State Court To Decide Constitutionality Of Eminent Domain Act

TALLAHASSEE, July 14.—(AP)—The State Supreme Court has been called upon to pass on the constitutionality of Chapter 10,118 of the Acts of 1925, giving the State Road Department and county commissioners power of eminent domain in the condemnation of property for the building of state highways.

The court, it was announced today, has granted a restraining order to J. H. Wahl of Cocoa, which in effect, enjoins the Road Department and Brevard county commissioners from proceeding with the condemnation of property in Brevard county for construction of the Dixie Highway, until the plea

of the complainants can be reviewed.

The question of constitutionality of the chapter is raised in Mr. Wahl's petition on the ground that it deprives the property owners of a trial by jury; deprives them of their property without due process of law, and deprives them of that guarantee of pre-payment contained in the constitution.

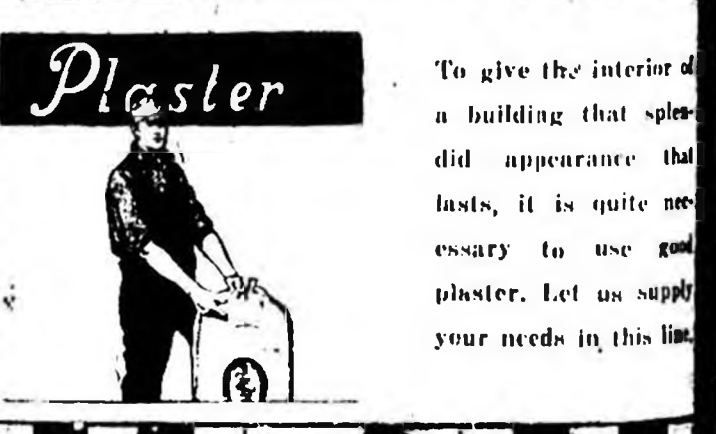

"Busted—Praise The Lord!"

In a certain Florida city a large real estate office was closed a month or so ago. Since last Fall its salesmen had been assembling every morning, nattily dressed, smiles on their faces, ready in all outward appearances for "another big day's business." Since last Fall those boys had not made a single sale. None of them received a cent of salary from the company.

Then after a gripping silence that told more than words could have conveyed of what this breaking up must mean, one young fellow stood up and said, "Well, boys, it has been a great game. I have learned more than I could have learned in ten years at school. I have learned the great value of fellowship. I have seen how much it pays to run with a clean crowd. And, Buddies, I have even discovered that the Dollar is not Almighty at all. Right this minute I haven't thirty cents to call my own. But I feel like a King. I'd rather be one of this busted bunch than the richest guy in town."

Another of the crowd jumped to his feet and silenced the group about to improvise a song to fit "the richest guy in town." This man was older than the other speaker, but he had been so merry a comrade that his solemnity at the moment was impressive.

"I want to say just a few words, fellows," he began. "If we were drinking a toast I, too, would like to make it something like: 'Busted—Praise the Lord,' because it means that I am going back to work. I was trained for engineering. PROTESTANT missionaries plan to leave Mexico before July 31, when new religious laws go into effect. They say their usefulness will end.

El Universal Grafico reports that every Catholic church in Mexico will be closed. The government denies it, saying no school or church will be molested that obeys the law.

ALL CHURCH property is to be confiscated on the ground that such property has been held by the churches unlawfully for the last 50 years. No religious instruction will be permitted in schools and religious publications may not mention or comment on news of national political affairs.

The law is evidently aimed especially at the Catholic church, the national church of Mexico.

A statement issued by the Mexican government says: "Regulations apply to all religions, but the Catholic church is most affected, because it is the purpose of the Mexican government to keep the Catholic church outside of politics."

A STATEMENT regarding bank failures in Florida has been sent to a number of people by Calvin A. Owen, president of the Rapid Transit Company of St. Petersburg. The information which it contains should come to the attention of everyone in the state.

It shows that from 1921 to July 1st this year, there have been in Florida 13 failures. During the same period Colorado had 45 failures, Wyoming, 53; Kansas, 85; Missouri, 96; Nebraska, 102; Minnesota, 149; Iowa, 153; Oklahoma, 160; Montana, 173. This comparative showing indicates the sound banking situation in this state, and indicates that there is no reason for the flimsy feeling which many people have.

The further statement of Mr. Owen is not less important, however. He says: "Of the foregoing failures it is estimated that 10 per cent were due to bad management, 15 per cent to crop failures, 20 per cent to drought, 25 per cent to over-inflation, 30 per cent to ill management. When the latter, the poorer, the idler, the dumber and the skeptic are influenced from further prattle, they will be fewer and fewer failures."

This is undoubtedly true, but how to stop the gossiper is something else again. He is usually beyond the law, and if the law does finally catch up with him it is usually too late to prevent any of the disastrous effects of his vicious talk. He is also beyond the power of any sense of decency, be-

cause there is nothing in his contemptible nature that responds to the dictates of decency.

Fifty per cent of bank failures are of banks which under the ordinary conditions and expectations are perfectly sound, and can continue to transact business. They cannot stand the strain that is put upon them by conditions created through the unbecoming activities of the gossiper. Few banks can, or should, be expected to stand such a strain.

Fifty per cent of the misery and suffering that is caused by bank failures comes from the work of the idle tattler, who takes a childish delight in spreading insinuations. And usually he gains nothing for himself by it, unless he finds some substitution in bringing disaster to others.

The gossiper has no regard whatever for the inalienable right of every individual to his property and his reputation. The person who by tattling breaks a bank actually steals the money of others, who are perfectly innocent of any fault. The person who gossips in such a way as to injure the reputation of another steals that which is even more valuable than money.

A man who will risk his own life in a straight-out robbery of another is entitled to some slight respect. He at least shows a kind of courage and frankness. The gossiper is worthy of nothing but the deepest contempt of others. He has not a single redeeming trait.

woods, old field cow tick everywhere except in a tier of counties to the north. It is a hangover from a pest that is far behind almost every other southern state. The federal government has been willing and is willing to do all it can to help us get rid of the pest—and we still cherish it.

Its presence here will be viewed askance by any prospective settler who knows his business. A cattle tick will kill a blooded dairy cow over night, it is said, and no farmer wants to bring in thoroughbred cows to face a menace like that. Dairy farming is held down by the handicap and we have to buy milk in Wisconsin and buttermilk in New York and dairy products of all kinds from other states.

Paying \$100,000,000 a year tribute to a little insect in Florida! It is time this modern commonwealth spent a million or so of its big surplus at Tallahassee to eradicate the tick, once and for all time.

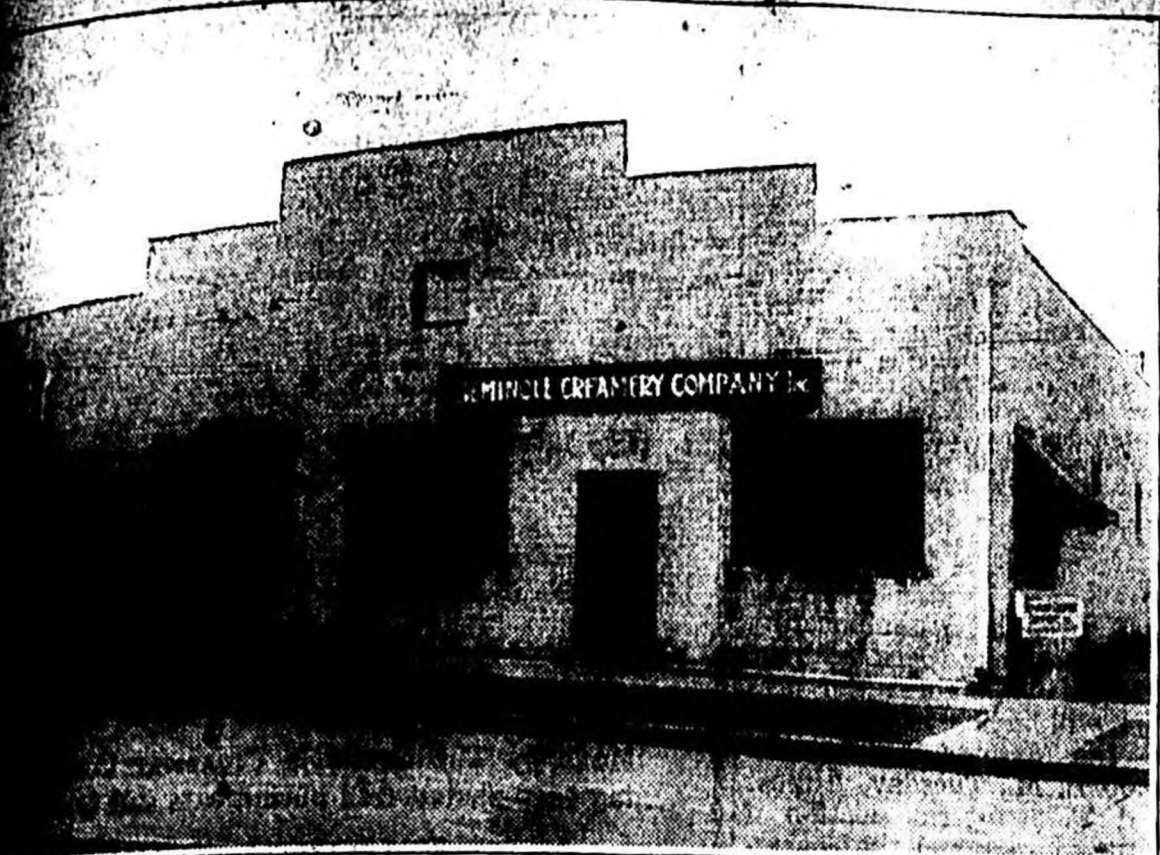

Buttermilk Described As Food And Health Restorer

Although milk and its products have been used to some extent as far back as history records, the general use of milk as a food came about only with the advent of highly civilized nations. Sour milk or buttermilk has been regarded as having a purgative action upon the digestive system, and as of more or less medicinal value.
Souring of milk is caused by the action of lactic acid bacteria contained in the milk sugar into lactic acid, which in turn curdles or coagulates the casein. At this point the milk is called clabber, and is to be churned.
The Metchnikoff in his "Prolongation of Life" shows the process whereby lactic acid inhibits intestinal putrefaction. He shows that the use of lactic acid milk serves to combat putrefaction in the intestine, and that the presence of lactic acid prevents or inhibits the growth of the toxin-producing bacteria in the intestinal tract. Tuberculin Tests Are Given To 3,113 Cattle During May

TALLAHASSEE, July 19. (AP)—Florida conducted tuberculin tests for 3,113 cattle during the month of May, according to the summary of tuberculosis eradication work being done by the Bureau of Animal Industry in cooperation with the state.
The report, issued by the United

States Department of Agriculture, stated that of the tests made for the month, 100 cattle reacted.
A total of 54,224 once tested free cattle was given for the state, and 15,802 accredited.
The tuberculosis eradication forces, under Dr. J. G. Fish, of the Bureau of Animal Industry, and Dr. J. V. Knapp, state veterinarian, had 92,010 cattle under supervision when the report was issued, and 3,125 cattle on the "waiting" list.
Three modified accredited counties are in Florida. They were declared accredited when the eradication work in the state was in its earlier stages, and prior to the adoption of more restrictive measures.

FIGURES GIVEN BY STATE OFFICIALS

157,046 Heads Of Livestock Were Dipped Or Inspected During June, Including Over 3 Thousand Horses, Mules

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., July 19. Tick eradication forces of Florida, under the supervision of Dr. J. V. Knapp, state veterinarian, dipped or inspected 157,046 heads of livestock, including 3,175 horses and mules, according to the report for June showing the progress of tick eradication in the state.
Of the 3,175 horses and mules, 17 were found to be tick infested.
Of the cattle, horses and mules dipped or inspected, a total of 655 were found to be infested, and 66,383 cattle were reported held for systematic work.
Twenty-two cattle were reported not systematically treated.
Systematic work was being conducted in Escambia, Franklin, Holmes, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton counties. Final work was reported for Bay, Franklin, Gadsden, Liberty, Martin, Okaloosa and Palm Beach counties.
In the area where systematic work was in progress, 147,320 cattle were dipped or inspected and 655 found to be infested. A total of 41,875 cattle were held for systematic work, and 22 were not systematically treated.
In the counties where final work was carried out, 9,726 cattle were dipped or inspected and no infestation found, with 1,508 held for systematic work and none systematically treated.
Those engaged in the eradication work included Drs. B. H. Lauderdale, J. W. Woods, J. P. Mack, E. N. Mohr and J. H. Yoder, and J. C. Jeter, T. J. Taylor and R. S. English.

LONDON LETTER

LONDON, July 18. (AP)—British airships of the future are to be so much bigger than was thought some months ago, that the Atlantic airship longer at Cardington has had to be reconstructed. It was originally planned to be seven hundred feet long and 144 feet high and capable of housing two airships of the R-33 class but it now measures 812 feet long and 180 feet high, says Modern Transport, and will house one airship of the R-101 class.

A mooring mast has been erected with a pump capable of lifting 2,000 gallons of fuel oil an hour to airships.

Much stir has been created in London theatrical circles by the announcement that the Guitrys, the celebrated French actors, are paid 250 pounds sterling a performance for their acting in "Mozart," the musical play they are producing at the Gaiety in French.

The type of freezer used in an ice cream factory has no resemblance to the old freezer. Instead of ice and salt brine of 72° temperature is used direct from a large brine tank which is kept cold by a 10-ton ice machine.

The ice cream is drawn from the freezer into cans just before it gets too hard to pour. The full cans of comparatively "soft cream" are immediately placed on shelves in the

PLANS FOR NEW STATE PEN WILL CONSIDERED SOON

Committee Will Go Into Subject As Soon As Construction Of Tag, Power Plant At Raiford Is Completed

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., July 19.—(AP)—Preliminary plans for Florida's new \$300,000 state penitentiary will be taken up immediately after final construction of the tag and power plants at the farm, according to State Treasurer J. C. Luning, member of the sub-committee appointed to take charge of the project. Nathan Mayo, commissioner of agriculture and prison superintendent of public instruction, are the other two members.

Indications are that the penitentiary plans will be taken up early this fall, as final construction of the plant is now under way, and the power plant is expected to be finished in August.

The new penitentiary, authorized at the last special session of the legislature, will be made of reinforced concrete and will probably be two or three stories high. The reinforced concrete, Mr. Luning explained, was decided upon in order to permit the work to be done entirely by the convict forces, thereby executing a big saving for the state.

The legislature appropriated \$500,000 for the new penitentiary. The appropriation for the penitentiary was made by the legislature at the same time that another \$500,000 was set aside for a new state building at Tallahassee to take care of the overflow at the State Capitol. Bids for the latter structure will be received by the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions at a meeting late in July, with actual work also expected to begin this fall.

Florida Should Make Changes In Act On Sale Of Game, Says National Magazine

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., July 19.—(AP)—The Florida legislature, at its first opportunity, should remedy an alleged omission in its law prohibiting the sale of game at hotels and restaurants of the state, in the opinion of Hunter-Trapper-Trapper, a national publication devoted to the sportsman.

The publication, in an editorial captioned "Imported Game," calls attention to an interpretation of the law by the attorney general, in which the latter stated that "imported" game may be legally sold and served in hotels and restaurants.

"Such a situation not only permits a market for game from other states from which it may be legally exported," the editorial states, "but affords no protection to the game of Florida, as it is manifestly possible to distinguish local from 'imported' game, venison, or ducks."

Hunter-Trapper-Trapper, however, calls attention to the federal law which makes it an offense punishable in federal courts to transport game in interstate shipments from state prohibiting such shipments by state law, adding that "consequently, the bringing of quail, for instance, from Georgia to Florida for supplying hotels is a federal violation."

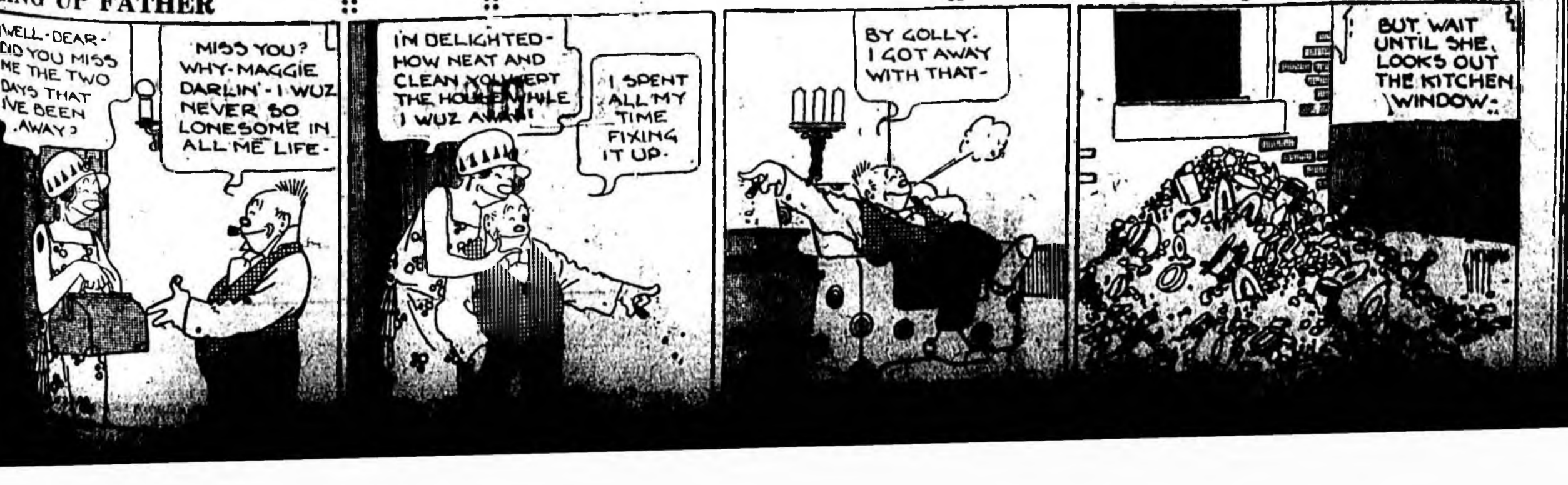
