DAKOTA BANK, SEIZE 5 GIRLS

Band Believed Headed By John Dillinger

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Mar. 6.—(A.P.)—Six daring daylight bandits, headed by a man believed to be John Dillinger, held up the Security National Bank and Trust Company today, wounded a patrolman, seized five girl bank employes as hostages, and fled.

Armed with machine guns, the bandits, fleeing southward, drove off pursuers with a volley over the heads of the girl hostages. It was undetermined immediately how much money was taken.

Several police who drove up to the bank were halted with a burst of machine gun fire, were forced to save their car, and were disarmed by men on guard.

Hale Keith, policeman, was shot down from the inside of the bank by one of the robbers firing through a window as the officer stood on the sidewalk. He was shot in the back and arm.

Pursued to a point about two miles from town, the bandits forced the girl hostages to stand about as shields while they drove back three carloads of officers and citizens with their machine guns.

Three hours after a group of 15 men and women set out this morning to raise \$250 as Seminole County's quota of \$5000 that is to be used for the maintenance of the Central Florida Boy Scout Council this year, four teams had reported collections totaling \$46,700.

W. W. Lawton of Oviedo was the first of the 25 workers to report success in a canvass in his home town. He brought in \$10 this morning.

H. H. Coleman turned in a check for \$10, representing the Florida Power and Light Co. donation.

Ray, Martin J. Bram and Karl Lehmann together turned in \$26. The drive will continue until tomorrow night, with officials of the local Scout Council confident that the quota will be reached. Recent activities of Boy and Girl Scouts, council officials state, have served to increase general interest in Scouting, and as a result, prospect of a successful drive is better than it has been in years.

CWA PROGRAM TO BE ENDED BY MARCH 30

Winter Expedient For Aid Of Unemployed Will Be Replaced By Restricted Plan

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—(A.P.)—The Civil Works program, the expedient used by the Administration to carry 4,000,000 unemployed through the winter is expected to end Mar. 30, a full month ahead of the scheduled closing announced last week by President Roosevelt.

Harry L. Hopkins, federal emergency relief and Civil Works administrator, announced yesterday that the Civil Works program in cities of 5000 or over would be dropped from Civil Works Mar. 30 and taken over by work divisions of state and local relief administrations.

The entire program of Civil Works was ended yesterday in North Dakota and South Dakota and in the drought areas of Minnesota and Kansas.

Demobilization will continue during the next four weeks as originally planned. It was pointed out yesterday all of the 4,000,000 persons who will be on the payroll May 31 will be in cities.

The Federal Emergency relief program will be replaced by a restricted plan. The plan will be to pay relief to persons who are unable to find work through the normal channels.

National Defense To Be Discussed Friday

Because a basis of data has not been established, members of a special committee of the House of Representatives today referred to the chairmen of the United States delegation with "National Defense" postponed their meeting from yesterday afternoon until 1:00 o'clock Friday afternoon.

BORAH PLEADS FOR REJECTION OF NAVAL BILL

Veteran Solon Assails Munitions Vagrants In Most Vigorous Speech Of Career

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—(A.P.)—Approaching virtually certain passage of the half-billion dollar naval construction bill, the Senate yesterday heard a vigorous plea for its rejection from Senator Borah of Idaho, who charged munitions manufacturers were responsible for all wars through "unstable greed" for "soldier profit."

Borah, strong dissonance of vociferous, in one of the most vigorous speeches of his long career, declared American arms makers were now selling war equipment on a large scale in the Orient. Celery Growers, Shippers Who Had Part In Hearing Praise Approval For Pact

That the proposed celery marketing agreement which was given a public hearing in Lakeland yesterday will go into effect within a few weeks, George A. Sweet, sales manager for Chase and Co., who led the fight against the agreement during the witness stand, this morning stated that "Although the hearing lasted for many hours, nothing that was brought out has changed the view point which our group has held for many weeks. We are convinced that the agreement has no place in the celery industry of this state. With the exception of the asparagus industry out West, there has been no marketing agreement applied to the perishable vegetable industry in the United States. This will be the first attempt to cover a major vegetable crop by a marketing agreement, and in our opinion the state will suffer heavily if the agreement is accepted."

HOUSE LABOR BOARD OKEYS 30 HOUR WEEK

Group Unanimously In Favor Of Flat Time For NRA Industries, Subject To Changes

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—(A.P.)—In line with the Administration goal for the re-employment of at least 1,000,000 more men by private industry, the House Labor Committee voted unanimously for a flat 30-hour week for all NRA industries, subject to modification by a governmental board in case of a labor shortage or other emergencies.

The NRA codes review today with charges of non-observance and opposition to further cuts in labor hours, but the will to cooperate with the Administration was evident too.

Amid scenes paralleling Congressional speaking members of code authorities spoke their minds.

For the national legislators in the meantime, requirements of the army and navy occupied their debates after morning committee sessions on tax, stock exchange control, cotton reduction, and other bills.

In line with President Roosevelt's plan, a 10 percent slash in hours of labor and a corresponding increase in pay for industries under NRA was outlined last night by Hugh S. Johnson at meetings called to discuss methods of reorganizing the recovery unit.

Johnson, NRA administrator, made it plain that his proposal was tentative but for some time such a plan, to be accomplished by a blanket presidential order after completion of the present code revision conferences, had been foreseen.
