



The spokesmen said the incident occurred 22 miles west of Saigon in a border area Da Nang. where North Vietnamese troops have been building up for weeks. An OH6 light observation helicopter flying on the Vietnam side was struck by ground fire from Cambodia, exploded and crashed in flames, spokesmen said. The two crewmen were missing and believed killed.

Rescue 'copters that arrived later to search the area came under heavy ground fire from inside Cambodia, the report said, and U.S. warplanes came in to hit back.

It was the first time the United States has acknowledged attacks inside Cambodia since Dec. 4 and 5, when air strikes were flown against targets across the border in retaliation for a North Vietnamese attack on a South Vietnamese post.

Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird, in Vietnam on a threeday tour, told newsmen Wednesday the United States would keep attacking North Vietnamese and Viet Cong units in



usefulness not always apparent. It is in this aspect that we are printing herewith an editorial from the National Conference of Christians And Jews, Inc., in New York which could be used by everyone as a guide to

personal judgment and personal action. "The new decade begins with the torment ing awareness that social problems in our land remain unresolved.

"Each of us, in the words of Charles Lamb is unconsciously a "bundle of prejudice". But it is within our power to rid ourselves of such a load . . . an unnecessary burden which only halts our personal progress as well as that of our fellow men.

"If we can but set our sights on the goal of true brotherhood . . . the belief that one should act brotherly toward one another regardless of race, creed, or nationality . . . the load will

"The National Conference of Christians and Jews calls this the "brotherhood commitment". They ask us to establish our own Brotherhood Week this week and next week and the next, all through the year.

"This need not necessarily be an act of love, but of respect. Brotherhood begins with respect. As a human being simply engaged in the act of living in these difficult and divisive times .each of us is entitled to respect. "Yes, give us this day our daily bread End give us this day our daily dignity.

"Since 1934, when the National Conference of Christians and Jews felt the need to establish a special Week to remind American of their obigations to their fellow man, the climate for the acceptance and the practice of brotherhood has changed for the better.

"While brotherhood has not yet become way of life for all, at least in many quarters we believe it has become an all-year-round commit-
