## Rhodesia Attacks Rebels

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (UPI) — Rhodesia's unprecedented air and ground attacks on guerrilla bases inside Mozambique crippled the black insurgency and buoyed the spirits of the nation's embattled white minority, military sources say.

The military command announced Monday the raids — the most massive operations of the five-year war — killed more than 1,200 rebels in five days last week and destroyed two of their bases.

## First Special Session Called To Decide Poston's Fate

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — House Speaker Don Tucker and Senate President Lew Brantley called the Legislature into special session today so the Senate can decide whether to punish one member accused of misconduct and five others fighting the Sunshine Amendment.

The session, the first time in Florida history the Legislature has convened itself, is scheduled for Dec. 13 when lawmakers will be in Tallahassee for interim committee meetings. It is to last only one day.

The Senate will consider a Judiciary-Civil Committee recommendation that Miami Sen. Ralph Poston be reprimanded and fined \$500 for abuse of office, and a resolution by Sen. Ed Dunn, D-Daytona Beach, that could lead to the expulsion of five members who have refused to obey the disclosure amendment and are fighting it in court.

# Aero Services Lease Shot Down By Board

The Sanford Airport Authority board of directors has voted to terminate the lease of the airport's fixed base operator, Aero Services, Inc.

The company was in arrears of rental money and fuel storage fees, said J. S. "Red" Cleveland, airport manager, Monday. Cleveland said Aero owned \$2,432 for rental money and fuel storage fees for the month of October.

Robert "Jerry" Sullivan, president of Aero, said Monday he will seek legal advice for the proper termination of the lease. Sullivan said he thought there was a grace period involved for the November rent, which was due Nov. 15. Sullivan charged the airport authority asked too much in rental and said "the authority has not given us any quarter toward

reducing the high cost of doing business at the Sanford airport."

Sullivan said the airport authority asked too much in rent. He said the rent was higher than for other fixed based operators in the area, even though the traffic flow at Sanford "was less than half" of the flow at other area airports.

As fixed base operator, Aero provides fuel service, flight instruction, aircraft sales and other services.

Sullivan said he thought the airport authority would have "difficulty in finding a fixed base operator because of the high cost of doing business at the airport."

Cleveland, however, said finding a new fixed base operator shouldn't be difficult. He said the authority could provide the services of a fixed base operator until a new one is found.

Cleveland said Aero's failure to pay its airport bills was "a consistent thing," a claim which Sullivan hotly denied. "That's an erroneous statement," Sullivan said. "It's evident to me they (the airport authority) wanted Aero out," Sullivan said.

Sullivan said he took charge of Aero in December, 1976, in a "sincere, earnest effort to turn a failing business into a profitable one."

Cleveland said Aero "didn't have the money" and the situation had reached the point where the authority had to take action.

Aero has been fixed base operator at the Sanford-Central Florida Airport for about four years, Cleveland said. — SCOTT ABRAMS

# International Shoplifting Ring Broken

MIAMI (UPI) — Police and department store detectives say a \$200,000-a-week international shoplifting gang is operating in the Miami area, stealing clothing for Christmas shipment to buyers in Latin America and the United States.

Six persons have been arrested so far and about \$50,000 in merchandise recovered, police said. But the gang is estimated to involve at least 30 other persons, including Chileans, Peruvians and Colombians.

They have links with natives of those countries living in New York, Chicago and other large U.S. cities as well as in Latin America, police said. As a result of the arrests, identification of some of the other gang members has been made, police said. Security chiefs of major departments stores have been alerted, and some pictures of the gang members have been posted.

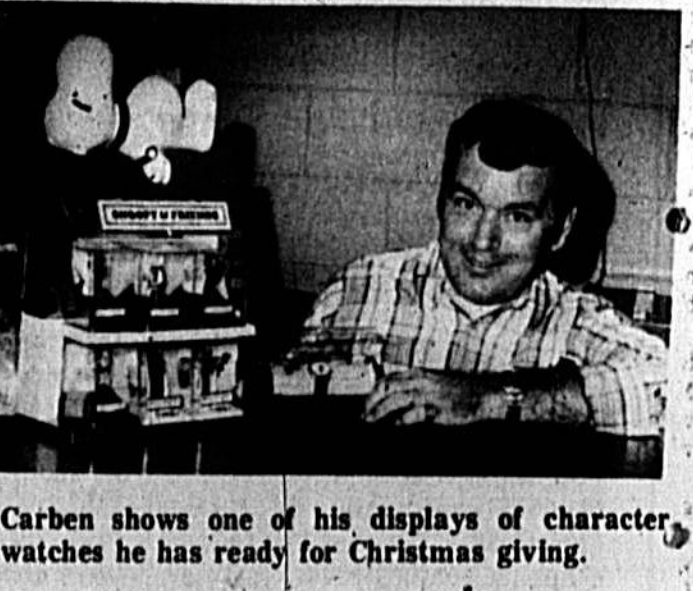

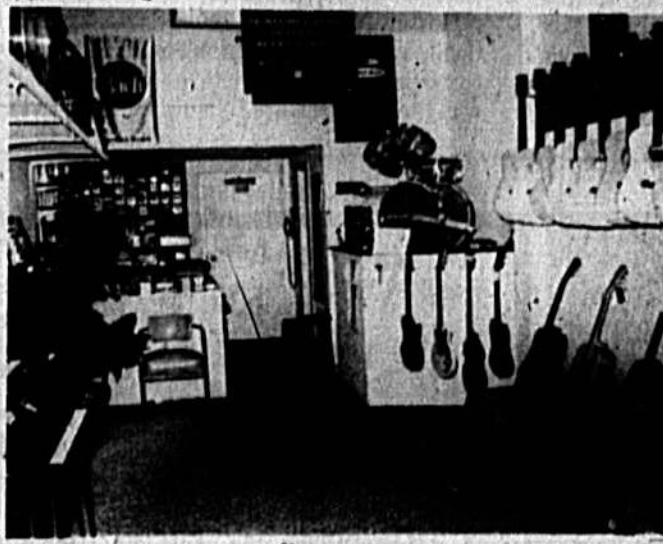

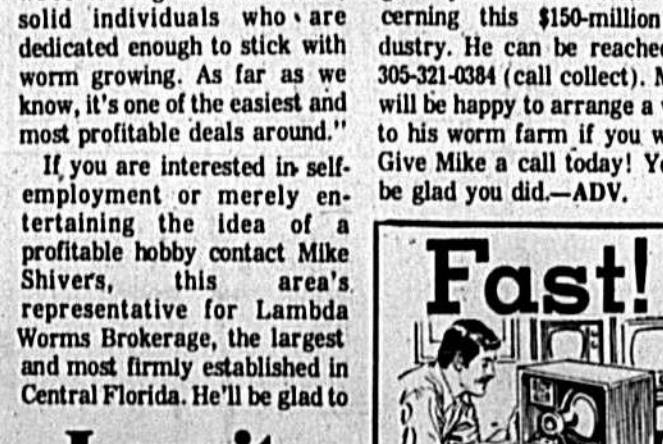

## Report Calls For Testing Of Roumillat

A consulting engineer's report issued to Seminole County officials says it is "likely" the foundations of the 60-year-old Roumillat building on Park Avenue and West First Street, Sanford, are strong enough to support office use for the entire three-story building.

But the study, by John R. Tilden, Denson and Lobnitz Inc. of Orlando, recommends "test loadings" four of the building's columns, "the results of the test would provide sufficient basis for an opinion as to the adequacy of the building's foundations as a whole."

The county rents the building's 6,000-square-foot second floor to house the county's manpower program, and county commissioners are considering purchasing the building to provide an additional 10,000 square feet of office space for county staffers. Before deciding to buy the building, commissioners want to know if it is structurally capable of supporting offices on all three floors.

"This is the first mention I've seen or heard on the need for an additional study," said Administrative Services Director Bob Ellis, who heads the staff effort to determine the structural soundness of the Roumillat building.

Tilden's report to the county reads in part, "In view of the fact that design of the building superstructure appears competent, and that the building shows no obvious indication of settlement, it is likely that the foundation will support a minimal office loading. In order, however, for us to render an opinion, their adequacy must be determined either by analysis or by observation."

The engineering report also says the building's roof "will be adequate to support the addition of a ceiling for completion of the fourth story." Completion of the fourth floor would bring the building's total office space to 20,000 square feet. — MARK WEINBERG

## City Hall Tops Building For Sanford

Sanford's 1976-77 fiscal building year was highlighted by the construction of the new city hall building, but private and commercial building was slightly down from the previous year.

Building figures released by Building Official William Braceland show that from the fiscal period of October, 1976, through September, 1977, permits were issued for 38 single-family residences for a total \$97,638 valuation.

During the same months the previous fiscal year, permits were issued for 53 single-family residences for a total value of \$1,060,451, Braceland said.

Home improvements and alterations were also down, according to Braceland's fiscal year report.

The 1976-77 totals show 271 improvement or alterations permits issued for a value of \$44,543, down from the previous year's 284 permits and \$102,121 valuation.

"I think it was just a bit of a lull," Braceland said this morning. He said building activity could very well pick up next year. He noted that a new 60-acre development near Seminole High School had received planning and zoning board approval, although no building permits had been issued yet.

Commercial improvement or alterations permits issued totaled 79 for \$972,468 during 1976-77. The report does not include a comparison for the previous year's totals because commercial and private improvements previously were lumped together, Braceland said.

New commercial buildings totaled \$2,073,190, according to the year-end report. Of that total, \$1,406,000 was assessed for the new Sanford city hall, Braceland said.

The report did not give a comparison against previous year's figures.

The building department report will be submitted to the Sanford City Commission for final review, Braceland said.

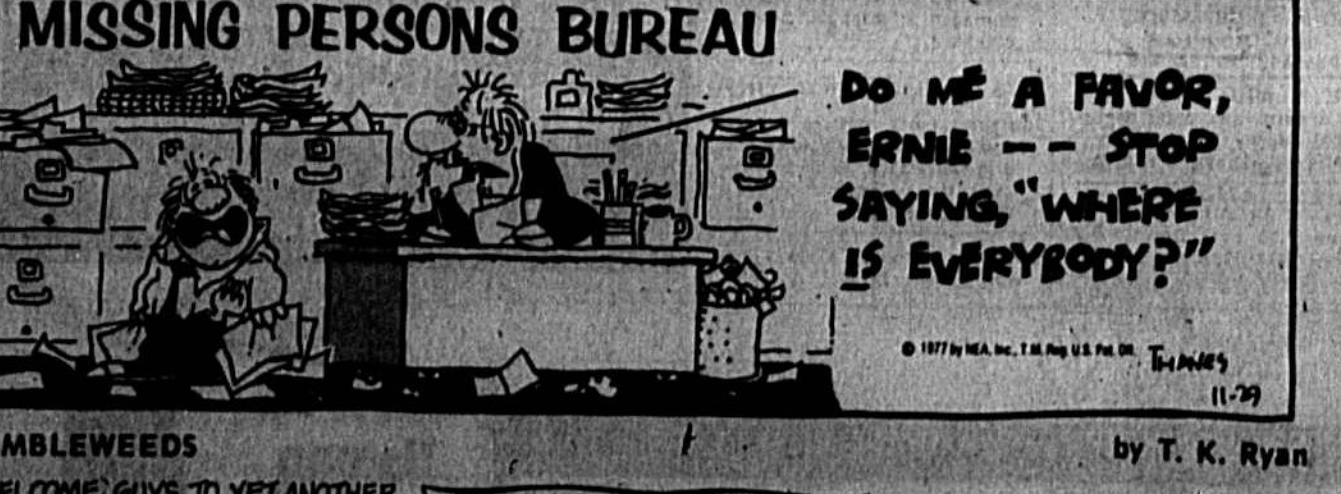
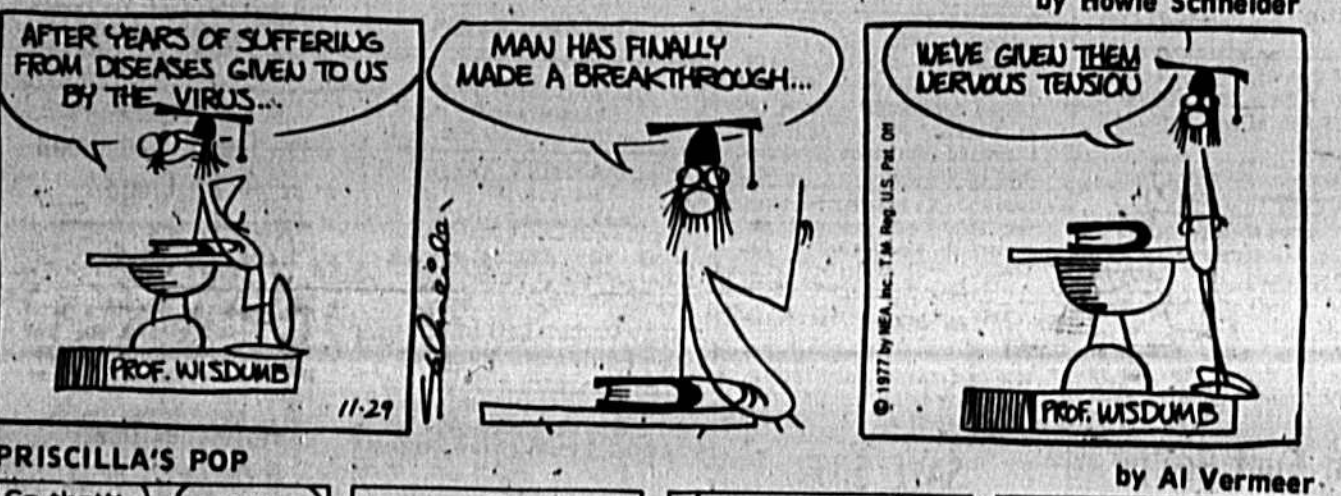
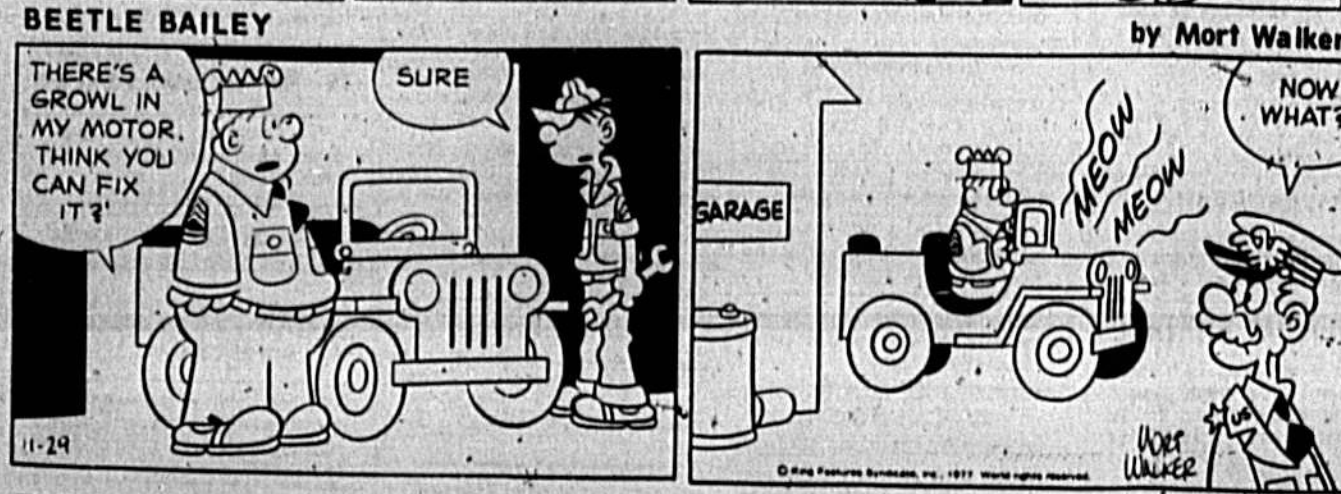
