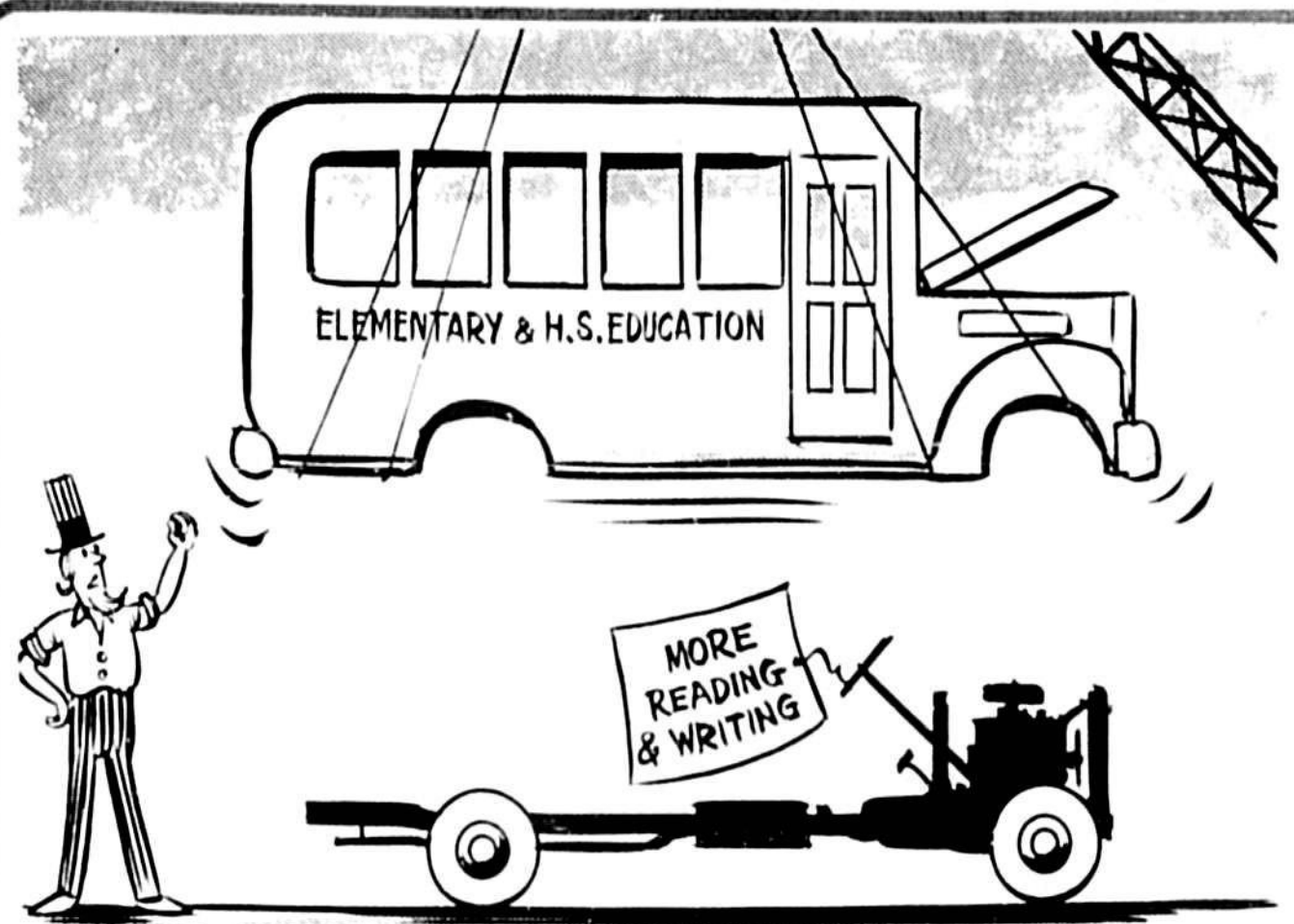

The Students And Those Tests -- II

Do They View Subjects As Relevant To Life?

The Evening Herald today continues its report on the reactions of students to the recent Functional Literacy Tests. On Sunday, five representative students who failed shared their reactions to the test. Today, they talk of the relevancy of subjects they are taught.

STUDENT: Yes, we know how to do them, but we didn't remember them.

EVENING HERALD: Are any of you taking math classes this year?

STUDENT PANEL: (One student said yes.)

EVENING HERALD: What kind of math are you taking?

STUDENT: Geometry.

EVENING HERALD: Are you getting good grades in geometry?

STUDENT: Yes, but what I'm taking in geometry doesn't even seem to be in this stuff on the test.

EVENING HERALD: Did you use past test material for the Functional Literacy Test?

STUDENT: No, but I probably could have if I had more time for review.

EVENING HERALD: Are you learning what you are going into the world?

STUDENT: I am in a second-year Spanish class. I already know how to speak Spanish, but I'm in a second-year Spanish class because I needed more help with grammar and stuff to get the words right. And I need that for what I want to do.

EVENING HERALD: What is it you want to do?

STUDENT: I want to be a stewardess. And nowadays it is great if you have two languages. That's good, taking the Spanish. I'm doing well in that. Now about biology II — I could do without that, but it is required.

IRS Differs With Layer

Claims Pledges May Not Be Tax Breaks

If you were planning to donate some money in response to School Superintendent William P. Layer's request on behalf of school board employees left with unpaid health and dental claims, better wait. At least if you were planning to take advantage of what Layer said is a tax deductible donation.

Internal Revenue Service (IRS) representatives say it just may not be tax deductible at all.

And, Holger Euringer, IRS public affairs officer in Jacksonville today, suggested that Layer stop calling the donations tax deductible until he discusses the matter further with IRS.

"Anyone can solicit funds, but whether or not it is tax deductible is the question," Euringer said.

He said funds solicited by Layer for the Special Insurance Fund on behalf of employees left with unpaid medical and dental bills after Old Securities Insurance Company sent into receivership are probably not deductible. "To be deductible," Euringer explained, "the funds would have to go into a charitable organization, which would seek tax exempt status from IRS."

A charitable organization must benefit the public at large, and not a specific group of people. Euringer explained, saying he did not think the Special Insurance Fund could meet that criteria.

Euringer suggested that, as an alternative, it is possible contributions could be made directly to the school board, which already is a tax-exempt organization, but that such donations could not be made specifically to meet the insurance problems, and would go into the general budget of the school board.

School board attorney Douglas Stenstrom already has determined that such funds could not be used for payment of the claims without a court order, and state auditors have assured him he is correct.

Asked for his response to the IRS statement that contributions to the fund, established at Flagship U.S. Bank of Seminole, are not tax deductible, Layer said today, "I have no reaction. We will check with IRS and see what we can work out, because we sure want it to be tax deductible."

The donation system was proposed by Layer and approved by the school board at its regular meeting on Nov. 22. At that time Layer estimated

the unpaid claims at about \$40,000 — the same amount he was saved by school employees when they took out insurance with Old Securities instead of the other bidder on contract, Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

The form which Layer has been using to solicit contributions also carries a line where employees may pledge to pay their own medical and dental claims. The form is marked "TAX DEDUCTIBLE," but Euringer said medical claims are not automatically qualified as tax exemptions.

Medical expenses must be greater than three percent of the adjusted gross income," Euringer explained, "and even then the entire amount of the claim may not be deductible."

Euringer said that if a patient declares his claim as deductible, Layer said today, "I have no reaction. We will check with IRS and see what we can work out, because we sure want it to be tax deductible."

The school board Wednesday refused to sign a resolution presented to it by Seminole Education Association (SEA) on behalf of the employees. Gene Grooms, SEA executive director, said today he felt the statement of intent to pay one's own bills which appears on the Board members said they felt the resolution might be used by SEA attorney John Chambliss as an indicator to the judge that the suit should be ruled in their favor.

'Safety Hazard' Cars Targets Of Towing

"We are only towing those that are safety hazards — only those cars that present an immediate hazard," he said.

Police Lt. Steve Garver said that, when the police find vehicles parked in the spaces provided for "wheelchair disabled only" and no evidence can be found on the vehicle such as a sticker or special equipment for a disabled driver or crutches or other paraphernalia indicating that a disabled person is at least a passenger in the vehicle, they are being ticketed and in some cases towed away.

Major Norman Floyd said the original intent of the law, requiring that parking spaces be provided for the handicapped, was that the spots were to be for wheelchair disabled drivers.

In a letter to the state Department of Transportation Floyd has asked that signs designating parking for the handicapped be changed from "wheelchair disabled only" to "Parking for Wheelchair Disabled Drivers only."

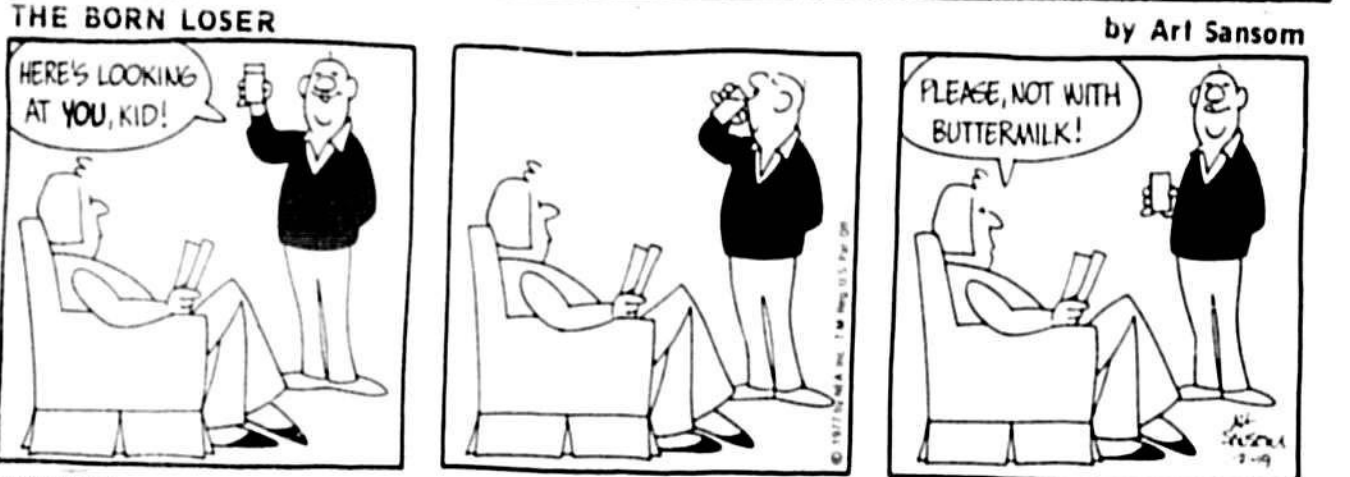
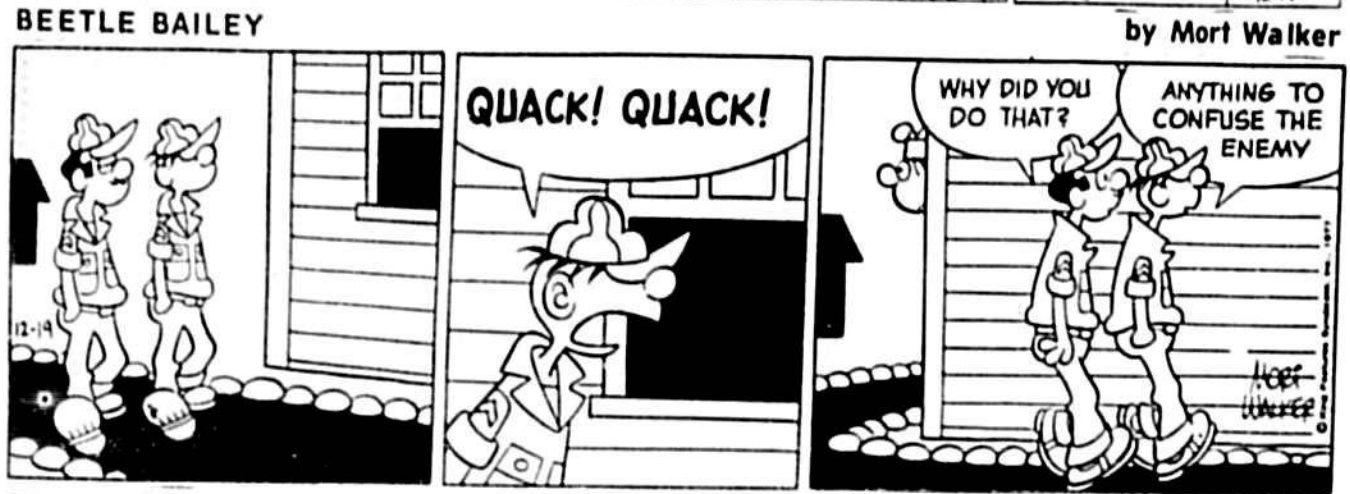
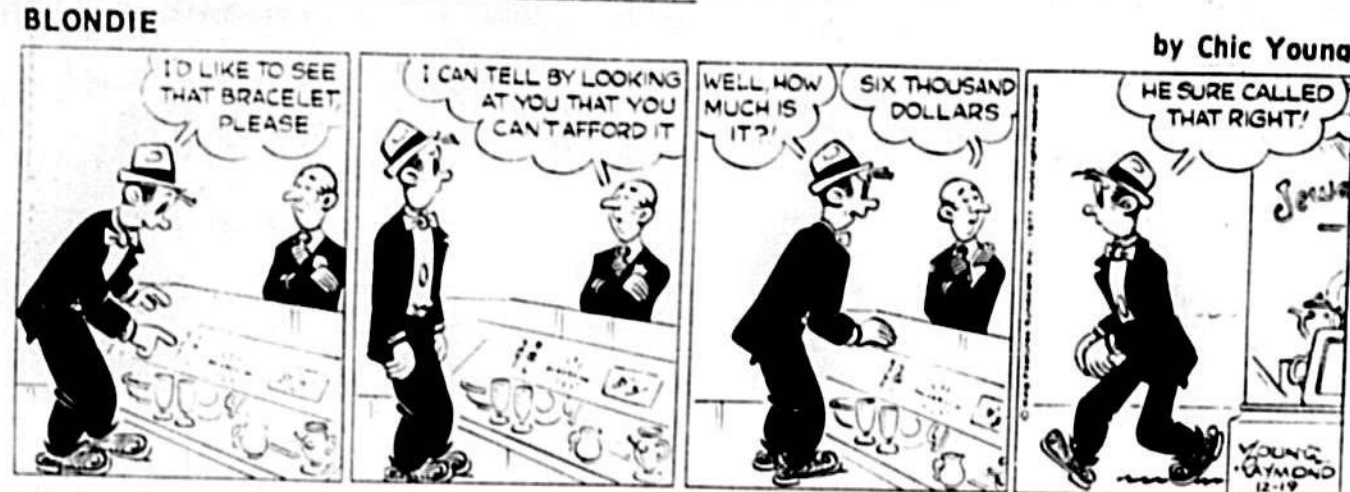

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Crossword puzzle grid with clues for Across and Down words.

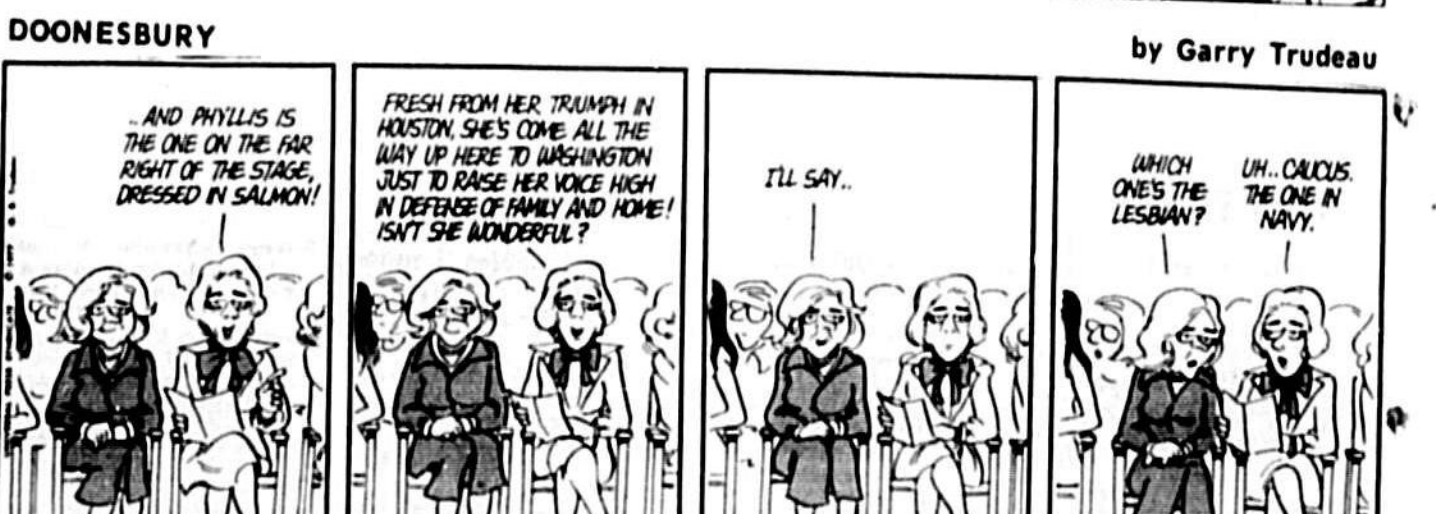

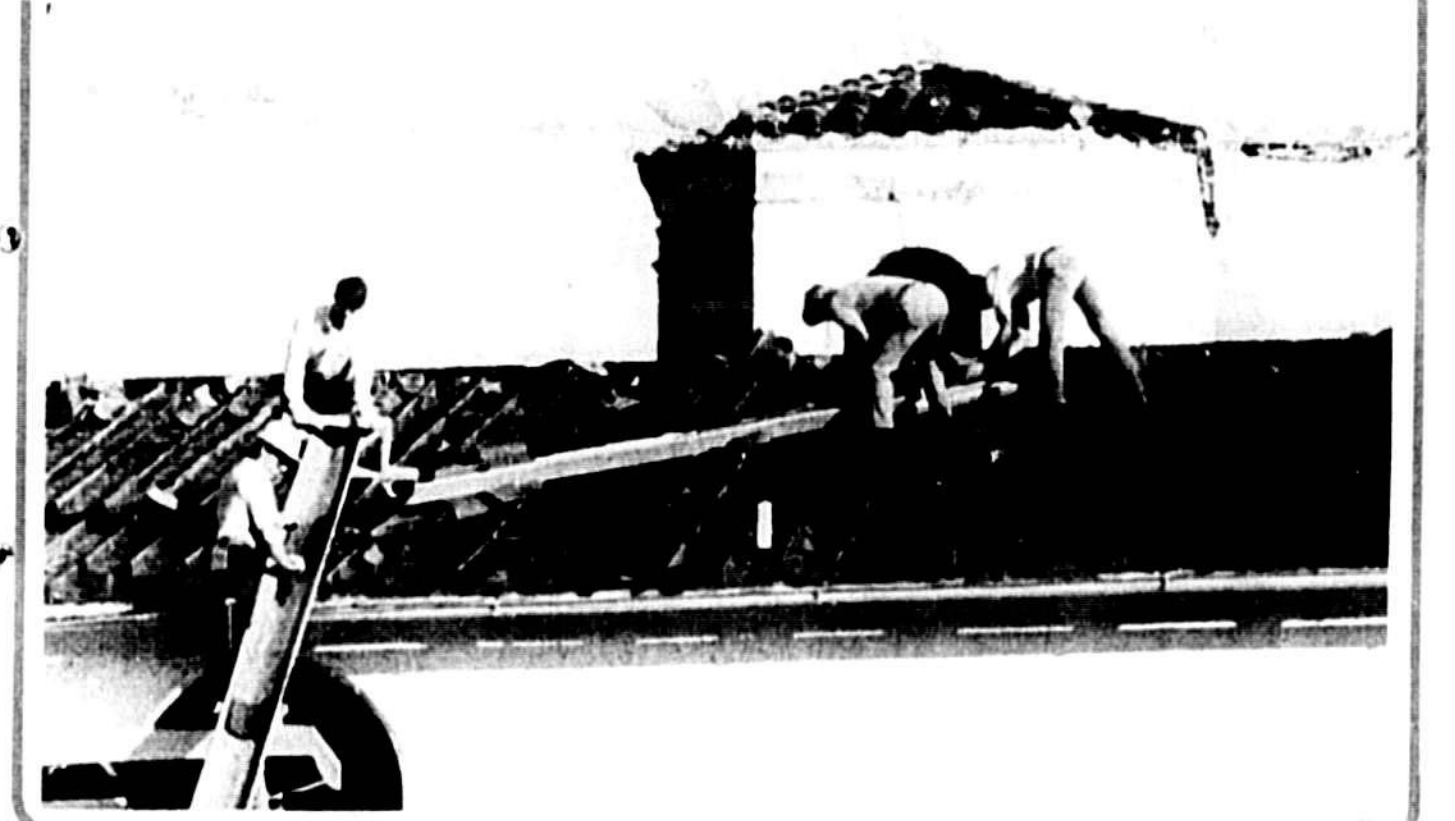

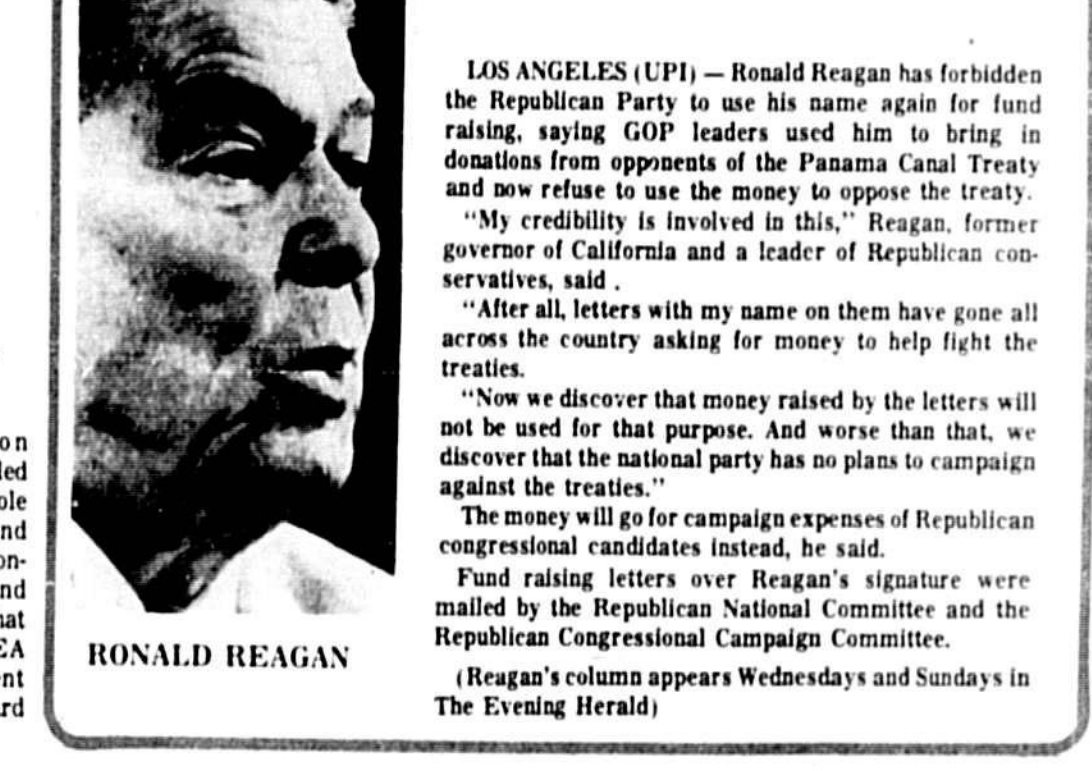
