Officers responding to an attempted burglary call found the night depository heavily vandalized. Patrolman Richard Dearing reported that apparently someone had tried to make a night deposit at the bank on U.S. 17-92 and "was unable to get the machine to operate properly." A tool was used to shear two bolt heads and the depository door was pried open.


The vandal left a note directed to bank officials "Now maybe you'll get a depository that works! You

Jerks.' Bank president John Y. Mercer today was unable to estimate the cost of reparing the damage. He said there had been trouble with the depository before but the weekend vandal "tore the front door off it. We're replacing the door and rebuilding the whole thing," he

**Pet Hamsters Blamed** 

### For NY Flu Outbreak

CHICAGO (AP) - Pet hamsters are blamed for an outbreak in 1973 of a serious flulike disease in upstate New York and elsewhere. The disease, called lymphocytic choriomeningitis, was

diagnosed in 57 New Yorkers - including 19 at Rochester who had been in contact with hamsters. Another 55 cases were reported in six other states. It is estimated that as many as 4,000 cases may have oc-

curred in the United States at the same time, just after Christmas 1973, but went undiagnosed or were misdiagnosed.

The rate of detection in New York is thought to be high because of a special public health program. Two reports on the outbreak appear in the May 3 issue

of the Journal of the American Medical Association. About four million hamsters are sold in the United States each year, and more are produced through breeding by owners of the pets.

### **Commission Hears Kissinger**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State Henry / Kissinger is one of four past or present high-level government officials to appear before the Rockefeller commission as that panel enters the final month of its investigation of CIA domestic activities.

In addition to Kissinger, Secretary of Defense James R. Schlesinger, former CIA Director John A. McCone and former national security adviser Walt W. Rostow are scheduled to testify today. All four have at one time been directly involved in

directing CIA covert activities. Kissinger originally had been scheduled to testify last

month but his appearance was postponed due to the absence of Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller, the commission chairman. Critics of the commission have asserted that Rockefeller would not conduct a thorough investigation of Kissinger, a long-time friend and associate.

### Will Merger Raise Rates?

WASHINGTON (AP) - What effect is the Postal Service decision to merge air mail with first-class likely have on future postage rate increases?

The Postal Service doesn't say in its request to the Postal Rate Commission for an opinion on the merger, but a new rate schedule expected this year is likely i eliminate a separate category for air mail and set 13 cents per ounce as the postage for domestic letters.

If, as the Postal Service plans, the merger takes place while present rates are in effect, there will no longer be any reason to pay the 13-cent air mail rate - a letter with a 10-cent stamp will be treated the same as one with a 13-

### Refugee Aid Is Sought

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congressional backers of aid to ndochinese refugees are renewing their efforts for aid egislation that omits the controversial issue of whether Congress should give retroactive approval to the use of U.S. troops in the evacuation of Vietnam.

The director of President Ford's refugee task force, L. Dean Brown, was to testify before a House judiciary panel today on how much money will be needed to transport and care for up to 80,000 refugees.

The House last week rejected a \$327-million aid bill for the refugees, partly because the bill contained after-thefact approval of U.S. troop use for Saigon's evacuation. The House International Relations Committee may begin work this week on a new bill that deals only with

## **Justice Adkins Expected** To Testify On Marijuana

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Proponents of a bill to reduce penalties for first-offense marijuana possession say Chief Justice James Adkins of the Florida Supreme Court endorses their position.

Adkins was expected to testify today in favor of decriminalization of marijuana penalties as the House Criminal Justice Committee considers the bill (HB1249) by Rep. George Sheldon, D-Tampa.

Sheldon's bill provides a \$100 fine for possession of less than one ounce of marijuana. Pot users can now be sentenced to one year in jail for possession of less than five grams and five years for more than five grams. Other major issues facing the legislature this week are state spending, impeachment of a Florida Supreme Court justice and reform of judicial selection procedures.

### Impeach Committee To Vote

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - After watching a elevision replay of the tangled testimony against Supreme Court Justice Joseph Boyd, a House impeachment committee planned to vote today whether to recommend his removal from office.

Committee members refused to say late Sunday how they would vote. But sources said the panel was likely to vote for Boyd's ouster on charges of receiving a secret memorandum from utilities lawyer Edwin Mason in a multimillion-dollar utility tax case. Meanwhile, the Florida Bar set a hearing today on

possible disbarment of Mason. His attorney has asked the Supreme Court to halt the hearing on grounds of unfairness.

Four committee members gathered Sunday night t watch a 90-minute videotape of excerpts from 35 hours of testimony. Chairman William J. Rish, D-Port St. Joe said it was a helpful review.







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## **Kissinger Could Help In Mideast**

Between periods of war, negotiations in the Middle East always appear to have run up and down the gamut of emotion and hope.

For example, on March 22 when U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger finished 15 days of intensive shuttling between Israel and Egypt, and returned home empty-handed, the hope among those who would like to see peace in the region was at the bottom of the scale. The only course that appeared to remain was a return to the Geneva conference on the Middle East and a stalemate. Everybody concedes that the Geneva conference, should it resume, will immediately bog down in endless and unfruitful discussions on representation and procedures.

The outlook for another step toward peace is brighter now than it was at the end of March. Egypt and Israel still are striking militant poses, whether they be harsh rhetoric or ostentatious displays of new military hardware. However, beneath the talk it also is clear that both Israel and Egypt would welcome a return to step-by-step negotiations under the auspices of Mr. Kissinger

Equally important, the Soviet Union, which is the sponsor of Arab militancy in the Middle East also has given the signal that it, too, does not want to return to Geneva discussions in the immediate future. Indeed, recently a Soviet envoy made a special trip to Jerusalem to assure Jewish leaders that Russia would "guarantee the security" of Israel if the pre-1967 war borders were reestablished. The Soviet diplomacy was an unprecedented appeal to Israel to make further territorial concessions.

Israel cannot, of course, trust the Soviet Union She has but to look at Soviet assurances that the 1973 Vietnam cease-fire accords would be observed to assess how much the Soviet word is worth.

Israel, like other antagonists in the Middle East, has but one good office to which to turn if hostilities are to be avoided -- the United States of America.

The strength of the U.S. position puts a new light on the "failure" of Mr. Kissinger to negotiate another increment of peace in March. His decision at that time to return home empty-handed rather than to settle for a face-saving, empty gesture could have been a part of his strategy. The fact also remains that the United States now is in a stronger position that it was in March.

Whether or not Mr. Kissinger will return to the region to pick up where he left off has become a blue chip itself - a bargaining factor that the United States can use to assure a better chance for success of future missions. Moreover, should Mr. Kissinger resume his step-by-step diplomacy, the consequences of another failure on his part should have a sobering effect on the antagonists. It is a blue chip that the United States should

use to the maximum advantage.

## **Turnaround For IRS**


Internal Revenue Service Commissioner Donald C. Alexander is showing a refreshing attitude when he invites an investigation of any alleged improprieties by his agency. Clearly, he sees this as the best way to restore public confidence in the IRS.

Two years after taking office, Mr. Alexander is no doubt shocked, as are many others, by previous attempts to use information from the IRS files for political purposes. In 1972, for example, the IRS is said to have participated in attempts to gather information on the private lives of prominent Miami

Both President Ford and Mr. Alexander have prohibited future misuse of information furnished by taxpayers to the federal government. Mr. Ford has ordered that tax return information can be made available for inspection only through a request signed by the President. Additionally Mr. Alexander has repeatedly expressed his determination to keep the IRS politically neutral.

When a person files his income tax return he should be able to assume that the confidential information it contains will be used only for fully legitimate purposes. Mr. Alexander is correct in inviting a congressional oversight committee to keep tabs on his agency. In fact, it is surprising that Congress did not ride herd on the IRS more closely in the past.

tures at best, the fact that an international exhibition called EXPO '75 is scheduled to throw open its turnstiles next July on Okinawa (Okinawa?) is either a sign that good times are returning or else that things are worse than we thought, so why not try a fair? Maybe it'll play in the Ryukyus.

Be that as it may, this particular fair, which will run from July 20, 1975 to Jan. 18, 1976 and is expected to draw two million visitors, has been sanctioned by the Bureau of Inte national Exhibitions in Paris as a "special fair" dealing with the oceans.

With the formal title of the International Ocean Exposition and the theme, "The Sea We Would Like To See," EXPO '75, says the Japan Trade Council, "will be a celebration of the largesse of the oceans that surround us as well as a sober examination of the problems threatening the well-being and productivity of the seas."



## To Church "The de-emphasis on church growth means a

reemphasis on the Old Testament. One of the reasons the church in recent years has been so wide of the mark is that it has lost its historic roots". - Robert K. Hudnut

Robert Hudnut is hard to ignore. His books are hard to put down for he has been dealing with the church and its problems for nearly a decade and keeps coming up with wild suggestions for change. Earlier works such as "The Sleeping Giant" and then, "Arousing the Sleeping Giant" caused considerable comment among th brethren. Hudnut writes as a pastor to people and his latest volume challenges the activism of the religious community.

"Church Growth is Not the Point" (Harper and Row) is going to irritate many readers by the title alone. We all thought that growth and enlargement was central to the goals of any religious organization. So does Hudnut. But the point, for him in matters of faith, is not to be found in numbers and success. The highest goal is to put people in a living relationship with God and not permit the organization to detour that pilgrimage. And the best blueprint begins in the Old Testament where individuals get pushed and pulled by a Power greater than their hopes and desires

At times Hudnut sounds like a Presbyterian Jew. He argues for the action of God against reluctant men. "We have lost some of the awesome dimension of being told what to do in the Judeo-Christian tradition --- whether we want to do it or not. Their own desires and abilities were completely beside the point to Moses, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Hannah and countless others in our tradition".

The concept here - and in the Bible - is that man has his own agenda and is always interrupted by the plans and purpose of God. Hudnut fears that the church today is so enamored of its own schedule of activity and progress that there is little room for the moving of the Spirit. This book points to the, if you will pardon the expression, passive role of the congregation. The point is to listen, to receive, to respond to the action of the Holy Spirit which is the high goal of the religious encounter.

Hudnut states that the biggest concept that one should receive from the pulpit is the message of reconciliation and forgiveness. He's right. People attend church out of great need, injury, and soul-deep wounds. Too often they are served some strange mixture of political science, quaint Bible study, or philosophical reflections on art.

"The church buries its most important product. You are forgiven, but you wouldn't know it going to Church on Sunday morning. Where's the joy? Where's the new life? Where's the thought, feeling, action? You are forgiven. Anything that gets in the way of forgiveness must go."

## U.S. Plans Withdrawal **Of Troops In Thailand**

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - The United States will remove over one-fourth of its troops stationed in Thailand in the next two months leading toward total withdrawal from its last military foothold in Southeast Asia, it was announced today. The announcement, made jointly by the Thai and U.S. governments, said the present strength of 27,000 men would be cut 28 per cent to 19,500. The announcement did not say how many of the 350 U.S. military planes remaining from the armada that bombed Cambodia and North and South Vietnam will be allowed to

### Schmidt Takes Two Votes

BONN, West Germany (AP) - Chancellor Helmut Schmidt's federal coalition has wiped out the conservative opposition's majority in the upper house of the federal parliament and boosted its 1976 re-election hopes by scoring successes in two state elections. In Sunday's voting, Schmidt's Social Democrats and Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher's Free Democrats retained control of North-Rhine Westphalia, the nation's most populous state and industrial heartland, preserving their 105-95 seat edge over the Christian Democrats. In Saarland they turned a 27-23 Christian Democratic majority into a 25-25 deadlock, eliminating the opposition stranglehold on the federal upper house.


