Pay Day.

Today is the last day on which employers of labor can file their Social Security tax returns for old age pensions without incurring a heavy penalty.

Under the law, pension taxes payable every month of the year are required to be paid during the month following that on which they are due.

The old age pension provision of the Social Security Act applied to every employer regardless of whether he hires one man, fifty, or a hundred thousand, except farmers, railroads, banks, governmental units, and the employers of household servants.

The tax is levied on the payroll. For the purposes of the old age pension, and throughout this year the rate is two percent payable monthly.

This has nothing to do with the unemployment insurance provisions of the Social Security Act. That is not due until April and then is payable on the entire year's payroll for 1936 at the rate of one percent, all of which is contributed by the employer, and only by those employers who hire as many as eight or more workers.

Life insurance sales in Florida during December registered conspicuous gains, according to figures released recently by the Life Insurance Sales Research Bureau.

Such a demand, he said, naturally would involve the possibility of necessitating additional equipment investments by communication companies.
