Repeal Delegates End
Task In Only 3 Hours

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 16.—(AP)—

Florida yesterday became the
thirty-first state to move by con-
vention to strike the 18th Amend-
ment from its national constitu-
tion, but the official recognition of
the electorate's choice was only an
empty gesture as far as the
state sale of liquor was concerned.

Stringent state liquor laws
passed long before national pro-
hibition, do not seem before the
voters until the Nov. 18, 1934,
general election, when article 10,
"the bone dry" amendment to the
state constitution, will be voted on.

With repeal of the state amend-
ment then, the state would revert
to the local option statutes. Four
counties, Hillsborough, Tampa,
Nassau, Hernando; Monroe, Key
West, and Escambia, Pensacola,
would become automatically wet
without further vote.

Florida's formal vote ratifying
the 21st amendment to the national
constitution which annuls
the 18th Amendment, was officially
recorded at 3:30 P. M. yesterday
by members of a convention
elected by state-wide referendum,
Oct. 10.

Woodin Given Lengthy
Leave Of Absence;
Morgenthau Takes
Over Responsibility

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.

—(AP)—President Roosevelt
today announced that Secretary
Woodin would begin a
"complete leave of absence"
at the end of the week and that
pending his return
Henry Morgenthau, Jr. would
be acting secretary of the
treasury.

Under-secretary Dean Acheson
has resigned and Morgenthau will
be appointed to that post.

Woodin tendered his resignation
to the President several days ago
but Mr. Roosevelt declined to accept
it, suggesting instead that the Secretary be completely freed
from all governmental responsi-
bility while he takes a complete
rest.

He had been suffering from
throat infection which has re-
quired constant treatment by New
York specialists.

Mr. Woodin will receive no re-
muneration during his absence.
