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Schools propose lower taxes

SANFORD — For the fourth consecutive year, property owners will have lower taxes if tentative millage rates proposed on Monday by the Seminole County School Board pass during a Sept. 14 meeting.

The School Board on Tuesday tentatively approved a \$562.1 million budget, as well as total tax millage rates of 9.541 mills. The total millage levies are down 3.8 percent from the 1998-99 Fiscal year. However, difficult decisions still face

Summer school, drop-out prevention may have funds cut

the School Board. Revisions in state funding for summer school and drop-out prevention programs will force the Board to examine whether cuts will need to be made in the programs.

Other funding programs, such as a request to assist in renovations planned for the Central Florida Zoo in Sanford, will be discussed Aug. 3.

The estimated impact of school related taxes on an individual who owns a \$100,000 home with a \$25,000 homestead exemption will decrease from \$743.85 to \$715.58 in the coming Fiscal Year, district officials said.

Significant revisions have been made by the State Legislature in the way funding was allocated that may affect

courses offered in summer school next year.

School districts now receive only a fixed amount of dollars for summer school. District officials will begin meeting Aug. 4 to discuss the impact this could have on funding for summer school next year, said John Pavlechak, executive director of finance and budgeting.

The summer school budget for students in kindergarten through the eighth grade will remain the same as last year, at \$964,984. The \$2 million in See Schools, Page 2A

SCC officials meet with Sierra Club

SANFORD — Officials from Seminole Community College met for an hour with representatives from the Florida Chapter of the Sierra Club and a property owner adjacent to the construction site of the college's Oviedo Center Campus Tuesday. Their objective was to quell concerns about possible drainage and flooding problems at SCC's 180 acre development, scheduled to open for student enrollment next August.

Eric Skogsberg and Mary-Slater Linn of the Sierra Club and Oviedo resident Susan Eberle came away with mixed

emotions from the meeting that included presentations by Christyne Hamilton, vice president for Administration and Business Services, Site Construction planners David Wright and Curtis Burkett, as well as construction site manager Norm Cervenk.

The SCC representatives reviewed the entire six-year process the college has gone through, including securing construction permits, and the steps SCC is taking to make sure development of the \$13.2 million facility causes minimal negative impact on the environment.

Cop practices slight of hand

Casselberry officer uses magic to convey message

CASSELBERRY — It's magic with a message. And the message is safety.

Casselberry police officer John Catiller has taken a childhood love for the slight of hand and incorporated it into safety presentations he makes frequently as part of his Community Relations Officer role for the department. His latest assortment of tricks and wizardry was on display Monday for a dozen

kids involved in the Casselberry police department's Summer Camp.

Using ropes, cards, scarves and other props that include a live corn snake, Catiller both amuses and informs groups of all ages and in numerous settings of safety tips, drug awareness, crime prevention, and community policing initiatives. Over the years he has performed countless times for groups ranging from pre-schoolers to senior citizens in retirement communities.

"I vary the show according to the audience," says Catiller, who picked up his love for magic at the age of seven from his grandfather, who at 87 years old still practices slight of hand

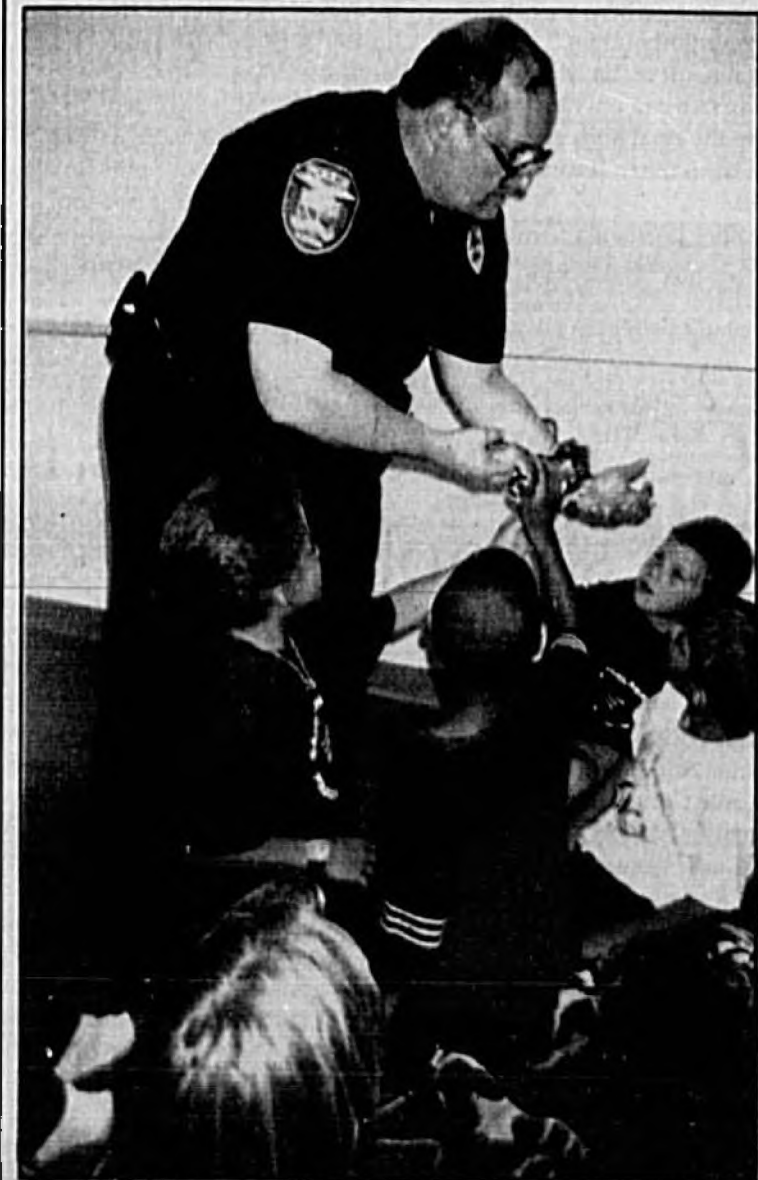
and illusions from time to time while enjoying retirement in California.

"I use different tricks for different audiences. With younger kids the focus is on drug awareness, bicycle and pedestrian safety, what to do if a stranger approaches and asks them to go for a ride. With adult audiences and senior citizens the focus of the magic act often deals with con games."

Catiller says his younger audiences are often the toughest, but likewise the most rewarding.

County gives residents tiny tax break

SANFORD — The Seminole County Commissioners decided on Tuesday to give home owners a minimal tax break.

By voting to cut \$1.5 million from the 1999-2000 budget, the commissioners passed on some savings to tax payers while slicing in half a \$3 million request for funds by the Central Florida Zoo.

The owner of a \$100,000 home who has a \$25,000 homestead exemption will save \$8.75 compared to this year's rate.

The zoo will receive \$1.5 million during the next five years — mainly because of support from commissioners Daryl McLain and Randy Morris.

The two said the county would send the wrong signal if it didn't make the zoo commitment.

County Manager Kevin Grace recommended \$2.8 million in additional income and taxes be used for road paving, stormwater projects and the zoo. This could be accomplished by keeping the same tax rate.

Commissioner Grant Maloy insisted on reducing the rate — ever so slightly — and finding a solution for the zoo request at a later date. McLain and Morris demanded the zoo money be identified Tuesday. The board voted unanimously to approve the measures.

"We're going to have to make some changes — redo the plans we had," Grace said. "It is doable. See County, Page 2A

There will be another, and another — Amen

It has been 12 years since I walked among the men on death row at the Florida State prison in Starke.

The experience will stay always with me.

There was a harsh roar — cries on anguish, torment, despair.

"Is it always like this?" I asked a prison chaplain.

"Yes," he answered.

We then entered the chamber where the state executes those who have been condemned to death by electric chair.

I stared at the chair, standing a good foot or two from it.

There was a frightening sense of isolation. More frightening than the wailing from the condemned men who were scheduled to die in the chair known as "Old Sparky" — or the new chair the state has begun using.

For awhile there were no executions, but in the fall of 1997 and again this year the justices upheld the state's method of death in the electric chair.

On July 8, Allen Lee "Tiny" Davis was electrocuted. He did not die instantly. The initial voltage wasn't enough to end the life of 350-pound "Tiny" Davis. Blood gushed from under his mask. Nose bleed, one jailer called it. Just a nose bleed.

Davis, found guilty of savagely murdering a pregnant Jacksonville woman and her two daughters during a 1982 home burglary, got what he deserved, some said.

Others pleaded that Thomas Provenzano not die in the chair

the next day — his execution is being put on hold until Sept. 14.

For the most part, Florida residents do not consider death by electrocution to be cruel or unusual punishment. They voted for the chair, not against it.

Law enforcement officials insist that there must be a suitable consequence for those who

murder others. One said Tuesday that whether the death penalty be by injection or electrocution is insignificant. "It isn't a matter of method but of justice," he said.

There's a mixed reaction from members of the clergy and congregations in this area. The Rev. Paul Hoyer, pastor at Holy Cross Lutheran

Church in Lake Mary, said his congregation — even his own household — have different opinions about the state's death penalty.

"The chair is not the most humane method," Hoyer said. "If we really feel there should be a change, we live in a democracy and should be able to request the change. Until the change, my belief is that we observe the rules of the state. That this is what we are taught in Romans."

Hoyer said that he had visited prisoners at the Florida State prison in Starke and at the Seminole County jail. He had never seen those on death row but sensed what it was like for those offenders to be where they were.

Recently, Hoyer said he

recalled visiting with a man who was in jail for spousal abuse. The man and his wife were members of Hoyer's church.

"The man said that he had found Jesus and that he would change," Hoyer said. "He promised he would never strike his wife again. He asked to be able to visit with his children."

"I told him that I could not approve of that," Hoyer said. "This man was sorry for what he did, but how could we know he would not do wrong again. There must be a consequence for what he did."

The Rev. Richard Trout, pastor of All Souls Catholic Church in Sanford, said he agreed there must be consequences but that the death penalty was "unacceptable." He said that Florida's Catholic Bishops wrote to Gov. Jeb Bush to stop the practice of electrocuting those on death row.

"No matter how little a man regards the sanctity of someone else's life that does not give us the authority to take the offender's life," Trout said. "Put him in prison for life. That, to some, is worse than death by the electric chair."

Thomas Provenzano, who killed a bailiff and paralyzed an officer in a 1984 Orlando courtroom shoot-out, will be the next in the chair unless Gov. Bush or someone else changes the rules. The electric chair goes on trial today in Circuit Court in Orlando. More than likely, Provenzano will not be the last in the chair.

There will be another. And another. Amen.

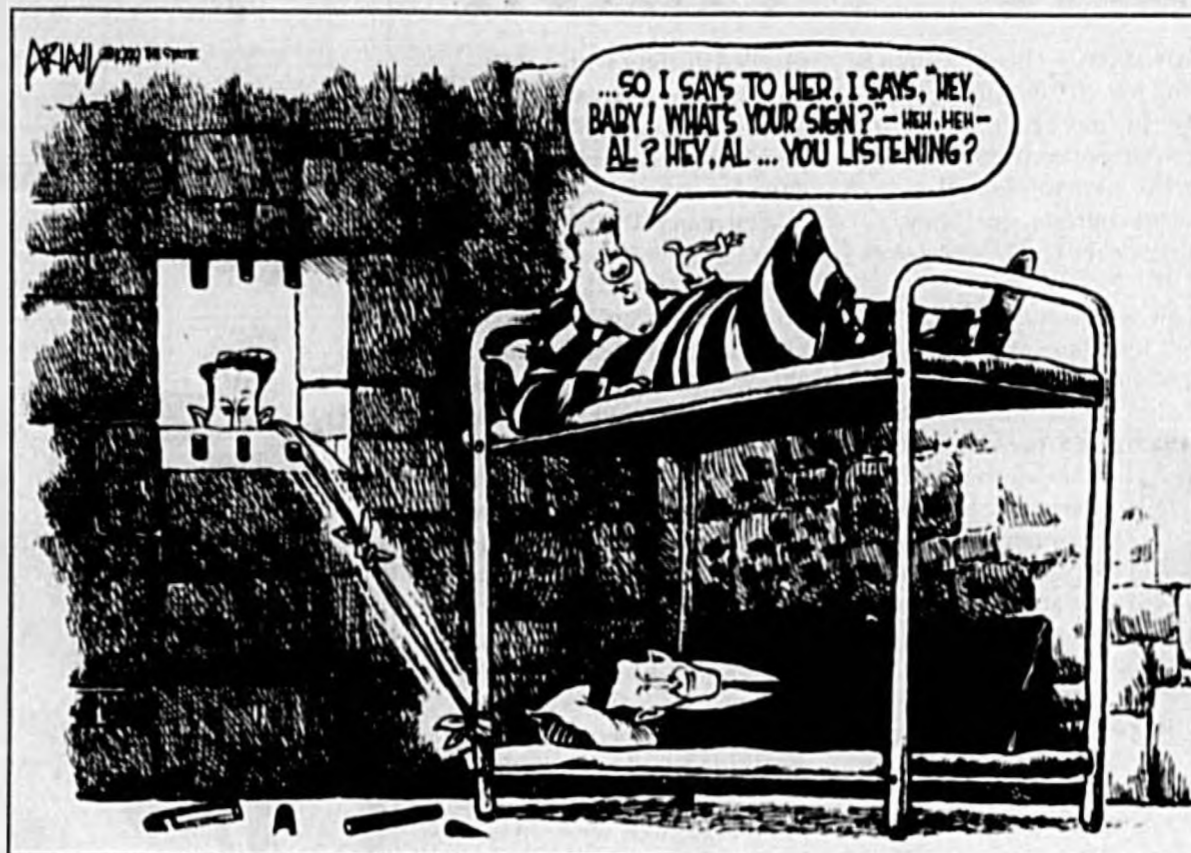
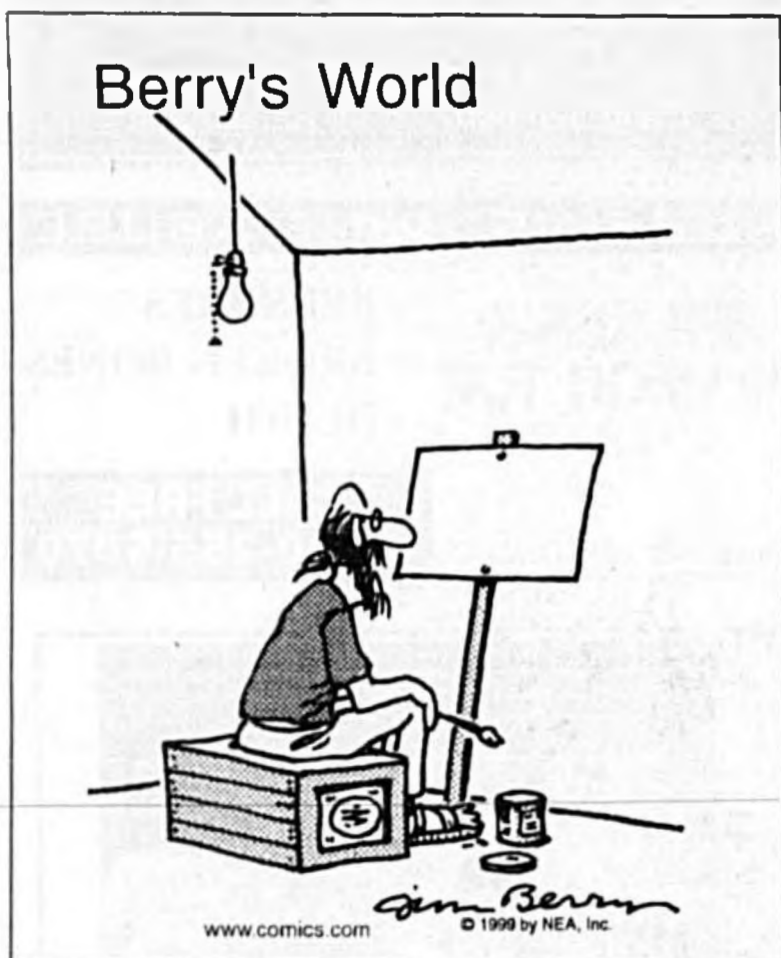
Please keep me informed on the zoo's plans. It is a great place and I would hate to see it Orlandoized.

Children's scholarship fund is well-meaning but misguided

You've got to applaud the generosity of philanthropists John Walton and Ted Forstmann, who have set up the Children's Scholarship Fund — contributing \$50 million each — to help less-affluent children attend private schools. Since they put up their own money, you know they are sincere about wanting to help impoverished children escape failing public schools. You have to give them credit for that.

But they are nevertheless misguided. The scholarships of up to \$1,600 that they are handing out to 40,000 families — from Los Angeles to Chicago to New York to Atlanta — won't get the poorest or most troubled children out of failing public schools next year.

The two businessmen (Forstmann is a Wall Street mogul, while Walton shares the Wal-Mart fortune) have joined the ranks of

those beguiled by the notion that inner-city public schools are so flawed, so inept, so bureaucratic, so troubled, that they cannot be salvaged.

At least not by traditional means. If public schools can be saved, that thinking goes, reform will come only with the pressure of increased "competition." Thus the popularity of proposals for publicly funded vouchers to allow more children to attend private schools.

The idea of getting poor children into private schools is so seductive that it has found adherents among Democrats and Republicans, rich and poor, black, white and brown. The Children's Scholarship Fund will undoubtedly increase the pressure on state legislatures to provide public funds for the same purpose.

But the thinking behind these pools of

funds, whether publicly funded vouchers or privately funded scholarships, has several flaws, not the least among them the amount of money they provide, usually less than \$2,000. (The Children's Scholarship Fund requires a match from families averaging \$1,000 a year.) The most prestigious private secondary schools average around \$12,000 annually. Catholic secondary schools, which have historically educated many working-class children, average around \$4,100.

Let's get down to cases. As a volunteer mentor to a 16-year-old girl (I'll call her "T") from an impoverished family, I found Atlanta public schools inadequate to deal with her academic problems. I enrolled her in a private school that specializes in educating children with learning disabilities, and its very small classes and nurturing teachers have helped her thrive.

The tuition is more than \$13,000 a year. Though the school generously provides an See Tucker, Page 5A

The Television People kill broadcast journalism

There may be no specific date on which the Roman Empire fell, but the final gasp of broadcast journalism occurred last week during the mawkish, obsequious and completely unprofessional coverage of the death of John F. Kennedy Jr., his wife and sister-in-law. Individuals once known as journalists morphed into alien life forms I'll call the Television People.

The Television People gave us their version of Woodstock '99. It was a massive encounter group for these aging and made-up Baby Boomers who decided to work out their frustration over the mythical Camelot that never was and now, with the death of "the heir," can never be.

Mislabeled "breaking news" revealed how broken the news has become. The Television People stopped the world, but they didn't want to get off.

Writing in the New York Times, Caryn James observed: "With this death television has not served the useful function of communal mourning so much as it has provided communal mind control and illusion ... Mr. Kennedy (and by extension his dutifully mentioned wife and sister-in-law) were canvases on which reporters, historians and long-lost college classmates imposed what they wanted to believe."

On CNN, one of the Television People narrated film of a young John Jr. playing on a beach, rhapsodizing about "the boy who so loved the ocean that one day he would be part of it." Later, Candy Crowley bab-

bled: "Summer should never be the final season of life." Checking the obituary page would have shown Crowley that death takes no vacation, one of the few clichés I didn't hear during the past week.

A once-proud profession has become all tabloid, all the time. A profession mostly respected in the past, which once informed, now titillates. The most outrageous untruths and inaccuracies are tolerated, even promoted, so long as they ratify the favored myth, be it Camelot or liberalism. NBC's Tom Brokaw, who knows what real journalism looks like but feels the pull of the Television People, said: "I think many people in my generation believe that (the Kennedys) would define our lives in terms of accomplishments and achievement and triumph." Get a real life, Tom.

From another of the Television People, Diana Olick on CBS News, we learned: "It is a testament to their unquestioning love of these waters that this family can continue to find peace in a sea that has stolen so much from them."

The Television People (CNBC's Chris Matthews excepted) mostly excused Clinton's false statement that he hosted JFK Jr.'s first return visit to the White House.

The decline of broadcast journalism began in the late '60s when I worked for NBC News. The advertising department, which had been mostly kept out of the news division during the tenure of NBC President

Robert Kintner and his predecessor, Sylvester "Pat" Weaver, was allowed in. Ratings for news started to matter, as they did for entertainment. Stories were increasingly selected for the type of audience they would bring, especially women. The ratings declined anyway, along with the respect most people once had for the journalism profession. Add to story imbalance what many correctly perceive to be an ideological tilt to the left and you know why increasing numbers of people are looking elsewhere for real news.

The tragedy for the Kennedy and Bessette families is compounded by the Television People who shamelessly exploited the event for their own purposes, while hypocritically claiming a more noble intent. The Television People stupidly conveyed their faith that Kennedy might have gone into politics, as if that is the only profession worthy of a Kennedy.

This handsome young man apparently didn't want to play their games. In what may have been the only realistic network portrayal of Kennedy, CNN's Jeanne Moos showed JFK Jr. as a real person full of self-deprecating humor and a true sense of self unrelated to how the Television People measure worth.

Some said the music died when Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens and the Big Bopper went down in a small plane 40 years ago. For sure broadcast journalism died last week. It has been replaced by the Television People.

annual scholarship of \$5,000 a year, that leaves \$8,000 that I must raise among my friends.

(Transportation costs come to another \$2,500 or so a year.)

T's parents, who lived for decades in a housing project, recently purchased their own home.

They don't have \$8,000. They don't have \$1,000. If they were

given a scholarship for \$1,600, they couldn't afford to match it to enroll one of their other two school-age children in a

parochial school with a nominal tuition. Though both of them work, they struggle to make

ends meet. A car repair or unexpected medical bill could break the family budget.

What Forstmann and Walton have done is create a scholarship fund that will make it easier for responsible working-class families — in

this case, families of four earning up to \$30,400 a year — to send their children to less-expensive private schools, a cost

of those families were already paying. (The scholarship is open to children in public or private schools.) So the fund will reach parents already deeply involved in their children's education and children already highly motivated to learn.

The scholarship is of little use to children in the poorest families, families earning between \$8,000 to \$20,000 a year. And it does nothing for children from dysfunctional families — children whose mothers are crack addicts and whose fathers are in jail, children whose parents have never read to them or attended a parent-teacher conference. Where is the help for them?

Hoping partner has the right spots

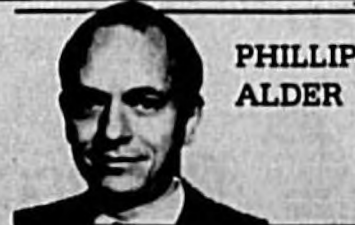
H.G. Wells claimed, "Human history becomes more and more a race between education and catastrophe."

Well, today's deal from the Spring Nationals in Vancouver developed into a race. And, as in yesterday's deal, the actual spots in one suit — here, clubs — were vital. How could East-West defeat two spades?

South's one no-trump showed 15-17 in tournament style. North's two hearts was a transfer bid, promising at least five spades.

South is hoping to score eight tricks via five spades, one heart, one diamond and a heart ruff in hand. The defenders need to ruff in one heart, two diamonds and three clubs. Who will win the sprint?

Not wishing to risk leading away from a king or an ace around to a no-trump opening, West started with trump. Declarer won, drew a second round, then played a diamond. After

taking dummy's jack with his king, East found the right continuation: the club jack. (If East leads the club eight, declarer can play low from hand, losing only two club tricks. Also, if East switches immediately to a heart, declarer plays low. East cannot get in for the club-jack switch, and in a moment declarer gets one of dummy's clubs away on his diamond 10.)

South covered the club jack with his queen, losing to West's king. Back came the club three (the nine might have been a better choice), East winning with the eight. ("Good card-holding, partner, having the nine!") Now came the key heart switch, establishing the contract-killing trick. The defenders had broken the tape first.

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ASK DR. GOTT

Chronic indigestion may mean trouble

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Does the frequent use of over-the-counter antacids (Tums, Rolaids and so forth) pose any danger?

DEAR READER: For the average person, there is no danger in taking frequent doses of antacids. In fact, in some people, the calcium in these preparations may help arrest the bone-loss of osteoporosis.

The major risk results from self-treating an undiagnosed illness that might be more effectively medicated in a different fashion. For example, people don't ordinarily take an antacid unless they have indigestion, yet chronic indigestion may indicate a host of diseases, ranging from gastric malignancy to gallstones and angina (heart-muscle cramps). So, rather than popping antacids, a patient would be better served by seeing a doctor. Antacids are useful for all of us on occasion — and for some people on a regular basis — but only after a patient and doctor know what's being treated.

Adults who enjoy good health have a natural aversion to doctors and hospi-

tals. I endorse this position, because I am in the minority of physicians who believe that healthy grown-ups usually know perfectly well how to take care of themselves without a doctor's constant advice and carping. Nonetheless, when things aren't right and symptoms develop, the intelligent adult says: "Whoa, something's wrong. I'd better get help." And does.

The chronic use of antacids indicates some sort of problem that needs fixing, but the antacid itself is not dangerous.

To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my health Report "Peptic Ulcers." Other readers who would like a copy should send \$2 plus a long, self-addressed, stamped envelope to P.O. Box 2017, Murray Hill Station, New York, NY 10156. Be sure to mention the title.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor believes that certain generic drugs are not on a par with their brand-name equivalents. Consequently, I end up paying much more for my prescriptions than I would like. Is she correct?

DEAR READER: Ten or 15 years ago, some brand-name drugs were

clearly superior to their generic counterparts. As a result, many physicians — myself included — preferred the more reliable products. However, the situation has changed.

According to the May 21, 1999 Medical Letter, the Food and Drug Administration has recently approved many generic equivalents. Such medicines include warfarin (Coumadin), levothyroxine (Synthroid), phenytoin (Dilantin) and digoxin (Lanoxin).

Because generic medicines are presently equal to brand-name compounds in efficiency, bio-availability and quality, most doctors are willing to prescribe the less expensive variety. Ask your doctor to review the publication I mentioned and, perhaps, modify her prescribing practice.

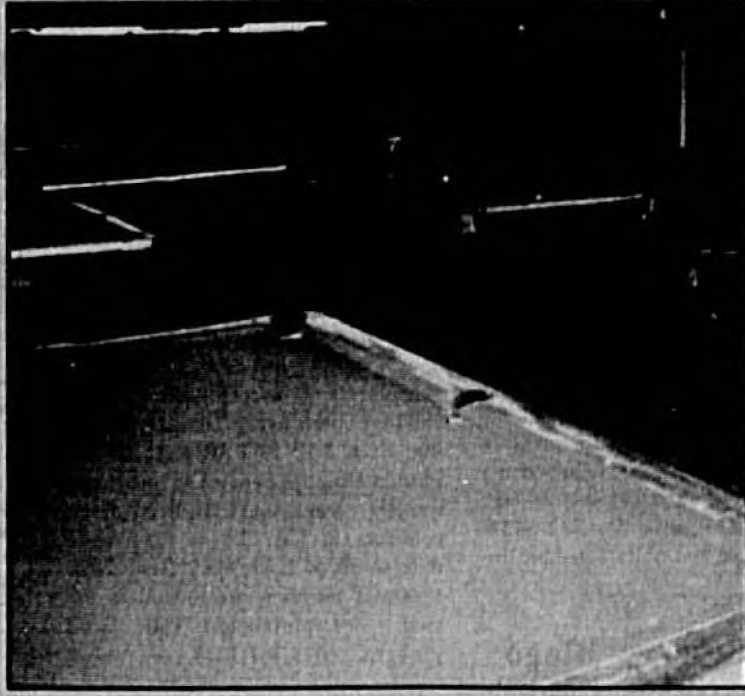
