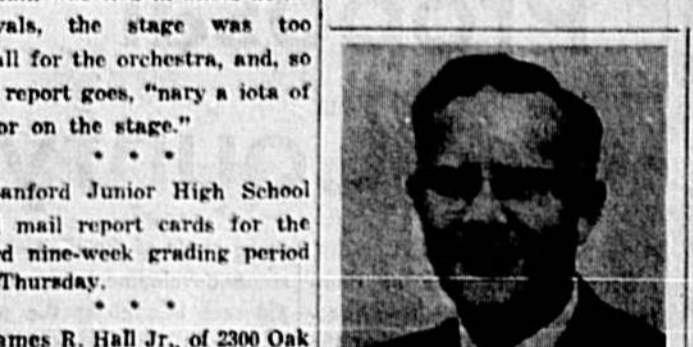

Signs are multiplying that Sanford-Seminole is the area where spring 1969 will be remembered for the start of a period of industrial growth which will establish an economic base of breadth, depth and substance.

Here and there come announcements from contractors who are ready to get in on the ground floor of this structure of prosperity and are staking out their claims.

Happy these foresighted executives are receiving assistance from many sources. Three of which we can name. One is the senior of the trio in age, the County Chamber of Commerce with its long list of county and city leaders who are chairmen of its active committees.

Another is the municipal operation of the Sanford Industrial Commission. Its life is limited to the past few years when it was created to handle the responsibilities and exploit the opportunities inherent in the transformation of the Navy's Air Base to civilian uses.

Most recent and already with a record of action is the Lake Monroe Industries, Inc. This group of men with courage and vision combined their various resources and formed a corporation to build a "shell" building and to have in being something visible to industrialists could see and investigate.

Thus there is the plastics complex on Grapeville Avenue with Seminole Plastics, Inc. in operation and Howe Industries, Inc., a manufacturer of plastic cases expected to be going within 60 days.

Of these firms, the Water Bonnet holds the greatest promise of employment. Its payroll is expected to reach 800 before the year's end. Others are comparatively small with as few as four and as many as 200 predicted.

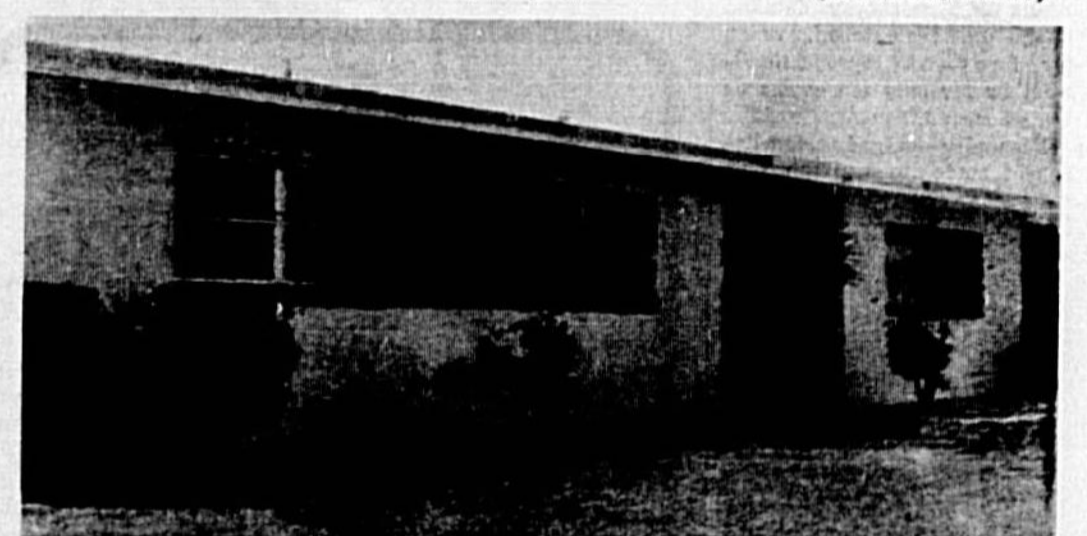

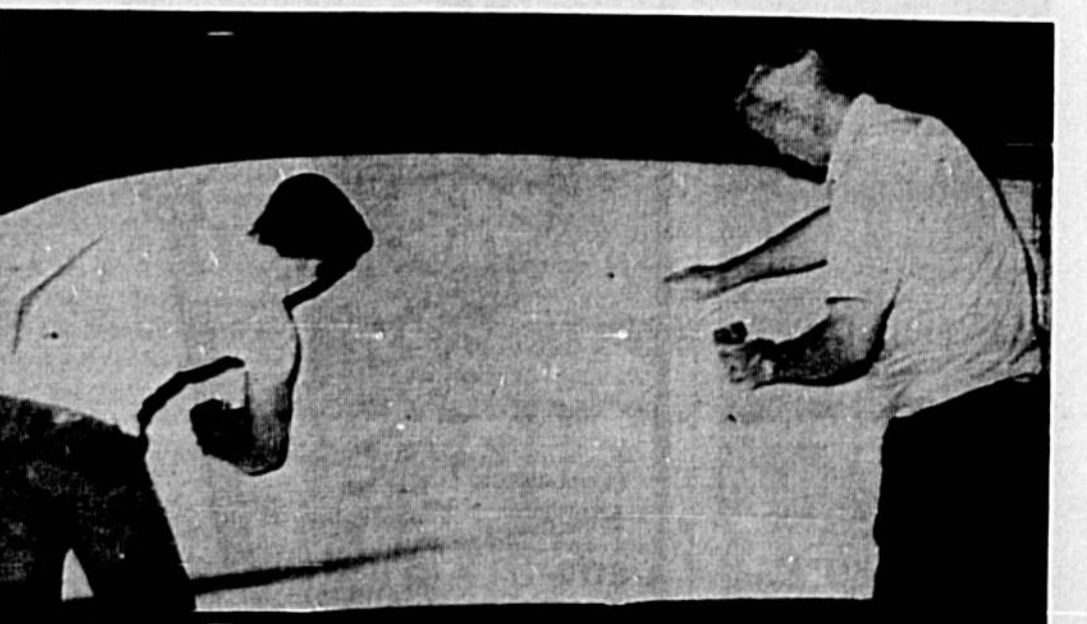

U.S., Peru Showdown Is Avoided

LIMA, Peru (AP) — The United States and Peru have avoided a showdown for the time being, but major problems remain for both governments because their dispute still hangs fire.

For Peru the problems are economic continued stagnation while hesitant foreign investors wait to see how the dispute is settled.

For the United States it is a matter of the perennial Latin American distrust of the big neighbor. While Washington has not applied economic sanctions, the threat remains, and Peru's resentment against the "Yanquis" likely will grow and harden.

A showdown over the exportation of the International Petroleum Co., a subsidiary of Standard Oil of New Jersey, was deferred Monday when Washington announced IPC would start proceedings in Peru against the Lima government's claim for \$60 million from the company.

A U.S. announcement said this procedure, together with current negotiations by special U.S. envoy John N. Irwin, constituted the "appropriate steps toward compensation" required by the Hickenlooper Amendment.

The economic sanctions thus were deferred pending the outcome of the IPC's appeal to Peru's Ministry of Energy and Mines. The ministry must rule on the case and leave time for a further appeal if necessary to President Juan Velasco on Aug. 6, six months from the day the huge IPC debt was alleged by Velasco.

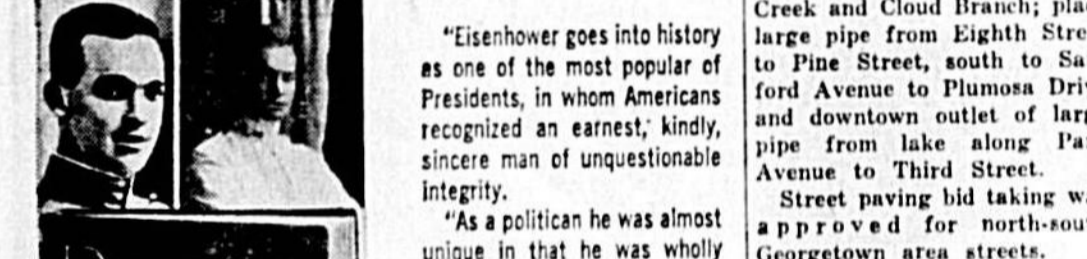

The terminations, announced Monday by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, are to become effective in 30 days.

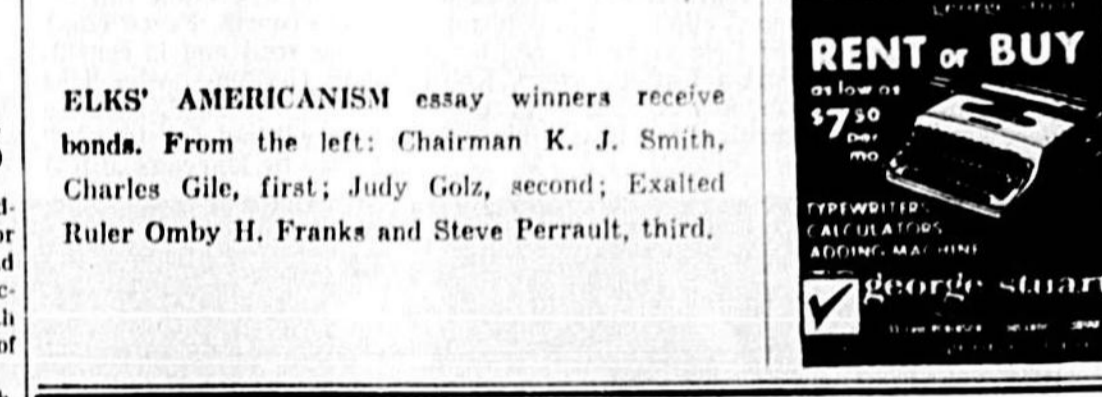

Company Faces Civil Rights Suit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department has filed its first suit charging a Southern textile firm with violating federal job discrimination regulations as several Nixon administration officials themselves were accused of failure to enforce the same rules.

Any Gen. John N. Mitchell filed the administration suit Tuesday against Cannon Mills Co., operator of 16 factories in North and South Carolina.

But as the Justice Department brought that action in Greensboro, N.C., the NAACP Legal Defense Fund filed charges against Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird, Secretary of Labor George P. Shultz and Deputy Secretary of Defense David R. Packard.

The NAACP suit in Washington charged that \$9.4 million in defense contracts were let to three Southern textile companies without first getting proper assurance that the firms would comply with laws requiring fair job treatment of Negroes.

The companies under attack are Dan River Mills Inc., J. P. Stevens & Co., and Burlington Industries.

Shultz was named in the NAACP suit because the Labor Department is responsible for enforcing that regulations applying to job discrimination are enforced.

Officials denied there is any inconsistency in the Justice Department's move against Cannon while the Pentagon is still doing business with Dan River, Stevens and Burlington.

The difference, a spokesman explained, is that Cannon has no major government contracts and cannot be regulated under an executive order issued in 1965 by former President Lyndon B. Johnson.

That order barred government contracts with firms that fail to comply with federal non-discrimination standards in employment practices.

In the NAACP's suit, the Pentagon was accused of acting illegally by awarding the contracts without first receiving a written assurance of equal job opportunity for the Negroes from the firms.

The Justice Department action against Cannon went beyond employment, however, and accused the company of discriminatory practices in rental of company-owned housing.

Cannon has 24,000 employees at its various plants and owns 2,000 single-family homes which are rented to some workers in the vicinity of its mills.

The suit contended Negro employees live in segregated, inferior housing, but still pay rentals "at least as high per unit" as whites are charged for much better homes.

In employment, the suit alleged, Cannon hires, assigns and promotes on a discriminatory basis and reserves some job classifications for whites alone.

In defending the awards to the other textile firms, the Defense Department said it let the contracts after receiving "assurances of affirmative action" toward full compliance with federal goals.

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Testimony Ends Trial Of Sirhan

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Is this it?" asked Sirhan, Bashar Sirhan, suddenly aware no one was going to the witness chair. "This is it," answered Russell E. Parsons, one of the lawyers trying to save the jockey-seated, unrepentant assassin of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy from the gas chamber.

With the words, "We rest"—announced matter-of-factly by both prosecution and defense—testimony had ended in Sirhan's murder trial Tuesday after 90 witnesses and three months in court.

Sirhan pronounced himself satisfied with his defense. David N. Fitts, a deputy district attorney, was to begin the state's closing argument today.

All he words of testimony were in the minute discussions about Sirhan's mind before the deed, during the deed, after the deed, and about the deed itself—the ambush slaying last June 5 of a presidential aspirant. The words filled 8,386 pages of transcript.

When the jury gets the case, possibly Friday or Monday, it need not debate whether the defendant assassinated the New York senator, Sirhan himself said on the stand that he killed Kennedy. "I'm not proud, but I'm not sorry either," he said.

But the jury must decide whether Sirhan's mental state was such that he could "meaningfully and maturely" premeditate his action—the essential element to first-degree murder. If the answer is affirmative, the jury then chooses between life in prison for the 25-year-old Jordanian Arab or death in a cyanide-filled chamber at San Quentin. Alternatively, the jury of seven men and five women could convict Sirhan of second-degree murder, which carries a sentence of five years to life, or manslaughter—one to 15 years.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The fast-moving Florida aligator has been besieged for years by droughts and poachers—has found a friend in U.S. Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill.

Not even Congress can do much about the weather, but Rostenkowski offered a bill Wednesday to make it rougher on the men who sneak into the swamps at night to slaughter the reptiles for their valuable skin.

Demands for alligator handbags, wallets, shoes and belts "have produced a lucrative opportunity for illicit operators who ignore the present laws to make a quick profit," Fasoelli said.

To protect the alligator from the increasing demand for its hide, Fasoelli's proposed legislation would prohibit the interstate shipment of alligators and other reptiles which have been taken contrary to state law.

Poachers reportedly get from \$5 to \$6.50 per running foot for the skins. Fines sometimes are in the range of \$50 to \$100, which a seasoned hunter can easily make in one illegal night's work.

Wildlife authorities in the United States are seriously concerned about the possible extinction of the alligator, a survivor from the Age of Reptiles 20 million years ago. The population has been slashed 95 per cent since the 1850s.

Originally alligators grew to a length of about 20 feet but today a 13-foot gator is a rarity.

Poachers prefer the reptiles when they are about five or six feet long, before their hides get too tough.

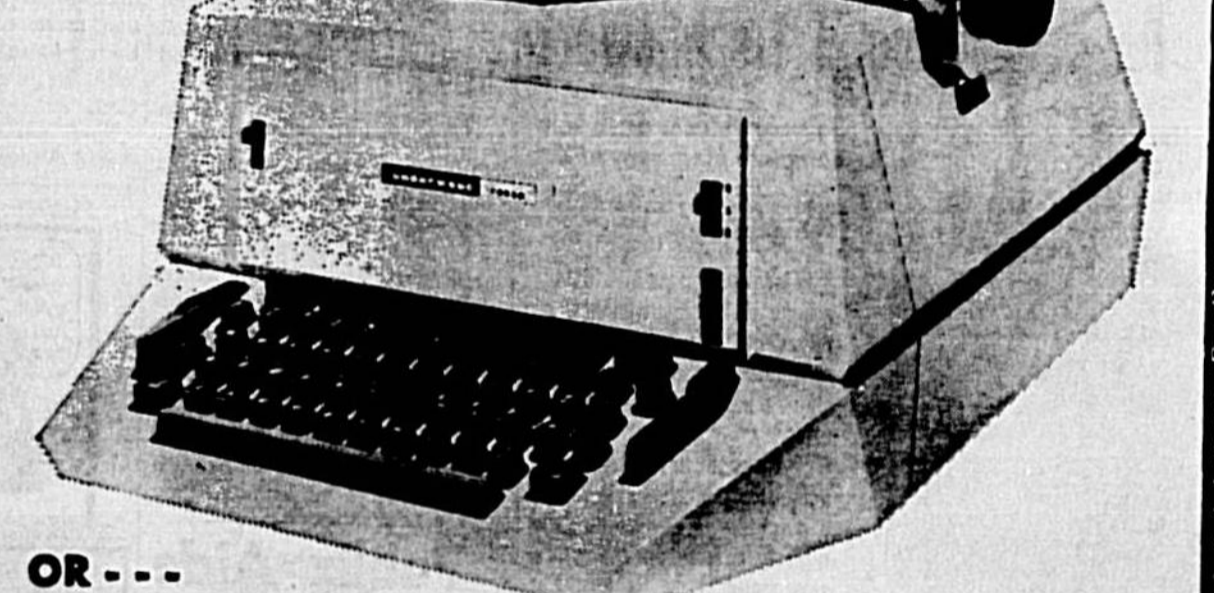

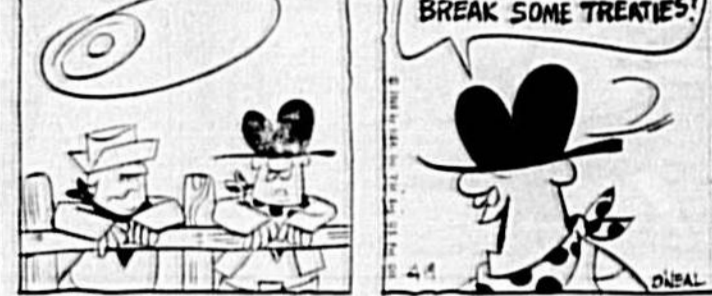

True Interest Rates Due

The insurance will retire it and not leave his heirs with a repayment problem.

If we asked you what rate of interest you paid when you last borrowed money from a bank, chances are you'd say, "6 per cent." You might even be right, too. If the last borrowing was for a house mortgage, you'd probably be right.

But for many of you, the "6 per cent" answer would be more of a reflex action than a considered opinion. Folklore has it that 6 per cent is some kind of a standard rate, adhered to by everybody but unscrupulous to change as the rules of baseball.

We're not sure what may be in store for baseball, but as of July 1, 1969, the folklore of interest rates is going to take quite a punching around, his is the day the "truth in lending" law takes effect.

This is also the day that the man who has been coagulating "86 per cent" on money lent is going to have to begin clearing 11.25 per cent annual interest instead.

Why will the price of money double at midnight June 30? It won't. It just seems that way. Actually, \$6 per \$100 and "11.25 per cent" are the same rate expressed in different terms.

Congress thinks the simple annual rate is the proper way to express interest charges and has passed the law that requires it. And lenders are going to have to explain to all their customers that rates haven't changed, only the method of expressing them.

Even this might not be too bad if that were all there was to it, but there's a long list of other items that lenders are going to have to pin-point for each borrower.

Credit life insurance, for example. This is simple term insurance taken on the life of the borrower. If he should die before the loan is paid off,

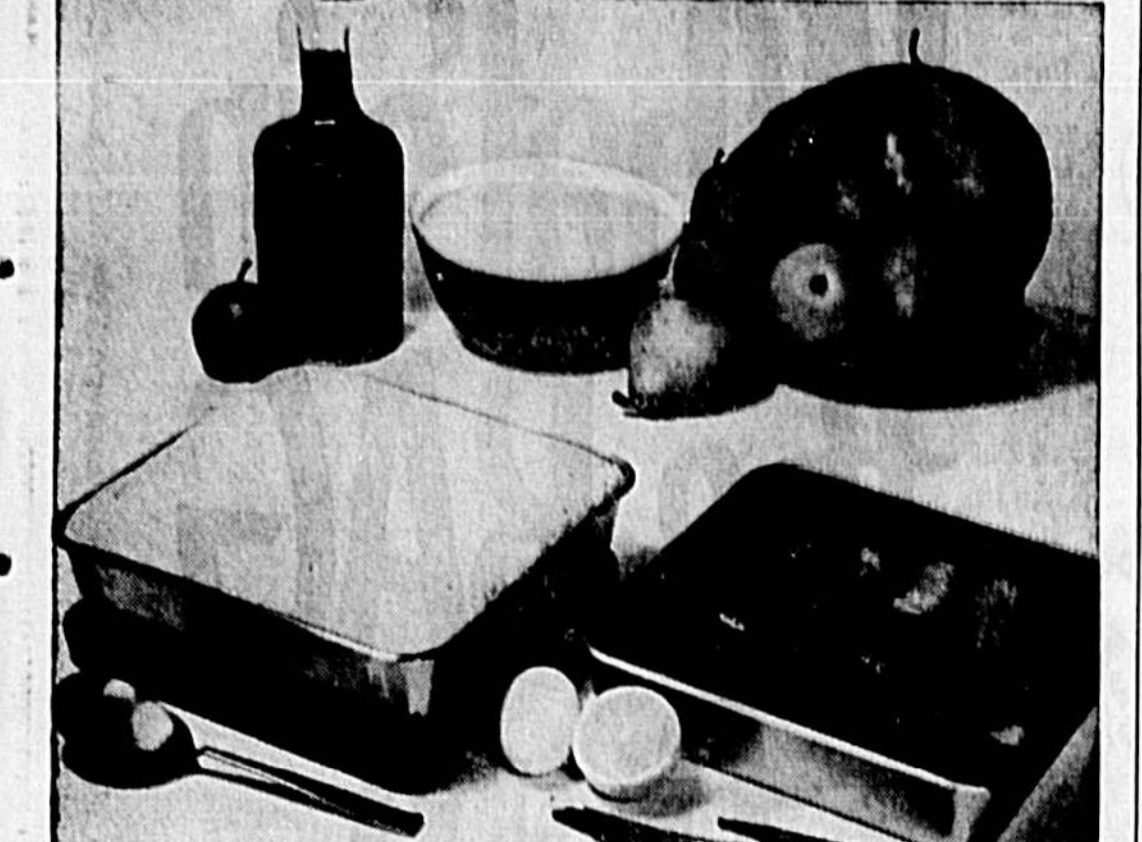

Gourmets Go For Birnenauflauf

Do you count any epicures among your friends? Call it a Birnenauflauf—we call it German Pear Pudding—it's a dessert cooked in red wine and covered with a delicate cake-like topping. Offer it with whipped cream or foamy sauce.

A German home economist and fine cook brought this recipe with her recently when she came visiting in New York, so it couldn't be more authentic. Tested in our own kitchen, we decided it was a delightfully sophisticated dessert that gourmet-type cooks in this country would appreciate.

GERMAN PEAR PUDDING (Birnenauflauf)

1/4 cup sifted flour
1/4 cup cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 cup dry red wine
1/4 cup sugar
Thin yellow rind cut from 1/2 lemon
1 cinnamon stick
2 whole cloves
4 medium or large fresh pears, pared, cored and quartered
3 large eggs, separated
3 tablespoons water
1 teaspoon vanilla
Whipped cream or foamy sauce

On wax paper sift together the flour, cornstarch and baking powder; return to sifter and set aside.

In a medium saucepan stir together the wine, 1/4 cup of the sugar, lemon rind, cinnamon and cloves; add pears. Bring to a boil; cover and simmer until tender—10 to 15 minutes; remove cinnamon stick, cloves and lemon rind and discard. In the bottom of a square cake pan

(9 by 9 by 2 inches) arrange the pears; add 1/2 cup of the cooking liquid; if there is less than one cup juice, add enough wine to make 1 cup.

In a medium mixing bowl, beat together egg whites and water until whites hold peaks that tilt over slightly when beater is slowly withdrawn. Gradually bring in remaining 1/2 cup sugar, then vanilla, until whites hold stiff straight peaks when beater is slowly withdrawn. Beat in egg yolks, one at a time, just until blended after each addition; if electric mixer is used, set it for medium speed.

Gradually sift flour mixture over egg mixture, gently folding in each addition; spread evenly over pears.

Place in a preheated 375-degree oven until topping springs back when lightly touched with finger—30 to 35 minutes. Serve warm or cold topped with whipped cream or foamy sauce. Makes 9 servings.

FILBERT JELLY COOKIES

1/4 pound (1 stick) butter
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup grated filberts. Use hand-operated rotary-cone device or electric blender.
1 cup unflavored flour, stir to aerate before measuring.
1/2 cup currant jelly.
Cream butter and sugar; mix in filberts. With a spoon or your hands, gradually work in flour until combined. Chill if necessary.

On a prepared pastry cloth, with a stockinet-covered prepared rolling pin, roll out half the dough to a nine-inch round—it will be about 1/4-inch thick. Cut out with a two-inch round cookie cutter. Roll and cut out remaining half of the dough the same way.

Place fairly close together on a buttered cookie sheet. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven until light brown—about 15 minutes. With a wide spatula, remove to wire racks to cool. On the day you plan to serve the cookies, put them together in pairs with about one teaspoon currant jelly between each pair. Do this then because jelly will soften stored cookies. Makes about two dozen cookie sandwiches.

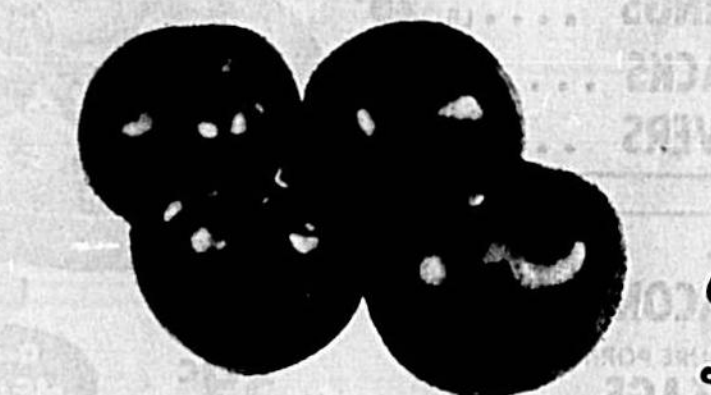

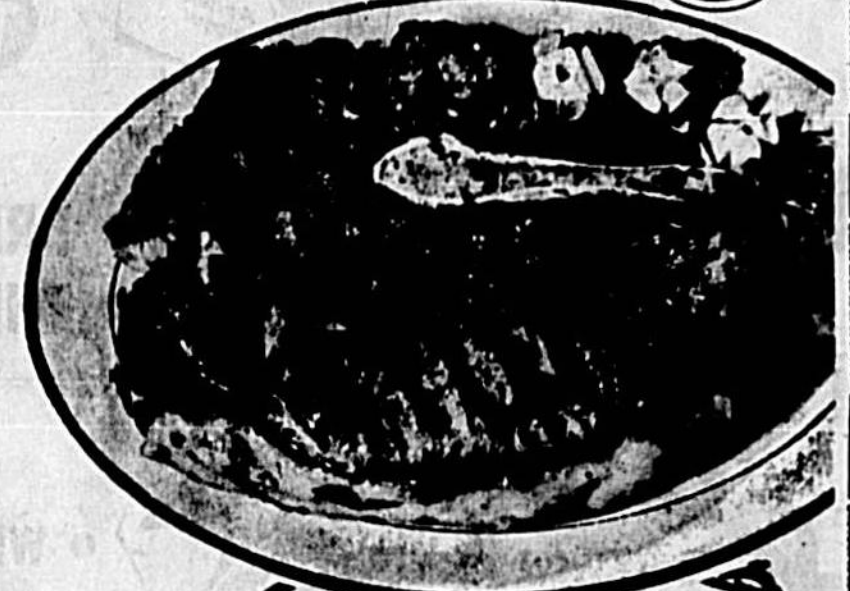

Potatoes Lila Hard To Beat

Lots of butter and a long stay in the oven before serving give these potatoes a taste that's hard to beat.
Braised Beef with Onions and Mustards

BAKED STUFFED POTATOES - LILA
6 medium mealy-type baking potatoes (about 2 pounds)
1/4 pound (1 stick) butter, at room temperature
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon white pepper
Paprika
Scrub potatoes in cold water; dry. Boil in a 425-degree oven until centers are soft when tried with a fork—about 30 minutes. Cut a thin longitudinal slice from top of each potato; scoop out pulp and force through a ricer into a medium mixing bowl. Thoroughly mix in butter, milk, salt and pepper. Pile back into shells. Draw fork lines lengthwise over each to ruff. Cover and let stand at room temperature until ready to heat, then sprinkle tops with paprika and bake in a 425-degree oven until extremely hot through and tops are brown and crusty—about 40 minutes.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Breathes there the man, with soul so dead,
Who never to his wife hath said:
"I've got a terrific idea for an invention."
A surprising number of inventions come from sudden, random flashes of inspiration, rather than from the steady, organized search for something better. However, to qualify for patent protection, the invention must include a special element of creativity. It must be "new," as that word is understood in the law of patents.
Suppose, for instance, that you think of a way to combine two products into a single unit for greater convenience. Generally speaking, that would not be considered new—not creative enough to deserve a patent.
One famous case involved the man who first attached a rubber eraser to the end of a lead pencil. Although this was certainly a convenience, the United States Supreme Court decided it was not new—because neither the pencil nor the eraser, when put together, did anything better than they did apart.
By contrast, said the Court, Charles Goodyear did create something new when he combined sulphur with india-rubber. This combination yielded a kind of rubber which for the first time, could be vulcanized and thereby put to commercial use.
What if your idea is to improve some product by making it out of a better material? If all you add is merely durability, that won't do. Thus, a toy-maker who switched from wood to metal, without otherwise changing his toys, was held not entitled to patent protection.
But it is another story if the new material works in a new and different way. Making a garter button out of rubber, instead of metal, was held a patentable invention. The court said this was a truly creative change, because the rubber meant less tearing and better gripping of the hose.

True, the Patent Office has made the statement that all of the important inventions have already been made. But that statement should not be too discouraging. It was made in the year 1880.

1/4 pound (15 sticks) butter, at room temperature
1/2 cup sugar
1 large egg
1 envelope no-melt chocolate
1 cup unsifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup finely chopped pecans
Butter bottoms of two square cake pans (each 8 by 8 by 2 inches) in a small mixing bowl cream butter and sugar; thoroughly beat in egg; then incorporate Add flour and salt; beat gently to blend. Spread evenly and thinly in prepared pans; sprinkle with pecans.
Bake in a preheated 400-degree oven until firm—about 12 minutes. Place pans on wire racks. In a minute or two (before cookies crisp), cut into two-inch squares; cool completely. Remove with a small spatula; store in tightly covered tin container. Makes two and a half dozen.

Marinated Roast Pork Real Treat

Here is a new version of one of our favorite roast pork recipes.

Marinated Roast Pork
Oven Potatoes
Sliced Bread

MARINATED ROAST PORK
4 pound boneless pork loin
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 teaspoons Oregon
3 medium cloves garlic, crushed
1/4 cup lemon juice
If you buy the pork at a supermarket, it will be rolled and tied; remove string and open flat. With kitchen scissors or sharp knife, cut away any large pieces of fat from inner side of pork. Place pork, fat on a small platter or similar vessel. Mix remaining ingredients. Spoon over pork, letting them run down. Cover tightly and refrigerate 48 hours. Roll and tie the pork. Place on a rack in a shallow roasting pan; spoon any marinade over meat. Roast in a 325-degree oven until meat thermometer registers 170 degrees—about 40 minutes per pound.

SUNDAY SUPPER
The ingredients are standard, but the cooking method is new.

4 large eggs
1/4 teaspoon salt
1-1/2 teaspoon white pepper
3 tablespoons butter
2 medium onions, peeled and cut into thin strips (1 1/2 cups)
1/4 small green pepper, seeded and cut into thin strips (about 1/2 cup)
1/4 cup diced cooked ham
Chili sauce
In a medium mixing bowl beat together the eggs, salt and pepper; just until yolks and whites are combined. In a 12-inch skillet melt two tablespoons butter. Add onion, green pepper and ham. Cook gently until vegetables are wilted. Add to egg mixture scraping out pan with a rubber spatula. In the clean skillet, over moderately low heat, heat the remaining tablespoon butter. Add egg mixture, spreading solids evenly. Cover tightly and cook until bottom is browned and top is set—about 15 minutes. Cut in wedges and remove with a wide spatula. Serve with chili sauce. Makes four average servings.
