Against him stands a charge of subornation of murder, which District Attorney Aas Keys says will be changed to murder when the grand jury hears all the known facts concerning the death some time Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning of Mrs. Theresa Mors, divorced wife of Albert Mors, wealthy antique dealer.

Insanity Plea Expected

Pals of his roseate sporting days have engaged attorneys to defend him and it already has been announced that, if a murder charge is preferred against the ex-fighter, an insanity plea will be introduced. One of these legal advisers said today that McCoy's friends had been worried about his mental condition for several weeks and had planned taking him before a lunacy commission. Mrs. Mors was found dead yesterday morning in her apartment by the house janitor, a bullet hole in her temple, a deep cut on her lip and cuts and bruises elsewhere on her body. McCoy was caught after his invasion of the Westlake business district, but for several hours said nothing, coherently relative to the murder. Toward evening he told a long story of having been with Mrs. Mors Tuesday night when in a fit of despondency she tried to stab herself with a butcher knife and then shot herself through the head.

WINTER TRAINING URGED FOR MEN WHO PLAY BALL

Indifferent Physical Condition and Lack of Proper Spring Training Are Causes of Mid-Season Collapse of Teams

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—Indifferent physical condition and lack of proper spring training causes the mid-season collapse of clubs, which at the start of the season seemed certain pennant contenders, is the belief of Ban Johnson, president of the American League.

President Johnson said the present day conditioning process is all wrong and that a return to the old-time system when players started to thoroughly harden themselves physically as early as the first of the year, would result in better baseball.

"In the old days players did not think of starting to play baseball in the spring until they were capable of standing it," he said.

"Cy Young and many others, in the old days, went to Hot Springs and other winter resorts, and by climbing, walking and running, developed their strength gradually. Then they started to play baseball and did not fall victims to chafery horse and other ailments. They were down to work and as hard as nails when it came time to start the actual practice.

"Today it seems to be the general practice of every player to start right in and practice baseball pitching, throwing, running, and batting with soft muscles and no wind.

"That is all wrong. If they started to condition themselves slowly soon after the first of the year, they would be ready for practice when the training season started, and it would result in a better game."

Democrats So in Carolina Meet to Select Full Ticket

COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 15.—With nomination by the Democratic party in this state equivalent to election, South Carolina Democrats will go to the polls August 26 to choose a complete ticket, from United States senator down through the smallest county offices.

Principal public interest is held by the contest for nomination as United States senator. Senator N. B. Dill, of Laurens, who is completing his first term and is seeking re-election, has three opponents. Congressman James F. Byrnes, or Aiken, who was elected to the sixty-third and each succeeding congress, is one of them. Former Governor Cole L. Blease, a former center of South Carolina politics for more than a dozen years, is another, and the third is John J. McMahon, former state superintendent of education, and now state insurance commissioner.

Governor Thomas G. McLeod, serving his first term, is opposed by John T. Duncan, a Columbia lawyer, who has offered for the office at various times for the last 20 years. Lieutenant Governor Edmund B. Jackson, of Wagener, is unopposed for re-election. The race for congress will be run in five districts.
