Great Britain Cracks Down In Palestine

Evacuation Of British Families Expected Anticipate Starting All-Out Drive

JERUSALEM, Jan. 31. (AP)—The Palestine government announced today that British families are to be evacuated from Palestine in the next few days. Families of army officers were ordered to leave today by 11 P. M.

LONDON, Jan. 31. (AP)—A sudden softening of the British attitude toward disorders in the Holy Land was reported today by sources close to the government. All British women and children are said to have been ordered to leave Palestine. This may be the signal for an all-out drive to stamp out the violence that has taken many lives.

This disclosure came as the House of Commons approached debate on the Palestine issue, and it was understood that some male British subjects also would be evacuated from the Holy Land. Meanwhile, Palestine remains under the threat of martial law.

Director Says Red Cross Converting From War Agency

The work of the American Red Cross is moving away from that of a wartime agency toward civilian assistance and special stress should be laid by local chapters on the work of committees of the Junior Red Cross, Home Nursing, First Aid and Accident Prevention. Alan J. Carter, southeastern area regional director, told members of the board of the Seminole County Chapter at a monthly meeting held Wednesday evening at the Women's Club.

In what was reported by Mrs. Roy Mann, chapter publicity chairman, as a very interesting, instructive and stimulating talk made on an informal basis, Mr. Carter pointed out that the regional office is set up to give professional assistance and not to dictate in any way as to the working of the individual chapters. For the first time since 1940, local chapter budgets totaling \$50,000,000, were approved for the National Red Cross which totals \$42,000,000, he said.

During the year, 28,000 paid Red Cross employees, but by July 1, the number will be down to 2,000. In the National Red Cross budget, \$10,000,000 is set aside each year for disaster relief.

Senator Announces President's Backing Air Safety Program

Group Has Examined History Of Pilots Of Crashed Planes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (AP)—Senator Owen Brewster of Maine said today that President Truman has pledged his support of an improved civil air safety program. Brewster is chairman of the Air Safety Subcommittee of the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee. He announced that he already has talked over his committee's probe into recent airline crashes. The republican legislature said Mr. Truman considered it "terribly important" to start a new air safety program without exceeding his 1947 budget figures.

The Air Transportation Association has completed a survey on the history of 14 pilots involved in serious air crashes during 1946. The examination was made to see if any flying could have been done in the background of the crashes, but the report shows that not a single pilot had any records. One was a pilot in the Air Transport Command and the other an Army aviator.

MacArthur Halts Strike By Japanese

Reluctantly Issues Order Affecting 2,400,000 Government Employees

General MacArthur reacted down officially today on the plans of Japanese Labor leaders to start a general strike of 2,400,000 government workers at midnight. Previously, Supreme Headquarters had acted behind the scenes in efforts to forestall the "walkout." But when the Japanese Labor leaders gave no indication of calling off the projected strike, MacArthur spoke out publicly. The Supreme Commander said: "It is with the greatest reluctance that I have deemed it necessary to intervene, the paralysis caused by the strike might reduce Japanese of the Japanese people to the point of actual starvation and would produce dreadful consequences on every Japanese home."

MacArthur declared that he could not permit the use of what he called "so deadly a social weapon" as a general strike in the present impoverished and associated condition of Japan. There was no immediate reaction from Japanese Labor circles, but it is expected that MacArthur's orders will be followed. The strike was scheduled to support demands by the government workers for extensive wage increases.

Royal Family Of England Leaves For South African Trip

Historical Journey Will Be Made On Giant Battleship

LONDON, Jan. 31. (AP)—Britain's royal family embarked today on the giant British battleship Vanguard on the first leg of a royal trip to the Union of South Africa for a visit of several weeks. King George VI, Queen Elizabeth, and the Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret Rose will be accompanied on their historical trip by a royal entourage. Before the royal family leaves Portsmouth aboard the Vanguard, there will be a ceremonial display by the RAF, the Royal Navy and picked units as England bids farewell for three and one-half months to the King and Queen.

The Vanguard will be escorted by two cruisers, a destroyer and an aircraft carrier on the 16-day cruise to South Africa, where a huge welcome—said to surpass anything previous in that part of the world—is being prepared for the royal family.

House Of Magic To Be Shown On Feb. 6

The "House of Magic," a free demonstration of scientific phenomena sponsored by the General Electric Company, will be shown next Thursday evening at the Seminole High School Auditorium, H. J. Coleman, president of the Sanford division of the Florida Power and Light Company, announced today. Research in science has uncovered many marvelous things about electricity. The "House of Magic" shows some of these, such as a glowing gear that appears to stand still when seen by stroboscopic or intermittently flashing light, an electric train that backs up at the sound of the demonstrator's voice, a stubborn shadow that refuses to follow its creator, and other curiosities of electricity.

The name "House of Magic" originated with the late Floyd Gibbons, famous author and lecturer. Gibbons was so impressed with the unusual things he saw in the General Electric Research Laboratory that he called it the "House of Magic." The demonstration is free, Mr. Coleman said, and the public is invited to attend.

Court Decides Clarence Gay Is Comptroller

Governor's Appointment Is Sustained; Vote Is Unanimous To Reject Fraser

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 31. (AP)—The State Supreme Court today rejected the claim of State Senator Edwin Fraser to be the Florida State Comptroller. The high court upheld the position of Governor Caldwell that Fraser is ineligible for the position.

In a unanimous decision, the Supreme Court upheld the Governor's appointment of Clarence M. Gay to fill the two-year unexpired term of the late comptroller J. M. Lee. Fraser was elected Comptroller in the general election, but Governor Caldwell contended he was ineligible because he was a member of the legislature which raised the comptroller's salary.

When the Governor appointed Gay, Senator Fraser brought suit to oust Gay from the office and take over himself. But the Supreme Court has rejected Fraser's bid for the office.

Health Director Gives Advice On Buying Iron Lung

Before money is expended for an "Iron Lung" a meeting of all interested people in the community should be called, and the question be debated pro and con and local chapter officials of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis should be guided by the outcome of the discussions, was the advice today given on the subject by Dr. Frank Quillman, director of the Seminole County Health Unit.

Proceeds of the admission to two basketball games to be played at Seminole High School gymnasium, Saturday evening, will be donated to the March of Dimes. The two teams of high school boys will be played between the two teams high school girls. The second game will be between the Feb and a team of returned veterans.

"Some will say that if one life is saved, purchase of an iron lung will be worthwhile," said Mr. Quillman, and added that he agreed to this, but declared that on the other hand that he does not believe a life would be lost, considering the number of iron lungs in the state which are available for use at the present time. In this connection, he pointed out that there are now 36 iron lungs in Florida, four of them within 50 miles of Sanford, and that even if all of these were in use and unavailable here, the National Foundation is so equipped as to be able to get one here for use within 24 hours after they received a wire asking for one.

In 1946, Seminole County had two of the 551 cases of polio reported in Florida. The two cases cost \$2,000 for hospital and treatment, he revealed. There were nine cases in Orange, six in Lake, eight in Volusia and nine in Brevard County, a total of 36, all of which could easily have been cared for in one central hospital, he said. Seminole has had but six cases in six years, none of which would have benefited by an iron lung. He pointed out that respirators built in 1941 become obsolete in 1950, and there would be the expense of training two operators to work in shifts.

He suggested that the money raised for an iron lung should bring more benefit for the community if used for treatment and care of children with polio, and that the National Foundation should be urged to conduct further research and to spread and immunization of the disease.

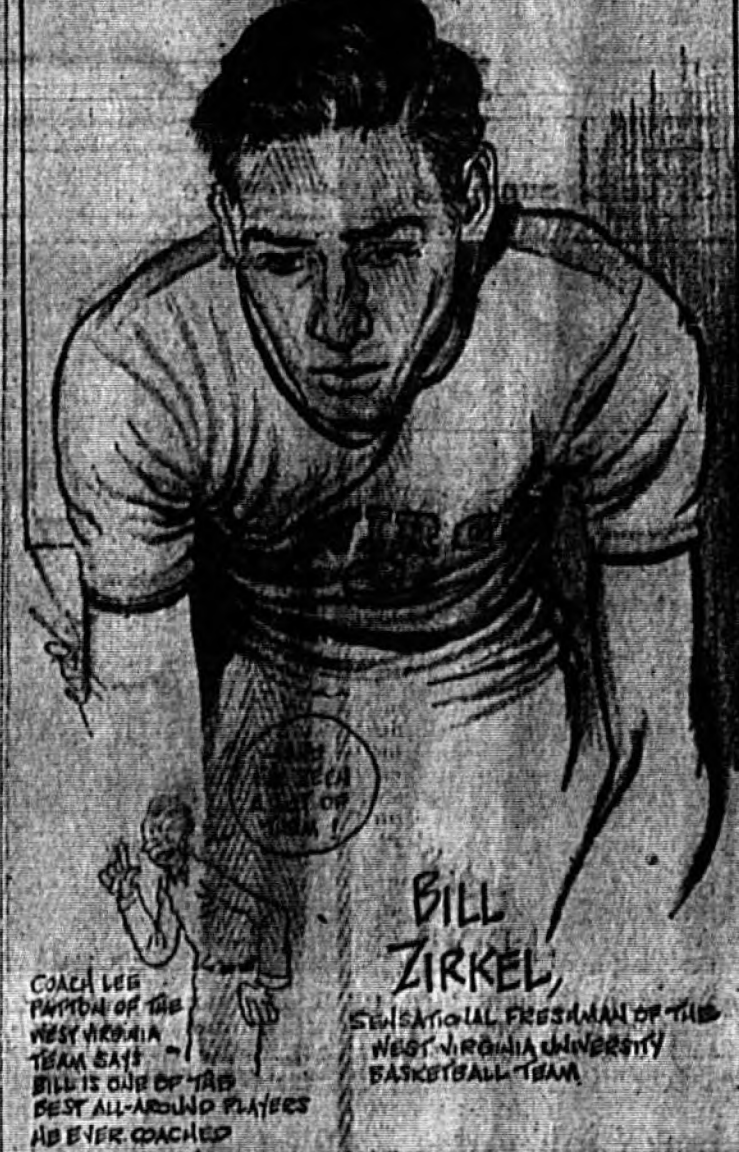

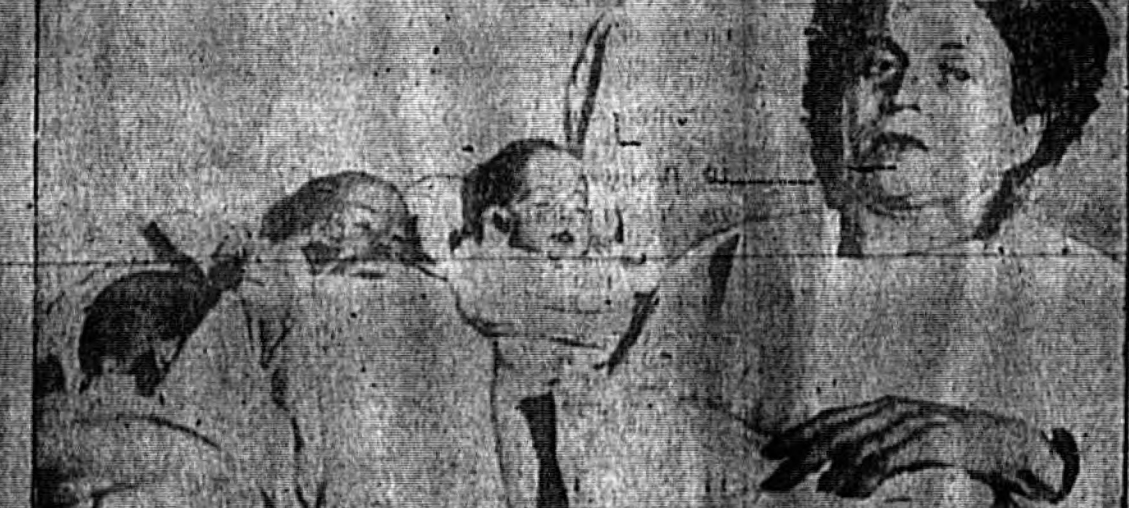

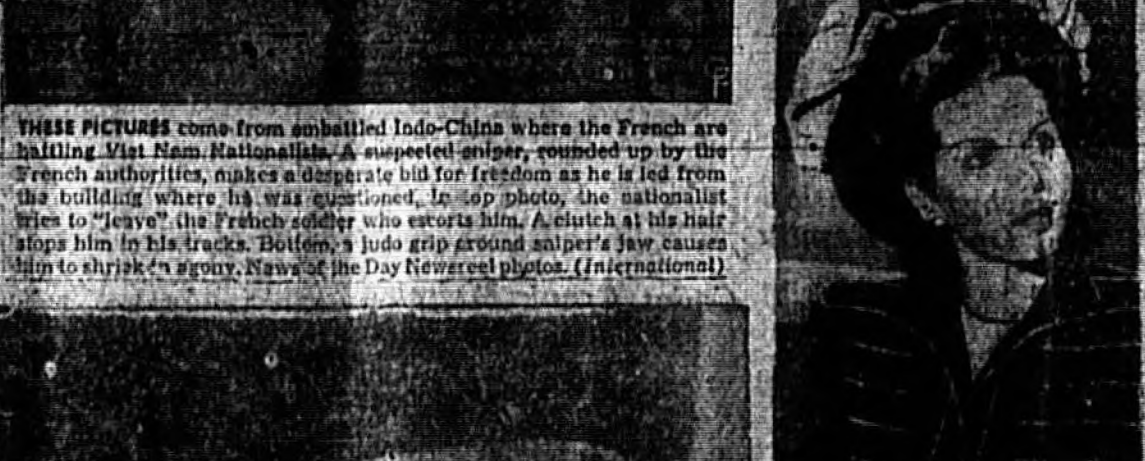

Water Conservation Program Is Outlined

LAKELAND, Jan. 31.—The groundwork for a long range water conservation program has been laid up by the Florida Water Resources Committee, it was announced here today.

The group is an outgrowth of Governor Caldwell's water conference in Lakeland last fall and is headed by former state Senator Ernest Graham of Miami as chairman and John Ford of Orlando, executive secretary of the Florida Farm Bureau Federation, is secretary.

The committee has decided to ask the next session of the legislature for \$150,000 to finance an engineering survey of the state's water problems. The program would be made under the direction of the state geologist, Herman Guiter, and would form the basis of any program presented to the state legislature two years from now.

The Water Conservation Committee had little to say at its meeting about water control, the topic which caused the most controversy when Governor Caldwell's water conservation bill was defeated by the 1945 Legislature.
