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Is There A Resurrection

John Smitt has a real good job. He must clear at least \$20,000 a year. And that home he owns would make your eyes pop. Of course the family has two cars and a boat besides. What more could anyone want of life. But a penetrating song asks "Is that all there is?"

A greedy person would think not. But what he thinks would be lacking is simply more of the same material possessions. "Is that all there is?"

The power monger looks to rule his fellow man whether as a politician, a president, a foreman or a pastor and again such a one must ask himself "Is that all there is?" Nice guy, athlete, hero, Don Juan, boss, chairman, is that all there is? The gnawing question presumes the answer there must be more and there is. No matter what we have in this life of this world it is not enough for our complete happiness. St. Augustine puts it very briefly and to the point when he says "O Lord, our hearts are restless until they rest in Thee."

Is there another life, fuller and greater than the one we live in here and now? St. Paul tells us "It has not entered into the heart of man to realize the things God has prepared for those who love him." This life is not the end of our existence but the beginning for a new existence. Our Judeo-Christian heritage proclaims for us a new life that will be better far beyond our powers to imagine. This life we live one day will be changed, but it will not be destroyed.

On this point the Sadducees tried to put Christ on the spot by asking about the woman who had seven husbands according to the Jewish law, "Master Moses prescribed that if a man's brother dies leaving a wife and no child, the brother should marry the widow and raise posterity to his brother. Now there were seven brothers. The first one married and died childless. Next the second brother married the widow, then the third and so on. All seven died without leaving her any children. Finally the widow herself died. At the resurrection, whose wife will she be'

Apparently these Sadducees were not really looking for an answer at all. They were trying to reduce the idea of the resta rection to the absurd, to show that it was ridiculous. So they thought. They felt resurrection would mean just doing all over the present processes of eating and drinking, loving and hating. giving in marriage and taking wives.


Jesus made it clear to them that this is not what resurrection is all about. Our resurrected hodies will be real and physical and will exist in a newer and better manner far beyond our powers to imagine. Our bodies, though not angels will become like angels, and will no longer be liable to death. Like the body of the risen Christ it will be glorified and possess spiritual properties.

In the Second book of Maccabees Chapter 7, verses 1-14 there is the story of the seven brothers and their mother who were asked to abandon their religion and God, but their faith in the resurrection from the dead was so strong that rather than do so they eagerly went to their deaths, One brother said to the king "You are duriving us of this life, but the King of the world will raise us up to live again forever." To the question of the modern song writer "Is that all there is?" we must say no - there is more - a fuller happier life beyond our



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



Jaques took the fight to stop the topless dancers in his city council last week. A resolution of support of the county commission was speedily adopted.

He appeared before the North Orando Council this past Monday and again received assurances and unanimous vote that a resolution will be adopted there as well,

Next scheduled appearance, according to Jaques, will be in the City of Oviedo, probably the first of next week. Following the raid conducted by the sheriff's department and state law enforcement agents, the Longwood Councilman praised the action, but added, "The menace still exists at other spots."

Uncle Sam Opening Day Nurseries?

The Herald contacted U.S. Sen. Edward Gurney's office for additional amplification on the Child Development Act (S-2007 Bill) and learned that on the day when it was presented in the Senate, it passed 49-12, with Gurney opposed and Sen. Lawton Chiles voting for the bill.

It was noted that this crucial vote was taken on the day following the Labor Day recess and that 38 Senators were not present to vote.

Although the Associated Press reported that it will cover families with incomes under \$4,320 a year, Gurney's aides reported it would cover those families with incomes of \$6,900 or less. In regard to the cost for this program Congressman John Brademas (D-Indiana), when questioned on this matter, said that he did not know the total federal support which would be required. However, again according to Gurney's office, it would cost \$100 million in fiscal 1972 and an astronomical \$2 billion in fiscal '73.

The bill has passed both houses of Congress but is presently in a joint conference committee. "Only by writing to President Nixon, asking him to exercise his power of veto, is there any chance of stopping this bill," said the Gurney aide,
