In this morning's mail... a letter from a student at Messiah College in Grantham, Pa. "I am a resident of Sanford and am presently attending Messiah College, and in one course here, called Social Foundations of Education, I brought up your article. We all in this class would like to study and debate this bill more thoroughly in our studies to keep abreast of the current educational trends in the United States."

# Child-Care Bill Puts Nixon On Spot

## Conservative Political Leaders Oppose New Development Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — A White House-led lobbying effort to defeat a multibillion-dollar anti-poverty bill has been launched in the House in hopes of sparing President Nixon the choice of signing or vetoing it.

The bill, a compromise between separate versions already passed by the House and Senate, contains a provision for a new child-care program which has aroused intense opposition from conservatives.

However, it has equally strong support from civil rights, labor and women's organizations, and Nixon will be in trouble with one side or the other no matter what he does.

In an effort to free him from the dilemma, White House congressional operatives are working with House Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford of Michigan and Southern Democrats to line up votes against the bill. Backers have delayed a vote until Dec. 2 to allow time for gathering their votes.

In addition to the child-care program, the bill authorizes a new legal services program for the poor and extends for two

more years job-training programs for needy youths, community action programs and other activities run by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

They all would go down along with the child-care bill, which makes the White House's task more difficult.

When the House acted on its version of the bill last Sept. 30, the child-care program, voted on separately as an amend-

ment, was approved by only three votes, 186 to 183. But the entire bill was passed 351 to 115.

Since then, critics have been arguing that the child-care program would undermine parental responsibility and permit government indoctrination of children. Some conservative political leaders, already unhappy with aspects of Nixon's program, have said he will lose their waning support if he signs the bill.

The child-development program would authorize three health, educational and nutritional services for children of families with incomes under \$4,200 a year. A sliding scale of fees would be charged families with higher incomes.

The bill authorizes \$100 million this fiscal year to phase the program and \$2 billion next year to put it in operation.

The final version was agreed to by House and Senate conferees Nov. 15 after weeks of negotiating for administration approval. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Elliot L. Richardson seemed in basic agreement on the final version.

However, Richardson joined the opposition Friday, announcing his dissatisfaction with the program in a letter to House Republican leaders.

# Uncle Sam Opening Day Nurseries?

The Herald contacted U.S. Sen. Edward Gurney's office for additional amplification on the Child Development Act (S-2007 Bill) and learned that on the day when it was presented in the Senate, it passed 19-12, with Gurney opposed and Sen. Lawton Chiles voting for the bill.

It was noted that this crucial vote was taken on the day following the Labor Day recess and that 38 Senators were not present to vote.

Although the Associated Press reported that it will cover families with incomes under \$4,320 a year, Gurney's aides reported it would cover those families with incomes of \$6,000 or less. Further, include those children from infancy to age 14, as cited in the NATIONAL JOURNAL, dated Sept. 18, page 1911.

In regard to the cost for this program Congressman John Brademas (D-Indiana), when questioned on this matter, said that he did not know the total federal support which would be required. However, again according to Gurney's office, it would cost \$100 million in fiscal 1972 and an astronomical \$2 billion in fiscal '73.

The bill has passed both houses of Congress but is presently in a joint conference committee. "Only by writing to President Nixon, asking him to exercise his power of veto, is there any chance of stopping this bill," said the Gurney aide.

### We Aim To Serve

Editor, Herald:  
This letter is to thank you for your interest in and assistance to our Marine Laboratory and its research. It is our understanding from Mr. Jim Crowe that your newspaper was instrumental in initiating wire service coverage of our recent financial crisis and consequently brought statewide attention to our plight. I am happy to report that we have been given a new (revised) budget and, although slim, it will see us through the year.

Although our immediate crisis has been alleviated, we still have some long range problems which I hope can be solved in the next legislative session: 1) Our State lab and its activities must be funded from the General Revenue, not the unstable Biological Trust Fund and 2) The Federal-State Cooperative Projects must be funded separately from the purely State activities. In the past when we have been told to increase federal projects the matching funds have always been subtracted from State programs. This is a crippling process and should be avoided even if we have to turn down Federal funds. However, I believe the loss of these funds is a waste to the State of Florida and would suggest that some other source of State matching money be found so these projects could continue. Now that so many people are aware of these problems, I am optimistic that they will be corrected.

Sanford may soon come to be known as the mobile home center of Central Florida if plans of a national firm to locate here are completed, plus the announcement today from the general manager of Winchester Mobile Homes of Win-

chester Mobile Homes the firm plans to have its first unit of the production line by next week.

The Herald has learned that a mobile-modular home manufacturing firm has taken an option to purchase 30 acres of land near the Seminole Industrial Park property.

According to reliable information, the nationally known company plans to erect a 100,000-square-foot building to employ approximately 300-400 workers.

Winchester Mobile Homes, a subsidiary of TRICO, Chattanooga, Tenn., is expected to have its first model off the production lines in about a week.

This was confirmed today by James Goforth, general manager of the Sanford Winchester operation.

Goforth said the local plant, located on Sanford Avenue in the building formerly owned

by H. L. Hunt, is now in production, and will be utilizing production lines building four separate mobile homes. The models are Winchester, Shenandoah, Heritage House and All-American, he added.

As many as 30 floor plans may be incorporated in the structures.

He said the first mobile home dealer already has indicated plans to purchase the first unit to be produced in Sanford.

Winchester plans to employ from 300-400 workers when capacity is reached.
