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## DeLand City Officials Face 'Sunshine' Bill

DELAND (AP) — The entire city commission and the city manager of DeLand have been indicted by a Volusia County grand jury for alleged violation of Florida's Government-in-the-Sunshine Law.

Indicted were Mayor Sidney Smith, commissioners Walter Glatzau, Harry Appay, Hayward Eitson and Neil Daugherty, and City Manager Wayne Sanborn.

They are free on recognizance bonds pending a hearing Nov. 3 before County Judge Robert Durden. Warrants were served on the officials Tuesday.

The grand jury handed down sealed prearrests Monday after hearing testimony from an Orlando reporter, Bernie Bishop.

He said he had been barred from a Sept. 12 commission meeting after he refused to agree not to publicize what transpired until given approval by city officials.

Bishop testified that the Sept. 12 meeting dealt with a discovery of a shortage in general municipal funds.

Maximum penalty for sunshine law violations is \$1,000 and six months in jail.

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## Jurist Denies Defense Motion

# Fireman's Widow Faces Trial

Mabel Frances Thompson, widow of slain Sanford fireman Bobby Thompson, must stand trial for his death as a result of a judge's decision last night.

Circuit Judge E. Thom Rumberger denied a defense motion to suppress evidence taken by Sanford police at the couple's former home at 1908 West Fourth Street.

Mark N. Cleveland Jr., after Judge Rumberger had concluded seven hours of hearing the defense motion that the constitutional rights of his client were violated by police, said he would make up his mind in a day or two whether to appeal Rumberger's decision or allow the case to go to trial as scheduled on Oct. 20.

If Cleveland decides to appeal, the trial date would have to be changed in order to allow for

Fourth Circuit Court of Appeal at Vero Beach to rule on Rumberger's decision. Mrs. Thompson's rights were not violated as a result of the entering of her home by Sanford detectives Don Brumby and Ralph Russell without either an arrest or search warrant.

The defense maintained the home was occupied by the woman even though State Attorney Abbott M. Herring produced 19 witnesses whose testimony tended to show that all utilities, telephone service and other facilities had been cut off shortly before the fire. (Cont. on Pg. 1B, Col. 4)

## Judge Silences Court Aides

Efforts by a Sanford attorney to control news coverage during the trial of a woman accused of killing her husband and stuffing his body in a hall closet were only partly successful as a result of a decision by Circuit Judge E. Thom Rumberger.

Mark N. Cleveland Jr., representing Mabel Frances Thompson, accused in the death of her husband, Bobby Thompson, said he would file a motion to control news coverage during the trial of the woman.

Yesterday, Judge Rumberger forbade all police officers, sheriff's department employees, court officials as well as state court officials from discussing the subject with the media while the case is being tried.

The judge did not restrict all news coverage to only court testimony as sought by Cleveland but did say he hoped that the news media would handle the case in a responsible manner so as not to force a mistrial due to misinformation and gossip.

The jurist forbade taking photographs on court house property or adjacent to the courthouse during the trial.

Rumberger said his court or any other court cannot restrict news coverage of a trial and it was not in the court's prerogative not to order the suppression of news materials.

Cleveland cited several news stories which tended to show there was a conspiracy by

someone to prevent the case from ever coming to trial and showed Rumberger several clippings from papers which kept his client from receiving a fair trial, he said.

The attorney was particularly upset by articles quoting relatives of Bobby Thompson as feeling that justice would not be served and in his motion asked the court to prohibit these statements.

Rumberger did not attempt to rule on the right of free speech and later informed The Herald that his decision would reduce the statements to just gossip since no court or police agency would be allowed to make the statements.

Harry Skop, candidate for the Sanford city commission, was sued in Seminole County Circuit Court for an excess of \$500 by his former wife, Irene Skop, of Baltimore, Md.

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# Movieland's Jungleland On Auction Block

 THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. (AP) — Forty-three years ago a young animal attendant for the Universal Pictures built a few cages in a rural valley west of Hollywood, brought in some lions and called it "Goebel's Lion Farm."  
 Louis Goebel's idea was to rent animals to movie studios, so they wouldn't have to keep their own menageries. Later, he sold tickets and let the public watch animal trainers at work. His 27-acre complex, later renamed Jungleland, flourished. Here Tarzan pictures were made when Johnny Weissmuller was the star. This is where Dr. Doolittle talked to the animals. Hundreds of movies, television shows and commercials used 1,800 animals of all varieties. Top lion and tiger trainers

prepared their acts here. But times and public tastes change. Where jack rabbits once hopped, housing tracts sprang. A freeway bounds one side of the park. The Conejo Valley is now a booming Los Angeles suburb.  
 Come Wednesday, the ring of an auctioneer's hammer sounds the end of Jungleland.  
 The place is in bankruptcy. An attorney appointed to handle the case blames high insurance costs, dwindling attendance and "bad feeling" between Goebel—who still owns the land—and the latest of six sets of exhibit owners.  
 Except for the land, everything goes: animals, buildings, cages, ticket booths, trucks, filing cabinets, even hay and grain.

Buyers are getting inquiries from all over the world, from museums, zoos and circuses. The list of animals reads like a roster of the ark: lions, tigers, leopards, jaguars, elephants, hippos, chimps, baboons, wallabies, monkeys, camels, goats, seals, deer, brown bears, iguanas, zebras, bears, turtles, skunks, alligators, lizards, llamas, flamingos... and on and on.

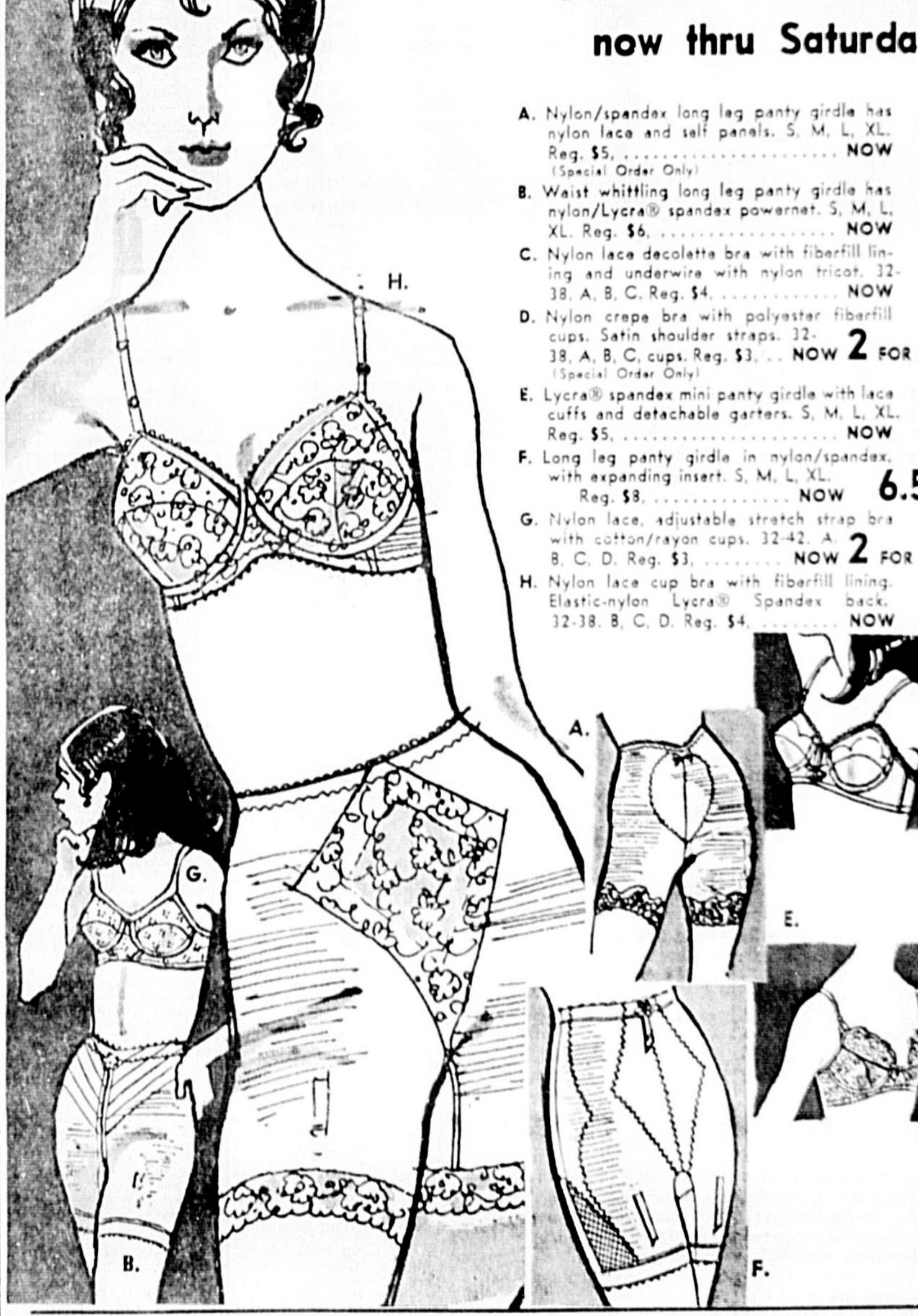

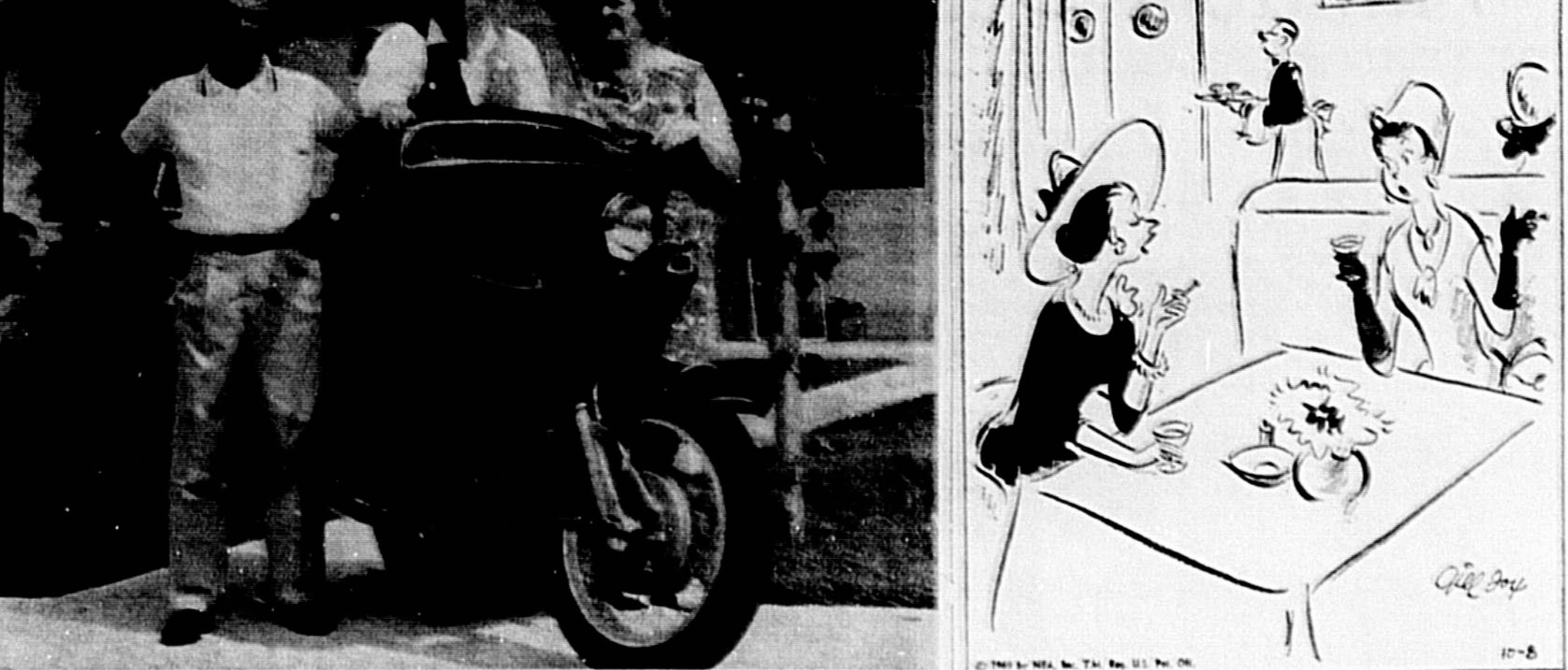

### Sea Farming License Sought

The first application under Florida's 1969 Mariculture Law for permission to conduct sea farming in state waters has been submitted to a Tallahassee City firm.  
It could mean \$180,000 in revenue over a 10-year period.  
The application to rent submerged lands, scheduled today for State Cabinet consideration, was submitted by Marifarms Inc., and would permit the firm to conduct commercial shrimp farming in a 2,500-acre area.  
The waters proposed for the operation are north and west of the Hawthorne Bridge, west of Panama City, said a spokesman for the office of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund.  
"This would be the first application to the trustees under the new law, and under the guidelines established," said staff

member Jim Williams. Marifarms Inc. includes staff members who are Japanese and who brought to this country commercial shrimp farming techniques developed first by Japanese.  
Under guidelines established by the trustees to implement the 1969 law, Marifarms would pay the state \$5 per acre in rent for the first one and one-half years, \$5 per acre from then through five years, and pay \$10 per acre the last four years.  
Once they begin operating and actual selling of commercial shrimp, Florida will determine what royalties it is to receive.  
Under the law and its implementing guidelines, the firm must allow the public access to the waters. It is using for sea farming.  
Another requirement is that the company replace certain

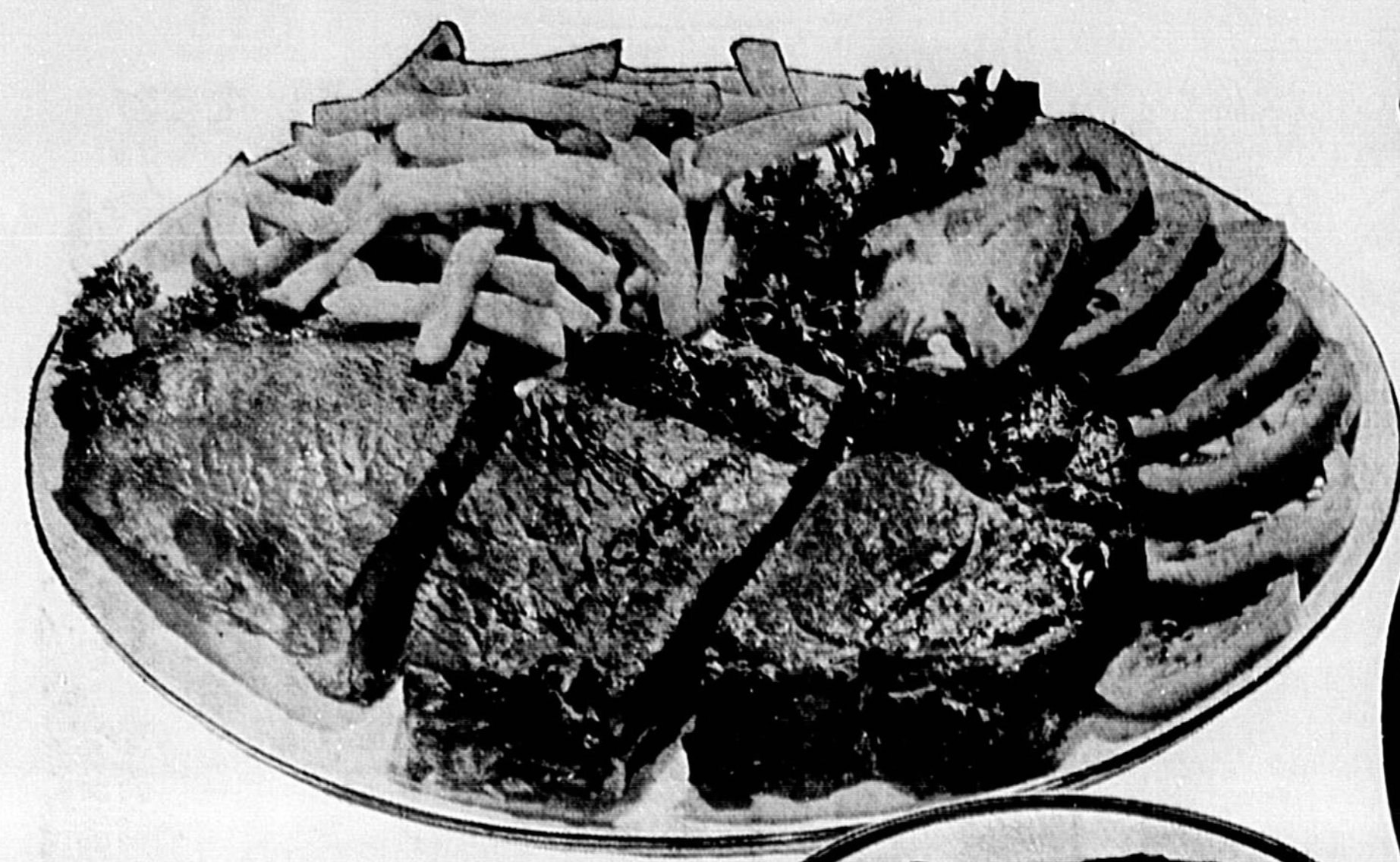

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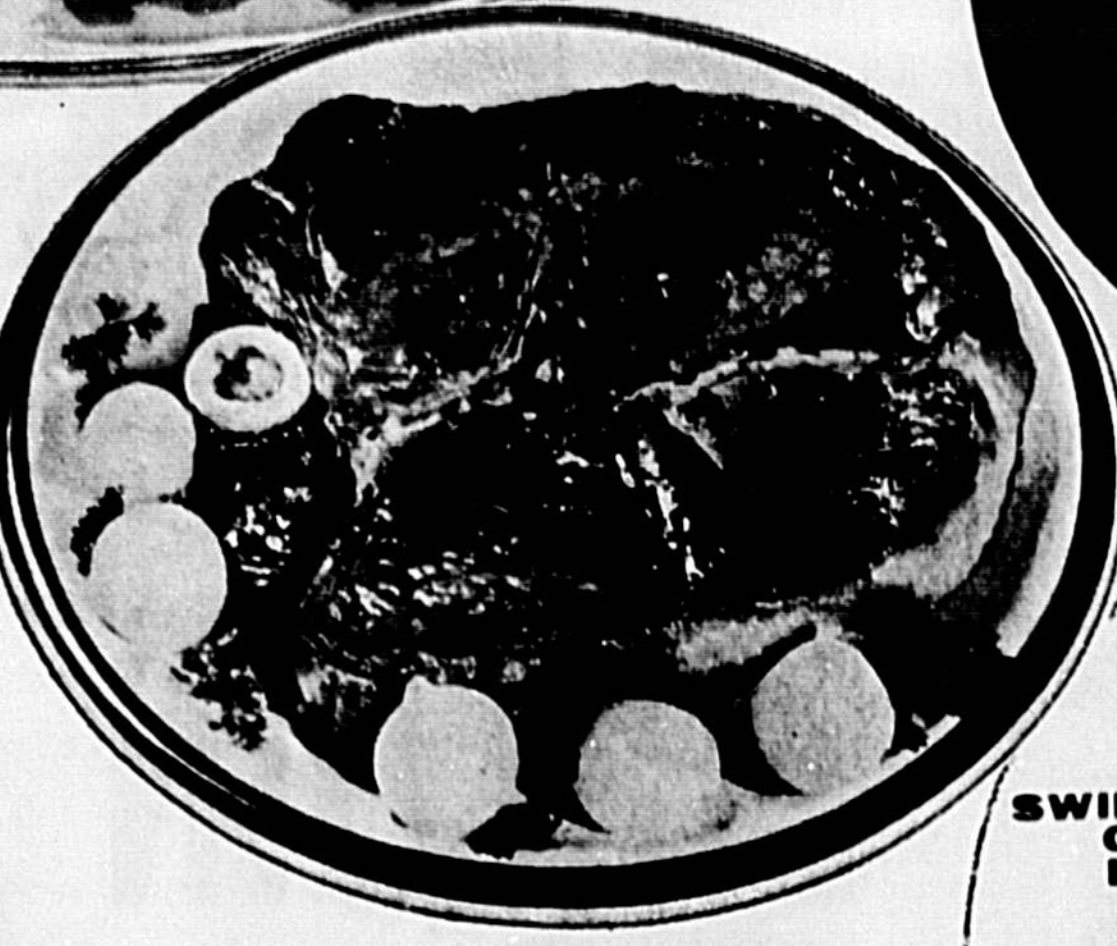

### Chinese Food Wins Friends

A young bride may find serving Chinese food a winning way to entertain. Especially good, because it brings true conviviality to the table, is the Chinese Fire Kettle. To the Chinese, it is the "Hot" dish and literally translated, means "heating the side of the stove." Such items as shrimp, steak, chicken livers and chicken are dipped into bubbling soup stock by each guest. The name comes from tapping chopsticks against the pot to remove excess liquid before taking a bite.

Jim Lee, author of "Jim Lee's Chinese Cookbook," explains that the Chinese use a charcoal stove with a well. He finds a new table chef portable cooking unit fueled by butane makes a good "stove" for this dish.

**CHINESE FIRE KETTLE**  
2 1/2 quart chicken broth or soup stock  
1 pound shrimp, cleaned and split  
1 pound sirloin steak, trimmed, sliced thin and seasoned  
1 pound sea scallops, sliced thin  
1/2 pound chicken livers, sliced  
1 can fresh, shelled oysters  
2 whole chicken breasts, boned and sliced thin  
8-10 fresh mushrooms, washed and sliced  
1 package each frozen broccoli, asparagus and spinach (chopped)  
1 pound thin noodles, pre-cooked and drained (optional)

Place soup stock in a flame-proof (not enameled) casserole and bring to a boil on portable cooking unit. Adjust flame so that the liquid is bubbling gently.

As each guest comes around the cooking unit, chopsticks, fungus (or) even small strainers may be used to cook the food in the bubbling soup stock. No item need be cooked more than 20 to 40 seconds.

Place condiments near guests.

High-spirited Jimmy, a suburban teenager, got a sharp gun as a gift from his dotting father. When he mischievously pointed the gun at a neighbor one day, his father scolded him—but allowed him to keep the gun.

A few days later, Jimmy tried the same stunt. This time the gun went off, seriously wounding the neighbor.

Could the father be held legally liable for the neighbor's injury? A court ruled that he could indeed. As one judge put it:

"Firearms are so magnetic to the young that a person of ordinary prudence will take preventive measures commensurate with the great harm that may ensue from the use of a gun by someone unfit to be entrusted with it."

Millions of American homes have guns, and the number of injuries is growing alarmingly. Generally speaking, parents are not liable for an accident caused by their offspring merely because they keep a gun in the house.

But they are usually liable if there is enough reason for them to foresee trouble. The law looks closely at the circumstances—as it did in Jimmy's case—to decide if the parents can fairly be held to blame.

Thus, parents may incur liability by allowing a gun to be too easily accessible. For example:

A man kept his revolver loaded—in an unlocked desk drawer. One day, his 12-year-old son took it out and began to play with it. Suddenly, he the boy's consternation, the gun discharged, wounding a bull-let into a visitor's leg. Again, the father was held liable for falling to foresee just this kind of mishap.

The court said that by violating the ordinance, the parents not only became subject to a fine but also branded themselves as negligent—hence responsible for the accident that followed.

### Louisiana Yam Puff Excellent

Yam farmers, their families and friends had a more significant harvest festival this October. The town of Opelousas, La., center of the families and surrounding farm area, escaped Hurricane Camille's destructive impact.

Through the years the growers met to crown a new Yam Queen and King and a new Champion Yam Cook from ten-agers taking home economic prizes.

Along with yams is every form — baked, boiled, fried in puddings, pies and puddings — there are candies and cakes, something for everyone.

Here is a Louisiana yam puff recipe yam lovers across the nation will enjoy.

**LOUISIANA YAM PUFF**  
8 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1/4 cup flour  
1 cup milk  
1 1/2 cups cooked mashed Louisiana yams (about 2 to 3 medium yams)  
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons firmly packed dark brown sugar  
5 eggs, separated  
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar  
Grease a 5-cup shallow casserole and set aside. Melt butter in saucepan; blend in flour until smooth. Stir constantly over medium heat until mixture turns light brown. Blend in milk gradually and bring mixture to a boil. Remove from heat and mix in yams, peel, seasonings and sugar. Set mixture aside to cool slightly. Meanwhile, beat egg yolks until light and fluffy; blend yam mixture.

Sprinkle cream of tartar over egg whites. In large mixing bowl, beat until stiff but not dry. Blend about one-third of whites into yam mixture, then fold in remaining whites. Pour mixture into prepared casserole and set in pan containing hot water, about 1 1/2 inches deep. Bake in 350-degree oven 35 to 40 minutes or until knife comes out clean when inserted in center. Makes 8 servings.

If you like pasta chances are you'll be delighted with this recipe. It rings a delicious change. For this superb dish, fettuccine is cooked and drained; then butter, lemon juice and garlic are heated with canned or frozen Alaska king crab and mixed with the fettuccine along with Parmesan cheese and parsley. It's quick and easy to put together for a luncheon or supper dish for six pasta devotees. For a formal dinner, this Fettuccine with Crab may be used as a first course; in this case the dish will serve 12. Fettuccine with Crab is also a perfect dish to serve for a late-evening party supper after the movies, TV or theatre.

To complete the menu for any of these occasions, you need add only a creamy loaf of hot Italian or French bread and a salad of tossed greens with an olive oil and wine vinegar dressing. King crab, canned or frozen, is always tender and needs only to be heated through. Its snowy white meat, sliced in crimson, is both succulent and delicate.

**FETTUCINE WITH CRAB**  
2 cans (each 7 1/2 ounces) king crab or 1 pound frozen king crab  
2 packages (each 8 ounces) fettuccine  
1/4 pound (1 stick) butter  
Juice of one-half lemon  
1 large clove garlic, crushed  
1 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
2 tablespoons minced parsley  
Extra grated Parmesan cheese  
Drain and slice canned crab. Or if frozen crab is used, defrost, drain and slice.

In two large saucers or one extra-large saucer, boil both packages of fettuccine at one time, using the amount of water and salt called for on packages; cook just until tender—this may be a few minutes less than package directions call for; drain.

Meanwhile in a saucepan over low heat melt the butter; add crab, lemon juice and garlic. Heat gently; do not boil. Add to fettuccine with the 1/2 cup Parmesan and the parsley. Toss well. Serve at once; pass extra grated Parmesan.

Makes six main-dish servings.

County authorities had been searching for Sanford, since Saturday, when the girl alleged the man forced her car off the road and assaulted and beat her.

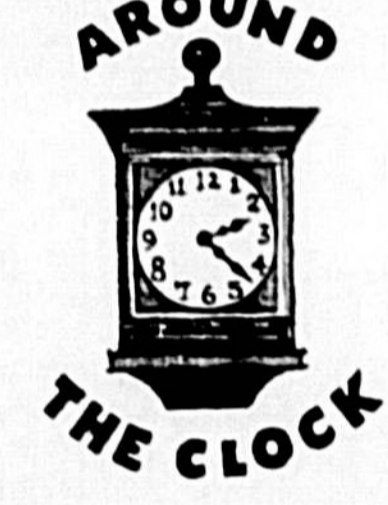

The girl signed a warrant charging the man with the crime but authorities were unable to locate the man, who had reportedly left Sanford and is believed to be in Orange County.

A physician, after examining the girl, reported she had been fondled but not raped.

And here's still another Seminole Countyman taking the "lead." Robert Bessner, Seminole Memorial Hospital and president-elect of the Florida Hospital Association, will be the presiding officer at the conference, scheduled to meet in Gainesville, Oct. 13-14.

The volunteer fire department scored a victory in the budget, receiving, subject to approval at a public hearing, \$1,800 for expenses. This amount has been increased from the present \$600 per annum. Keith Nixon, councilman, questioned the added expense and was advised by the assistant volunteer chief, Frank Pappas, that there were 18 members of the department and the regular council meeting. Councilmen also seemed to be appalled at the amount of approximately \$7 per man.

At the council meeting, John Payne, representing Yellow Cab Company, requested that it be allowed to operate metered cabs in the city. Payne stated that this affords passenger as well as company protection. Rates will be computed at 50 cents per mile. Payne asked that competitive cab companies be compelled to use meters.

Mayor W. Lawrence Swafford, replied that this would make it necessary to enact a new ordinance within the city. Payne then countered that all progressive cities are now using metered cabs, and that he had exclusive franchises in other areas. Payne also stated that the cost of meters is \$500 each. Councilman William Nickols moved that council authorize City Attorney S. Joseph Davis to draft an ordinance for taxi cabs. Council unanimously agreed with the motion.

Council was plagued with a problem common to many areas now's Open ditches and drainage. Complaints were heard (Continued on Page 1B, Col. 2)

## School Program Migrant Moneys Forthcoming?

At least a portion of the \$2,600 in Migrant Program funds recently chipped off by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) because that governmental agency refused to approve the county's desegregation plan for 1969-70 school term may be restored. This was confirmed today by Fred Taylor, county's coordinator of federal programs, who said he was submitting a new project today to the State Education Department for approval which would hopefully restore \$2,600 of migrant funds for this year effective Aug. 15.

Taylor said that since county had increased the migrant program from \$48,500 to \$22,500 for this year, HEW ruled this was a new program and hoped off the entire amount.

Result was the cutting of five teachers and six aides from the units assigned to six county schools with loss of federal funds.

The teachers were moved into existing openings within the school system but the aides employment was terminated.

Now, Taylor said two new teachers and two aides will be hired in conjunction with the program, if the government returns \$48,500 for funding.

## Local Collegiate Plan Moratorium

Ten students representing area colleges, who plan to participate in the national Vietnam Moratorium Day, Oct. 15, gathered Wednesday night in a private home in Fern Park to organize and coordinate their activities. Represented at the meeting were Seminole Junior College, Florida Technological University, and College of Orlando.

A moratorium is planned to dramatize the event leaving SIC at 4 p.m., Wednesday, to travel to Fern Park to be in place at 5 p.m. Other schools and interested persons will converge there.

Oct. 15 activities will be only the first of three local efforts during the end of the Vietnam War with other activities planned for November and December to protest the war.

At SIC a forum type meeting is tentatively scheduled for 12 noon on campus as part of the Vietnam Moratorium observance on Wednesday.

## Modular School Plan Pictured For County

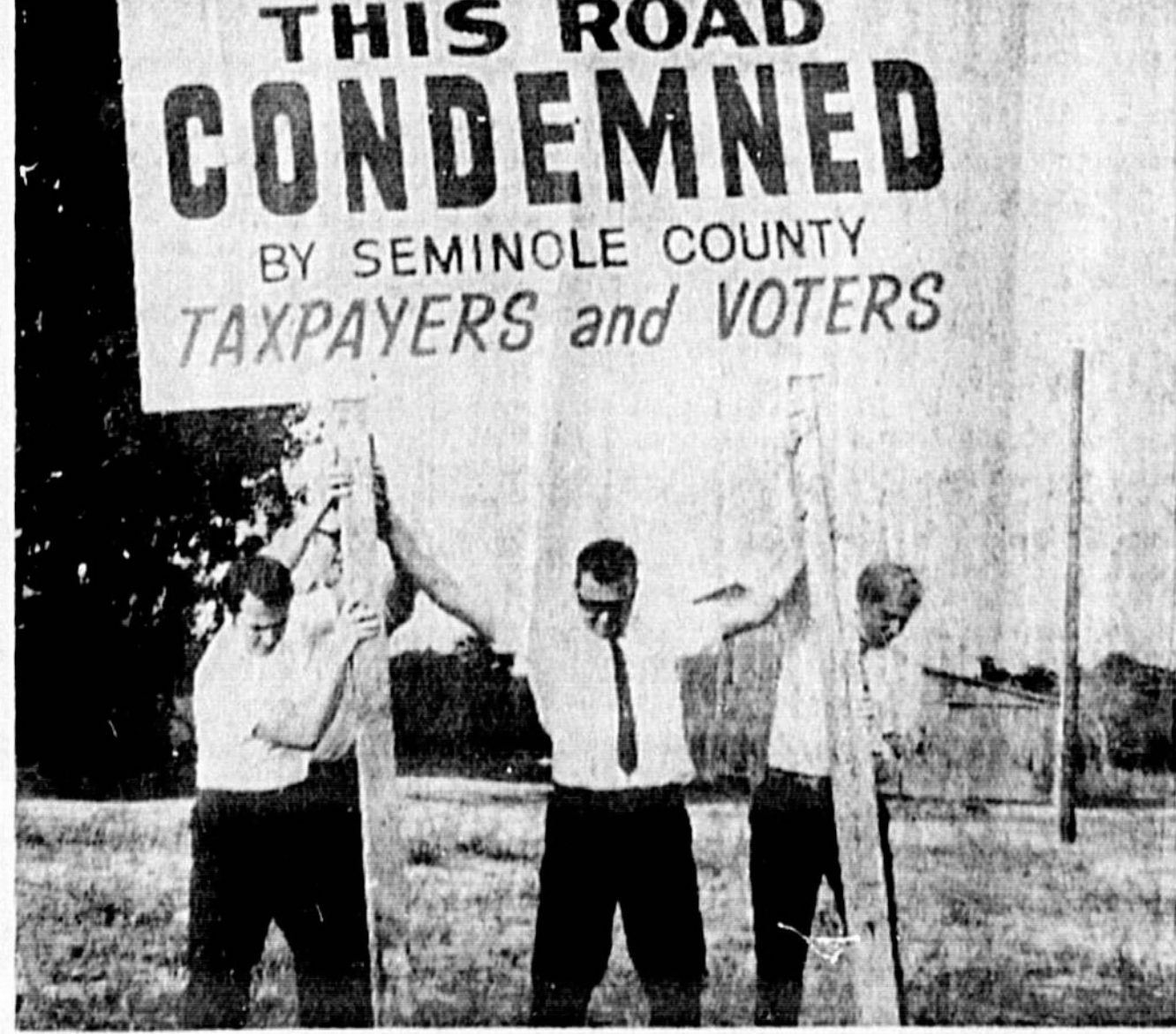
Seminole County School Superintendent John G. Angeli at his Wednesday news conference discussed plans for a future computer type modular school system for the county, but admitted it would be several years away.

Questioned concerning the 12 month school concept for the county, Angeli commented about a modular school which would utilize computers to analyze students and make recommendations for individual study schedules.

This would presumably complement the 12 month school, which Angeli said could not be implemented in the county for at least three years. "First, we need a feasibility study and a date to enter a county-wide program for selected grades," he said.

For teachers working the 12 month school, it would require an average 20 to 25 per cent pay increase, but because of computers fewer teachers would be required.

Each teacher would work a different schedule each week similar to a student, who could be graded by a computer to determine his needs.
