3 arrested in robbery of Steak and Shake

SANFORD — The Steak & Shake restaurant, 40 Towne Center Circle, was robbed early this morning. Sanford and Lake Mary police have already arrested three persons in connection with the case.

According to police commander Dennis Whitmire, at approximately 2:05 this morning, two white men entered the Steak & Shake, armed with a knife, and subsequently forced manager David Caron into a freezer. Whitmire said the men knew to bring a lock with them as there was none on the freezer.

The two were then said to have ordered the cook, Victor Maurice Nathan, to open the cash registers. The two then fled on foot in opposite directions taking an estimated \$800 to \$1,000 in cash.

Whitmire said a short time later, Lake Mary police officer Todd A. Moderson was at the Crystal Restaurant on Lake Mary Boulevard, and spotted two men in the business who matched a description radioed by Sanford police.

He waited until the two drove off then conducted a traffic stop, citing the driver, Danny Wayne Shepard, with having an expired license tag.

Officer Moderson also contacted Sanford police who arrived at the scene, and between the two departments, were able to associate the two men in the car with the Steak & Shake robbery.

They were listed as Danny Wayne Shepard, 19, of 450 Sand Cove Drive, said to have been a former employee of the restaurant, and Larry Dean Griggs, 20, of Hanson Parkway. Each was charged with one count of armed robbery.

Following an investigation, Sanford police said they learned that the restaurant cook, Victor Nathan, reportedly had recognized Shepard, but had been given \$40 by the two to keep him quiet.

Nathan was located at his home at Dorchester Square in Lake Mary this morning and has now been charged with being an accessory to an armed robbery. Police were able to recover much of the money.

Pit expansion defeated

Neighbors happy over county's decision

SANFORD — The citizens living in the area surrounding the Marquette Shores borrow pit are happy this morning. The Seminole County Commission has denied a request to expand the pit from 11.9 acres to 27 acres and extend the pit operation for four more years.

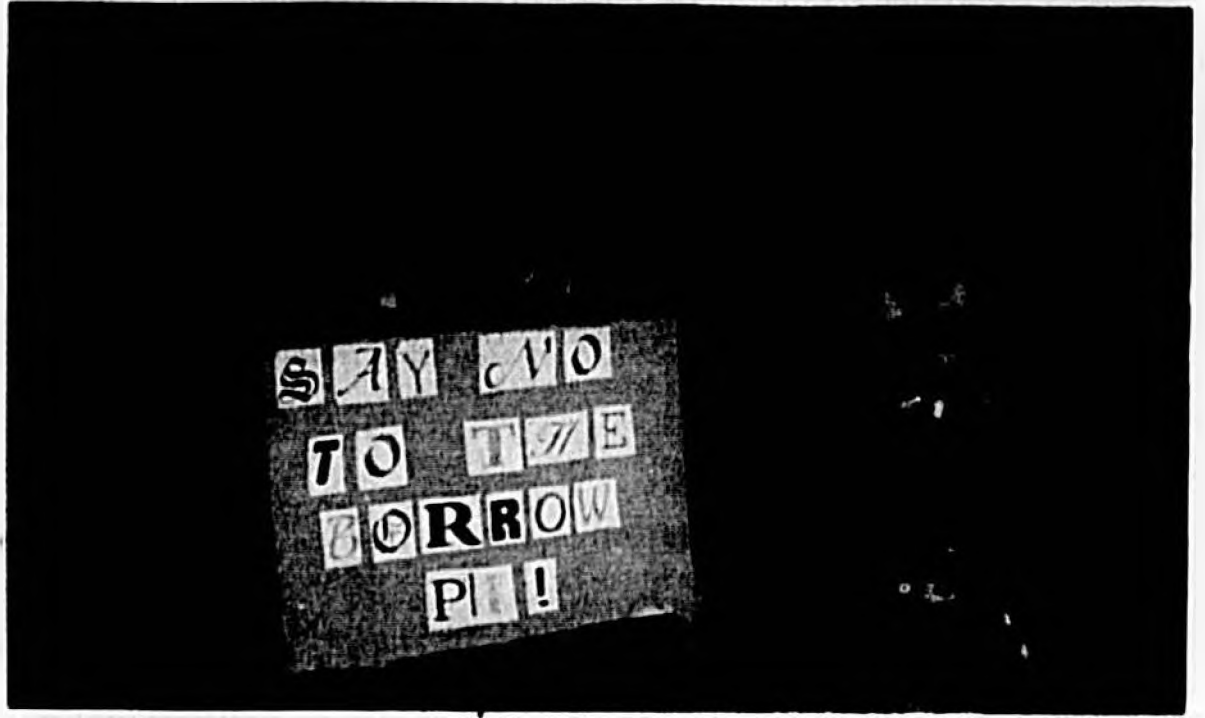
The meeting got underway at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday. Each side made lengthy presentations and many citizens, both area residents and others, expressed their opinions. This was subsequently followed by rebuttal from both sides.

As a result, the meeting didn't conclude until shortly before 8 p.m.

Pit owners Sid Vihlen Jr. and Ben Benham were well prepared to convince the commission that the pit expansion would not injure the surrounding area. Represented by Orlando Attorney Ken Wright, expert after expert addressed the commissioners. As each presented his case, a series of documents was given to the clerk for submission on the record.

A number of visuals was also presented. One was a colorful artist rendering of what the pit would look like if the expansion were allowed

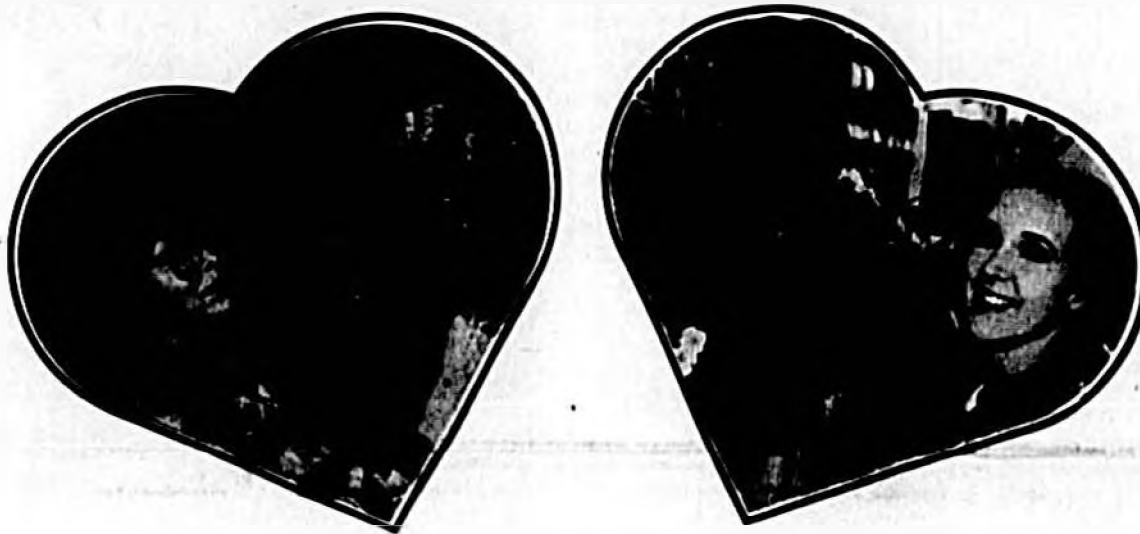

Education questioned in hiring of chief

SANFORD — Whether or not the Sanford City Commission will change qualifications for hiring a police chief remains questionable. Discussion of the matter during Monday's work session indicated only a three-to-two vote might be forthcoming.

The only change bought up for discussion is to return to the requirement of a full four-year college degree. The job originally called for a four-year degree, but was changed to a two year requirement plus extensive law enforcement background in 1993.

The present police chief, Ralph Russell, would not be effected in the change. While he has a two-year degree, he would be grandfathered in and the change would only come into effect whenever the city began to pursue hiring a replacement.

Each of the commissioners gave their viewpoints on the degree matter during work session discussion.

"Our Seminole County Sheriff doesn't have a four-year degree," said Commissioner Whitey Eckstein. "yet we want to require our police chief to have one. I don't think the ability of a person to handle the job should be limited to a college education. I don't think that alone assures a good chief of police."

Commissioner Kerry Lyons responded, "Comparing this to an elected official is irrelevant," he said. "The city provides the opportunity for all of its employees to go to college, and I think we should expect people to do that."

Commissioner Bob Thomas took the opposite side. "I don't think a four-year degree should be imperative. A four year degree doesn't mean he or she is a dynamic leader. I don't feel we need to look into it."

Regarding the sheriff's requirements, Commissioner Lon Howell commented, "The only thing a sheriff needs is one vote more than his opponent," he said.

Mayor Betty Smith said, "You all know where to see Education, Page 5A"

Arts and crafts festival planned on lakefront

SANFORD — While the natural beauty of Fort Mellon Park can not be denied, the first weekend in March always brings a special attractiveness to the shores of Lake Monroe in downtown Sanford.

For more than a quarter century, the St. Johns River Festival has brought some of the finest artisans and crafters together in the park to show and sell their works.

Once again, this year's event is expected to draw thousands of art lovers and visitors to the traditional event.

"There are artists coming from around here, around the state and far away," said Sam Silverman, one of the organizers of event which is sponsored by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce.

The show has, for many years, attracted both artists and those involved in cottage crafts to Sanford.

Many come in for the show and are pleased with the beauty and charm of Sanford, chamber officials said.

The fine artists bring their works which include watercolors, oil paintings and sculptures, as well as creations from paper. Home decorations and beautiful

jewelry will also be displayed by the crafters who created them.

The festival grounds sit among the shady oaks between the chamber of commerce building and the Gen. Henry Shelton Sanford Museum and Library and around Lake Corolla across from the shores of Lake Monroe.

The early March date usually ensures cool temperatures and clear weather.

The great variety of arts and crafts means there is something for everyone who attends.

"We have a nice variety of artists this year, as in other years," Silverman said.

One of the favorite features of the festivals has always been the food. Concession stands, with delights ranging from tacos to Greek Salads to burgers to sweets of all kinds, dot the festival grounds.

This year, organizers said, there will be more to do and taste than ever before. Now in their 26th year, they believe this year's festival may be the best one ever.

To celebrate the long-running event, the organizers will be offering for sale limited edition posters from past shows to showcase where the historic festival.

The event will run from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. on both Saturday and Sunday, March 2 and 3.

Motorist on trial for murder

Trial opens in shooting of FSU student

TALLHASSEE (AP) — A quick trip for an after-midnight pizza turned into tragedy for a university student shot and paralyzed by an angry motorist.

Steven Schultz and two friends were leaving the restaurant when another car nearly hit them as they pulled into heavy traffic along a thoroughfare near the Florida State University campus in October 1994.

The driver, upset about being cut off, pounded on Schultz's car. Moments later, the driver walked over, stuck a gun through the window and fired one shot.

Schultz slumped over, paralyzed instantly from the bullet that hit his head.

"He knew something was wrong," Tallahassee prosecutor Jack Pollinger said Tuesday during opening statements in the trial of Vincent Kenon, the accused gunman. "When the bullet hit him, his arms and legs shot straight out."

Kenon, 24, was accused of shooting Schultz and is being tried for attempted first-degree murder.

Schultz, 25, was a criminology major at Florida State when he was shot. He had just completed an internship at the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish

Commission, and two friends had arrived to attend an FSU football game that weekend, which also was Florida A&M University's homecoming.

"What began as a day of hope, began as a day of celebration, has ended in a lifetime of tragedy for Steven Schultz," Pollinger told the six-member jury.

Kenon, who has been held without bond since the shooting, has denied he was involved with the shooting. The Tallahassee man had never been arrested before and had hoped to earn a criminology degree from FAMU.

But fingerprints lifted from Schultz's car matched Kenon's. A bystander also got the license tag from a car that fled the scene. It was registered to Kenon's mother.

Another motorist who witnessed the shooting identified Kenon as the triggerman.

The defendant's lawyer, Hal Richmond, told jurors Tuesday that some witnesses identified the suspect only after he had appeared in court. Other eyewitnesses have given conflicting accounts, he said.

"You're going to have reasonable doubt," he told the jurors.

Schultz, from Orlando, is scheduled to testify in the trial. He was not present in court Tuesday but his family was there.

He testified at a bond hearing

a year ago via a live satellite TV link between his hospital room in Orlando and the Tallahassee courtroom.

At that time, he described himself as "a complete quadriplegic" whose diabetes was worsened by his paralysis.

Schultz's father, Terry, president of Davgar Restaurants Inc. in Orlando, has said his son probably would need constant care from now on.

Stephen Abbe, one of the visiting friends, identified Kenon as the person who leaned out of the driver's side window and pounded on the passenger side of Schultz's car.

A few moments later, a

shadowy figure walked up to the driver's window and shot Schultz in the left cheek. Abbe said he and another friend scrambled out of the car and ran to a nearby restaurant for help while the gunman's car made a U-turn and fled.

FCC prepared to approve Disney takeover of ABC, strings attached

WASHINGTON — The Walt Disney Co. will have to shed some properties to win federal approval to take over Capital Cities/ABC Inc. in a \$19 billion deal that would create the world's largest media company, attorneys close to the deal say.

The Federal Communications Commission is prepared to approve the merger late today.

The attorneys, speaking on condition of anonymity Wednesday, said the commission won't let Disney permanently

own, as it has requested, radio stations and a newspaper in Fort Worth, Texas, and in Pontiac-Detroit, Mich.

Instead, the commission would provide the company with a temporary waiver — probably one year — from cross-ownership rules to give Disney time to sell or swap the properties, the attorneys said.

Federal regulations prohibit one company from owning a newspaper and a radio station in the same market. A bill overhauling the nation's telecommunications laws, which President Clinton is slated to

sign today, would not change that.

Capital Cities/ABC owns in Fort Worth WBAP-AM and KSCS-FM and the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. It also owns WJR-AM and WHYT-FM in Detroit and the Oakland Press in Pontiac, Mich.

Whether Disney should be permitted to own all these properties was the most contentious issue before the commission.

Since Capital Cities/ABC owned these properties before the FCC had regulations barring such ownership, the properties were grandfathered, the FCC says.

I stand. I never wanted the change in the first place. I'm a strong believer in education, and I hope the voters would prevent this from becoming political in December (city elections)."

While Smith, at one point, described the two year degree change as lowering standards, Commissioner Thomas responded that he didn't believe it was such.

"Let's face it," Smith said, "I will probably not be here whenever the city has to select

the next police chief. So as such, I'm not totally convinced now is the time to change this back."

"I want to vote on it now," Howell responded. "It appears we have three votes to get it approved, so let's get on with it."

While one of the proposed changes in the city charter scheduled for a public referendum in December would place the position of police chief under the control of the city manager rather than the commission, City Manager Bill Simmons said

he would prefer not to make a judgement regarding the two versus four year degree matter.

Following a lengthy discussion on the matter, it was decided that the question should be placed on the city commission agenda once again at the next meeting, on Feb. 28.

While Howell insisted he wanted to bring it up for a vote immediately, he refrained from proposing it during the regular commission meeting which followed the work session.

and all of the dirt (an additional 1.13 million cubic yards), was removed as planned.

Several citizens, however, speaking in opposition to the request, while admitting that it was an attractive visual, questioned what assurance could be given that the land surrounding the pit would eventually look like what was depicted in the presentation.

There was extensive discussion regarding the county's requirement to have the surty bond increased from \$50,000 to \$100,000. Citizens reallocated, stressing that even the \$100,000 would not cover the cost of rebuilding the area should the pit owners decide to cease operation.

Several times during the discussion, Commission Chairman Dick Van Der Weide had to caution members of the public to adhere to the question at hand. Several were chastised for attempting to question individual experts representing the borrow pit group rather than addressing the commission.

One citizen explained that she had purchased her property a few years ago knowing the pit had been approved. Sharon Sullivan commented, "I was told that this was to be only a 12-month permit, after which the pit would become an 11 acre lake with homes around it."

She said she was totally against any request for an expansion, and was one of several who asked for assurance that the land would not be left undeveloped once the pit operation concluded.

Resident Daniel Hauser listed seven stipulations which had been outlined when the pit was first approved in 1993. They

included the requirement that the pit operators install a 100 foot paved driveway, have flashing warning lights installed, limit truck travel to only certain roads, monitor wells, and other requirements. "As far as I'm concerned," he said, "the operators failed to meet all seven of these requirements, and the borrow permit should not be extended if they didn't follow the rules."

With a number of residents observing that the original amount of dirt proposed for excavation from the original 11.9-acre pit had not been fully removed, discussion turned to how much dirt was still available in the original pit, and how long it may take to have it removed.

Approaching it from a point of completing the original borrow pit excavation rather than continuing discussion on a requested expansion, the commissioners eventually moved to extend the borrow permit authorization, not for four years with the expansion as had been requested by Vihlen and Benham, but for two years, without an expansion, to allow for the remainder of the original borrow pit dirt to be removed.

The four-to-nothing vote drew a large round of applause from the audience.

Commissioner Randy Morris did not vote on the matter. At the start of the meeting, he reported that he would not be voting because of a conflict of

interest, having been associated with a borrow pit operation at one time.

Vihlen and Benham have also requested the commission overturn a previous decision by the county Board of Adjustment. The BOA had denied their request to allow burning of debris at the borrow pit site. It has been scheduled to be heard by the commission on February 27.

As a result of yesterday's hearing, there was no immediate indication as to whether or not the ruling will still be sought.

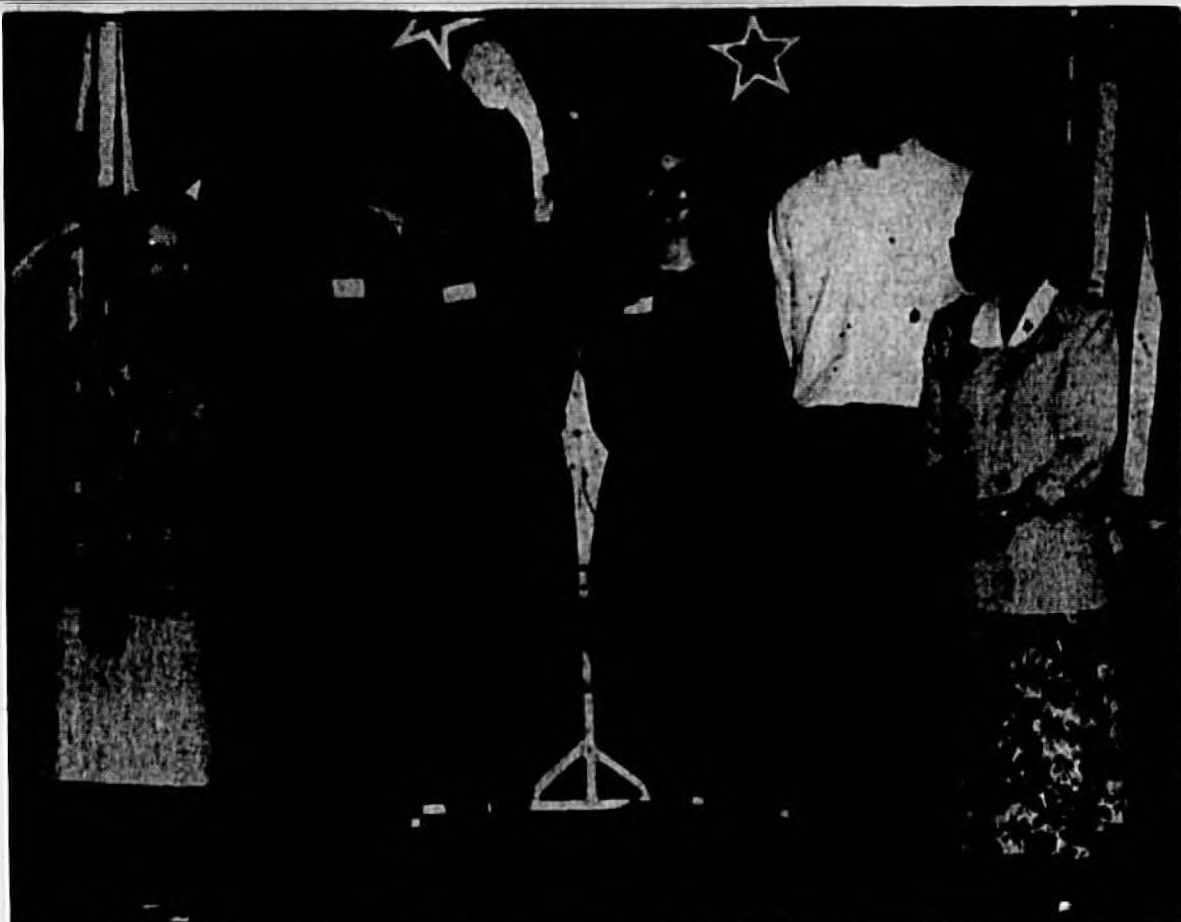

Oscars Nominations show voters don't hold long-term prejudice

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An Australian comedy about barnyard animals that talk. An Italian film about a loveless postman and a Chilean poet. An epic of an early Scottish hero. An English costume movie based on a Jane Austen novel.

Who could have imagined that these would make up four-fifths of the Academy Award nominations for best picture of 1995? Only the fifth nominee, "Apollo 13," represents Hollywood at its technical and heart-tugging best.

The nominations for the 68th Oscars indicate new life has seeped into the aging Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, giving it a bracing vitality to face the new century. The results seem to destroy the shibboleths of Academy voters:

1. That they are partial to home-grown product. (Look at the international nature of the best-picture and other nominees.)

2. That they are overwhelmed by big budgets and box-office success. (Such hits as "The American President," "Batman Forever," "The Bridges of Madison County," "Die Hard with a Vengeance" and "Crimson Tide" drew few or no nominations.)

3. That they are overly influenced by films released in December. (Four of the five best-picture nominees appeared during the summer or earlier.)

4. That they stick with their old favorites. (Only five of the 20 acting nominees had received Academy recognition before.)

The nominations were an awakener for the hardy souls who showed up to hear them in the pre-dawn chill Tuesday (the publicity-conscious Academy times them to catch the TV morning shows in the East).

"Braveheart," the Scottish war fable starring Mel Gibson in a kilt, dominated with a surprising 10 nominations, including best picture and best director for Gibson. However, most of its nominations came in the less-glamorous technical categories such as sound and makeup.

Gibson was in the middle of a take for his new movie "Ransom" when an assistant flashed

10 thumbs and fingers.

"I thought he was pulling my leg," Gibson said from New York. "As far as celebrating, forget it. I don't do champagne anymore. Real pain is my addiction. I'll just keep on working."

The other best-picture nominees were "Sense and Sensibility," "The Postman," and "Babe," which led the many surprises.

The innovative film starred domesticated animals that talked convincingly through the magic of computer imagery. A few critics placed "Babe" on their 10-best lists, and it won awards from the Golden Globes and the National Society of Film Critics. Nonetheless, it was a longshot for a best-picture Oscar nomination. Like "Four Weddings and a Funeral" last year, its appeal could not be ignored.

New twist surfaces in 'JFK' case: Investigator kept grand jury records

NEW ORLEANS — As if the Kennedy assassination probe didn't have enough twists, here's a new one:

A former investigator on the case was thrown in jail Tuesday for packing up secret grand jury transcripts in his trunk, keeping them hidden for 21 years and then turning them over to a federal panel.

Gary Raymond was taken into custody after a judge gave him the maximum six-month term for violating state grand jury secrecy laws. He was later released on bail pending an appeal.

Raymond once worked for former New Orleans district attorney Jim Garrison, who believed CIA hard-liners had President Kennedy assassinated in 1963 to keep the United States in Vietnam.

In 1969, Garrison put businessman Clay Shaw on trial on charges of conspiring to kill Kennedy. The jury heard 34 days of testimony, then deliberated less than an hour before acquitting Shaw.

Shortly after Harry Connick succeeded Garrison as district attorney in 1974, Connick ordered Raymond to destroy the records of Garrison's grand jury proceeding.

Instead, Raymond put the files in his trunk, then kept them hidden for 21 years. He wasn't sure what to do with them — until Connick told the federal Assassination Records Review Board last June that the files had disappeared when Garrison left office.

"Not only is the man lying about these records, but he is trying to pin it on Garrison's people," Raymond said.

Raymond went to WDSU-TV reporter Richard Angelico with the files, and asked him to pass them on to the review board. Angelico did, but also went on the air with the names of the people who testified two decades ago.

Criminal District Judge Frank Marullo, who cited Raymond, said he would decide next week whether to hold Angelico in contempt.

Raymond said he only went to Angelico because the reporter knew who to contact on the

review board. He said he knew nothing of Angelico's plan to report on the transcripts.

"If Mr. Angelico wanted to have some fun with Harry Connick, that was his business," Raymond said. "Connick was embarrassed and he deserved to be."

The federal review board now has the records and wants to release them, but is waiting for the courts to clear up their legal status, said board spokesman Tom Samoluk.

"These documents are an important part of the historical record of the Kennedy assassination because they were part of the Garrison investigation," Samoluk said. "They involve an important and much-studied chapter of the Kennedy assassination story."

The board was created by Congress in 1992 in an attempt to address any public concern that the government has not divulged all it knows about the assassination.

So far, hundreds of thousands of Kennedy assassination records have been logged with the National Archives.

Competing in N.H.

CONCORD, N.H. — Competing for New Hampshire momentum, Bob Dole and Lamar Alexander were rolling out high-profile endorsements today while arguing over who would be the best Republican candidate against President Clinton.

After back-to-back defeats, Texas Sen. Phil Gramm prepared to call it quits.

The dizzying pace of developments reflected the urgency, and volatility, of the GOP campaign six days before New Hampshire's primary. And as eight GOP hopefuls campaigned across the state today, they had to prepare for a televised debate Thursday night.

"You don't go to the White House unless you win New Hampshire," Dole said Tuesday night in framing the stakes for the weeklong sprint here.

Clinton says policies have helped

WASHINGTON — President Clinton sent an election-year economic report to Congress today, declaring that his policies have helped foster a strong economy with little danger of recession in the foreseeable future.

"Over the past three years, we have created a sound economic foundation to face the challenges of the 21st century," Clinton said in a message that accompanied the report.

The president said his 1993 deficit reduction bill "set the stage for this economic expansion and resurgence by enacting historic deficit reduction while continuing to invest in technology and education."

Clinton, who made a poor economy the centerpiece of his successful 1992 presidential race, cited a number of statistics to show that his policies had helped to turn things around.

Mom, friend arraigned on boy's death

LITTLE AXE, Okla. — There was little dignity in Shane Alan Coffman's short life. There was even less in his death.

The 8-year-old boy died in August from abuse, authorities say, and his body was shoved inside a broken freezer packed with red mud, a pink-handled spade and a headless doll. His body was found Friday by a man who owned the trailer where the boy's family had lived.

Shane's mother, Bertha Jean Coffman, and her boyfriend, Donald Lee Gilson, were arraigned Monday on charges of first-degree murder and concealing the death. Both were denied bond and placed in the county jail to await a preliminary hearing next Tuesday.

All but one of Shane's five siblings, ages 7 to 12, have been placed in protective custody, the state Department of Human Services said Tuesday. Two have been hospitalized for malnourishment; the 12-year-old boy was staying with a grandparent.

Investigation sought for Hillary

WASHINGTON — Six weeks after a memo surfaced pointing to Hillary Rodham Clinton as a key figure in the White House travel office firings, the U.S. attorney is being asked to launch a criminal investigation of whether a presidential aide lied about the matter.

The General Accounting Office, which is the investigative arm of Congress, notified U.S. Attorney Eric Holder that David Watkins may have made false statements to GAO investigators in 1993 when he said the dismissals were prompted by an accounting firm's findings of mismanagement in the travel office.

But according to a copy of a 1993 memo by Watkins — which the White House says was stored in boxed-up files of his former deputy — it was Mrs. Clinton who was behind the purge.

"We ... knew that there would be hell to pay if ... we failed" to remove the travel office employees "in conformity with the first lady's wishes," Watkins wrote in his memo, which he said was a draft that was never sent.

Wages rise little

WASHINGTON — The wages and benefits paid American workers rose just 2.9 percent last year, the smallest increase on record and fresh fuel for the unhappiness of a middle class convinced it is falling behind.

The biggest factor was restraint in health care and other benefits, though they were rising more quickly as the year ended.

The Labor Department said Tuesday the increase in its Employment Cost Index was down from 3 percent in 1994 and the smallest since the government began recording annual changes in 1982.

Rohatyn withdraws from race

WASHINGTON — New York investment banker Felix Rohatyn withdrew from consideration for the No. 2 position at the Federal Reserve, leaving the Clinton administration scrambling for names of Democrats who could win confirmation in the Republican Senate.

Calling GOP opposition to Rohatyn "cheap politics," White House officials conceded Tuesday that Clinton may not be able to fill two vacancies on the Fed's Board of Governors until after the November elections.

Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan will still be nominated for a third four-year term in spite of the controversy over Rohatyn, said administration officials who spoke on condition their names not be used.

Congress needs to move on S L

WASHINGTON — Congress needs to promptly move on stalled legislation to revive the S&L industry's shaky deposit insurance fund or the industry could suffer severe consequences, top federal regulators warned.

The regulators, in a letter sent Tuesday to House and Senate leaders of both parties, urged action on a proposal to rescue the Savings Association Insurance Fund, or SAIF, which insures deposits at the nation's thrifts up to \$100,000.
