LEADERS IN FIGHT FOR OL. SMITH

Leaders Seeking Admission in Illinois Man Ready Debates

Consists To Names For Him

Elect Stands Chance To Get Say Democrats

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Unleashing a flood of fiery oratory in the Senate, administration leaders this afternoon launched a final drive to elect Oliver P. Smith (R) Illinois, into his oath as a United States Senator.

With Smith halted at the gate and knowing that a majority of the Senate is waiting for him, Republican spokesmen tonight sought to gain temporary admission to the senate. An earlier Internal News Service poll indicated that a vote of 48 to 47 would be needed to deny the oath to Smith and his supporters conceded the battle over administrative control and the old democratic-insurgent split revived and unifying the administration.

The administration threw its support to Smith and its spokesmen contended that he was entitled to his oath of office, even if it meant a temporary suspension of the constitutional provision that no Senator should be sworn in until he has taken the oath.

SETTLEMENT OF MEXICAN DISPUTE STILL A PROBLEM

QUIET PREVAILS AS "SHOWDOWN" BATTLE LOOMS

Johnson And Landis Are To Settle Six-Year Feud At Meeting Of Big Loop Heads

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—Foreboding quiet prevailed along the baseball front today as General Landis and Johnson, principals in the pastime's bitterest feud, marshaled their forces for the "abowdown" battle scheduled for Sunday and Monday.

Respected local opinion is practically unanimous in the belief that when the smoke of this engagement has cleared away there will be a "help wanted" sign hung on the door of organized baseball, calling either for a new commissioner, or a president of the American League. The odds favor the latter.

The feud between Leo Johnson and the mild but firm Judge Landis is of six years' standing.

The present crisis was precipitated by the Cobb-Speaker scandal. Johnson broke a long silence with the charge that Commissioner Landis alone was responsible for clouding the escutcheons of Cobb and Speaker, and that he was trying to "pass the buck" to the American league.

Landis countered by summoning major league officials to meet with him here Monday when he promises to thresh out the whole

matter to a bitter finish. Johnson met that move by calling a meeting of American league directors for the Sunday before. At the meeting of American league officials will decide whether or not they will attend the Landis hearing.

"It looks like a merry session Monday," Johnson said today, which was taken to mean that the American league officials will attend the Landis party. "I stand by every charge I have made," he continued, "and I am prepared to prove every thing I say."

Landis was back in town today from French Lick, Ind., where he attended the Major-Minor league meeting. But he refused point blank to talk. As one observer put it, "he doesn't intend to fire until he sees the white of Johnson's eye."

The general belief that the storm will blow Johnson out of his \$40,000 a year job is based on the by-laws that govern the game, which

give Landis his power. It is further charged that Johnson has violated the pledge to support the commissioner which was drawn up and signed by major league officials on January 12, 1921. Johnson's name heads the list. This pledge reads in part: "We, the undersigned, pledge ourselves loyally to support the commissioner in his important and difficult task; and we assure him that each of us will acquiesce in his decisions, even when we believe them mistaken, and that we will not discredit the sport of public criticism of him in any way."

Cobb And Speaker Were Too Friendly With 3rd League Promoters, Is Claim

DETROIT, Jan. 19. — (INS)—Bert Walker, sporting editor of the Detroit Times in a copyrighted article today says: "Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker were dropped from organized baseball because they were accused of negotiating with promoters of a proposed third league to rival the American and National Leagues."

"When a high American League official was quoted in the Times yesterday as saying Cobb and Speaker would never again appear in the American League he added, 'the half has never yet been told.'"

"Well, here is the other half."

"Cobb and Speaker were dropped from organized baseball, not because they were accused of having made a bet on a ball game in 1919, but because they are suspected of having flirted with eastern promoters with the idea of forming a third league to run in opposition to the American and National Leagues."

"The incident of 1919 was merely a subterfuge. That commissioner Landis does not consider matters that happened back before he took office a significant today is indicated by the fact that immediately after he dipped his brush in whitewash and cleansed the players accused of having thrown games in 1919, he immediately recommended to the rules committee of the Major's a statute of limitations. He recommends that incidents happening prior to the time he took office in 1920 be outlawed."

"I have it in the best authority

that more than a year ago it was charged that both Cobb and Speaker did confer with promoters who were trying to establish a league to rival the American and National. It is understood that it was proposed that each of these stars should lead a team in the new circuit."

"Ty Cobb himself seems to verify this suspicion for he told the writer that he knew he was slated to go more than a year ago and given him in Detroit, when he was lauded to the skies, saved him for the time being."

"This new information doubtless will explain why both Landis and Johnson have been so reticent regarding the status of Cobb and Speaker. They have tried, doubtless, to suppress the real reason for the dismissal of two foremost players fearing that it might lead to encouragement to prospective rivals of the major leagues."

"When correspondents wrote to Cobb, immediately after his withdrawal from the Tigers, and suggested that he and Speaker head a movement for a third league, Ty told this writer that he would not consider it."

"It would take too much money," he said, "and it is not practical."

"That remark alone would indicate that he had studied the situation."

"The alleged acts of Ty and Tris that brought about their banishment took place early in 1920 or late in 1920."
