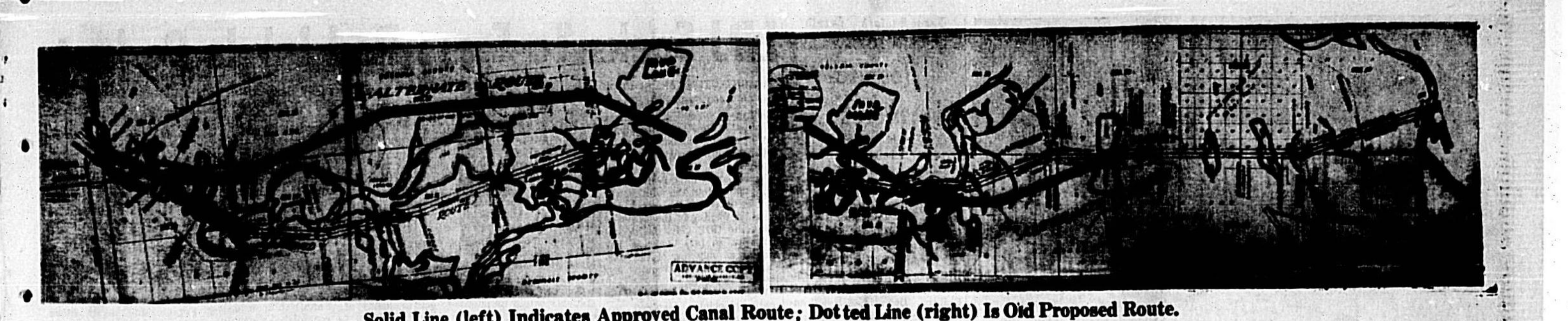

## Alignment of Canal Acceptable

One of the biggest controversies arising from plans to dig a canal from Lake Monroe to the Indian River on the East Coast has been the worry of conservationists and wildlife protectors that the canal would hurt fishing in the area.

A new alignment, which swerves to the north and avoids most of the river and lakes in Seminole County, has received the approval of the Seminole County Sportsman's Association.

In April it was agreed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Florida Board of Conservation to have engineers make computations to determine the expected discharge down the proposed navigation canal and the existing natural river channel.

The engineering survey concluded that the discharge would be proportionate and would not have a detrimental effect on the natural channels.

The study of the velocity flow and elevation indicates that no draining of the river would result and the river would not flow into the canal.

Previous estimates of the cost of the canal were set at \$11,500,000 for an eight-foot deep canal. The new alignment will add about \$1 million to the cost. The estimates include two railroad bridges, two highway bridges (US-9 and US-1) and two locks.

The new alignment picks up just east of the Otter bridge on SR 415, moves east, then turns slightly north away from the river bed, continues north of Lake Thornhill and crosses Mud Lake at its narrowest point.

Then it turns back, northeast, crosses north of Mullik Lake, turns back northeast and joins the original alignment at Cypress Pond, after which it again crosses the river north of Lake Deltona.

The canal then continues east across palmetto scrub and flatland, through a lock, goes under a railroad bridge, through an other lock, under a 1.55 bridge canal, expected to be opened by 1970 (if all things remain favorable), a 29,000-mile waterway will be opened to navigation.

**County Budget Requests Hiked**

County Commission, holding budget hearings this morning, asked requests for budget increases over last year totaling \$264,019 from all departments. It was noted, however, additional increases for other items have not yet been computed.

Major increases have been requested in their last year budget for maintenance, operation and capital improvement from Seminole Memorial Hospital for an increase of \$90,000, from the sheriff's department, \$200,000 to \$243,500 for an increase of \$43,500, and from the Port Authority from \$76,400 to \$115,000 for an increase of \$38,600.

Other increases were maintenance of buildings and parks, \$15,000; agriculture and county home economics department, \$6,000 and road department, \$18,821.

# 'All Bombs On Target'

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. Navy planes today bombed the oil storage depot in the Halphong dock area two miles northeast of the heart of the city for the second time, the U.S. military command announced.

The Halphong depot, through which 85 per cent of North Viet Nam's petroleum supplies move, was first bombed on June 29 along with another major depot three miles from the heart of Hanoi. The attacks set off a worldwide debate.

A U.S. spokesman said A4 Skyhawks from the aircraft carrier Hancock struck the fuel installation at 1 p.m. and that pilots reported "all bombs on target."

The spokesman said one Skyhawk was shot down by anti-aircraft fire but the pilot was rescued.

Pilots reported smoke from the depot rose 20,000 feet and a fireball erupted from a second explosion, the spokesman said.

He said pilots saw no ships at the piers near the oil depot but that there were three ships in the outer harbor. The ships apparently were not attacked.

Earlier the U.S. command announced American planes flew a record 113 North Viet Nam missions and shot down four Soviet-made missiles, but two of the raiders were shot down, apparently by conventional ground fire. The three pilots were listed as missing.

The U.S. command again reported no significant ground action by American forces.

**Assessors Get Word On Taxes**

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—County assessors were expected to get the official word on how to put 100 per cent property tax assessments into effect this year during a meeting with Comptroller Dickinson today.

"We have got to do the job this year," Dickinson declared Wednesday as he made final preparations for the meeting, which will have an economic impact on most counties in the state.

The comptroller said he expected to give the assessors the necessary tools to do the job. He gave no indication of what he planned to say to the assessors but said the "uncompleted program of action will be quite far afield from anything any comptroller has ever done."

The State Supreme Court, in a ruling last month ordered Dickinson to comply with the legal requirement for full valuation. "If I had done this, I would have given them the assessors' more than one year to get their houses in order," said Dickinson, noting that the law requiring 100 per cent property tax valuation has not been previously enforced.

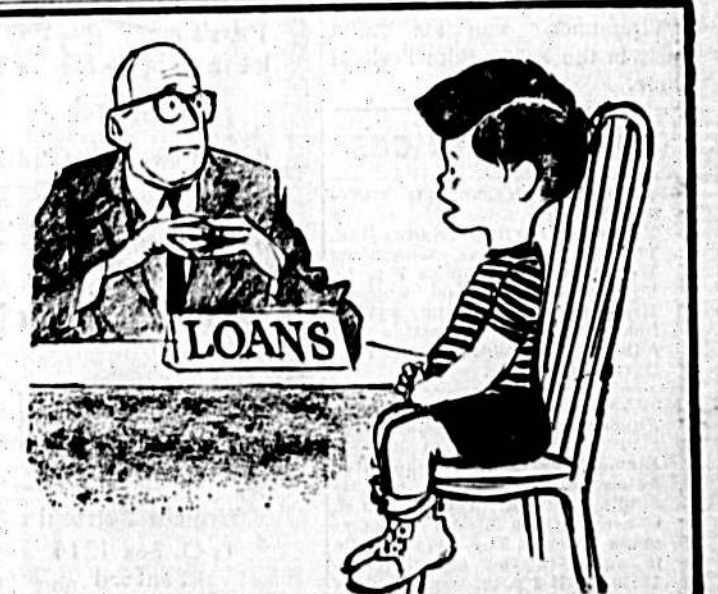
"But," he added, "the court has given them a time schedule of this year and that's that."

The court said that only eight counties had completed reassessment. It said the counties with 100 per cent valuations were Alachua, Baker, Bradford, Duval, Hendry, Orange, Palm Beach and Union.

### 51% Of Adults Failed Eye Test At The Fun Fair

Fifty-one per cent of adults and 25 per cent of children failed vision tests given by the Titmus Vision Screener at the recent Fun Fair. Dr. Richard Dougherty, director of testing said failures were most acute in the area of muscle balance for children and in the area of far visual acuity for adults.

"The lack of eye muscle coordination in school children can cause reading problems, slowing down reading and learning and causing children to be slow in comprehending what they read," Dr. Dougherty said.

"Often people with this problem say they do not like to read. They don't know why, but they are uncomfortable," he pointed out.

"Any student who fails in the vision screening in his class and has reading problems should be given a complete examination. Possessing good vision does not mean that vision is perfect, when muscle co-ordination is lacking," he declared.

In adults, the far visual acuity lack is most dangerous for those who drive automobiles. It causes the driver to make errors in judging the speed and distance of oncoming traffic. Often a driver cannot ascertain if another car is coming toward him or going away.

"There is also an increased problem in night driving when a driver with poor light-to-dark adaptation is unable to make the split-second adjustment from the glare of oncoming headlights to the comparative darkness at the side of the road and cannot perceive persons or objects on the side of the road," Dr. Dougherty noted.

"Lack of far visual acuity and poor light-to-dark adaptation vision does not mean that vision worsens with advancing age.

"Many children tested in the July Fourth examination also failed the far visual acuity tests and a smaller percentage failed the far-nighted test. Many adults also failed the muscle balance tests.

In the latter test, co-ordination between the two eyes is poor, with the result that many people become "one-eyed," using one eye or the other, but not both together.

"It doesn't happen overnight. But nature will not tolerate double vision and eventually adjustment will be made, putting a greater strain on one eye and lessening the power of the other eye," Dr. Dougherty explained.

"Records show that 156 persons were tested on the Titmus Vision Screener, with 68 or 44 per cent failing the tests. Some adults failed more than one test.

"Dr. Dougherty reported he was pleased with the response to the offer of free testing. A steady stream of persons visited the test center during a three-hour period. Assistance with registration and records were members of the Seminole Memorial Hospital's Community Services. Public Health Department nurses administered the tests.

## \$15 Million In Building Is Pictured

Seminole County is in the midst of an economic boom, with employment and personal income on the upswing and with \$15 million in industrial and commercial construction anticipated during the next year, according to statistics released today by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to Florida Technological University, Seminole Junior College, vocational technical training center, the last-of-its-kind project, Sanford Port and new court house, new industrial and commercial enterprises will amount for \$2 million.

Foremost in the commercial construction is the Montgomery Ward complex in Seminole Plaza. Preliminary work on the construction already has been started.

Have Industries, Inc., multi-million dollar subsidiary of Hercules Powder Company, Thursday leased the 7,000 square foot York Manufacturing building on Highway 17-92 south of Sanford with an option for cash purchase.

Lease to Sam L. Levy, former owner and operator of York-Rear Company, now owner of the Western Auto Store in Casselberry.

Transaction was handled through Lorman, Inc., Casselberry realtors.

The new industry will manufacture harnessing for multiple circuit cables in missiles for the space program and when in full operation will employ approximately 40 persons, most of whom will be from the local labor force.

Have plans to start moving in immediately and hopes to start production around Aug. 1.

William P. Stant is vice president and general manager of the company and David Gross is district sales manager.

John Krider, executive manager of Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, was instrumental in locating the new industry in the area.

### President Directs U. S. Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—A machinists union strike crippled operations of five major airlines today.

More than 35,000 members of AFL-CIO International Association of Machinists began walking off their jobs at 6 a.m. local time. A half hour later a spokesman announced the five airlines—Eastern, Northwest, National, Trans World and United—had canceled all originating flights.

In some cases, the spokesman said, through flights were continuing to their final destinations.

Picket lines formed at New York, Washington and other airports in the populous Eastern section of the nation at 4 a.m. EDT. The strike then spread westward from one time zone to the next.

The five airlines normally carry more than 250,000 passengers daily, according to an air transport official. Flights blanketing the United States and spanning the globe.

Local negotiations failed to resolve the labor dispute that began last year.

At his Tampa Ranch, President Johnson deplored the failure of the union and airlines to reach agreement on wages and other issues. He ordered the Civil Aeronautics Board to work out a temporary agreement in the public and to let the Defense Department to report immediately on any problems that arise.

The union said, however, that all IATM workers involved in military aircraft contracts would remain on the job.

Johnson also asked Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien to use every means of moving the mails as rapidly as possible. The President was especially concerned that there be no delay in mail to servicemen in Viet Nam.

The five airlines serve 31 cities in the United States and 62 cities abroad. Their 84,000 employees represent about 64 per cent of the industry's total employment. In terms of revenue passenger miles, the five firms account for 61 per cent of domestic trunk airline operations.

The airlines said that if no substitute is found, the flight schedule, the strike would leave 60 cities without trunk air service.

The Civil Aeronautics Board, on White House orders, called off separately Thursday night representatives of 13 local service airlines, supplemental airlines that specialize in charter operations and seven trunk airlines not threatened with a strike.

CAB transportation specialists worked until late in the night to find possible means of handling the traffic normally served by the five airlines' 8,000 daily flights.
