MRS. LANSDOWNE REITERATES HER FIRST TESTIMONY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Mrs. Margaret Rose Lansdowne, the young widow of Commander Zachary Lansdowne, took direct testimony Friday with Secretary Wilbur before the naval court of inquiry on question of whether her husband did protest against the mid-continental flight of the airship Shenandoah.

Recalling that immediately after the wreck of the Shenandoah she had asserted that her husband had lodged a protest against the flight and that the naval secretary had followed with a statement that no protest had been made, Mrs. Lansdowne said one of her reasons for appearing before the court was to emphasize that her assertions were substantiated by official correspondence read into the record of the court.

This correspondence, she added, consisted of her husband's letter to the chief of naval operations Aug. 4, recommending postponement of the flight until the second week in September and the making of a trial flight, to be held on the morning of the 11th of April. Both of these recommendations were disapproved by the chief of naval operations on Aug. 12.

Because of weather conditions during the thunderstorm period in the middle west, Mrs. Lansdowne continued, "the long legs of the flight on a rigid schedule, and I untried that, my husband was very much opposed to this flight and protested as vigorously as any officer is allowed to do to his superiors."

Accompanied by two women friends and dressed in black, the young widow was completely self-possessed. After hearing her statement the court adjourned until Monday.

BISHOP BROWN TO HEAR FATE NEXT MONDAY

Episcopal Clergyman Told To Appear Before Presiding Official; Convention Was Upheld Thursday By Bishops

Most of Big Church Deficit Is Raised

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 10.—The Right Rev. William Montgomery Brown, Episcopal bishop convicted heresy by a church court and whose conviction was sustained by the house of bishops of the Episcopal church here yesterday, last night announced that he had received summons to appear Monday before the most Rev. Ekelbert Talbot, presiding bishop for sentence.

Exhibiting an order to that effect purporting to bear the signature of the presiding bishop the deposed prelate told newspapermen that he had now "changed his mind about leaving New Orleans, and would stay and fight this thing out to a finish."

He refused to indicate what action he contemplated in view of the order directing him to appear for sentence. The presiding bishop could not be reached for a statement. All but \$99,000 raised. All but \$99,000 of the \$1,500,000 deficit facing the Episcopal church in the United States was raised by a joint subscription in a joint meeting of the houses of bishops and house of deputies today.

The subscriptions to wipe out the deficit were started at the morning session when New York pledged \$250,000 and at the close of the afternoon session \$1,401,000 had been pledged for this purpose. The joint session of the two houses was held for the purpose of hearing the report of the national council.

Bishop Thomas F. Gallor, president of the council, in introducing the report presented a survey of the work of the church pointing out the "remarkable increases of offerings since recent years." In 1923 the amount contributed was \$15,000,000 over and above that of 1922.

Amundsen Returns Home To Complete Preparations For Flight From Rome To Nome

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Undaunted by Arctic perils, Captain Roald Amundsen, whose Polar airplane expedition barely escaped perishing last summer, arrived Friday from Europe to begin preparations for a resumption of the flight next summer from Rome to Nome in a semi-rigid dirigible.

As a continuation of last summer's attempt to fly across the roof of the world, Amundsen and his youthful American patron, Lincoln Ellsworth, will head a party of 18 scientists and aeronautical experts on an adventure to fly across the Amundsen-Ellsworth transpolar route. The purpose of the flight will be geographical exploration and survey of a million square miles of Polar regions between the point where Amundsen's expedition stepped last summer and Alaska, the explorer hoping to discover large areas of land upon which he will plant the Norwegian flag.

Hopping off from Spitzbergen late in May, after the dirigible has been flown from Italy, via England, Amundsen and Ellsworth hope to reach Alaska in sixty hours. "If we are lucky," said Amundsen yesterday, "we will fly on to Nome—if of lucky, we will walk."

Amundsen's only disappointment upon arrival here, he said, was not to find Ellsworth, famous for his heroic part in the expedition of last summer. He emphasized Ellsworth's role in the proposed flight, saying, "It would be impossible to carry on the project without him, as he brings to it enthusiasm and American interest."

Ellsworth financed Amundsen's first flight to the extent of \$80,000 and will give \$100,000 to next year's expedition. He will be the only American and will act as scientific leader and navigator. SOUTHLAND GETS TIL FIRST TOUCH OF REAL WINTER

Many Communities Report Decided Temperature Changes as Chilly Winds Produce Man y Overcoats

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Sudden drops in temperatures late Friday and last night gave Dixie its first touch of real winter. Swept by chilly winds, many communities reported decided changes in temperature and official forecasts contained predictions of frost in some localities. Following the long drought, which continued for more than two months in some sections, the change to cooler weather produced a crop of overcoats on the streets and caused a hunt for blankets laid away for many months.

Reports from sections of the west which told of snow, awakened fears among Southern farmers, who have pinned their hopes to fall crops after the parching dry weather of late summer. Dixie shivered last night from Virginia through the middle Atlantic states. Although temperatures were not extremely low, the sudden change produced much the same effect as a bit of freezing weather. Official forecasts contained predictions of frost in upper Georgia, North and South Carolina and Tennessee.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The suggestion that Senator Couzens' committee on investigation of the Internal Revenue Bureau of the Treasury Department be given a new lease of life when Congress meets in December was received in administration circles in gloomy silence—no applause.

This committee was a source of much worry to the administration last year and the earlier part of the present one.

The Internal Revenue Bureau handles far more of the government's money than any other of its agencies, and if anything is wrong there it's apt to be wrong on an exceedingly large scale.

Which just goes to illustrate one of the worst troubles two countries encounter when they undertake to adjust a difference of opinion. Neither more than half knows what the other is talking about and presently they get to fighting, as about the only way there is left to settle it.

In Bed Inspiration Of Swede Inventor

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Difficulty in awakening and his fondness for a cup of hot coffee in bed, were two factors that led Dr. Gustaf Dalen, winner of the 1912 Nobel prize, to become a successful inventor.

Dr. Dalen as a boy, living in a humble country home, was required to arise early, but he found it hard to awaken on time. A discarded old wall-clock was repaired to which was added an alarm mechanism with a piece of tin-plate taking the place of the bell. He combined the clock work with a little friction wheel covered with emery paper that began to rotate 15 minutes before the alarm went off. Friction against the rough surface of the paper lighted a match.

The match was attached to a rod that swung over a gasoline lamp, the cap of which was simultaneously removed by another contrivance constructed from a couple of empty wooden spools and a piece of string. Over the lamp he had placed a coffee urn containing coffee prepared the night before. When the slumbers of the little inventor, then 14 years of age, were interrupted by the alarm going off the room was lighted and his coffee was boiling.
