Youngsters To Play 6 Games Each Week On School Grounds

Play Ball! The kids get the jump on their elders. Organized baseball will get under way in Sanford next Monday, Apr. 6, with the youngsters at bat—two weeks before the opening game of the Florida State League which includes the team of the Sanford Baseball Association.

It is going to be organized baseball that the youngsters will play, organized by the Sanford Lions Club (the 11th season), and they'll play according to standard rules. There is only one exception: there will be no charge for the games from the standard rule. There the public can see them, free gratis, for nothing. They'll play every afternoon during the summer with the exception of Saturday and Sunday afternoons. At the close of the season they'll have their own "world series."

There are six teams in the Sanford Junior Baseball League, and the Sanford Lions club is furnishing all the equipment for all the teams—balls, bats, mitts, etc. Managers have been chosen. Three of the managers started will select their own captains, their baseball careers as members of the Junior Baseball League. They are O. P. Herndon Jr., Billy Zachry and St. Clair Cameron.

'Orange Belt League' Of Double A Teams Talked With Group

Exhibition games between teams of professional, baseball players practically every alternate afternoon during the spring training season next year is proposed for Sanford by George M. Trautman, president of the American Association with headquarters in Minneapolis.

Trautman proposes the formation of the Orange Belt League to be composed of Double A circuits—the American Association and the International League—with games between teams in the opposing league. Seven of the eight clubs in the American Association now have their training quarters in Florida, and six of the eight International League clubs in this state. It is Trautman's hope to get all the clubs to train in Florida, and by inter-club games throughout the season develop better players than would otherwise be the case.

If his plan goes through, Sanford will be headquarters of the American Association, with all teams in that league training here and in nearby towns. The International League would train in South Florida towns.

Trautman explained his plan to the Sanford baseball committee at a conference held in the Mayfair Hotel yesterday afternoon, and later visited the Municipal Baseball Park which he stated is in "excellent condition." The only suggestion he had to make for improving the baseball park was to give the grandstand "a couple of coats of paint."

The conference, which was called at Trautman's request, was attended by representatives of every club association with the exception of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. That organization's committeeman was unable to be present.

No action was taken at the conference, as the president of the American Association said he must first interview managers of the various clubs and get their reaction to his proposal. He said he expects every club before May 15. He asked for the conference here before he took further steps toward the formation of the proposed Orange Belt League. Trautman told the committeemen in order to acquaint local fans with the idea and ascertain if they would welcome such a league.

The eight teams in the American Association are the Minneapolis, St. Paul, Milwaukee, Kansas City, Indianapolis, Toledo, Columbus and Louisville. The International League teams are the Montreal, Toronto, Baltimore, Syracuse, Albany, Buffalo, Rochester and Newark.

Penn Insurance Wants To Locate Alice A. Barnes

\$200 Policy Will Be Paid To Her Or To Her Heirs If Found

If Alice A. Barnes, one-time resident of Sanford, is still living, she can collect \$200 from the Penn Mutual Life Insurance Company, of Philadelphia if she is deceased, the same amount will be paid by the company to her executors or estate. In an effort to locate her, the company has asked the assistance of The Herald.

"We have on our books," the company says, "a number of instances in which endowment policyholders or their beneficiaries, although the policyholders did not pay the stipulated number of premiums, are nevertheless entitled to cash payments. We believe that in most instances they have either forgotten the policy or have died without leaving a record of them. Our efforts to locate these persons for whom we are holding various sums of money have so far been without success."

Everard Barnes, whose last address, according to the company's records, was Sanford, many years ago he purchased an endowment policy payable to Alice A. Barnes, his wife, but failed to continue the payment of premiums. Thereupon, assuming him to be still alive, the company applied the cash value as provided in the policy to June 10, 1913, when the same amount automatically became due and payable to Alice A. Barnes.

(Continued from page 1) lauded Townsend, it is indicated in incomplete and unofficial returns received by the state agricultural extension service.

Figures from 24 counties show a favorable vote of almost five to one. It is announced. More than 3000 votes, most of them said to be for the agreement, cast by growers and associations, and forwarded direct to Washington are not included in extension service reports.

County committees are canvassing the votes today, and final returns of individual grower ballots will be canvassed by a state committee Friday.

Mrs. Barnes died in Savannah last November, Mr. Woodruff said. Her husband, the late E. F. Barnes, was mayor of Sanford in the early days. The Barnes family left Sanford about 25 years ago, according to Mr. Woodruff.

Rankin of West Palm Beach, a former law partner; with personally profiting from these fees; with practicing law after going on the federal bench and with evading income taxes. Ritter's trial before the Senate opens Monday.

It arrived at the foreign office shortly before Anthony Eden, foreign secretary, told the House of Commons that Great Britain, France and Belgium were ready to fight as allies if attacked by Germany, but that the British government was anxious to discuss permanent peace proposals.

THE GIFT OF PEACE.—Peace

In spite of the fact that the croak state canal has been disapproved by the Senate, the signing goes on and on.

But if living at the expense of others will be in the poor, why doesn't it ruin the rich?—Robert Quillen in Ashby's Citizen-Observer.

Two years ago Dr. Townsend wrote that there might be millions in his pension scheme. And he didn't mean millions of old folks either.

If our local candidate should be eliminated from the congressional race in the first primary, a lot of Seminole County folks are planning to ride that Steed from Kissimmee in the runoff.

Harry Papworth attended the meeting in Lakeland today with J. Hardin Peterson to help get federal funds for fruit fly re-impairments. Still working for Sanford and Seminole County.

Judge Ritter is now accused of having evaded his income tax. And judging from some of the other charges, it would appear that he had quite an income to evade taxes on.

Mattie Martin, one of the army of candidates for governor, is making his race on a promise to give motorists \$1 license tags, showing that Mattie is an amateur in politics. If he had any political acumen at all he wouldn't charge anything for an automobile license.

Those having claims against the government on account of the fruit fly invasion are asked to attend a meeting with Representative Peterson in Lakeland. Now that they are going to save about 150 million dollars on the cross-state canal, maybe they will be able to reimburse the farmers for their losses.

And on Wednesday only three days after the Southland's accident in Georgia, a Packard sedan crashed into a passenger train near Tampa, instantly killing a man and two women. The automobile approached the crossing at about 50 miles an hour, the train at 60. The driver did not see the train and the engineer thinking he did, thought he would stop. They met at the crossing and there more lives were added to this year's highway fatalities.

If you want to see why England is so perturbed over Mussolini's recent successes in Ethiopia, refer to your map of that country and look at the Lake Tana region. Now where Gondar is and see how it controls the approach to Lake Tana, which feeds the rich Egyptian delta. Gondar is the strategic city which fell in the victorious fascist legions the other day after a furious fighting with the Conquering Lion's own troops.

Col. Luke Lea, the man who would have brought the German Kaiser back to this country, as his own particular prize of war if his attempted seizure had succeeded, has been released from prison after serving two years of a six to ten year sentence for violating the banking laws. With all the considerations for the country's military achievements as well as for his statesmanship while working in the United States Senate, still it does seem to us that one of his pro-emergence who is convicted of embezzlement should receive the same punishment as that accorded any ordinary citizen who is punished solely because he was supposed to be an outstanding citizen.

Overlooking A Goot Bet

There are sixteen candidates for governor; some say eighteen. Most of them are running on perfectly orthodox platforms which excite little emotion. Most of them are in favor of tax reduction and old age pensions, the abolishment of unnecessary bureaus and commissions and the creation of additional services for the public, of nine months' school terms and no new sources of revenue. One or two at least are advocating the Townsend Plan.

But so far as we know not a single gubernatorial candidate has propounded any original panacea for the nation's economic ills or advanced a plan for restoring prosperity in the State of Florida to the 1925 level. None of them has promised to put everybody on the state payroll at \$5,000 a year, or take over all the wealth in the state and divide it equally among all the hundreds of thousands of voters, banish poverty, or make every man a king, and every woman young and beautiful.

Great shades of Huey Long and Upton Sinclair! Do our gubernatorial candidates think the people of Florida are too stupidly practical and realistic to believe in Santa Claus and Alice in Wonderland? Or, are Carter, Hodges, Chappell, Paty, Petteway, Caldwell and the rest too unimaginative themselves to conceive of any sound workable scheme for making everybody rich with no more effort than pulling white rabbits out of a hat?

Now, we have a plan which we have been working on for some time. We will guarantee that it will furnish every voter in the state all the Castles in Spain that are good for him. It is sure-fire, sound, and workable, will loosen up frozen credit and put plenty of money into circulation. And it won't cost anybody a cent. We have it patented and all rights are reserved, but we will offer it gratis to the first gubernatorial candidate who promises to make us chairman of the State Road Department.

Briefly, we would have the state organize a corporation, something like the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, only it would be purely a state organization solely for the purpose of selling life insurance. We might call it the FIC, the Florida Insurance Corporation. This corporation would be empowered to sell life insurance policies to anyone who makes application for them in amounts up to ten thousand dollars for each policy.

At the same time, we would have the Legislature (and the two-job idea is not such a bad one if you want to control the Legislature) pass a law requiring all the banks in the state to extend credit on these insurance policies up to the full amount of their face value. In other words, a man could go to the FIC, take out a life insurance policy by paying the premium of, say, \$100 or \$200 (we haven't worked out all the details yet) and then take the policy down to the bank and borrow \$10,000 on it. When he died his life insurance would pay up the loan so that the bank would not lose anything.

Now there is an idea which one of these gubernatorial candidates might capitalize upon and absolutely guarantee his election to the highest office in the state. The people are not interested in tax reduction any more, or the old political hokum about fresh air and sunshine. They want something tangible and they want action. This plan of ours would give them what they want, economic security, plenty of money in circulation, expanding incomes, and what is infinitely more important, something to dream about.

Justice — 1936 Model

You have seen a cat playing with a mouse. You have seen her paw him playfully, turning him over, mashing him a bit until he squeals, then suddenly letting him up. The mouse scampers off in search of the nearest hole in which to escape. But the cat pounces upon him again, grabbing him in her mouth and shaking him wildly to and fro. This goes on and on until at last the mouse is dead. That is what the State of New Jersey has been doing to Bruno Hauptmann. For some months he has been walking in his death cell across the hall from the little dark room in which is housed the electric chair. He has seen others walk down the hall into that room never to emerge again. He has seen the lights grow dimmer as the current is turned on. And he has thrown himself down on his own cot in mental anguish as he anticipated his own fate.

He has had his chance to eat his last meal before going to his execution, but he did not feel like eating. He went to bed the night before thinking it was his last night on earth. He slept fitfully to awake repeatedly during the night and contemplate the fate which awaited him on the morrow. How many times during that night and the day that followed did he experience death itself? How many times has he already died for his crime?

At the last minute he was given another 48 hour lease on life. Again he was to have to spend his last night on earth. Again he was to be asked what he wanted to eat for his last meal in this world. Again he was to wonder whether he would again be snatched from death as he was about to sit in the electric chair. But wondering, he must know that sooner or later his last hour will arrive and there will be no reprieve, no further delay in his execution.

The manner in which the State of New Jersey is toying with the life of its most notorious criminal is a fitting climax to a most sordid story of crime, trial, and conviction. The whole case has provided revolting proof of the utter depravity of our present civilization. It could hardly be worse if Hauptmann finally met his death by feeding him to crocodiles, or turning him loose to prey again upon a defenseless public.

Christian Science: The Science Of Reality

I think that we shall all agree that the utmost goal of all education, study, and research is to acquire the ability and discriminate between the real and the unreal, or that which is true and that which is untrue; in other words, to become conscious of reality.

Wary with fruitless search for the truth concerning human existence, confused and troubled, mortals have felt as did Pope, who wrote of mortal man: "Chaos of thought and passion, all confused; Great lord of all things, yet a prey to all; Sole judge of truth, in endless error hurled." The gory, fest, and riddle of the world.

The Bible sums up this condition by declaring that "the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God."

In addition to wondering what it is all about, a tendency of mortals is to be afraid—afraid about many things: the weather, their food, their clothes, their business, their children, and their health. Then it occasionally they have a few minutes of peace they are apt to wonder what is wrong with them and immediately proceed to find something about which to worry.

After a few years of wonder, worry, and disappointment, mortals try to console themselves with the belief that they may receive happiness and reward in a post-mortem experience. But, when the time for this expected happiness and joy is apparently drawing nigh, every endeavor is made to postpone this experience.

To this miserable and apparently hopeless situation came the glad tidings of Christian Science to those who are listening for Truth, giving them the ability to solve these perplexing problems and assuring them that they may attain, here and now, the spiritual understanding which will enable them to declare with rejoicing that it is a pleasure and a privilege to live.

As Christ Jesus is the founder and great expositor of Christianity, and since his religion is the true foundation of Christian Science, it will be helpful to consider the nature of his teaching and practice. Concerning that which is real in this connection Mrs. Eddy writes (Science and Health, p. 269) "The testimony of the material senses is neither absolute nor divine. I therefore plant myself unreservedly on the teachings of Jesus, of his apostles, of the prophets, and on the testimony of the Science of Mind." The mission of Christ Jesus is set forth in his own words: "To this end was I born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth." It remained for Mrs. Eddy to interpret the spiritual meaning of this text and to show mortals how to apply this truth in the destruction of sin, disease, and death. This, indeed is the mission of the Christian Science textbook, to set forth and explain the words and works of the Master. It does not attempt to teach a new religious doctrine nor to improve and change in any way the teachings of Christ Jesus. It is a spiritual searchlight on the Scriptures, making plain the spiritual import of the Master's teachings and stressing the point that his way is the only way.

With clear and convincing logic Mrs. Eddy points out that the seeming cause of all sickness is fear, ignorance, or sin, and then she offers humanity her demonstrable remedy, Christian Science. This Science teaches mortals how to overcome fear, ignorance, and sin through an understanding of infinite Love, intelligence, and law.

It is important to note that the healing which occurs under Christian Science treatment is entirely different in nature and quality from that of any other kind; it does not employ hypnotism, suggestion, or the human will in any way. These agencies are directly opposed to the practice of Christian Science, and Christian Science from the patient from their pernicious influence. It is also important to know that while hypnotism and suggestion claim to heal phys-

ically, regardless of the moral status of the patient, the Christian Science practitioner cannot heal his patient without improving him spiritually and morally. Moreover, it imparts to the patient the ability to preserve his own sense of harmony through spiritual thinking and living.

Matter In the year 1868, Mrs. Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, declared for the allness of God and the nonexistence of matter. By a world consciousness steeped in materiality this great discovery was not understood and hence became a target for ridicule and misrepresentation. Mrs. Eddy, reasoning from the Scriptural premise of the allness of God, infinite Spirit, was forced to the conclusion that infinite Spirit must necessarily express itself in a spiritual universe and that it must all be spiritual in its nature, not part Spirit and part matter. When Mrs. Eddy declared that all is the expression of infinite Mind, God, she is not denying the existence of the universe but declaring that it is wholly spiritual and not a mixture of Spirit and matter. She sums up the entire situation by declaring that "what the human mind terms matter and spirit indicates states and stages of consciousness" (Science and Health, p. 573).

It is interesting to know that after a half century of ridicule the leading material scientists, in substance, agreeing with Mrs. Eddy's original announcement concerning the nonexistence of matter. The modern physicists are teaching that what is termed matter is, in the last analysis, an expression of energy. As there is no action apart from Mind this is equivalent to declaring that matter is mental in its cause and nature; or, as the philosophers say, made of mind-stuff and this is exactly what Mrs. Eddy said in 1868. In other words, Mrs. Eddy led the world's foremost thinkers and scientists by approximately half a century.

The importance of realizing that what is called material is really mental resides in the fact that when this is understood it shows the possibility of harmonious control through spiritual thinking and of understanding what Paul meant when he said "For to be carnally minded is death, to be spiritually minded is life and peace." When we realize that what we call our physical body is mental, wholly governed and controlled by thinking, we can readily understand that whether it is to be harmonious or discordant will be determined by the nature of the thoughts we entertain.

The Practicability Of The Bible We owe everlasting gratitude to Christian Science for many things, and among them is the fact that Mrs. Eddy has given us a method whereby each one of us can prove

It has been generally conceded that if the teachings of Christ Jesus were practicable, the affairs of earth would be very much improved. Whenever this question arises the materialists and so-called hard-headed, common-sense individuals demand a statement that while these teachings are beautiful and idealistic, they are entirely impractical, and that the world must look to other sources for the remedy for world ills. Concerning this, Mrs. Eddy writes on page 9 of her work entitled "Unity of God": "The present and genius of the centuries have wrongly reckoned; they have not based upon revelation their arguments and conclusions as to the sources and resources of being,—its combinations,—phenomena, and outcome,—but have built instead upon the basis of human reason. They have not accepted the simple teaching and life of Jesus as the only true solution of the perplexing problem of human existence."

Divine Guidance A spiritual understanding of the Bible is a very practical guide and mentor in our everyday affairs, bringing us life, peace, and joy. All the activities of life are mental and since this is true it follows that, as our own lives are attuned to the divine Mind, all our actions become more and more harmonious and intelligent, and this of course means the progressive elimination of ignorance, misbelief, and mistakes.

This understanding is the only thing in the world which will prove and enable one to do the thing which thinkers and philosophers are agreed upon as one of the greatest of human achievements,—that is, to live one day at a time. "It shall be given you in that same hour," understood through spiritual thinking and living, will enable one to do wholeheartedly and efficiently the duties of today, and thus calmly face the future with the assurance of practice aid from God, infinite Mind. This condition is well portrayed by Isaiah, who writes "Thou shalt show a word behind thee, saying, This is the way, walk ye in it."
