### 10-DAY LEAVE IS GIVEN COUNTESS TO VISIT GOTHAM

After 12 Days Of Exclusion From United States, British Woman Allowed Short Visit By Department Of Labor

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The Countess of Cathcart, by signing a personal bond of \$500 for her release from Ellis Island last night, was permitted to visit the United States for a 10-day leave from the Department of Labor.

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The Countess of Cathcart, after 12 days' exclusion from the United States because of her elopement with the Earl of Craven in 1922, was in New York today, under a 10-day leave from the Department of Labor.

She was released unexpectedly from Ellis Island last night, under a \$500 personal bond. Tomorrow in Federal Court there will be arguments on her habeas corpus proceeding seeking admission over the ruling of the Department of Labor that she be excluded on grounds of "moral turpitude."

She had been praying for this for days, she remarked. Immigration officials expressed ignorance of how the order came to be issued especially so late at night. The Countess said, "I don't know a thing of how it came about."

She was met at the pier by Mrs. Gordon Cary, a friend, who has visited her nearly every day since she arrived Feb. 10 at Ellis Island. They went to the Hotel Ambassador.

The Countess said she wanted to thank American women for their sympathy. "I want to see your great buildings, the Woolworth and other skyscrapers," she said shortly before she landed at the Battery. It was too dark in the downtown section to see much of the Woolworth tower, but the Federal building where she is to appear tomorrow is just across the street from it.

Arthur Garfield Hays, of her counsel, will argue that her admission of elopement with the Earl of Craven does not constitute admission of a crime or misdemeanor or involving moral turpitude under the laws of the United States, France, England or South Africa. It developed that when she arrived from England, a board of three American inspectors asked "did you, while still married, have relations with the Earl?"

"I most certainly did," she replied.

## MANY CHILDREN ENJOY OPENING OF PLAYGROUNDS

Miss Mary Clark Stages First Program This Afternoon At The South Side Park; Equipment Arriving Daily

Large crowds of children were present at the south side park this afternoon for the initial program of the City Playground Commission, under the direction of Miss Mary Clark, who previously appeared in the schools and issued invitations to all the children of the city to be present.

Miss Clark returned from Jacksonville with sufficient equipment to get the first program under way and to keep the various activities of the commission working until the parks are thoroughly equipped with the apparatus that has been ordered.

The program this afternoon consisted of baseball, tennis, relay races and various well known games for both older children and the little tots, who were present in large numbers.

The commission announced some time ago that for the present only the south side park would be used for the programs. It was stated that as soon as all the apparatus ordered by the commission is received, the other parks will be opened.

Many playground festivals are planned for the spring and for the summer months and features of interest to the group will be presented, officials say.

Miss Clark was formerly in the employ of the Board of Education of the city of Chicago where she was engaged in school playground work. Her experience in the field which she will direct in Sanford is said to be such nature as to admirably fit her for all the activities planned by the commission.

The playgrounds of the school city of Chicago are noted for their efficiency and for the great programs which the children of the middle west metropolis enjoy throughout the year.

## New Concerted Attack Directed At Dry Law

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—(AP)—A new concerted bombardment was directed at prohibition today and aimed with the fire of general criticism were demands for repeal or modification of the Eighteenth Amendment.

The plans were framed from the launch of the association against the prohibition amendment for its second "face the facts" conference. The contention that states of prohibition under the Volstead Act has proved a failure coupled with the demand that light be made and beer be legalized.

A number of addresses supplied the ammunition for the onslaught on prohibition, which was described as "immoral and indefensible, stupid, deplorable, mockery and hypocrisy." And as making "a crime of what most people do not even regard as a sin."

## DROP IN TARIFF RATES IS ISSUE OF DEMOCRATS

Representative Oldfield Of Arkansas Declares Party Wants To End Country Of Conditions Existing Today

G. O. P. Charged With Not Helping Farmers

Administration Is Held Responsible For Deterioration Of 20 Million In Farm Land

TULSA, Okla., Feb. 22.—(AP)—Democrats will make the party stand for a downward revision of the tariff the paramount issue in the congressional campaign next fall, Representative Oldfield of Arkansas, chairman of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, declared in an address here today.

"We advocate a revision of the tariff act," he said, "to a point where it will be a competitive revenue tariff; where it will not hamper the pet industries of the administration at the expense of the agricultural population."

He flatly denied Postmaster General New's recent statement to Kentucky Republicans that the Democrats were without an issue to carry to the country.

"I want to do this," he said, "and I will do it as follows: Complete denunciation of the administration by the ultra rich as shown by the failure of the commission to turn over to the Department of Justice evidence obtained in its investigation by the aluminum trusts over which the Secretary of the Treasury is the dominating influence."

"The value of farm land and farm equipment," Mr. Oldfield said, has deteriorated \$20,000,000,000 and farmers have incurred an indebtedness more than \$12,000,000,000. He is calling the present tariff law a costing the country \$500,000,000 annually in increased profits to manufacturers.

Republicans are taking advantage of disappearing war expenses to claim economy, the representative declared and "Mr. Coolidge and his propagandists would have the country believe the administration is practicing economy."

Mr. Oldfield charged that despite the President's claims for the economy the cost of maintaining the yacht fleet had been more than doubled under the Coolidge administration compared with the Wilson regime and that President Coolidge required \$12,500 for traveling expenses in 1924 in total of the \$25,000 granted by Congress.

## Three Mississippi Negroes Are Saved From Mob Violence

TUNICA, Miss., Feb. 22.—Three negroes, accused of robbing a highway near Rich, Miss., yesterday, were apparently safe today in jail in an unincorporated city after having been rescued from mob violence.

The three negroes, who were strangers in the community and whose names were removed from the local jail late Sunday night, and accompanied by deputies, and out of Tunica in an automobile after the mob had formed with the intention of taking them from the officers.

The girls were driving an automobile near Rich when the mob, it is alleged, came up in another automobile and blocked the road. The negroes made threats, the girls told officers at Rich. Accompanying the young women back along the highway, the deputies chased the negroes for miles, finally overtake them in Tunica county. In a gun battle Tunica and another were wounded.

The negroes surrendered and were ordered to avoid a mob which was gathering on the highway the officers stood with their prisoners to Tunica.

The negroes were placed in jail here last night, only to be moved out of town again when a mob of officers there. Local officials declared that they expected no further disorders.

## HOUSE FIGHT IS VANCE DOUGLAS BREWING OVER TO VISIT TAMPA INHERITANCE TAX BASEBALL MEET

Retrospective Cut In Taxes As Provided By Comprehensive Revenue Act, Draws Warning From Democrats

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—(AP)—With a fight brewing in the House against the provision of the comprehensive revenue bill for a retroactive cut in the inheritance tax, Chairman Green of the Ways and Means Committee, has warned that any increase in taxes may be necessary at the end of a year.

Nevertheless, \$187,000,000 in retroactive measures will be taken up tomorrow in the House and Senate will be taken up tomorrow in the House chamber with a retroactive cut in the prompt ratification.

Mr. Green, who headed the House conferees declared last night that if an increase is necessary "full responsibility rests with the Senate." The Senate voted to repeal the inheritance tax and to make the retroactive cut in this tax wholly the increased rate which in 1924 would be eliminated in favor of the lower rates effective in the 1924 act.

House conferees obtained the restoration to the bill of the inheritance tax, but against the wishes of Mr. Green, were forced to yield the retroactive cut in this tax, which will mean the eventual loss of \$85,000,000 in revenue from taxes already assessed on estates during the period in which the increased rates were effective.

White Representative Newton, of Minnesota, has given an notice he will seek to have the bill sent back to conference with instructions that this provision be eliminated. House leaders confidently expect approval of the bill with ratification expected within a day.

## Representatives Of 11 Cities To Gather For Purpose Of Re-organizing Ball Teams; Sixteen May Head League

Vance Douglas, president of the Sanford Baseball Club of the Florida State League, has received an invitation from Mike Sexton, president of the National Association of Minor League Baseball Clubs, to attend a meeting next Wednesday in Tampa, for the purpose of assisting in the re-organization of the league and in perfecting plans for the coming season.

Mr. Douglas, who is coming with a view of looking over the prospects of the coming season league, according to Park and Bonner, who stated today that he will attend the meeting Wednesday.

According to officials of the league, there are four franchises open at the present time. Sanford, Lakeland, Tampa and St. Petersburg were the only clubs to finish the season last year.

Port Myers is reported to be ready to enter the league and the club is said to have raised \$25,000 with which to start the season and to get players and equipment.

Representatives of 11 cities have been invited to the meeting called for Wednesday. They are: Sanford, Sarasota, Lakeland, Bradenton, Orlando, Port Myers, St. Petersburg, Lake Wales, Winter Haven, Avon Park and Haines City.

It is expected that the four "rider" cities, Lake Wales, Winter Haven, Avon Park and Haines City will back one club, which will alternate its playing dates between the four. Officials say this would solve the matter of finances.

Much optimism is being expressed over the presence of Sexton in the state and officials of the league say that if he will accept the presidency the baseball fans of Florida will have one of the best seasons in the history of the game to look forward to.

The meeting Wednesday is expected to result in the granting of franchises, the election of officers and the tentative drafting of the season's schedule.

Two hundred and thirty two thousand dollars worth of six per cent street improvement bonds sold Friday at a premium which will bring the city two thousand four hundred dollars above par, according to a statement of the mayor.

Bonding houses of the class represented here Friday are notoriously conservative. Financial reports are checked, transportation facilities studied, agricultural and industrial resources considered and numerous other factors carefully analyzed before the average bond company submits a very favorable bid on community bonds.

The harvesting of Sanford's eight million dollar celery crop, the increased activity of its building operations, coupled with the dawn of an era of water front and river transportation development, are some of the determining factors in the joint bid that was submitted Friday for the bonds.

LENT

Lent connotes self denial and introspection, moral abstinence and the subordination of selfish trails. Its observance is fundamentally necessary each year for the salutary state of religion, but particularly is its close observance necessary at this time when the newspapers of the nation are replete with violations of the law of God and man, when divorce court scandals and free love advocates are threatening the very foundations of religion and society.

Lent is one of the most ancient and sacred departments of the church calendar, for its origin dates back to the death of Jesus of Nazareth, and those who undertake its observance are presuming to imitate the founder of Christianity.

Instead of appreciating the true spirit of Lent and resolving to repudiate during this period some selfish vice or shortcoming, many of us "give up" candy, or cigarettes, or moving pictures, or some other trifling, inconsequential detail that in reality does not represent a moral sacrifice as much as a physical denial.

The honest determination to check at least for forty days some vicious habit, the resolve to entertain no malice, hatred or covetousness, to shun temptation and to adhere more closely to the Golden Rule represent the true spirit of Lent.

I have always believed in Florida, and felt that ultimately it would be developed to the point where it would be one of the most prosperous states. I have also always believed in the South and its development, and I am glad, of course, to know that I was not wrong in my early impression.

St. Petersburg, Tampa, Palm Beach, Miami, Jacksonville and other towns of lesser importance are making wonderful strides in building up their population, and are making extraordinary preparations for further growth and development.

What though you have found no treasure, nor has any rich relation left you a legacy. Diligence is the mother of good luck, and God gives all things to industry. Then plough deep while shuggards sleep and you shall have corn to sell and to keep.

LONDON LETTER

LONDON, Feb. 22 (AP)—The Prince of Wales may accompany King George on the health cruise which the monarch intends to take as soon as he completes his social duties to his subjects, which are represented by the three courts to be held at Buckingham Palace and possibly a fourth in Scotland this year. The King's physicians have advised such a trip each year. Queen Mary, it is generally known, is not a good sailor and does not enjoy sea voyages, and it is understood she probably will not accompany her consort on this year's cruise. The heir to the throne is expected to take the trip.

It is the arrangement to be followed it will be the first time that the king and queen have been separated on an occasion of this sort since their coronation and probably will be the longest period their Majesties have been away from each other since their marriage. The cruise is expected to last six weeks or longer.

H. G. Wells is working on a novel, which, it is reported, will contain a chapter of a million words. This work, which will probably be completed in the late spring, is said to be somewhat in the style of his novel, "The New Atlantis." Although Mr. Wells does not share the general opinion that the characters of that novel are a little overdone, he has already sketched out the outlines of a new story, including Lord Bunsby.

At the first display of the new British fashions, established to show the designs, the spectators included many French designers who had come to put some of the London ideas into their spring creations. Probably the short skirt will survive the spring in Paris also, but it seems almost certain to disappear in the summer, English designers say.

Mayfair is taking sides in a battle between bridge and poker to decide which one is to be acknowledged as the favored pastime of London society. Bridge has been the standard card game of Park Lane and its side streets for many years, but this year the Americans living in the aristocratic section have introduced poker parties, which have become so popular as to attract large numbers.

The "hard" bridge players are reluctant to attend poker parties and poker players are never seen nowadays at bridge tables, but they say...

PARIS LETTER

PARIS, Feb. 22 (AP)—At least one billion francs in gold coins are still hidden away in the proverbial woolman, according to authoritative calculations made in connection with numerous recent arrests for buying gold coins and melting them down for sale.

Groups of men are traveling through the country and paying as high as 70 or 80 paper francs for 20 franc gold pieces. In frequently use the argument that the gold coins are sure to be demoralized before the country gets back to a normal gold basis. The agents say that even at the price of eighty paper francs, the 20 franc gold pieces can be melted and sold at a profit.

Deputy Pierre Ramel has proposed a scheme which he says he will produce from thirty to forty million francs (\$1,200,000 to \$1,500,000) a year to benefit French writers, artists and scientific men generally, who from the class that has been hardest hit by post-war conditions. A crusade in their favor has been started by deputy Ramel's proposal is one result.

He proposes that a two per cent royalty be collected on the sale of all works on which the copyright has expired. Professional guests have become numerous in England and of late continent since the war. Many men and women of breeding and education, impressed by the fact that they have entered into the employ of the wealthy who require assistance in forwarding their social ambitions.

Many of the newcomers in society are socially "rather difficult," especially many of the men, and British society women who can talk politics, business and sports are in much demand to mingle in companies where such men are not found and in keeping up conversation. Social bureaus have presented who women who may be employed for such emergencies.

Some heels are decorated with subtle designs in colored stones against a shiny black background. For day wear many of the fancy heels are generally of one color—green, blue or red. 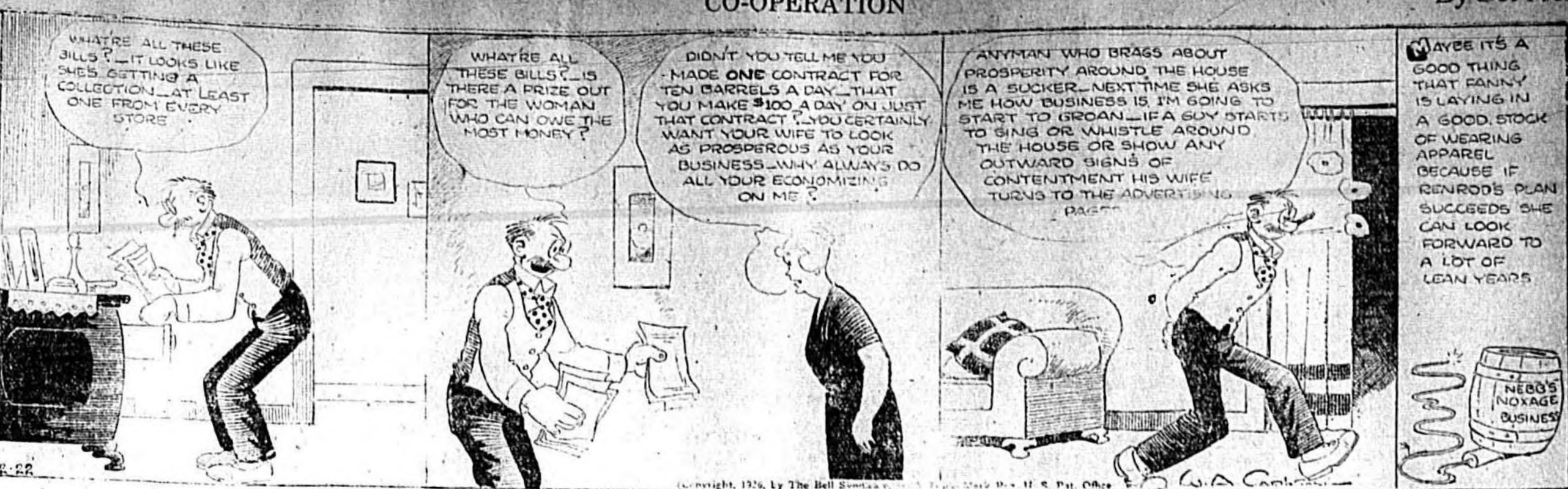

### MISSION WEEK IS SUCCESSFUL, METHODISTS SAY

Drive To Raise Funds Among Florida Churches In Recent Campaign Called A Proof Of Interest In The Work

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 22 (AP)—Nashville leaders of religion who filled pulpits in Florida last week and inaugurated a missionary week in the interest of the cause of missions in the Methodist Episcopal Church South, have returned to mission headquarters here and report and enthusiastic reception in Florida and renewed interest in the present plan of missionary maintenance of the denomination. Of the \$40,000 expected from the whole state of Florida, \$37,000 was pledged by the congregations of the 20 churches visited by the Nashville Methodists.

Dr. E. L. Russell, chairman of the committee on missionary promotion, expressed the opinion that Florida would raise not less than \$20,000 of the million dollar fund for Methodist missions, now being collected throughout the denomination.

The congregation at Bradenton, which was visited by Dr. S. P. Wilson, of Atlanta, not only raised \$2,500 but individual members in addition assumed the support of St. West Palm Beach and Trinity four missionaries. Congregations at West Palm Beach and Trinity Church, Miami, raised \$2,700 each; the four churches at Del Ray totaled \$10,000; while a group of twelve at Fort Lauderdale quickly raised \$1,200, said Dr. Russell, indicating the quick response of Florida Methodists.

Dr. Russell said that throughout the church, mounting interest in the cause of missions was evident and that payments on the recent million dollar campaign for missionary maintenance were coming in at the rate of \$5,000 a day. "Don't bring home any missionaries" was the keynote of the daily letters, he said, as people learned of the threatened retrenchment on account of small gifts to missions.

### TOTAL OF 602 IN STETSON U. FOR CALENDAR YEAR

Present Enrollment Far In Excess Of Previous Terms According To Report Of President Lincoln Hulley

STETSON UNIVERSITY, DeLand, Fla., Feb. 22.—(AP)—A total of 602 students make up the present enrollment of Stetson University, according to information secured from an official report made recently by Dr. Lincoln Hulley, president of the institution, to the board of trustees in annual session here.

On February 16 there were enrolled to the college of liberal arts 15 students for post graduate work; 26 in the junior class; 52 in the senior class; 76 in the sophomore class; 222 in the freshman class and 21 taking special courses,

a total of 416 in the college of liberal arts as compared with 216 last year.

In the school of engineering there are 42 students as compared with 42 during last year. In the college of law there are enrolled 21 seniors; 27 juniors; 32 sophomores; and 36 specials, making a total of 116 as compared with 109 last year.

This makes a total of 576 students of college rank. The remaining 26 students are taking courses in the conservatory of music or in the conservatory of music or in the academy. This completes the total of 602 students enrolled this year as compared with 522 last year.

## Countess Cathcart And Her Counsel



## ENGLISH WOMAN MAY BE ABLE TO STAY IN AMERICA

### Friends Of Countess Cathcart Assert Her Relations With Earl Do Not Constitute Crime In South Africa

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—(AP)—Friends of the Countess of Cathcart new regard the mystery surrounding her sudden admission to the United States on a 10-day leave as indicative that she will be able to remain as long as she likes. They base their belief on the contention that the acts she admitted to immigration inspectors do not constitute a crime in South Africa, where they were committed, and that she will get a rehearing and be granted admission.

Her attorney, Arthur Garfield Hays, wired Secretary of Labor Davis, last night, asking a rehearing. Her admission that she had been in South Africa since the Earl of Claven of 1922 cannot be an admission of crime or moral turpitude, Mr. Hays contends, because adultery is not a crime in South Africa.

"I do not contend that the Countess committed an act but a crime," he wired Mr. Davis. "She did not know that her act was a crime until she was told by the Department either informally or at hearing where we may present South Africa law."

The hearing scheduled for today on the general term of naturalization for Lady Cathcart has been postponed a week.

United States Attorney Emory R. Bakewell was to oppose the Countess' admission to Ellis Island and her out of the court's jurisdiction and left her fate up to the Attorney General.

Commissioner of Immigration Henry H. Curran, in a statement to Congress to change the law under which the Countess was excluded. He would have the law made specific crimes, in order to avoid the general term of moral turpitude. Moral turpitude, he says, is just about as clear as mud.

"If the Countess of Cathcart," he continued, "has a meaning 'single' she still would have told the truth about the status and the questions would have asked no questions. Such a state of affairs is ridiculous. Do you think anybody will ever put 'D' (divorced) after a name again?"

Detectives from the "black hand" squad met the singer and his party at the train and accompanied him to the hotel, where they guarded him until shortly after midnight. Every effort was made to keep the communication from the singer, but the police guard gave the secret away and he wrote an open note which he left with the hotel management.

Leaving the hotel, Gigli and his party went to the railroad station and boarded a pullman car which is attached to the Chicago-Buffalo train here. The note left at the hotel said: "According to the statement made to my secretary by Mrs. Isobel Hurst, my local manager, that an anonymous letter was received threatening personal injury to me upon my concert appearance here Tuesday night, I have decided to cancel same, with sorrow to disappoint my beloved Detroit public. But the nervous reaction would prevent my doing a truly artistic performance."

Mrs. Hurst, when notified early today of the singer's action, said she had heard nothing of Gigli's leaving, but added: "I don't blame Gigli for going in the face of those threats."
