

# Vandals Desecrate Catholic Church

## Priest Promises Full Prosecution

Catholic Church of the Nativity, located on SR 427 near Lake Mary, was the site chosen by vandals for an escapee some time during the night-time hours last night. It was the second breaking and entering in little more than 24 hours at the church and the seventh in 15 months.

No estimates are available as yet of value of items stolen or of damage done. A huge mop up operation will be necessary to get the church back in shape for services again.

Pizza sauce and freshly baked pizza, prepared by the vandals, were splashed over the walls in the social hall and the church sanctuary.

Items of religious value only and not payable were ripped from the altar and baptismal font. The crucifix from the crucifix used in religious ceremony and the cross from the baptismal font were broken off and taken from the church property.

The Tabernacle (small safe) that houses the Hosts used in the mass and altar vessels which weigh several hundred pounds was moved from its stand to the altar. Key for the Tabernacle was stolen. Pulpit flag was taken from its normal position near the altar and thrown in a field outside.

Broken bottles were strewn along the path from the front door to the Madonna shrine at the right of the church.

In the social hall, the public address system was tampered with, cold drink machine damaged beyond repair, and pizza sauce splattered all about. Altar boy vestments were covered in sauce.

Detective Sheriff Ronald Miller said he patrolled the church property at 6:30 this morning and saw no evidence of a burglary. However, from the coolness of the oven and the cold generated from the cold drink machine, it is evident the vandals took place some time during the night.

Rev. Cyril J. Kennedy, pastor, assured "If these people are caught, regardless of their age, they will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. I hope our laws are able to handle vandals such as these."

When Father Kennedy opened the church for services yesterday morning, he found a window in the social hall broken and apparently the vandals gained admittance through there. Tabernacle was also moved in that breaking and entering.

In an earlier B and E this summer, a window was taken out, a door frame broken and the Tabernacle was tampered with. The vandals also broke into the church property they might notice passing by.

Sunday, at both Casselberry Community Methodist Church and at Prairie Lake Baptist Church, money was stolen from women's handbags during the services. In both instances handbags were placed in a room outside sanctuary during the services.

Investigation is continuing today into the shooting of Mrs. Louise Hall, 44, of Georgia Avenue, Longwood, late yesterday afternoon. Police Chief Grady Hall reported on the Herald today.

Hall said his department received a call from a neighbor on Palmetto Avenue reporting the shooting and arrived at the Hall home at 3:40 p.m. Monday. It has not been determined if the wound was self-inflicted, Hall said.

## Osteen PO Site Nixed By Protest

Request for a change in zoning from residential to commercial for the proposed property site of a new Osteen post office was denied by the district zoning board at a hearing held last night in DuBary after a large delegation represented by Attorney Roger Berry of Sanford appeared in protest.

However, William W. Austin, of Austin Development Company, Alhambra Springs, who holds the building bid, told The Herald this morning: "We intend to do everything we can through the appeal method to get the zoning change. We've got the best site that could possibly be utilized but do have an alternate site, property owned, in the area near the existing post office and will use it only after we exhaust all avenues of appeal available to us."

"It was noted last night by a member of the zoning commission that zoning in Osteen is 'completely inadequate,'" he commented.

Berry, who reported there were some 50-60 Osteen residents in the protesting delegation, said that approval of the requested change would have resulted in "spot zoning" and it was upon this basis it was denied.

"Eighty per cent of the property owners in the immediate area desired the land remain zoned residential," he noted.

The two-block site in question is located on the corner of New Smyrna Boulevard and Florida Avenue across from the combined civic center and fire hall.

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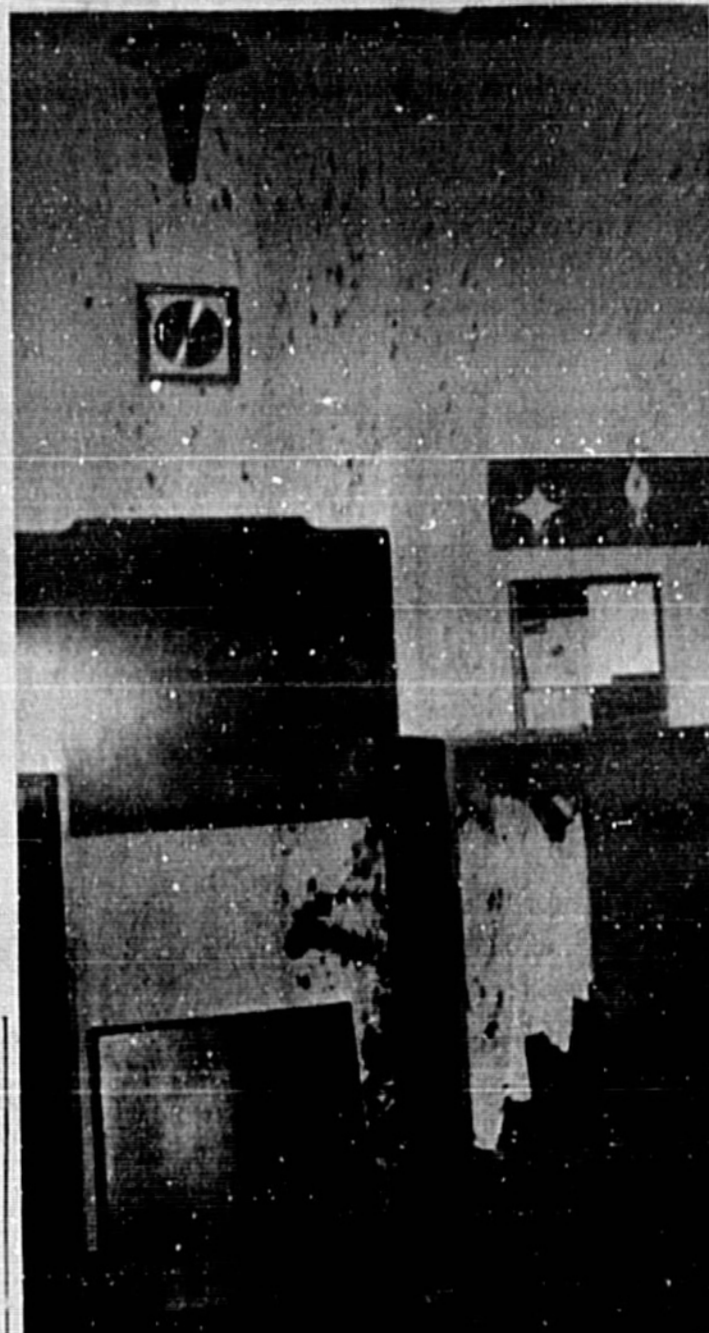

## Victory Claimed By Both Sides

(Editors note: Sheriff Peter Millot yesterday went before the State Board of Appeals in an effort to have his budget restored to his figure, after it had been slashed by the County Commission. Herald reporter Donna Estes was at the hearing in Tallahassee. Today, in the following article, she quotes the Commission as it will win the verdict. However, Herald reporter Bill Scott interviewed Millot this morning and the sheriff claims he will win. Following is his respective reports, Estes' and Scott's.)

COMMISSION  
 County Commission acted with its legal counsel, Mack N. Cleveland Jr. and Harold Johnson, left hearing before the Board of Appeals yesterday afternoon in the Capital in Tallahassee with an air of confidence that they had been successful in their presentation before the Board.

Commission Chairman John Alexander testified in the budget appeal filed by Sheriff Peter Millot for 30 minutes giving statistics showing Seminole to be the smallest county in area with the smallest per capita in-

crease in East Central Florida. He insisted Millot's requested budget was "unreasonable and unnecessary."

Cleveland after showing Alexander's past experience on the Commission as chairman and his knowledge of budgetary matters, picked at Millot's lack of past experience in law enforcement. Under his questioning, Millot admitted his only prior experience had been in the military police for three years.

Millot's attorney, E. Pope Bassett's revelation of the \$100,000 error in the sheriff department budget as submitted by Millot brought riot from the members of the board. "Did the same fellow who made the \$100,000 error in your budget prepare the rest of the budget?" "No, sir," Millot answered.

When Millot shifted responsibility from himself to his attorney for the inclusion in his appeal mention of no funds being allocated for the new jail addition, the attorney general's man asked if Millot were aware of items in the appeal and had signed it. Cleveland brought out fact that sheriff, himself, had signed it. (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 2)

## Sanford Tax Hearing Superseded By TV

 Budget meeting scheduled for last night by the Sanford City Commission never got off the ground.

Mayor Vincent Roberts decided to recess the gathering approximately 45 minutes after a scheduled 8 p.m. start, when it became apparent that county tax information needed to use in a comparison test with city tax rolls would not be ready until later in the evening.

This being the case, and since a Green Bay Packer-Chicago Bear football game on the "boob tube," only slight persuasion was necessary to convince the assembly of the futility of waiting for dry numbers when the thrills of the games awaited.

City Manager Warren E. Knowles said the meeting would be continued to regular Commission session next Monday at 8 p.m.

Importance of the county tax figures to the city fathers cannot be stressed too much, since state has ordained that city must have approximately same total property tax assessment as county.

This means that Sanford, which is assessing, according to best estimates, up to 90 per cent of county rolls, must increase this property assessment to even out with county's figures.

Failure of city to bring its rolls into line with county could result in loss to Sanford of cigarette tax collections from state.

Another important factor to consider relates to whether city will receive enough revenue through all sources to fund 1968-69 general operations budget and to give pay increases to city employees.

It has been evident to most observers that commissioners are looking in every nook and cranny of the city treasury in an effort to find enough funds to permit a pay increase to municipal workers.

This increase, if granted, would start at the lower paid laborers with a projected five per cent raise and drop down as higher-paid city employees are covered.

If enough funds are found in present taxing structure, it may not be required to increase cost of garbage collection as had been mentioned as possible means of finding ample money to pay for regular operations and fund a salary increase.

FAA Okays Site To City  
 Federal Aviation Authority recommendation that the City of Sanford should receive full title to the defunct Sanford Naval Air Station is now being processed by General Services Administration's Atlanta office.

This information was revealed today by Warren Knowles, city manager, who said the FAA had recommended favorably toward the city.

This FAA report will be forwarded on GSA's central office in Washington, D. C., where a final decision relative to how when city will receive base will be forthcoming in about a month. Knowles said, this recommendation involved the final disposition of the facility and had nothing to do with the asked-for one-year lease, which already has been partially okayed by federal authorities.

Marine Lab Eyes Port  
 Possibility of establishing an underwater research laboratory at the Port of Sanford was discussed by F. Robert Hill, of Rochester, N. Y., with the board of the Seminole County Port Authority last night.

Hill, with Marine Resources, said his company's program could lead to the construction of mini-submarines at the Port of Sanford, the site to be used for underwater exploration.

Scotts Burns, manager of Florida Power and Light Company, discussed possible future needs for expanded right-of-way through the port property for its power lines.

Francis Roumillat III, port administrator, reported the board's request for a \$650,000 grant for construction rests with the U.S. Economic Development Administration's regional office at Huntsville, Ala.

## Junior High Offers New Work Program

Seminole County Board of Public Instruction opens schools this year with a new course at Sanford Junior High School, known as Junior High Work-Experience Program. It is a course for students in the junior high school level with special needs.

The instruction received by the students in this course should aid them to become more proficient in many areas such as develop good work habits, develop good attitudes toward society in general and a feeling of responsibility to be a good citizen.

The purpose of the program is to make valuable contribution to the junior high curriculum in that it is preventive, remedial and preparatory in nature; preventive in that it encourages staying in school, remedial by being geared to the learning ability of the individual involved, and preparatory in that it involves students in employment-finding procedures, employer-employee relationship, discipline, and on-the-job experiences that directly benefit the student in choosing a future vocation.

The work-experience program provides for the kind of guidance and experience in school and on-the-job that will allow for directions and aid in personal adjustments, individual pupil motivations and a desire to remain in school.

The work-experience program is to provide purposeful flexibility in its effort to encourage students to not only remain in school, but develop their thinking, self-image and aspirations so they may move back into the mainstream of the junior high and on into senior high curriculum. These same experiences should provide the kinds of information and direction that would enable a student to move into the world of work if they must leave school. To spell out the objectives in clear, concise statements, there are several statements that could be made.

Improve attitudes about work, school and society.

Improve personal appearance and hygiene.

Develop personality characteristics of dignity, self-respect, self-reliance, perseverance, initiative and resourcefulness.

Achieve academically. Become effective in personal economics and develop some understanding of the economic system.

Receive recognition through successful experience.

Develop a realistic understanding of the connection between the world of work and study which assists them in becoming contributing members of society.

# Montreal 9 Looks To Sanford As Training Site

The new Montreal National League baseball franchise is interested in Sanford as a spring training site. This information was made known today in a long-distance telephone interview with James Fanning, general manager of the Canadian club, which is scheduled to field a National League team in 1969. Fanning, along with John McJannet, former assistant to Commissioner of Baseball W. D. Eckert, are presently setting up the new entry for their Windsor Hotel office in Montreal. Fanning made "no bones" about wanting to come to Sanford if there are available facilities for the club to use. The baseball executive said, "We have an open mind and have made no decisions toward any city, but we are definitely interested in Sanford." Fanning said he had visited here while affiliated with the former Boston and Milwaukee clubs. Main concern right now is Montreal, Fanning said, was the baseball draft coming in October, when the new club will be stocked with players selected from other senior circuit teams. After the player selection is completed, next agenda item will be site for spring training, Fanning said. Montreal is in an embryonic baseball stage, and almost lost its franchise a week ago, before Mayor Jean Drapeau led an effort to construct a temporary 50,000-seat stadium when most observers thought the franchise would fold after failing to agree on a playing field with sufficient seating. Drapeau, in the eleventh hour, won National League President Warren Giles to a 3,000-seat stadium called "Larry Park" and committed his city to expanding the seating if Giles would approve. The commissioner replied he thought this would be satisfactory and the Canadian "try was secured." Fanning and McJannet are making the decisions now for the club after consultations with Charles Bronfman, Paul Shady and Loren Webster, all financial backers. Lester B. Pearson, former Prime Minister of Canada, is an honorary member of the baseball group.

Sanford Plaza merchants, meeting in regular monthly session, were requested to support important development proposals for the Sanford Seminole County area. Herald Publisher Walter A. Gielow, guest at the meeting, along with Mrs. Irma Struggles and Mrs. Margaret Ganas representing SISTERS, spoke on the importance of the construction of two causeways, the four-laning of a major through-highway, beautification, and annexation by Sanford as the prime projects proposed for the immediate future. Causeways to be built would be the Lake Jessup route through to the new Florida Technological University near Orlando and the Lake Monroe Causeway, which would connect Sanford to Seminole. Gielow also cited the urgent need for four-laning SR 46, at least to U. S. 41 on the west for the present time, later, on a long range plan, all the way from 175 to 1455. Speaking on beautification, the speaker noted that "responsibility of this project falls on all merchants and citizens of a community." He proposed that the city of Sanford be urged to annex outlying areas thus relieving the population up to 50,000 from its present 25,000 persons.
