

## NEGOTIATIONS ARE OPENED BETWEEN BRITISH EMBASSY AND STATE DEPARTMENT

### LOOKING TO RELEASE OF BRITISH VESSELS FROM CUSTODY, SIEZED THREE MILE LIMIT

And Law Pertaining Thereto Will Mean Refusal to Enter an Agreement

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 17. Negotiations between the British embassy and the State Department looking to the release from custody of the British vessels seized by prohibition forces outside the three mile limit were expected to take definite form as a result of a refusal of the British government to enter an agreement which would admit of reciprocal authority.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17. British officials are extending the right of search of British ships up to 12 miles off shore, as announced in a note handed to Secretary Hughes yesterday by Ambassador Geddes. The communication sets out difficulties in the way of American prohibition enforcement officers appearing in checking the identity of passengers on the United States.

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## JEALOUSY IS BLAMED FOR TWO DEATHS

(By The Associated Press) NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Oct. 17. Supreme Court Justice Charles W. Parker was expected to announce today a special prosecutor to take charge of the inquiry into the murder of the Rev. Edw. Wheeler Hall, rector of the Protestant Episcopal church of St. John the Evangelist, and his choir leader, Mrs. Eleanor Reinhardt Mills. He is expected to name Attorney General McRan, but is thought unlikely that McRan will personally look after the investigation. Mr. McRan is expected to designate an assistant to handle the matter.

Private detectives working on the case declared yesterday that their investigations have convinced them that the murder resulted from jealousy. Julius A. Braun, employed in the trust of Charlotte and James Mills, daughter and husband of the slain singer, said that Miss Florence North, a woman lawyer, representing a pack of lawyers, showed beyond doubt that the murder of Mrs. Mills was an act of passion.

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## ARMY ENGINEERS SPECULATE ON NEW AERIAL FEATS AND REMARKABLE RECORDS

Hung Up at Selfridge Field Last Saturday by Army and Navy Officials

(By The Associated Press) MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., Oct. 17.—Aeronautical engineers and army and navy experts at Selfridge field were speculating today as to what might be the next unheard of aerial feat. They came here a week ago prepared for surprises but none had expected to see human beings plunge through space at nearly four hundred feet a second. This was the performance yesterday of Lieutenant R. L. Maughn, army pilot who drove a Curtiss army biplane at the rate of 218 1/2 miles an hour, surpassing by more than thirty-two miles the previous official record.
