

Two major forces are striving for supremacy in every man's life. They are the life-defeating forces that destroy, that burt, that tear down. There also are the life-suctaining forces that build up, that strengthen, that heal. This has been true since the beginning of time. No one escapes the tension, at times the conflict. Any honest biography makes it clear that even the giants of the faith knew it, often intensely. Even the saints had their conflicts. At no one time is either of these groups or forces in complete control.

Both life-destructive forces and life-building forces are described in an infinite variety of ways in the Bible, especially in the book of Psalms. All of the emotions known to man are presented in Psalms.

Guilt, while it can have some positive values and lead to growth, can literally tear a man to pieces when unrelieved and continuous. Nowhere is it described more clearly than in Psalms 51: "Have mercy on me, O God, according to thy steadfast love: plot out my transpressions Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin!" Here is the agonizing sense of guilt which people describe when they say, "I can't escape it, I can't sleep, I can't work." For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me. Over and over, descriptions of the destructive power of guilt appear in this classic of the devotional life.

However, we also find descriptions of the healing, empowering, sustaining power of redemption and forgiveness: "He does not deal with us according to our sins, nor reward us according to our ininguities...as far as the east is from the west, so iar does he remove our transgressions from us" (Psalms 103:10,12). I recall the statement of a woman who had been harboring a sense of guilt for a long time. After a lengthy conversation when she finally had developed courage to make a confession and to believe and accept acceptance, she said. "You know, Pastor, I feel clean for the first time in a long time."

Bitterness, hostility, resentment and jealously are there. We find examples in the narrative accounts of both Old and New Testaments. Again it is The Psalms that give one of the most graphic examples. In the same collection that includes beautiful phrases of "green pastures and still waters" there is vindictiveness of the severest sort in Psalm 137, Hatred, bitterness and hostility, in almost any form, are among the most life-destructive forces.

Understanding, compassion, goodwill and love are also here. They are found in the career of Jonathan, the story of Hosea, the forgiving love of Christ. Hatred destroys; love

Fear is in the Bible, and not without reason. The people had occasions when fear was the only logical response. There were times when they trembled like the leaves on the trees. But courage is also here. There is the stoical courage of Esther, going up before the king, saying "If I perish, I perish." There is the courage that comes out of self-forgetful commitment: "Perfect love casts out fear" (I John 4:180. There is the courage that comes only with faith: "Wait for the Lord; be strong and let your heart take courage; yea wait for the Lord" (Psalms 27:14).

We sometimes see both forces at work within one personality: "I cannot be good as I desire to be, and I do evil against my own wishes." The life-destructive forces gained the upper hand even in the life of Paul. "Wretched man that I am!" he said (Romans 7:24). Here are anxiety, self-doubt, guilt and many more emotions condensed in a few sentences. But Paul also could write: Have no anxiety about anything but in everything my prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known unto God. And "the peace of God which passes all understanding, will keep your heart and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7). The life-enriching, the life-sustaining, the lifegiving forces are now in control. It is the message of the Scriptures that the life-giving forces are always stronger than the life-destructive forces. It may not always seem so to you, either in the world around us or the world within us. It is a venture of faith, but these affirmations are true: Love is stronger than hate; guilt can be overcome by forgiveness; and faith is truer than doubt. By this faith we live

To make the change one of a positive, useful and definable character the qualified citizens must register and vote in greater numbers and with greater understanding than has been the case in the past.

The broad picture of American democracy is in for some changes. The ones which are easiest seen and even more easily felt are at the local levels. Thus, Seminole County redistricted and re-woed is a political phenomena of more than local interest.



Copley News Service On Aug. 8, Ambassador U. Alexis Johnson, undersecretary of state for political affairs, testified before the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on national security

His remarks, based on his experiences during 38 years in the foreign service, deserve wider publicity than that afforded by the subcommittee report. They contain much that is a welcome relief from flood of left-wing and liberal propaganda.

To determine which way we should go in the future, it is helpful to examine the past. Immediately following World War II, the ambassador notes, in the defeated countries "desperate men and shattered states saw a bleak future. We alone had the strength and confidence to provide

, the leadership and help" to save these defeated peoples from "a new tyranny which openly professed hostility not only to the United States but also to any international structure in which we could survive."

The only sensible thing we could have done, he said, was to offer this help, because "strong as we were, we were not then - and we are not now - strong enough to be indifferent to the world we live in." Johnson finds it extraordinary that it is now fashionable

to question our motives and accomplishments during these postwar years. As to motive, Winston Churchill called our efforts "the most unsordid in history."

As to our accomplishments, they were not insignificant. Not the least of them is that our mortal wartime enemies are now among our closest friends.





Political Notebook Cost of Manpower Faults McGovern By BRUCE BIOSSAT

Once again, Sen. George McGovern is putting his prime? emphasis upon our having fewer planes, missiles and other armaments when he says he would cut the defense budget \$30 billion in three years. But manpower is really the big cost escalator in defense spending.

In two key paragraphs on defense outlays, McGovern in his New York economic speech mentioned military hardware repeatedly and spoke of the "waste of scarce wealth on excess firepower" and the "dead weight of

excessive arms. He touched upon manpower just once, when he suggested that our present NATO force stationed in Europe was far too big.

McGovern's preoccupation with weaponry makes his "alternative defense budget" read too much like an emotional essay in the liberal New York Review of Books, and too little like the hard, realistic document it was in-

tended to be. The Brookings Institution's review of the proposed 1973 budget states flatly that "increases in manpower costs have become the most important single determinant of changes in recent defense budgets.

The supporting figures are impressive. In the 1973 budget, military and civilian manpower and related personnel costs are expected to account for 56 (per cent of total defense outlays. In fiscal 1964, they came to just 43 per cent, though there were then 300,000 more men on active military duty.

Though the senator himself says little about it, his own defense document promises to cut some 650,000 men from strictly military manpower rolls. The clear import, of course, is that this would produce substantial savings. Still, the record isn't all that cheering. From fiscal 1968 until now, total U.S. military and civilian defense manpower has been cut by 1.5 million individuals. Yet, in that span, payroll and other defense personnel costs went up by 10 billion yearly.

Strictly military pay doubled in the period, and civilian defense pay went up 50 per cent. And the end is not in sight. Brookings says defense

manpower costs will go up another \$4.5 billion in the 1973 budget. It further estimates that by fiscal 1977 at least another \$4 billion will be added to those costs just through military and civilian pay boosts. By a strange coincidence, pay legislation has hiked the

defense budget since 1968 by an amount almost matching the savings from our withdrawals from Vietnam. Incidentally, there won't be any huge savings from the further winding down of the Vietnam war. The vaulted "peace dividend" long since has been collected and spent. Any dramatic portrait of a country brought out of war

and turning vast released sums to great home front tasks is cruelly false. As a matter of fact, one respected budget specialist not unsympathetic to McGovern's presidential candidacy

told me the senator's \$30 billion defense cut proposal is excessive. He suggested saving up to \$15 billion might



One Man's Opinion We're Improving Till It Hurts By DON OAKLEY

The engineers call it "channelization," and the word is self-descriptive. Channelization is the deepening. straightening and clearing of natural watercourses so that heavy rains will drain off rapidly instead of overflowing

"Gutterization" is what critics of the practice call it, however, and that word, too, is descriptive. A channelized river or stream is nothing but a big gutter designed to transport water in the most efficient manner from point A to point B.

"Gutterization" is also the direct opposite of all that makes a stream biologically healthy for fish and wildlife, writes conservationist John Madson in a slashing attack on the "river wreckers" in the September issue of Audubon magazine.

When the engineers remove the bends, pools, riffles, snags and sandbars of a stream, along with the trees that shade the streambank, all that's left, says Madson,

is a barren ditch. To date, he reports, more than 8,000 miles of living streambeds in more than 40 states have been "gutter ized." 13,000 more have been scheduled for "improvement," and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service estimates

that 175,000 miles of streams "need channelization." The National Audubon Society has undertaken a major effort to publicize what it considered to be the excesses of the Soil Conservation Service and the Army Corps of

Engineers. Among other things, it challenges the alleged flood control benefits of channelization. Why, it asks, spend money on costly projects to protect fields from being flooded when the nation already has a surplus crop prob-

And anyway, it claims, the projects often fail to control floods but just transfer the flood threat to the next community downstream.

The trouble with such arguments is that they amount to accepting battle with engineers on their own terms.

Longwood citizens, when announcement was made that certain classes of its elementary school were going on double sessions, did not just sit back and complain. Rather they did something about it.



William L. Taub of New York said today that Kissinger was informed on July 5 in San Clemente, Calif., that Hoffa had been invited by the North Vietnamese trade union movement to visit Hanoi. "Kissinger approved the plans," Taub said, "but asked that the trip be postponed until after July 20."
