They had been awarded similar canoes on previous Pioneer nights. He declared that he was impressed by the spirit of "fair play" by the "old timers" and pointed out that "in the general run of things people nowadays reach out to grab." He asked co-operation of the pioneers in determining policies for the next session of the State Legislature, and paid tribute to their "rugged individualism" which, he stated, had made this country great.

In introducing Judge Stenstrom, Mr. Evans pointed out that Isaac Terwilliger and the Judge's grandfather, N. J. Stenstrom, were competitors in the milk and vegetable business in Sanford about 65 years ago.

Judge Stenstrom declared that he represented the business men and farmers of Seminole County when he paid tribute to the pioneers whose efforts had made the county prosper. "We realize and recognize our heritage and will carry on to build a better Seminole County," he said. He revealed that his paternal grandfather had come here from Sweden and raised 10 children, that his father had spent his life in this county and expressed the wish to spend his own declining years here.

Mr. Housholder spoke of the "golden age" when youth is passed, when the individual no longer seeks to strive for self alone, but seeks to do something for mankind. "In that, we get the peace of mind that God intended," he asserted. In humorous vein, he told of fillibusters in the U. S. Senate and declared that he was thinking of making a speech before the State Legislature which he once served, with the idea to "stop all speeches."

ments, in collusion with the government of Russia, are not implementing the military clauses of the peace treaty.

The three treaties were to be supervised by the Allied Powers for a period of 18 months, which ended yesterday, McNeil said during that period there have been "violations of the human rights, military and economic clauses by all three ex-enemy countries."

The British minister said Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin assured the house that we fully maintain our rights to invoke the treaty machinery at any time in the future.

Treaty provisions allow Hungary an army of 65,000 and a 1,000-man air force of 60 planes. Bulgaria is allowed a 55,000-man army, 1,800 men for antiaircraft defense, 5,200 airmen with 60 planes, and 3,000 seamen with 7,250 tons of shipping. Romania was to have 120,000 land troops, 5,000 anti-aircraft gunners, 8,000 airmen manning 160 planes, and 5,000 seamen for a 25,000-ton navy. None was to have heavy bombers or rockets, even experimentally.

"Whenever Britain or the United States has attempted to invoke the peace treaty by calling a meeting of representatives of the three Allied Powers with a view to concerting action, the Soviet representative has refused to attend," McNeil said.

All three treaties guaranteed freedom of religion, press, speech and public meetings to all persons.

4 Additional Countries To Join Alliance

Denmark, Iceland, Italy And Portugal To Enter Pact To Curb Aggression

Four more nations were expected today to line up under the North Atlantic Defense Alliance, details of which will finally be made public tomorrow.

Denmark, Iceland, Portugal and Italy were invited today to join the United States and seven other nations in the pact—a treaty designed to curb aggression.

Inclusion of Italy would be a triumph for France and the United States.

Britain, abetted by Canada and the low countries, has objected that Italy's entry might extend the alliance too far southward and expose the members to unnecessary risk.

The American and British governments contend that Italy's pro-Western outlook and her strategic position make it necessary to include her.

In Rome, Communist members of the Chamber of Deputies held up a vote on the treaty with an all-night talking marathon. Demanding their right to speak as they voted, each Communist and extreme left winger assailed the pact, which has been bitterly opposed by Soviet Russia.

Seven nations originally formed the nucleus of the proposed alliance: Belgium, Canada, France, Luxembourg, Iceland, Britain and the United States. Norway joined recently.

The pact would commit each of the signatories to join in resisting an attack on any one of them. Each nation would devote to itself a military force to be used in meeting the attack.

In Stockholm, Lieut. General Hugo Jung, commander in chief of Sweden's armed forces, said last night he hoped a defense alliance could be worked out between his country and the pact.

The body of Walter Schoenemann arrived on the 2:40 o'clock train Tuesday afternoon, with Chief Machinist Mate William W. Constantine, U. S. Navy, in charge. Sauls of the Legion and Judge O. Douglas Stenstrom, adjutant of the V. F. W.

Huge Defense Budget Approved By Sweden

STOCKHOLM, Mar. 17—(AP)—The Swedish parliament, after more than 12 hours' debate, decided today to set aside \$200,000,000 (200,000,000 crowns) for defense this year.

The greater part of the defense budget had been appropriated earlier. The debate centered around an additional \$200,000,000 crowns asked by the appropriations committee for new ordnance material, including radar equipment.

During the debate, the Communist Party, following the recent line of their comrades in other lands, pledged loyalty to the Soviet Union.

31 Are Injured When Truck Hits Bus At Sarasota

SARASOTA, Mar. 17—(AP)—Thirty-one persons were injured today when a dairy truck and a bus smashed together on a narrow highway.

Felia Wellman, driver of the Sarasota dairy truck was unconscious two hours after the wreck and the extent of his injuries were not known.

Highway Patrolmen McRae Walling and Howell Gillett said the accident occurred after the Lamsont Trail Tours bus was on the bridge and the dairy truck driver probably saw he couldn't avoid hitting the southbound bus.

The officers said Wellman evidently swung as far as he could to one side to avoid the oncoming bus and hit a bridge abutment. This impact knocked his truck into the path of the bus.

The dairy truck was demolished. Four ambulances were rushed to the scene. X-ray doctors and nurses were hurried to the Sarasota hospital.

The bus was enroute from St. Petersburg to Miami. It had departed here about 10 minutes previously.

Trans-Jordan, Israel Agree On Arms Pact

Forces Of Two Nations Will Be Reduced In Military Zones Of Palestine

RHODES, Mar. 17—(AP)—Israel and Trans-Jordan agreed in principle today on a reduction of their forces to equal strength in military zones of Palestine, acting U. N. Mediator Ralph Bunch announced.

The two nations, engaged in armistice talks, agreed last night on lines dividing Jerusalem among them.

Bunch saw Brig General William L. Riley, the American who heads the staff of U. N. observers, will go to the Red Sea Trans-Jordan port of Aqaba and make a final report of events there. The Israelis occupied the Palestine Red Sea coast opposite Aqaba, where British troops are stationed. Trans-Jordan protested.

Riley also was named chairman of a committee of military experts to supervise equalization of Israeli and Trans-Jordan troops. Lieut. Col. Thomas J. Conlin, also an American, will sit for Riley at the first meeting later today. Lieut. Col. Dan Lowther and Lieut. Col. Mohamed Mowat also are on the committee.

The Jewish and Trans-Jordan delegates agreed the reduction of forces would be broken down into three areas. One is north from a point called Budrus at the beginning of the front held by Iraqi troops, down to the Jerusalem sector and the true lines set on Nov. 30. The second area is the Jerusalem sector. The third is the eastern Negev south of the Dead Sea.

An authoritative source said some problems of the Jerusalem sector are "not yet solved." (Continued on Page Eight)

40 Guests Routed As Fire Destroys Minneapolis Hotel

MINNEAPOLIS, Mar. 17—(AP)—Early today a fire swept the Minneapolis hotel building to burn out the business firms and the hotel with loss estimated at \$500,000.

Flames spread rapidly through the three-story structure and in one hour were shooting high into the air through the roof to attract thousands of spectators.

One fireman overcome by smoke was reported not in serious condition.

All Minneapolis fire agencies were alerted and a number of fire engines and ladders were summoned from St. Paul and other nearby cities.

The hotel building, at Hennepin Avenue and 7th Street, was called a total loss by George Eckhart, fire chief who made the damage estimate. Firemen devoted much of the day to firing the shuttering, Gophers Theater and Liggett-Douglass, which the hotel surrounds in L. Square.

Three Judges Decide Charge Should Be First Degree Murder

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 17—(AP)—Seventeen-year-old Seymour Levan was sentenced to life imprisonment today for the Jan. 8 sex slaying of a 12-year-old neighbor.

Three judges fixed the degree of the crime at first degree murder. The youth had pleaded guilty to a general charge of murder.

Testimony was heard two weeks ago in an effort to determine the degree of guilt.

The court's decision said that Levan "knew that the members of his family were absent, entered into the home of 12-year-old Elyse Simon, a stranger to him, and there committed upon that child an act of premeditated sexual lust which constituted the physical element of the crime." By President J. Hillis Miller University of Florida GAINESVILLE, Mar. 17 (Special)—Minnesota, Iowa and Texas all have great State Universities. Minnesota and Iowa, each have populations equal to that of Florida, i. e., about 2,500,000.

Minnesota has one State University with 27,000 students. Iowa has two State Universities and a State Teachers College enrolling a total of 23,083 students.

Florida has two State Universities with similar offerings in areas that attract large numbers of students such as Arts and Sciences, Education (teacher training) and Business Administration.

Florida has enough population to fill two State Universities to overflowing. (Iowa with a similar population fills and supports two State Universities and one State

Teachers College.) Florida has the same per capita income as Iowa. Is Florida able to support its universities in a creditable manner?

Modern business, industry and science is so complex that our youth need the best possible university training in order to be ready to compete and to make their contribution to community, state and nation.

NEW YORK GIANTS
The New York Giants, who finished in fifth place in the National League last year, face a tough task of completing the job outlined for them by President Horace Stoneham. Stoneham says he figures the Gotham Bombers have the stuff to win the pennant in 1949.

For better or worse their showing could depend on one man—Lippy Leo Durocher—and possibly the injury jinx.

As the squad goes through its spring drills in Phoenix, Ariz., only one major change can be noted in leading personnel—Durocher, erstwhile pride of the old Brooklyn Dodgers, stands at the helm instead of the popular Mel Ott. The finger seems to point to "The Lip" to move the Giants from the top of the second division to the top of the first.

Durocher took over the club midway the 1948 season, but it is not fair to judge his work with a team, which was molded by another die.

All the regular players are familiar, and on hand to give him every assistance possible. Plenty of good looking rookies are also in evidence, but the men who will be in the starting lineup when the curtain rises on the National League season begins were on the Giants roster last season.

Injuries hurt the club all during the 1948 season, a team can not lose the services of men like Walker Cooper and Billy Ripken without seriously affecting the ball club. These two men were out of the Giants lineup for quite a time last season.

Cooper still remains a question mark. He has undergone an operation on his injured knee, and the big backstop has been taking things a little easy this far in spring drills. The Giants will definitely need the assistance of Cooper, if they expect to go far this year. His experience behind the plate with young pitchers and his hitting power make him an important cog in the wheel.

Pitching presents an unknown factor beyond Larry Jansen, the ace of the corps, who again should be the leading hurler on the staff.

The second best pitcher on the staff will probably be Sheldon Jones, starting his second year in the Giants livery. He won 16 games for the team last season. Monte Kennedy, who spent most of 1948 with Minneapolis in the American Association, could prove invaluable. His only difficulty will be his wildness. If he conquers this, he should be counted on for at least 15 victories.

NEW YORK—This is the third successive year that Joe DiMaggio has come up with heel trouble. In 1947 and again last spring he was bothered with a bone spur in his left heel. He underwent several operations. He feels that by favoring this heel he put an extra burden on his right foot and now he gets intermittent pains in his right heel.

Fortunately for the Yankee jolter and the Yankees-DiMaggio need little spring conditioning to get in shape. Though he seldom exerts himself during the winter, he's the kind of fellow who could go out there tomorrow and hit that long ball. He has remarkable reflexes and lives a good life for a guy whose appearances are in terrific demand.

Joe is not troubled when he's batting. It's only when running that his heel hurts. Early in January during a National Children's Cardiac Home benefit game at Flamingo Park, Miami Beach, DiMaggio gave a pre-game exhibition of hitting. Baseball rules militated against his actual participation in the game.

He hit the ball well, hit it far and pulled just as usual to the left field fence. He overcame two important obstacles doing this. He was batting in borrowed spikes and in a batter's box that might have resembled the La Brea tar pits.

A couple of days later he shot a round of golf over the famous La George course. Walking didn't bother the heel that last November sent him to the hospital for an operation. Twenty stitches were taken.

There have been some guesses about how many games DiMaggio will play this season. These are the result of Joe's recent trip to Baltimore to have his heel X-rayed following the opening day's work-out at St. Petersburg.

Joe played 153 games last season. The 163rd game was the toughest he ever played. That was the game in Boston on the final Sunday. The Yankees lost their chance at the American League pennant the previous day. The final game meant little other than a chance to avenge their four elimination defeat by the Red Sox.

DiMaggio was as crippled as any ballplayer ever was for any final game that had no bearing in the

standings. Yet all he did was lash out four hits—two doubles and two singles—in five trips to the plate to drive in three runs in a 10-5 lost game.

He had a painful charley horse in his left leg and his body was battered and bruised from a long season that began with spring training on Mar. 1 and ended this final Sunday, October 3.

DiMaggio got every swing out of his aching body. He had used up all his opportunities to bat in this game. When he made his final hit, Manager Bucky Harris—not DiMaggio—signaled for a pinch runner. As Joe hobbled off the diamond, 31,354 Fenway Park fans stood up and cheered. It was an ovation that few Yankees ever heard. You would have to go back to the days of Ruth and Gehrig.

DiMaggio never complains about his injuries because he loves to play ball. After his recent ailment he said:

"Last season—the pain was so intense it affected both my legs. The calf of my right leg stiffened because in favoring the heel I was using an unnatural stride. My knee swelled. Both thighs pained me. That's what I want to avoid this year. Maybe it will clear up. I hope so."

DiMaggio's recent ailment recalls the spring of 1947 when he was missing from the St. Petersburg camp. He was in Baltimore where his left heel was mending following a bone spur operation which required 40 stitches. Larry MacPhail, then Yankee president, was in Miami trying to get his No. 1 scout, Paul Krichel, to make a deal with Connie Mack.

MacPhail and Krichel were standing beside a car belonging to another Yankee scout. It had a flat tire and, noticing that MacPhail seemed anxious to get to town, we picked him up.

"I don't see how I can pick the Yankees to win. Why, there's no telling how much DiMaggio will play," the writer said.

"You can't pick us worse than second," MacPhail said. "That means we'll be the contender, at least. And regarding DiMaggio, don't worry. He'll be all right."

Well, the Yankees won the 1947 pennant by 12 games and DiMaggio played 141 games and batted .315.

It establishes an armistice line that starts at a point near the village of Al Wajain southwest of Jerusalem, east through the Holy City and swings back to the west, completing a semi-circle, an Israeli spokesman said.

Discussion of the reduction and withdrawal of forces in the entire combat zone is scheduled for today.

Meanwhile, Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, United Nations mediator, announced that U. N. observers have found no basis for Trans-Jordan complaints that Israeli and Arab forces clashed recently in the Aqaba area.

He said it has been established that Israeli troops moved south to the Gulf of Aqaba, occupying the hamlet of Umm Rush Rash on the Israeli side of the Trans-Jordan border, but that the move was accomplished without a fight. He added that the occupying force numbered 200 Israelis, not 3,000, as had been reported.

Meanwhile Senate Republican leader Wherry (Nebr.) said he is going to press for a new set of "civil rights" legislation at the first opportunity after the Senate adopts a new debate limitation rule.

Wherry's declaration was his answer to Truman. Democrats who complain that the rule will make it impossible to pass any of the President's "civil rights" program which includes anti-poll tax, anti-lynching and anti-discrimination measures.

The Nebraska said his text would disclose "just who is for civil rights around here and who is just talking." However, no civil rights bills are yet ready for Senate action.

And the Hoover Commission recommended to Congress a reorganization of the Interior Department which is said to be needed to increase efficiency and cut out "wasteful conflict."

Under the reshuffling proposed by the commission, interior would become the focus for all major public works projects. But two congressional members of the department the floor control and cover and harbor work now supervised by the Army engineers.

CIO Challenges U. S. Estimate On Unemployed

W. E. Says Check Of Nation Shows Over 5,000,000 Are Idle

WASHINGTON, Mar. 17.—(AP)—The government's figure of 3,222,000 unemployed was challenged by the CIO (United Electrical Workers), the union said today. It now has at least 5,000,000 idle. At a news conference, the U. S. Washington representative, Miss A. Nixon, criticized what she called a government tendency to "pooh pooh" the extent of present unemployment.

The U. S. said its studies showed more than 5,000,000 were idle today. Instead of the 3,222,000 which the Census Bureau counted in its last cross section check for early February.

The union's president, Albert J. Fitzgerald, wrote President Truman urging a vast preparedness program of public works to cope with unemployment.

The union argued that three classes of idle were being left out of the census count—and that they numbered 1,600,000 in February.

1. Those laid off for temporary periods or who were to start new jobs within 30 days.

2. Those who are forced into part-time work, while idling from their own jobs, even though they may be employed only one hour a week.

3. Those who are idle but for their own reasons are not "pounding the streets" daily looking for work.

J. S. Capt, director of the census, commented: "We have to consider what is best for all the people. There are no groups and think others should be called unemployed. We count those unemployed for 30 days or more who are looking for work."

The U. E. got equally little support from the CIO. In a statement after the U. S. conference, a CIO spokesman said: "The census figures are adequate to measure the fluctuation in the level of unemployment and employment. They have reflected the recent rise in unemployment fairly, although serious unemployment continues to exist and vigorous action is still below depression size."

TOKYO, Mar. 17.—(AP)—A sudden war in the Western Pacific would find Russia with a larger fleet than the United States.

Sudden Pacific War Would Find U. S. Handicapped

The Soviet fleet in the Pacific has increased since the end of the war, now including six cruisers, a number of destroyers and between 72 and 100 submarines of all types. Construction for the assembly of new craft is continuing at Vladivostok.

This is far less than the number of ships assembled by Japan before the Pacific war. American naval officers also are inclined to agree with Secretary of the Army Kenneth B. Dyer's recent opinion that the Soviet fleet is far behind the U. S.

Nevertheless, there is a feeling in naval circles that the real test will come when the sea lanes open from Hawaii to beyond the Indian Ocean if long done on a short string.

The strongest American force in this area is the Western Pacific Fleet under Vice Admiral Chester Hodge now in those waters. Its future disposition depends on events.

A small force of destroyers and minesweepers operates from Japan as part of the Far East Command under Vice Admiral Russell S. Berkey. His command includes the Pacific Islands stretching from here to the Philippines.

Even with this small force, U. S. Navy strength out here is being reduced—partly in line with the "Surge first" strategy. Key officers say they have lost the services of a cruiser and failed in an effort to obtain another destroyer division. This results from a recent Washington order cutting the Pacific fleet strength by 50 per cent and destroyers by 25 per cent.

15,000 Homes Are Reported Unsold In 46 U. S. Cities

Majority Of Vacant Houses Are Priced Above \$9,500 Mark

CHICAGO, Mar. 17.—(AP)—More than 15,000 new houses in 46 cities are standing unsold, an Associated Press survey showed today.

The bulk of the 15,083 were priced above \$9,500. Very few, unless obviously undesirable, were unsold below that figure. Generally, the industrial Midwest showed the largest numbers. The rest were scattered throughout the nation.

Opinion was divided as to why the houses were not sold. The pull of home builders, real estate men, finance agencies, and public housing authorities assigned various reasons. But they all agreed the normal winter slump had something to do with it, and that high down payment requirements had cut the potential market. March income tax payments likewise figured.

There are approximately 37,000,000 homes in the United States, including a near record construction of 826,000 last year, Bureau of Labor Statistics figures.

An analysis of the report shows that the 15,083 unsold houses are priced from \$9,500 upward to \$20,000. Homes in the lower classifications are selling quickly as fast as produced, taking into consideration the requirement of FHA that they be held 90 days for veterans, if built with FHA money.

Does this mean the housing shortage is licked, that people have been priced out of the market, or that financing requirements are too high?

The Denver Housing Authority says there has been little backing up there, but many persons who want a house for a large family (at least three bedrooms) are obviously being priced out of the market.

Alfred H. Dolben, president of the Massachusetts Real Estate Association, said: "It is obvious that private builders are producing new housing in all price levels as fast as it can be absorbed by the public. I am forced to the conclusion that the shortage of housing shortages has passed in many sections of the state (Massachusetts)."

Japan Occupation May Be Continued By Civilian Army

U. S. Is Reported Eyeing Change From Military Control

WASHINGTON, Mar. 17.—(AP)—The United States is banking seriously on switching the occupation of Japan to civilian control, possibly next year, diplomatic officials said yesterday.

They said present planning is based on the idea that Gen. Douglas MacArthur or some other top military man would remain as supreme Allied commander. He would be responsible to the State Department rather than the Army Department as now, and he would have a civilian deputy to handle most administrative matters.

The same general idea is reported under study for Germany. Authorities, and, however, that deal with the occupation area will be up in the air, with monthly work on detail in prospect even after a decision finally is reached.

They said therefore that recent published reports that a civilian high command would replace MacArthur by the end of the year were at least premature.

MacArthur will be at least Aug. 30 well past the normal Army retirement age but there have been no hint of any plans to replace him.

The United States is preparing for Japanese occupation by wartime agreement among the Pacific allies.

Unless there is a peace treaty in the meantime, officials indicated, when MacArthur departs a deputy will be replaced by another American general. Under the proposed change he would be responsible to the army only for strictly military matters.

The proposed civilian deputy probably would have the diplomatic rank of ambassador, and a position which would be held by a former State Department official.
