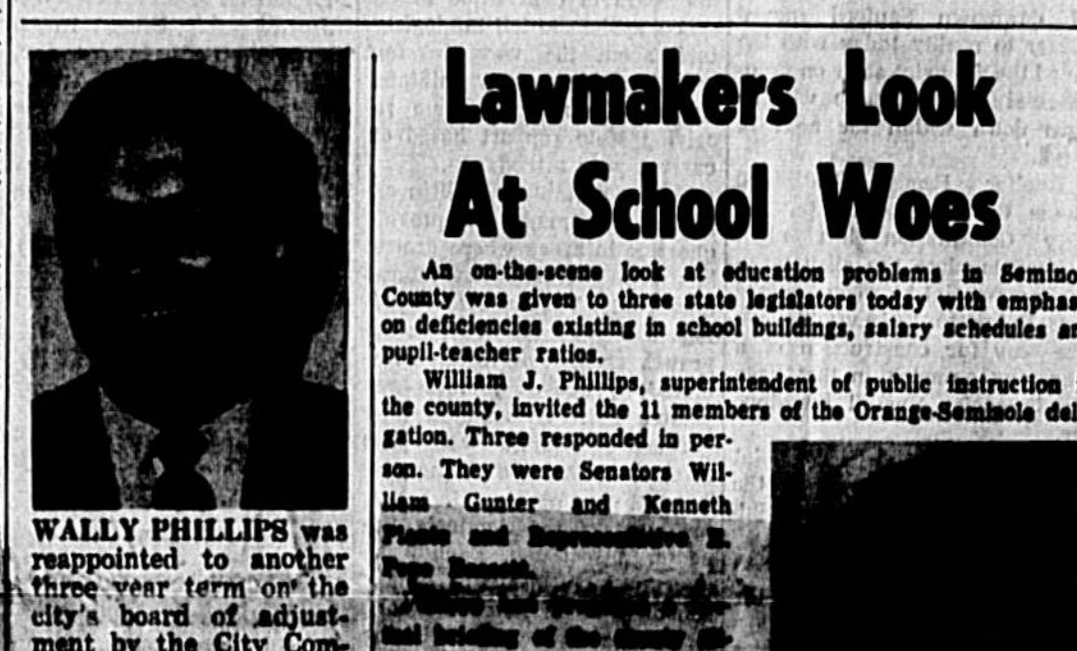

Glamor Stocks Continue To Soar

NEW YORK (AP) — A large percentage of Wall Street's assets began chattering earlier this year the opinion that the glittering glamor stocks would fade and the blue chips, with their dull but more whole some picture, return to favor.

The experience hasn't been quite that. Although stock averages are higher now than they were a few months ago, some glamor stocks have continued to soar, and through last week looked as if the sky itself was no limit.

What is surprising even experienced investors is that some of the glamor stocks already were so high that profit-taking seemed inevitable. But they have pushed ever higher, sometimes on heavy volume.

Computer, electronics and other science-oriented stocks have been among the most popular trading vehicles, with International Business Machines, Control Data, Burroughs and Scientific Data, all soaring to record highs. Since all these companies make computers, the buying can be explained in part by examining the vast potential of the industry, now revolutionizing some businesses, creating others and releasing manpower from menial chores to concentrate on more profitable tasks.

The vigorous advances in other areas of the market—along with some sharp declines—might more easily be attributed to in-out trading by some of the highly active "performance" mutual funds.

There is little question that many stocks also have been lifted more than trading vehicles for some big, venturesome money from questionable sources.

But, after considering all reasons for the advance by glamor stocks, the most plausible and now the most popular explanation remains an old one—that stocks are a hedge against inflation.

The market is in a questionable period. Gains and losses almost match some days. On others the market average remains neutral despite tremendous advances by individual stocks.

This has created a feeling among some on Wall Street that a renewed speculative binge could occur, with the public jumping into the market in force. When this happens, it is the signal for some pros to leap out.

Big Storm Due Next January

DUBLIN, N.H. (AP) — The big January storm of 1947 will be repeated in 1968, but next spring will be early and sunny, the Farmer's Almanac says.

Predicting the weather a year in advance is the principal claim to fame for the publication, now in its 174th edition.

The almanac accurately forecast last year the end of the drought in New England during 1967 and the January storm that year which was a blizzard in the Middle West and heavy rains in New England.

Also Weatherwise, the almanac's weather forecaster, predicts that 1968 will be marked by nice spring weather, interrupted later by major storms from Chicago to New England in late April.

Also Weatherwise is the pen name of Robb Sagegood and Rob Troutbridge who publish the almanac. They use a secret formula, current atmospheric data and charts dating to 1862 in plotting the forecasts.

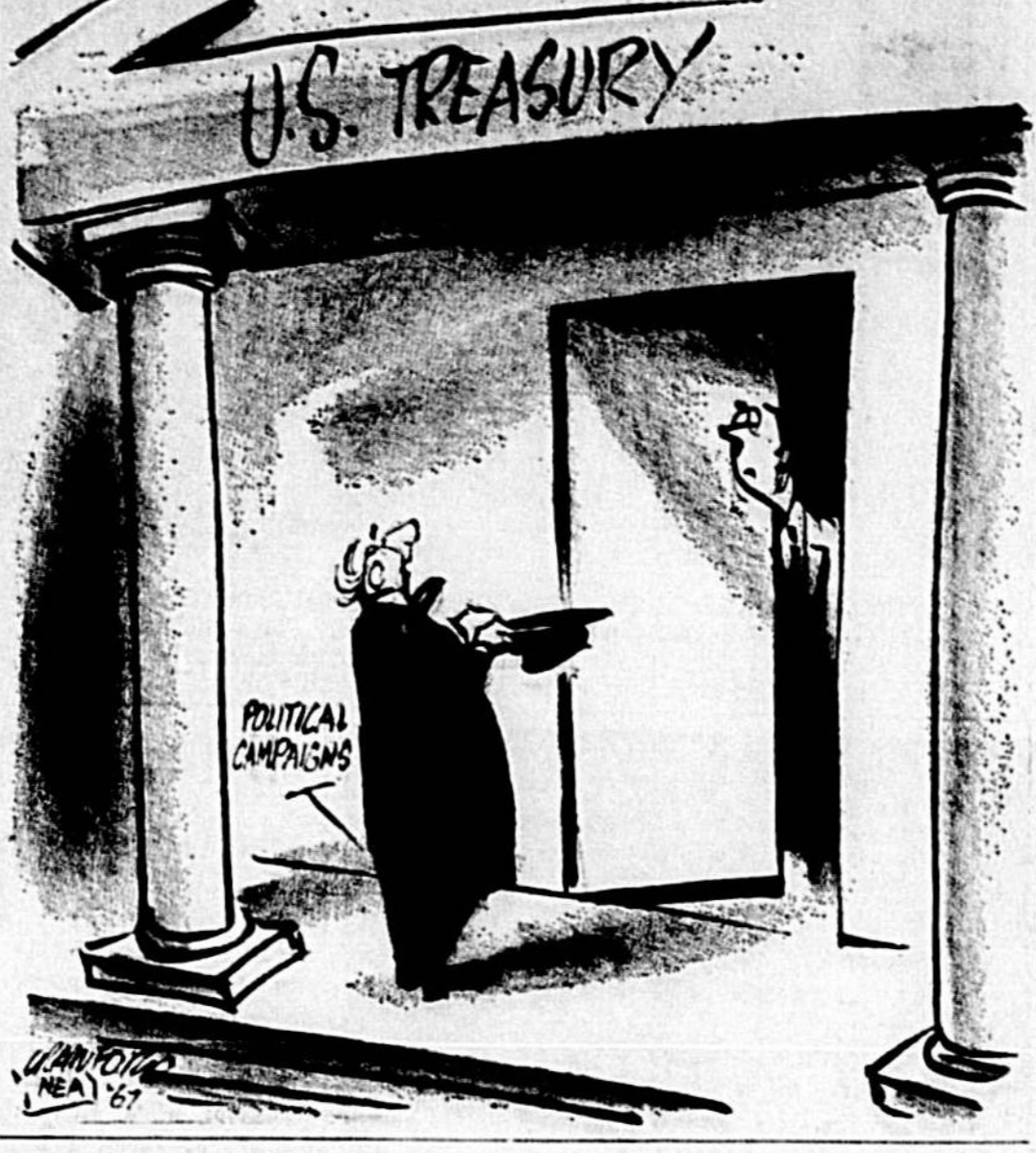

That is one reason why fat folks have so much trouble trying to slenderize.

In fact, it is really much harder to quit either the tobacco or liquor or dope habit!

For in those three unnatural acts, the victim can make a clean break.

He can stop entirely his use of tobacco.

But that is not healthful regarding food, for our body needs fresh protein every day to replenish the worn out muscle cells, especially those in the heart!

When quitting tobacco, try to substitute a similar muscular pattern that is less objectionable.

For we have found by experiment that it isn't the craving for nicotine but the desire to avoid one's arm around the waist of a smoking partner that bothers the addict.

The use of chewing gum is thus a partial answer when quitting cigarettes, for you consume energy while using the jaw muscles.

They don't drain off energy as fast as by waving your arm, but you can continue chewing much longer and thus equalize the total energy expended.

Other muscular outlets for relief of tension, consist of twirling your key ring or toying with a watch chain or tossing a pencil in the air, end over end, as you talk or watch television.

Another superb device is to keep rubber bands in your pocket and then hook the little finger in one end and the thumb in the other.

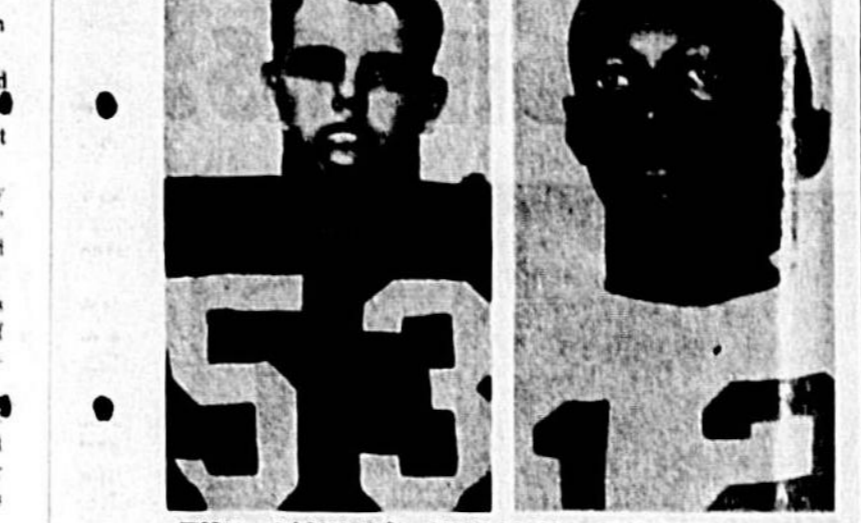

Selective Service

Q—I am an alien doctor, 22 years of age, who has been in this country for 3 years. My Selective Service classification was recently changed from V-A to I-A. Why was that action taken?

A—You were originally placed in Class V-A under the law then in effect because you were over 26 years of age when you registered with Selective Service, and because your liability had not been extended to age 25 by virtue of a previous deferment. The recently enacted Military Selective Service Act of 1967 provides that any person who is in a medical, dental, or allied specialist category, as in your case, shall be liable for registration, training and service until age 25. In view of this you were no longer eligible for Class V-A.

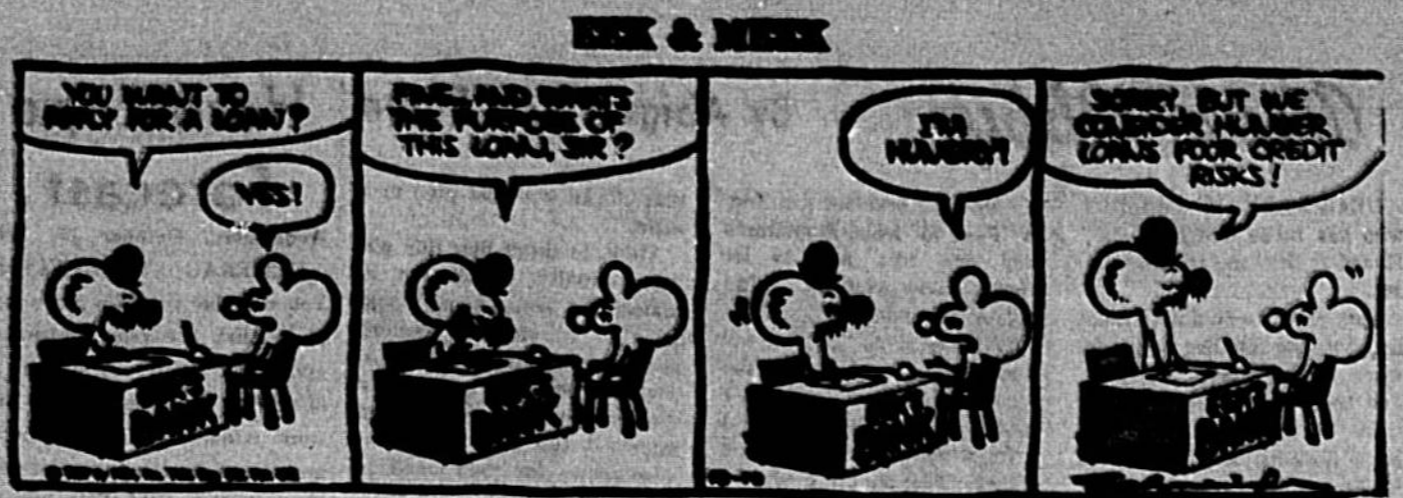
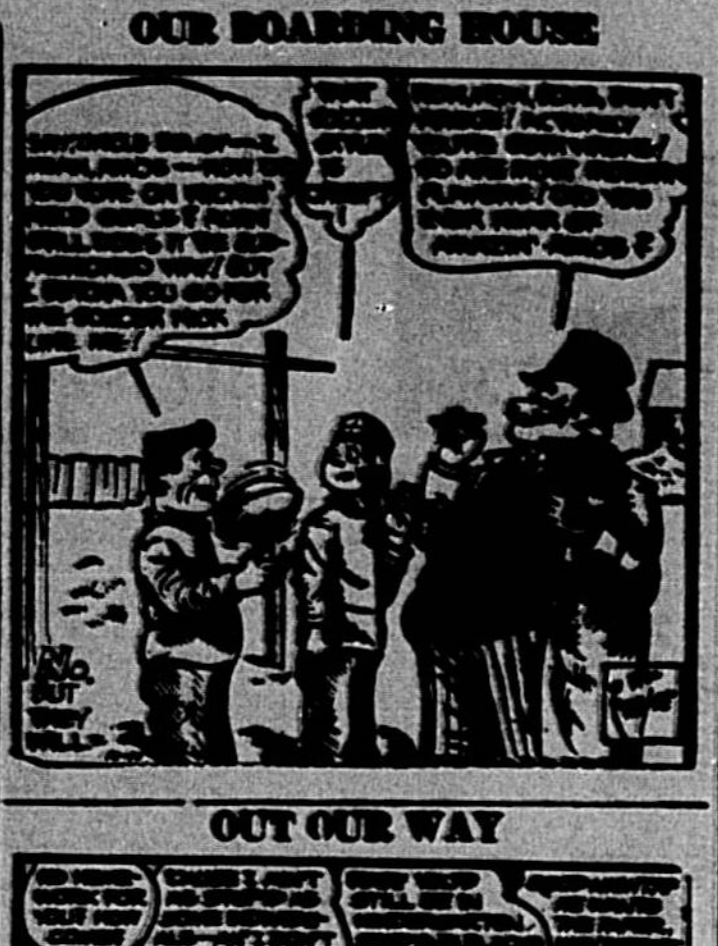

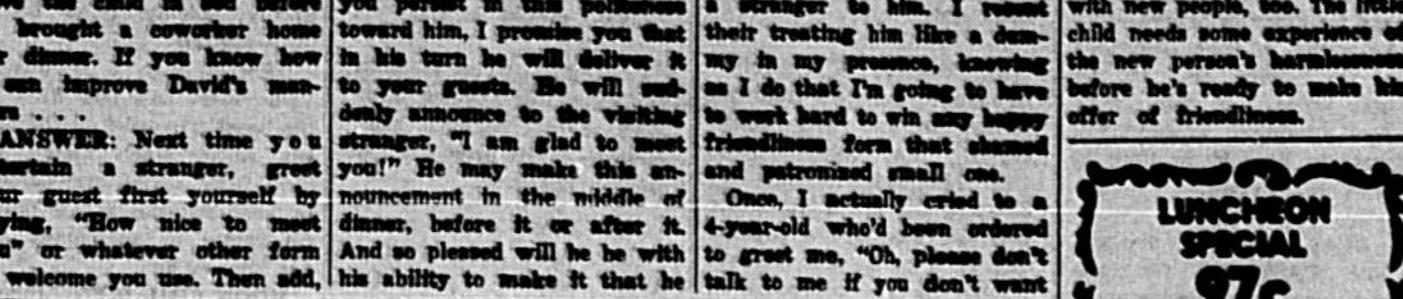
