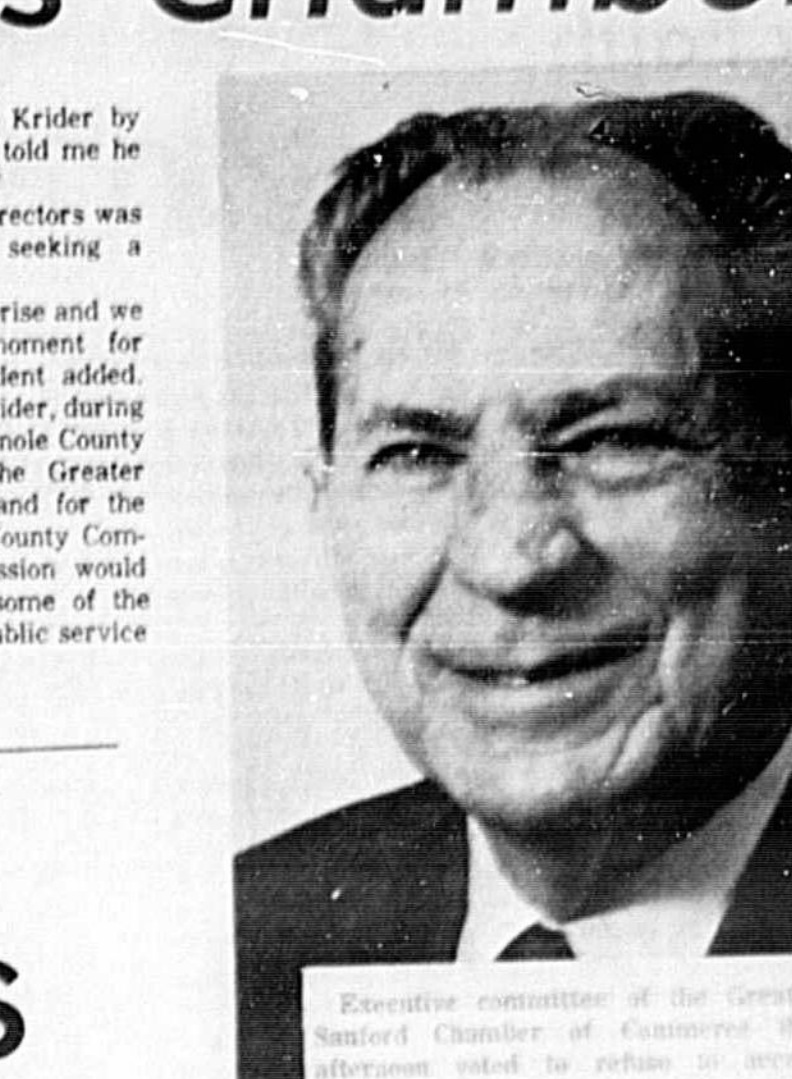

2 Rapists To Receive Resentence

Capital punishment for several years while the constitutionality of the death penalty languished in the courts, and which has recently been ruled unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court, will see the results locally on Monday in Circuit Court.

On March 31, 1966, defense attorney Albert Pitts filed a writ of habeas corpus for a new trial. Later, in 1967, Pitts filed a writ of habeas corpus for a new trial. At the time the two were included in an order by U.S. District Judge William McTear legal challenge of the state law and procedures in capital cases was settled.

On Aug. 17, 1967, U.S. District Judge George Young ordered a stay of execution for the two youths and retained jurisdiction in their case pending determination of the status of capital punishment in Florida.

'Sunshine' Vote Due At Winter Springs

WINTER SPRINGS — The city's 500 registered voters will have an additional item to consider on tomorrow's ballot in the primary elections. Voters will give the stamp of approval or turn thumbs down on an amendment to the new city charter which requires that all meetings of the City Council be open to the public.

While city officials are quick to point out that the provision,

being contrary to state law, could never be put in effect, nevertheless it took threatened court action by resident John Ritten to focus attention to the potential seriousness of the issue.

The new charter, adopted by referendum June 13, was not supposed to have included the provision for closed executive sessions, under home rule provisions the section will be removed immediately.

Mayor Granville Brown, in defense of the oversight, stressed the fact the present council would never use the provision, but that a new council might present a divergent problem if the section permitting closed executive sessions is left intact.

Regardless of the adamant rebuttal of wrongdoing, Councilman Troy Piland, at an Aug. 18 meeting, again suggested closed meetings to discuss accusations against city officials. Whether these prove true or false, Piland maintained, the damage is done to a person's reputation if the accusations are made public.

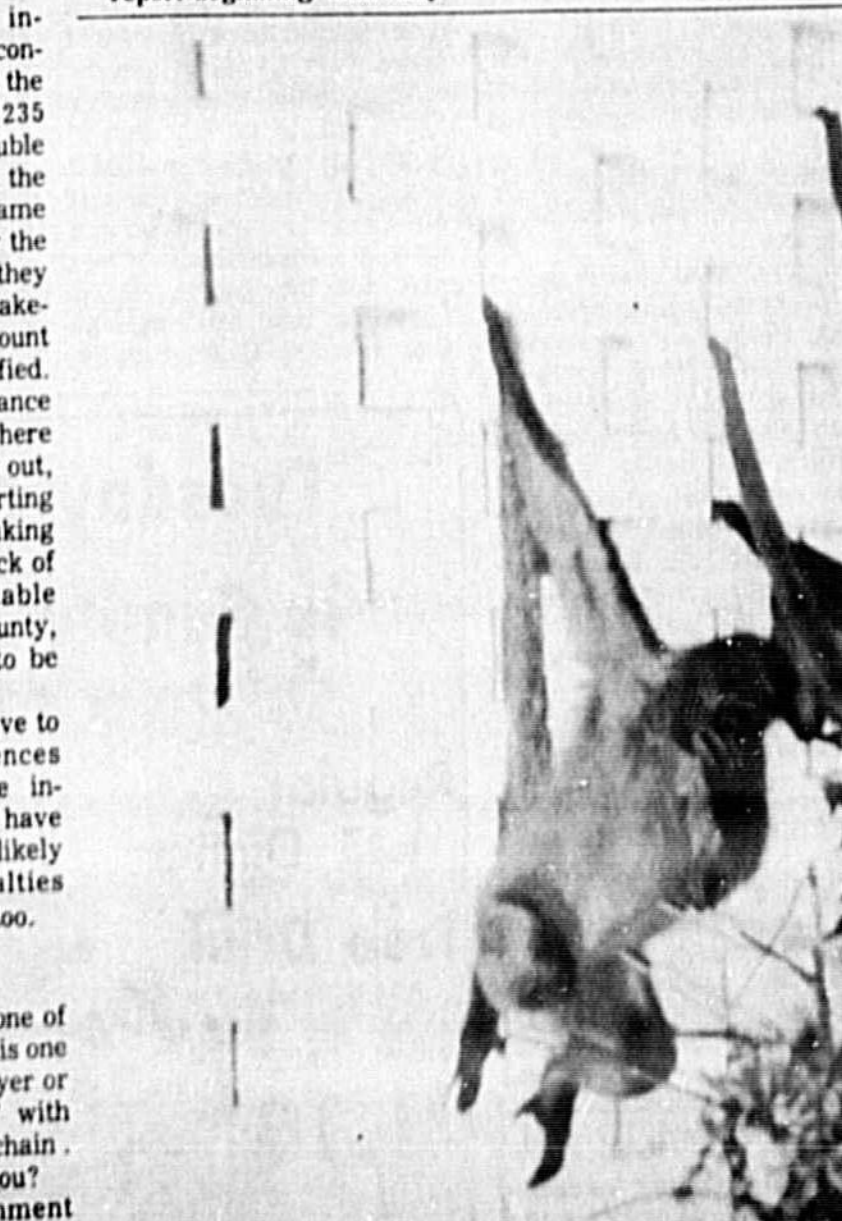
Piland suggested an advisory board to sit through the complaints as to credibility and then make a report to council.

Abolition Of Mayoralty Urged

CASSELBERRY — In a surprise move at a budget work session, City Council Chairman Edith Duerr startled the council by suggesting that the position of mayor be abolished.

Dr. Duerr, in making the suggestion, pointed out that a great number of cities no longer have mayors. She feels that a five-member council and city manager could run the city effectively but, if a mayor was needed at any time, the council chairman (a new one will be elected in January) could act in the position.

the position of city manager could be made strong enough so that the manager would have all the power and responsibility of a mayor. "Our city manager's position was made weak in the beginning because of the strong feelings of an incumbent mayor," Duerr said. "It's time to correct that."

All the council members dismissed the chairman's idea quickly. "At this particular time in Casselberry, I don't think this is a good idea," said Councilman John Zacco. "I want somebody responsible to the people," said Councilman Harry Sambrook. In discussing further in the

budget the matter of council salaries for the coming year, Chairman Duerr seemed to feel that the salaries might have to be raised. She pointed out the difficulty she has had in getting all the councilmen together for meetings, and suggested that a larger salary might possibly help in that area.

"If you have to be bought, I'll be willing to buy councilmen," she said. "I'm in favor of raising the salaries if it takes a raise to get councilmen to come to meetings." The other members of the councilmen disagreed on the need for a pay raise. Zacco said, "If you want a pay raise, I don't think this is a valid reason for bringing it up."

Council covered the parts of the budget dealing with estimated revenue, administration and personnel, building and zoning, and the council salaries. The next budget meeting will be held Wednesday night.

Rapists' Sentence Cut To 30 Years

Israel Gilley and Jimmie Lee Drumwright, among the previously doomed inmates of Raiford's death row, following conviction of rape without recommendation of mercy,

were brought back to Sanford for resentencing this morning. Standing before the same judge who meted them the death sentence seven years ago, the two youths, in appearance and demeanor, belied the heinous crime of which they were convicted.

Circuit Judge Thomas Waddell, Jr. explained the nature of the proceedings, noting that it was a petition by the defendants for an entry of a new sentence based upon a federal court order. The U.S. Supreme Court, Judge Waddell noted, has decreed the laws of the country dealing with the death penalty to be illegal and, therefore, the petitioners were brought back for the resentencing.

Having adjudicated the defendants guilty of the crime of rape, the court queried if they wished to make any comment before sentencing. Defense Attorney Albert Pitts, who has, through the years, waged an intensive legal battle upon the part of the youth, requested the court consider the length of time in incarceration on death row and the traumatic effect this would have upon a person.

Pitts contended there was no violence involved in the perpetration of the rape, and asked the court to consider a sentence of 30 years or less due to "the economic position if such vehicles were obliged to use two other routes which are available."

Also on tonight's agenda is a report from the city manager on the proposed closing of two parking lot entrances at 25th Street and French.

She said the men grabbed her eight-month-old boy, but left the child inside on the couch, while they ransacked the house.

A public hearing to resolve the traffic problems along Airport Boulevard (Old Onora Road) between Sanford Avenue and U.S. 17-92 has been set for 8 p.m. tonight at Sanford City Hall.

Both sides of the controversy are expected to present their views to the City Commission, who are in the throes of trying to determine whether it wants to implement a city ordinance it had drawn up two months ago to prohibit heavy traffic, including buses and trailers, from using the residential area route.

Property owners in the Pinecrest area of Sanford have complained several times to the commission about fast traffic going and coming from the Sanford Airport utilizing the mile-long stretch. They say it is a hazard and pointed out that several traffic accidents have occurred.
