

'No New Tax' State Budget Of \$1.18 Billion Proposed

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — Gov. Claude Kirk proposed a "no new tax" state budget totaling \$1.18 billion from the general revenue fund today. It would be an increase of 8 percent over current spending but would leave an estimated surplus of \$5.5 million for education.

Bomber Hits In Cambodia

SAIGON (UPI) — American warplanes attacked Wednesday Cambodia, hitting gun positions that shot down one U.S. helicopter and opened fire on others coming to the rescue, U.S. spokesmen said today.

Elsewhere on the battlefield, U.S. Marines killed 17 guerrillas with the aid of artillery and fighter-bomber strikes south of Da Nang. There were no American casualties in the fighting. In a day of light action, U.S. helicopter gunship pilots reported killing another 17 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops in two engagements. One such action near Duc Pho 82 miles southeast of Da Nang resulted in eight guerrillas killed.

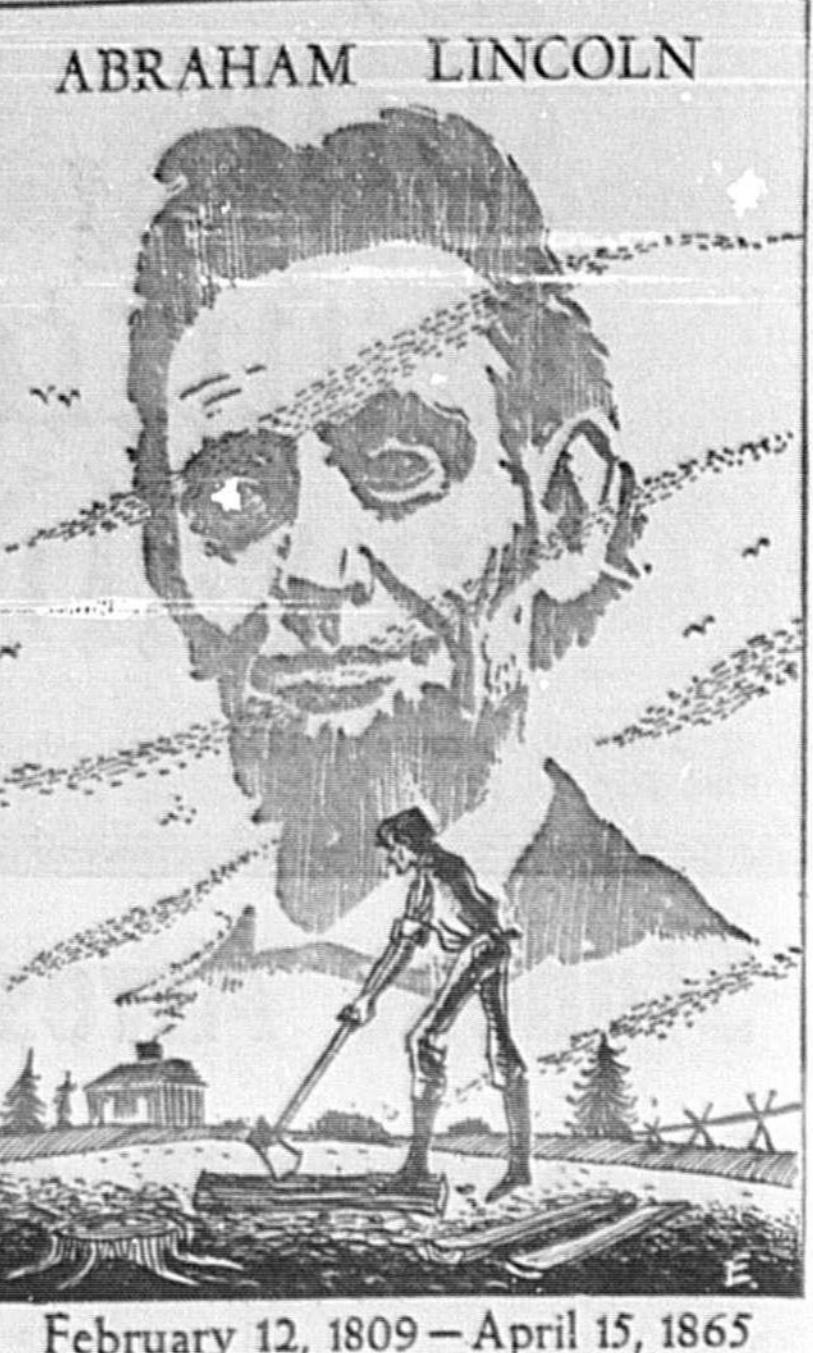

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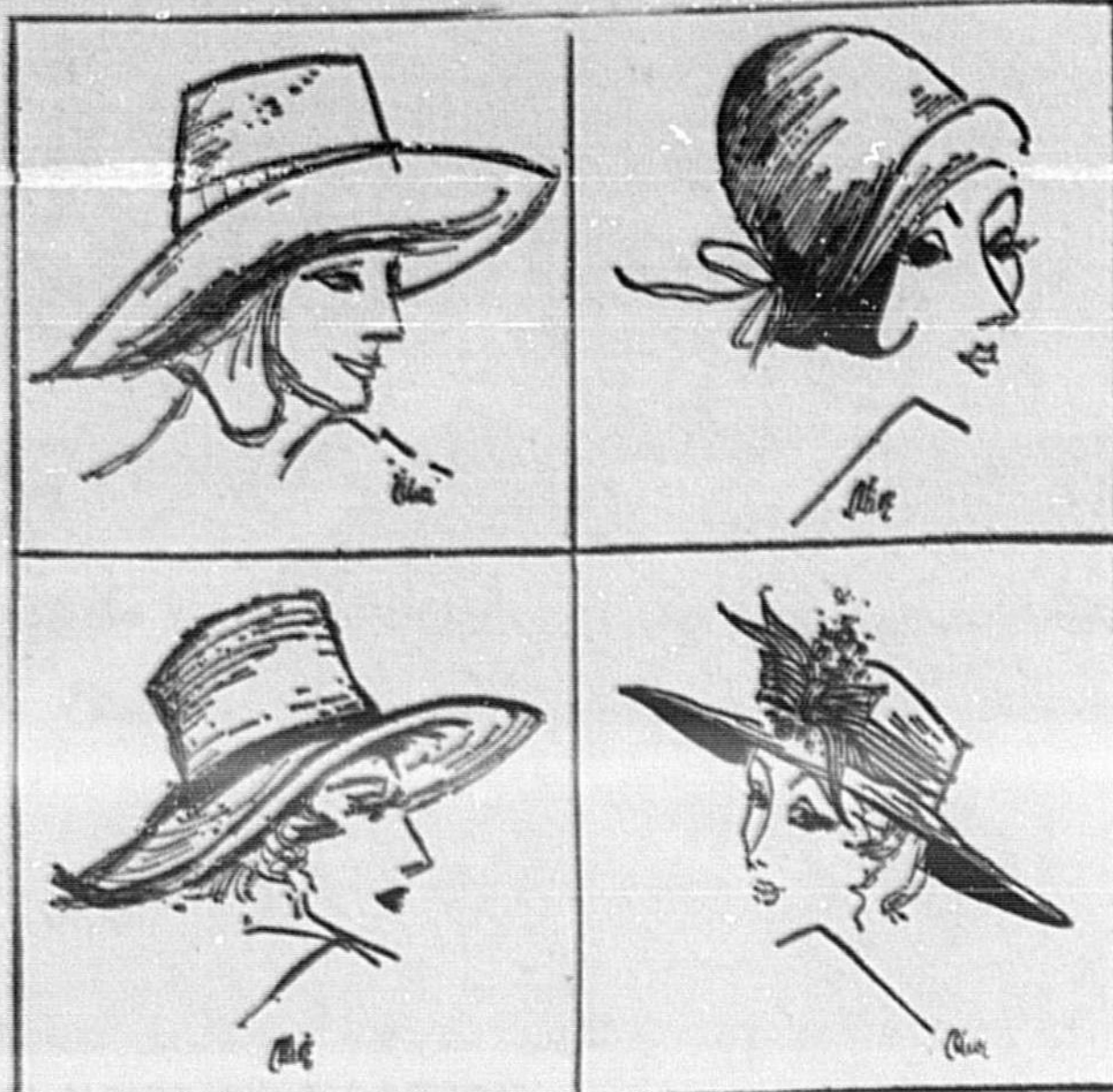

LIBERAL, Kan. (UPI)—Kathleen Weed is the world's record holder in the run-the-415-yards-while-flipping-your-pan-without-dropping-it-or-slipping-in-the-drip race. In other words, Legay Kathleen, 19, won the 21st annual International Shore Tuesday Pancake Derby Tuesday. The transatlantic event, overlooked in Olympic competition in these many years, is staged annually between the ladies of Liberal and the lassies of Olney England. Kathleen's first Negro to win the race, came close to Pancake Derby fame in 1968 and 1969, only to stumble both times and dropped her flapjack. 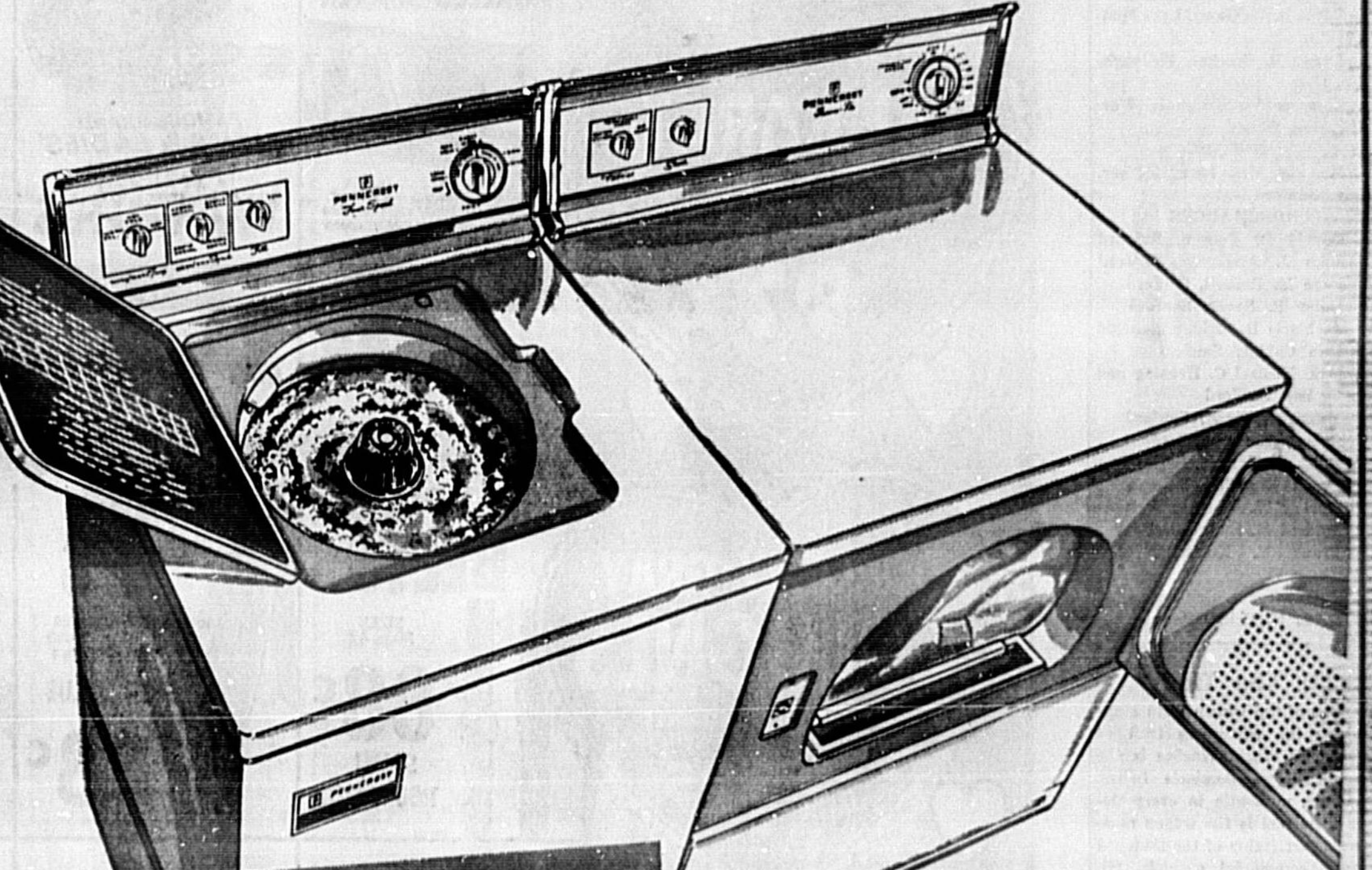

New York's 'Freedom Of Choice' Favored

 Moves are underway in the South Carolina and Georgia legislatures to adopt New York's "freedom of choice" school desegregation program. Federal courts have outlawed freedom of choice programs in the South. The purpose of the actions, according to sponsors of "New York" bills is to "point out the inequities" taken by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare in school cases. "If they are allowed one thing, why should we not?" asked Rep. Harold Rector. Florida Rep. Jack Porthugh said Tuesday a movement has begun for passage of a constitutional amendment allowing freedom of choice as the "only sensible way to resolve the school crisis." He said the drive is bipartisan and is going beyond the confines of the state of Florida. The Judiciary Committee of the Florida House Tuesday passed resolutions calling for public election of federal judges and asking Congress to "bring federal court authority in cases involving the forced busing of students." The Georgia House passed a bill Tuesday which would block the use of state funds to transfer students and teachers in compliance with federal court orders issued by Burke County, Ga. The bill charges state funds "currently are not available, in sufficient sums" to provide both quality education and teacher and student transfers to satisfy racial balances. And at Savannah, Ga. U. S. District Court Judge Alexander A. Lawrence granted a 30-day deadline extension Tuesday for new desegregation plans to be submitted by the Chatham County school system. The order pushed the deadline for submission of the new plan back to April 1. It also set back the final date for tendering new teacher contracts from Feb. 1 to March 1.

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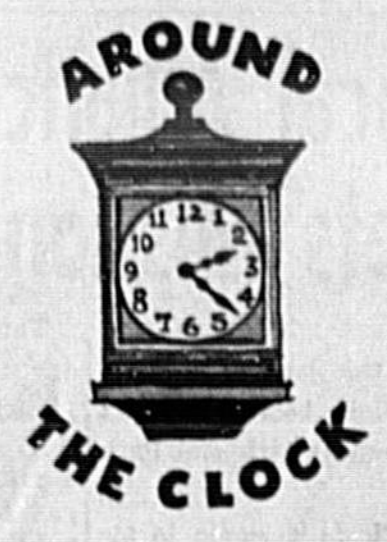

Maitland Interchange Public Hearing Feb. 20

The State Department of Transportation will conduct a public hearing Feb. 20 in Maitland to discuss the location of a proposed interchange on Interstate 4, between Sandspur Road and U.S. 17-92. The hearing will be to discuss the proposed location, social, economic and environmental effects the project will have on the local area. Maps, drawings and other pertinent information concerning the proposed location developed by the State will be available for public inspection one hour prior to the start of the hearing. It is emphasized that this hearing will deal only with the proposed location. A design public hearing to discuss features of the interchange, right-of-way acquisition plans and construction schedules will be held after the Bureau of Public Roads approves the proposed location. The 2 p.m. hearing will be held in the Maitland Civic Center. Seminole County interests are reviving a proposal that an interchange be installed at "Twin Lakes," at the intersection of I-4 and the 30-52nd Street extension.

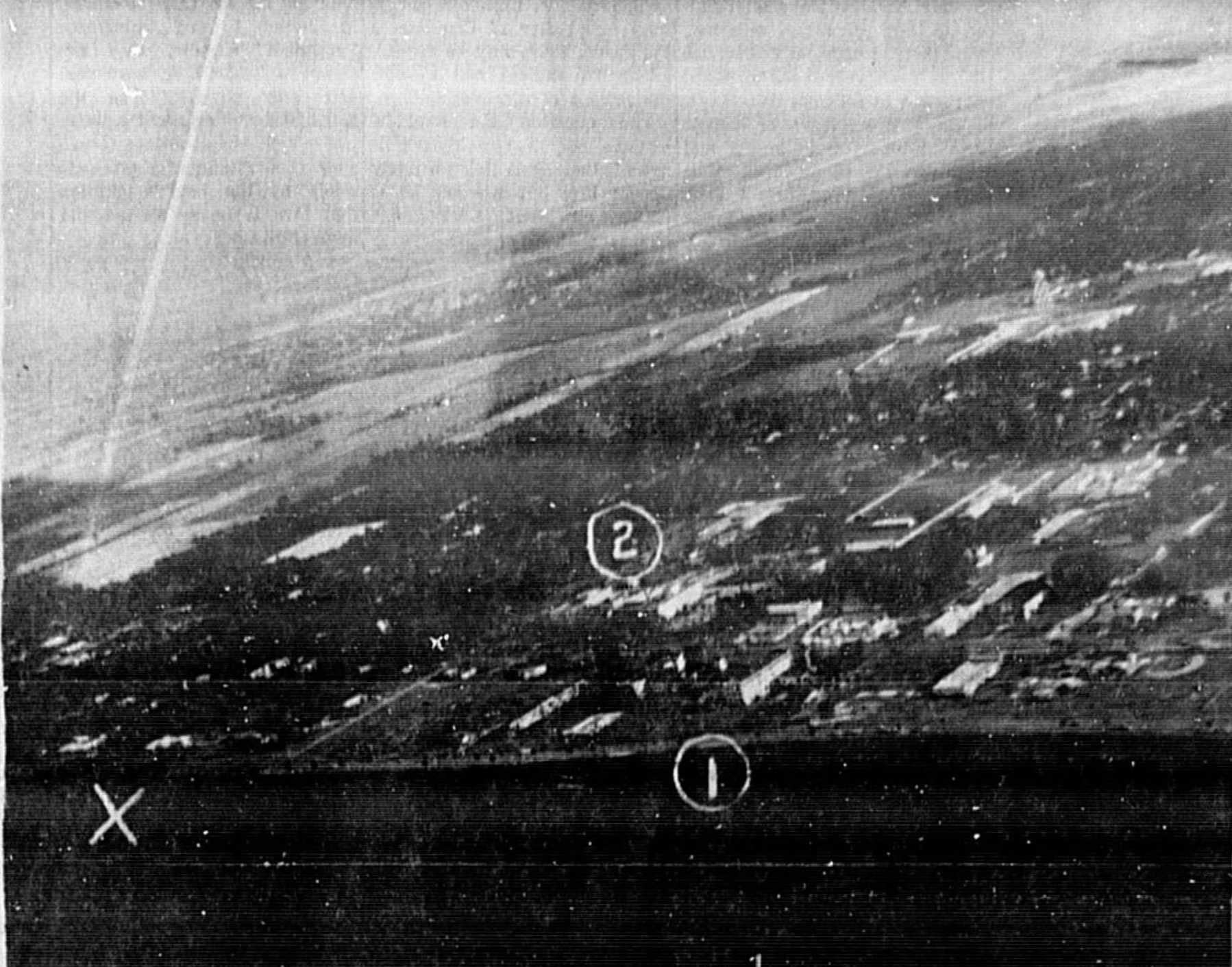

As a result of this action 2,863 of the nation's 3,129 counties and independent cities are or soon will be offering the food stamps or donated foods. Seminole County approved the program locally in a "Christmas present to the needy" in action of the Board of Seminole County Commissioners at a meeting on Dec. 23, 1969. Application was later made to the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture through the State of Florida Division of Family Services of the Division of Health and Rehabilitative Services. A spokesman for the agriculture department stated that the stamps will be available to low income families as soon as necessary local arrangements are completed. When contacted by The Sanford Herald this morning, County Commission Chairman, John Alexander advised that the procedure, since approval has been granted by the Department of Agriculture, is that the state agency will contact county authorities to effect a satisfactory agreement for operation, personnel, regulatory procedures and funding. Alexander continued that following the necessary implementation of these details, the program should be in operation within Seminole County in the next 60 days.

 Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce executive committee at this morning's meeting named John Krider, chamber manager, as that body's choice to fill the remaining open seat on the Sanford Industrial Commission. The action by the Chamber came after Sanford City Commission at Monday's meeting asked that a recommendation from the Chamber be forthcoming, so action could be taken at the next city meeting scheduled for Feb. 22. Commission Monday named John Krider, United States Bank president, and Carl Schlie, Harzer Aluminum Products president, to the nine-member board. If the City Commission acts to accept the Chamber's recommendation Feb. 22, then a recent unified understanding between the city and the Chamber will have been completed and the city's industrial efforts will then be channeled through the industrial commission. George Tushy, Chamber president, commented, "Krider's experience will fit in well with the SIC." Arthur Beckwith, Chamber executive committee member, said the action would tie the Chamber in with the SIC since many industrial contacts are first started with the Chamber. Harold Kattner, executive committee member, moved to name Krider as the Chamber's choice. In other action, the Chamber board named members Clifford McKibbin, Harold Rowland and A. L. Wilson to an election committee to make tabulations and supervise the Chamber's coming election of 30 members to a board of directors. Ballots will be mailed out by Feb. 23 and must be returned by March 2 for tabulation. A nominating committee, to be made up of Vernon Miles, Kenneth McIntosh, Arthur MacKay, Clyde Long and Beckwith will select the top 30 vote getters for directors board to serve one-to-and three-year terms. Top 10 persons getting most votes will serve three-year terms; second 10 in voting will serve two years and last 10 to serve one year and last 10 in April, 1969.

Criminal Docket Before Williams

Three Murder Trials Slated

Circuit court trials which begin next week before Judge Volie A. Williams Jr. will include three murder cases. Appearing will be Carl Lee Bowers, 34, who has been charged with first degree murder in the death of his wife, Beryllen Bess Bowers, 32, in Oviedo. Bowers allegedly shot his wife with a pistol, kicked her, and reportedly left her face a bloody mess. Facing second degree murder charges are Willie Philip and Charles Hall. Philip is charged with the death of Samuel Tolbert, 45, in November of last year. Philip allegedly struck Tolbert with an iron drain pipe in an altercation which took place at a rooming house. Tolbert later died in a Winter Park hospital. Hall is charged with shooting a 21-year-old Marine, Kenneth Hollerman, in the chest on the outskirts of Oviedo. The incident occurred last October, and Hollerman later died in a Winter Park hospital. Joel McLean faces charges of crime against nature in an incident of last July in an alleged sexual attack against Howard Bolden while both were prisoners in Seminole County jail. Shadrick Martin faces charges of grand larceny in the theft of a cigarette machine at Seminole Fish Camp last October; Lonnie McNeal, charged with uttering a forged check, charged with aggravated assault in the shooting of Charles Taylor last October, and Johnnie Rozier, charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit a misdemeanor. Rozier reportedly entered the home of J. L. Penney, Clyde Long and Beckwith to commit petty larceny by stealing and carrying away property of less than \$100. Hugh Hollar is charged with assault with intent to commit rape in an alleged attack upon a 17-year-old Forest City girl in April, 1969.
