blooms on the trees perished and if trees were damaged by the frost.

### Peers could recommend waiver for teachers who fail skills test

TALLAHASSEE - Teachers highly touted by their peers should be able to seek waivers from required tests of 10th grade reading, writing and math skills, Gov. Lawton Chiles and the Cabinet say.

Over Education Commissioner Frank Brogan's objections, the panel approved a loophole for the few teachers repeatedly stumped by the College Level Academic Skills Test.

whether a teacher gets a waiver. But Chiles said rather than new rule allows "somebody to look at 'is this a dadgum good teacher? What is the value of their work?"

### Fire claims four family members as seven others escape the blaze

TITUSVILLE - Four members of a Titusville family died when an electric space heater ignited bedding and set fire to their home.

Killed in the pre-dawn fire Tuesday were three children and one adult, said Fire Commander Rick Talbert.

The first units arriving at the central Titusville home found heavy smoke and large flames coming from the house. Talbert said.

Neighbors and family members who had escaped told firefighters of people being trapped inside. Firefighters entered the burning home and found the four victims.

One of the children was taken to Parrish Medical Center, but it was too late to save him. The other three victims were pronounced dead at the scene.

Killed were Johnny Thomas. 52: Emmanuel Thomas, 10: Tiffany Thomas, 6: and Shermaine Wright, 3.

Talbert said all four were related, but had not been able to establish their exact relationship. He said 11 people lived in the house.

Overnight low temperatures in the area dipped into the 30s. Titusville is on Florida's East Coast, near Cape Canaveral.

Mary Smith, who lives down the street, sald she was awakened when the smoke alarm went off in her home. triggered by smoke drifting in from the neighbor's house.



### Motorist on trial for murder Trial opens in shooting of FSU student

By ABAM YSSMAMS Associated Press Writer

TALLAHASSEE (AP) quick trip for an after-midnight pizza turned into tragedy for a university atudent shot and paralyzed by an angry motorist.

Steven Schultz and two friends were leaving the restaurant when another car nearly hit them so they pulled into heavy traffic along a thoroughfare near the Florida State University campus in October

The driver, uppet about being cut off, pounded on Schultz's car. Moments later, the driver walked over, stuck a gun through the window and fired one shot.

Schults alumped over, paralysed instantly from the bullet that hit his head.

"He knew something was wrong," Tallahassee prosecutor Jack Poitinger said Tuesday during opening statements in the trial of Vincent Kenon, the accused gunman. "When the bullet hit him, his arms and legs shot straight out."

Kenon, 24, was accused of shooting Schultz and is being tried for attempted first-degree

Schultz, 25, was a criminology major at Florida State when he was shot. He had just completed an internship at the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish

had arrived to attend an FSU football game that weekend, which also was Florida A&M University's homecoming.

What began as a day of hope, began as a day of celebration. has ended in a lifetime of tragedy for Steven Schultz. Poitinger told the six-member

Kenon, who has been held without bond since the shooting. has denied he was involved with the shooting. The Tallahassee man had never been arrested before and had hoped to earn a criminology degree from FAMU.

But fingerprints lifted from Schultz's car matched Kenon's. A bystander also got the license tag from a car that fled the scene. It was registered to Kenon's mother.

Another motorist who witnessed the shooting identified Kenon as the triggerman.

The defendant's lawyer. Hal Richmond, told jurors Tuesday that some witnesses identified the suspect only after he had appeared in court. Other eyewitnesses have given conflicting accounts, he said.

"You're going to have reasonable doubt," he told the jurors.

Schultz, from Orlando, is scheduled to testify in the trial. He was not present in court Tuesday but his family was there.

He testified at a bond hearing

a year ago via a live satellite TV shadowy figure walked up to the link between his hospital room in Orlando and the Tallahassee courtroom.

At that time, he described himself as "a complete quadriplegic" whose diabetes was worsened by his paralysis.

Schultz's father, Terry, president of Davgar Restaurants Inc. in Orlando, has said his son probably would need constant care from now on.

Stephen Abbe, one of the visiting friends, identified Kenon as the person who leaned out of the driver's side window and pounded on the passenger side of Schultz's car.

A few moments later, a

driver's window and shot Schults in the left cheek. Abbe said he and another friend scrambled out of the car and ran to a nearby restaurant for help while the gumman's car made a U-turn and fled.

### Fighting the big guns

Yesterday's public hearing by the Seminole County Commission regarding the requested expansion of the Marquette Shores borrow pit was interesting. It was a good example of the way our government system

The developer will be allowed to continue operation of the pit for the time being, but the citizens were able to persuade the commissioners to deny the request for a large scale expansion.

There were a few points however, that we believe are worth noting for future reference.

First of all, contrary to the way it may have seemed, this was not a battle of the "people" against government. While there were two sides to the situation, as their generally are, it was those who didn't want the pit expansion. against those who did.

People with property and/or homes near the pit believed it was not suitable for what has become a residential area. The people who operate the pit, of course, wanted the expansion. People who are involved in a business do so in order to make money, and one of the ways to increase profit is to expand the business. This is what it was all about.

The way each side presented its case, however, was as different as day and night. The Marquette Shores borrow pit organization presented professional after professional. Each gave logical reasons why the pit should be expanded. They included an attorney, a civil engineer, a technical engineer, an environmental safety and health specialist, a chemist, a land planner, a landscape architect, and others. In common terms, they brought in the big guns.

The citizens, however, were not well armed. While they had held several meetings on the situation, they could not back their side with cold, hard statistics. There were no professional representatives to prove the points they wanted to make against the proposal.

All they could give were individual and personal reasons why the county commission should deny the expansion.

There were statements made suggesting the present borrow pit had effected some wells, but there was no documented proof. There were allegations that the pit expansion would produce greatly increased noise, dust and smog, but again, there was no documented

Some of the speakers who appeared against the expansion didn't even live in the area. although a few had property within a mile of the pit, or had friends or relatives who lived there.

When one looks at this, we believe persons sitting on the commission had a difficult time making a decision. Fortunately for the people, they believe they have won their battle.

But, for any citizen group making an appeal before government, for any reason, we believe this stands as an example of what is often lacking, and why many decisions appear to be against the people.

It's not that our government bodies won't pay attention to the people, but many decisions must be based on the cold-hard facts. People must have documented proof on their side. They must present facts, and professtonal opinions.

Lacking this, it may be a difficult road. A successful battle can be fought. The residents living near this borrow pit have proven that. But it's difficult to fight city hall unless people are better armed than they generally are.



### **Postal Service** fails to deliver

Back when Ronald Reagan was governor of California, he made an observation about the nation's postal system. "Some 25 years ago," he said, "you could make a longdistance call on a privately owned telephone system from San Francisco to New York for \$28. For that same amount of money, you could send 1,376 letters.

'Today," he continued, "you could make the same telephone call for \$2 and a half, and

for that amount you can only send 41 letters. So the government is investigating the Bell System!

Reagan's remarks come to mind amid news reports that the U.S. Postal Service plans to spend \$90 million this year on an elaborate advertising campaign designed to show that the 219-year-old quasi-governmental institution is not only dependable, but also a bargain.

Postal Service spokeswoman Robin Minard says that these self.

essary because "we face competition in everything." She further claims, "We don't have a monopoly on the mail like most people think.

Well count yours truly among "most people." Last time I checked, the Postal Service had a monopoly on first-class mail. Moreover, the Postal Service so zealously enforces this monopoly that in recent years it has sent out armed postal inspectors to audit the mail rooms of private businesses. Since 1991, at least 21 companies have been hit with more than \$500,000 in postal fines. Their crime was sending out letters by private overnight couriers (like Federal Express) that postal inspectors deemed insufficiently "urgent" -- that could have been sent by first-class mail.

But the reason so many businesses and, increasingly, individuals are looking for alternatives to the Postal Service is because first-class mail has gotten slower and costlier.

Indeed, the Postal Service itself acknowledges that a first-class letter took 22 percent longer to deliver in 1990 than in 1969. Meanwhile, from 1970 to 1991, first-class postal rates rose 385 percent, while the cost of living increased only 244 percent.

Postal customers might find the higher cost and slower delivery time of first-class mail somewhat easier to accept if the Postal Service had markedly improved its reliability. But the evidence suggests that the Postal Service loses or throws out several hundred million pieces of mail each year.

Consider some of the recent postal horror stories. A Rhode Island mailman was arrested after 94,000 letters were found in his backyard. A Boulder, Colo., carrier was arrested after three tons of undeliverable mail was discovered in his house. A Chicago letter carrier was brought up on charges after it was discovered that he hid 40,000 pieces of mail in his truck.

If a private company had been guilty of such lapses in service, it would have gone out of business a long time ago. But the Postal Service is able to get away with its lessthan-reliable first-class mail delivery (at ever-increasing prices) because it's the only

That's why Congress needs to end the Postal Service's monopoly over first-class mail. If there were several competitors vying for first-class mail customers -- rather than a single bureaucratic behemoth -- rates would be lower, delivery time quicker and service far more reliable.





### NBC conquers, but CBS ekes out second in primetime Nielsens

NEW YORK - With help from "Gulliver's Travels," NBC beat out its network rivals in the prime-time Nielsen ratings, while lowly CBS nudged ABC into third place.

The finale of the "Gulliver's Travels" miniseries finished at No. 4 for the week of Feb. 5-11. With six other shows in the top 10. NBC earned a 12.9 rating and a 21 percent average share of the prime-time audience. according to Nielsen figures released Tuesday.

CBS, however, landed "60 Minutes" at No. 8, its "Thorn Birds" miniseries at No. 9. Walker, Texas Ranger" tied for 10th, and the family hit "Touched by an Angel" at No. 14 for a 10.1 rating, 16 share.

ABC's "Home Improvement" was its only top 10 show. The network finished one-tenth of a point behind CBS.

### Mfume promises to revive the legacy of the NAACP

WASHINGTON - Kweisi Mfume is inheriting an NAACP tarnished by scandal and burdened by a \$3.2 million debt. But the Maryland congressman says he can solve these problems while increasing membership and reviving the activist legacy of the nation's oldest civil rights organization.

"I want people to be proud of the NAACP across the board, not a handful of people here or a pocket there," Mfume said in an interview. "I don't want anybody to ever wonder again, 'What does the NAACP do?"

But "wonder" is just what donors and members started to do in mid-1994 upon learning that thousands of dollars from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People were to be used to avoid a sexual harassment lawsuit against Mfume's predecessor, Benjamin Chavis.

Then came accusations of extravagant spending by board members, particularly its former chairman, William Gibson. And with a deficit approaching \$4 million, the NAACP clearly was in a crisis.

Corporate donations slowed to a trickle and hall the staff was laid off. Spending was cut and programs were scaled back or eliminated.

But Mfume's surprise selection in December as president and chief executive officer of the troubled NAACP was seen by many as a breath of fresh air.

As a 47-year-old Democrat who has served nine years in the House and is a former chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus, Mfume knows Capitol Hill politics. He represented some of the poorest sections of his hometown of Baltimore. where he roamed the streets as a homeless youth.

"He is a mature and gifted kind of person," said Diane Atro-American studies and professor of political science at

the University of Illinois. The new job allows Mfume to

continue his longtime advocacy of civil rights and to counter the 'extreme, ultraconservative policies" of the Republicancontrolled Congress he leaves on Sunday, The NAACP was criticized for its absence from debates over GOP plans to end or scale back federal programs for children and the poor.

"The need for the services of the organization has not diminished," said Mfume, who will attend the board of directors' annual meeting this week in New York and will be sworn in Tuesday.

His priorities include increasing membership, particularly among young people, from its current level of 500,000, including 76,000 teens. He also wants the NAACP to enhance its voter registration efforts to include educating voters to the political process and encouraging them to participate.

The NAACP began repairing its image in February 1995, just months after it fired Chavis. Myrlie Evers-Williams, the widow of slain civil rights leader Medgar Evers, replaced Gibson as board chairman.

### Pointer hubby found guilty

LOS ANGELES - Singer Bonnie Pointer's husband was acquitted of spousal battery but convicted Tuesday of two misdemeanors for a Christmas Eve fight with his wife and sister-in-law.

Prosecutors said Jeffrey Bownes, 43, hit his 39-year-old wife and her sister, June Pointer, during an argument over when to leave the party at June's Hollywood Hills home.

Bownes hit her in the face and then broke June Pointer's nose when she tried to intervene, prosecutors said.

Bownes's left eye was injured as well, and he had surgery done on his face while in the jall ward at Los Angeles County-USC Medical Center.

Bonnie Pointer said the prosecution was against her wishes, and that her sister. who was not present, felt the same way.

"All families have fights." said Bonnie Pointer, who has been married to her husband for 15 years. All three people involved had been drinking. and "things just got out of hand," she said.

"This trial should never have taken place," she said. "Now we're going back into the studio.'

Deputy City Attorney Michelle Lim said she was glad "that despite the fact Bonnie recanted, the jury was able to see through Bonnie's testimony and realized she had been hit by her husband."

Bownes faces up to a year and six months in jail and \$3,000 in fines for the convictions on counts of simple battery and battery causing serious bodily injury. Judge Michael S. Mink scheduled sentencing for Feb. 22.

### Teachers push computers over classics

WASHINGTON - Computer literacy, the three R's and hard work are the keys to success - not Shakespeare, Plato and Hemingway, many teachers say.

But critics worry that the classics are getting short shrift in the classroom, leaving American students with a weak grounding in Western In a Public Agenda survey released Tuesday,

less than 25 percent of 1,164 teachers listed classic works by Shakespeare and Plato, or writings by American novelists such as Ernest Hemingway or John Steinbeck, as "absolutely

But 70 percent of the teachers ranked the three R's, the value of hard work, citizenship, computer skills and U.S. history and geography as essential components of public school curriculum.

They don't think Shakespeare is the be-all, end-all for kids," said Steve Farkas, who worked on the survey by Public Agenda, a research group founded by polister Daniel Yankelovich and former Secretary of State Cyrus Vance. "Computer skills emerge from the pack because the teachers connect that with survival in the real

But computer class isn't all about mastering the keyboard, said Patricia Tuma, who teaches computer programs and integrated business systems at Midland High School in Midland.

"Through the learning of computer skills, you can learn all these other things at a much faster rate," she said. "You can use a computer encyclopedia to study American history. Among the survey's other findings:

-Of factors that might determine career success, teachers place "an excellent academic education" a distant third, with only 21 percent saying it is the most important factor. Persistence and inner drive, and knowing how to deal well with people rank first and second.

-Some 27 percent of the teachers think "A" students are "much more likely" to get good jobs. while 46 percent say they are "somewhat more likely" to do so. -More than 80 percent of the teachers

surveyed think it is "absolutely essential" for schools to teach good work habits, honesty and The findings mirrored another Public Agenda

survey of the general public's attitudes about education.

Chester Finn, a former Education Department official in the Reagan administration, said he was not surprised that only a quarter of the general public ranked the classics or American literary works as "absolutely essential." But he was disappointed that teachers didn't rank them

I think teachers have been brainwashed by the political-correctness crowd to think that anything associated with 'classics' is tainted as 'dead, white, European male' imperialism," Finn



### New twist surfaces in 'JFK' case: Investigator kept grand jury records

By ALAM SAYRE Associated Press Writer

NEW ORLEANS - As if the Kennedy assassination probe didn't have enough twists. here's a new one:

A former investigator on the case was thrown in Jail Tuesday for packing up secret grand jury transcripts in his trunk, keeping them hidden for 21 years and then turning them over to a federal panel.

Gary Raymond was taken into custody after a judge gave him the maximum six-month term for violating state grand jury secrecy laws. He was later released on bail pending an

appeal. Raymond once wored for former New Orleans district attorney Jim Garrison, who believed CIA hard-liners had President Kennedy assassinated in 1963 to keep the United

States in Vietnam. In 1969, Garrison put businessman Clay Shaw on trial on charges of conspiring to kill Kennedy. The jury heard 34 days of testimony, then deliberated less than an hour before

acquitting Shaw. Shortly after Harry Connick succeeded Garrison as district attorney in 1974. Connick ordered Raymond to destroy the records of Garrison's grand jury proceeding.

### Nominations show voters don't hold long-term prejudice

LOS ANGELES (AP) - An Australian comedy about barnyard animals that talk. An Italian film about a lovesick postman and a Chilean poet. An epic of an early Scottish hero. An English costume movie based on a Jane Austen novel.

Who could have imagined that these would make up four-fifths of the Academy Award nominations for best picture of 1995? Only the fifth nominee, "Apollo 13," represents Hollywood at its technical and heart-tugging

The nominations for the 68th Oncara indicate new life has sceped into the aging Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, giving it a bracing vitality to face the new century. The results seem to destroy the shibboleths of Academy voters:

1. That they are partial to home-grown product. (Look at the international nature of the best-picture and other

2. That they are overwhelmed by big budgets and box-office success. (Such hits as "The American President," "Batman Forever," "The Bridges of Madison County," "Die Hard with a Vengeance" and "Crimson Tide" drew few or no nominations.)

3. That they are overly influenced by films released in December. (Four of the five best-picture nominees appeared

during the summer or earlier.)
4. That they stick with their old favorites. (Only five of the 20 acting nominees had received Academy recognition before.)

The nominations were an awakener for the hardy souls who showed up to hear them in the pre-dawn chill Tuesday (the publicity-conscious Academy times them to catch the TV morning shows in the East).

"Braveheart," the Scottish war fable starring Mel Gibson in a kilt, dominated with a surprising 10 nominations, including best picture and best director for Gibson. However. most of its nominations came in the less-glamorous technical categories such as sound and makeup.

Gibson was in the middle of a take for his new movie "Ransom" when an assistant flashed 10 thumbs and fingers.

"I thought he was pulling my leg." Gibson said from New York. "As far as celebrating, forget it. I don't do champagne anymore. Real pain is my addiction. I'll just keep on work-

ing."
The other best-picture nominees were "Sense and Sensibility," "The Postman." and "Babe," which led the many surprises.

The innovative film starred domesticated animals that talked convincingly through the magic of computer imagery. A few critics placed "Babe" on their 10-best lists, and it won awards from the Golden Globes and the National Society of Film Critics. ### Clinton says policies have helped

WASHINGTON - President Clinton sent an election-year economic report to Congress today, declaring that his policies have helped foster a strong economy with little danger of recession in the foreseeable future.

'Over the past three years, we have created a sound economic foundation to face the challenges of the 21st century." Clinton said in a message that accompanied the report.

The president said his 1983 deficit reduction bill "set the stage for this economic expansion and resurgence by enacting historic deficit reduction while continuing to invest in technology and education."

Clinton, who made a poor economy the centerpiece of his successful 1992 presidential race, cited a number of statistics to show that his policies had helped to turn things around.

#### Mom, friend arraigned on boy's death

LITTLE AXE, Okia. - There was little dignity in Shane Alan Coffman's short life. There was even less in his death.

The 8-year-old boy died in August from abuse, authorities say, and his body was shoved inside a broken freezer packed with red mud, a pink-handled spade and a headless doll. His body was found Friday by a man who owned the trailer where the boy's family had lived.

Shane's mother, Bertha Jean Coffman, and her boyfriend. Donald Lee Gilson, were arraigned Monday on charges of first-degree murder and concealing the death. Both were denied bond and placed in the county jail to await a preliminary hearing next Tuesday.

All but one of Shane's five siblings, ages 7 to 12, have been placed in protective custody, the state Department of Human Services said Tuesday. Two have been hospitalized for malnourishment; the 12-year-old boy was staying with a grandparent.

WASHINGTON - Six weeks after a memo surfaced pointing to Hillary Rodham Clinton as a key figure in the White House travel office firings, the U.S. attorney is being asked to launch a criminal investigation of whether a presidential aide lied about the matter.

The General Accounting Office, which is the investigative arm of Congress, notified U.S. Attorney Eric Holder that David Watkins may have made false statements to GAO investigators in 1993 when he said the dismissals were prompted by an accounting firm's findings of mismanagement in the travel

But according to a copy of a 1993 memo by Watkins which the White House mays was stored in boxed-up files of his former deputy - it was Mrs. Clinton who was behind the purge.
"We ... knew that there would be hell to pay if ... we failed"

to remove the travel office employees "in conformity with the first lady's wishes," Watkins wrote in his memo, which he said was a draft that was never sent.

### Wages rise little

WASHINGTON - The wages and benefits paid American workers rose just 2.9 percent last year, the smallest increase on record and fresh fuel for the unhappiness of a middle class convinced it is falling behind.

The biggest factor was restraint in health care and other benefits, though they were rising more quickly as the year

The Labor Department said Tuesday the increase in its Employment Cost Index was down from 3 percent in 1994 and the smallest since the government began recording annual changes in 1982.

### Rohatyn withdraws from race

WASHINGTON - New York investment banker Felix Rohatyn withdrew from consideration for the No. 2 position at the Federal Reserve, leaving the Clinton administration scrambling for names of Democrats who could win confirmation in the Republican Senate.

Calling GOP opposition to Rohatyn "cheap politics," White House officials conceded Tuesday that Clinton may not be able to fill two vacancies on the Fed's Board of Governors until after the November elections.

Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan will still be nominated for a third four-year term in spite of the controversy over Rohatyn, said administration officials who spoke on condition their names not be used.

### Congress needs to move on S. L.

WASHINGTON - Congress needs to promptly move on stalled legislation to revive the S&L industry's shaky deposit insurance fund or the industry could suffer severe consequences, top federal regulators warned.

The regulators, in a letter sent Tuesday to House and Senate leaders of both parties, urged action on a proposal to rescue the Savings Association Insurance Fund, or SAIF, which insures deposits at the nation's thrifts up to \$100,000.

# Will drug cause kidney damage?

DEAR DR. GOTT: Since my husband is an insulin-dependent disbetic with a slight kidney problem, he is confused as to what pain reliever to take for arthritis. Aspirin, ibuprofen and acetaminophen have been reported to damage kidneys. What, then, is there for control of arthritis pain?

DEAR READER: Many medicines, including the ones you mention, can — in some cases — cause kidney damage. Fortunately, over the counter aspirin, ibuprofen and acetaminophen carry very little risk of such damage when compared, for example, to prescription anti-arthritis drugs, such as Indocin and Naprosyn.

As I have said before, any patient who consumes medication must weigh the risk/benefit ratio. In your husband's case, the risk (very slight) of kidney damage from these products is far outweighed by the benefit tto be pain-free from his arthritis).

Nonetheless, your husband should carefully check this out with his doctor, who may choose to monitor the kidney function with blood tests.

Because diabetes itself can cause kidney malfunction, the physician may not want to risk further damage, no matter how small the likelihood that this could happen.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A group of my friends are into eating what they call steak tartare, which is raw, ground, high-quality steak. They spice it up with onions and garlic, but it's always eaten raw. I'm a skeptic, since I feel at risk for contracting a bacterial infection such as E. coli. Are my fears real or unfounded?

DEAR READER: Your fears are certainly valid. Raw - or near-raw beef often harbors E. coli bacteria that, when eaten alive, can cause serious intestinal infection with pain, diarrhea and bleeding.

Most experts urge consumers to avoid steak tartare, a delicious hors d'oeuvre, because of the significant threat to health posed by this delicacy.

In fact, based on scientific studies of E. coli outbreaks (some resulting in death) in several metropolitan centers from undercooked beef in fastfood restaurants, these experts also recommend that beef be thoroughly cooked, in order to kill any bacteria and render them harmless.

Let your friends play Russian roulette with their dietary preferences. You and your family should stick to well-cooked beef products.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed with a torn rotator cuff, for which surgery is recommended. Is there an alternate method to correct this problem?

DEAR READER: The rotator cuff is a series of supporting tissues that help hold the shoulder in place. Damage to -14

or tearing of the cuff can result from injury, causing pain on shoulder motion and eventually — if not corrected — a "frozen" shoulder with decreased mobility and weakness. The condition is diagnosed with MRI scanning.

Small tears in the rotator cuff will usually heal over time, especially if the patient embarks on an aggressive program of physical therapy, under

the guidance of an orthopedic nurgeon or a physistrist (a specialist in rehab

In most instances, however, doctors prefer to operate because such surgery repairs the cuff, limits disability and leads to faster recovery than rehab alone.

You should follow the advice given by your orthopedic surgeon. If your tear is significant, an operation may be your best option.

South summed up his problem in six no-trump in no time. Should he play West for the heart ace, heart jack or spade king?


West led the heart four. After only a moment. South called for dummy's heart king. Calmly, Fox-Sheinwold played her two.
