



Warm tribute is paid to Sidney Hillman, head of the CIO Political Action Committee, upon his sudden death at his summer home in New York state Wednesday by Senator Claude Pepper who characterizes his life as a "typical American success story."

But Sidney Hillman was not an American any more than his name was originally Hillman. He was a son of Schmuel Gilman and he was born in Zagare, Lithuania, it a time when that little Baltic state was a part of Russia. He was brought up as a member of the Russian Jewry and was being trained as a rabbi when following a revolutionary attempt in 1905 he was forced to flee to this country.

America received him, as it has many other refugees from foreign lands, with open arms.
