

Clever Chinese Propaganda Hits Home With Uninformed Soldiers

NEW YORK — (AP) — Somewhere in Korea weeks ago an American soldier picked up an enemy propaganda leaflet.

Ever since then the questions it raised have haunted him and members of his infantry squad.

The faded leaflet — it is on my desk now — is a greeting from "the Chinese people's army volunteer forces" to the American troops. It wished them a merry Christmas and a peaceful New Year and asked:

"Why are you here slaughtering the Korean people and burning their homes down — freezing and dying 5,000 miles from home where you belong with your families? Why aren't you enjoying a turkey dinner like the Wall Street financiers who sent you here to fight for their profits?"

"We do not want to fight you, and we bear you no ill-will, knowing that you, like us, are ordinary laboring people and that you have been duped by American warmongers and their Wall Street bosses."

"We only want you to go home, so that we Koreans and Chinese people can build the lives we want and live in peace."

"We realize that enemy propaganda is one of their greatest weapons," he wrote. "But in our position how can we help but believe parts of this? So we'd like for you to help us get an answer to some of these questions."

I don't feel I'm the one to give the answers. But here is my reply to Sergeant Gaine and the boys in the Fourth Squad of the First Platoon of the First Battalion of the Eighth Regiment of the First U. S. Cavalry Division, fighting somewhere in Korea since last July:

"That leaflet would trouble any honest man if it were true. But it isn't true. And it isn't simply an earnest plea for peace, written by one soldier to a soldier on the other side.

"It is the effort of a skilled propagandist. He wants to confuse you, to make you homesick, to make you doubt your cause and feel your sacrifices are useless and unnecessary.

"If he should succeed in making a majority of American soldiers feel this way, we will have pulled out of Korea entirely. And, in time, I think that means we will have to fight a third World War in our own homeland — and our own families will become the refugees.

"You aren't fighting for the profits of Wall Street financiers — or just to save Seoul or Taegu. You're fighting for a chance to keep your families away from your own town — Main Street, U.S.A.

"Of course, it is true the average Chinese soldier doesn't in his heart bear you any real ill-will. You probably don't bear him ill-will.

Individual reports from the State Markets follow:

Fort Pierce State Farmers' Market. Cool weather has delayed tomato harvesting to the first week in April. Volume is expected to gradually pick up and reach its peak about May 15th. Growing conditions are reported ideal.

Florida City State Farmers' Market: A total of 75,731 bushel field boxes of tomatoes brought growers during the last five day auction period a gross return of \$405,229.90 — averaging \$5.52 per crate. Indications are that the peak of the season was reached during the past week. Squash and bean prices were better during the past week with squash selling at \$1.75 to \$3.50, pole beans from \$2.25 to \$3.75, depending on quality.

Pompano State Farmers' Market: No shortage of transportation facilities was evident last week in spite of the heavy volume of 168 cars over the previous week.

Sanford State Farmers' Market: Improved weather conditions are expected to improve quality of cabbage, celery, turnips, lettuce, beets and other crops in the Sanford State Market area. A record breaking 24-hour period during the past week saw 91 cars of vegetables and 22 cars of fruit move out of the Sanford State Market. Cabbage and celery moved in the heaviest volume followed by lettuce, turnips and cauliflower.

Wauchula State Farmers' Market: First cucumber of the spring deal moved over this market during the past week and prospects are good for a large volume of both tomatoes and cucumbers. Cucumber harvesting is late and volume is expected to remain light with a sharp rise due to planting practices necessitated by weather conditions. Tomatoes are not particularly late, but probably will probably reach the peak about the same time as the cucumbers.

Hoover Declares FBI Has Agents In Communist Cells

WASHINGTON, Mar. 26 — (AP) — J. Edgar Hoover disclosed today that the FBI has secret agents among a group of American Communists which he said "has gone underground for possible action at a later date."

The disclosure was reported in a copyrighted interview in the magazine "U. S. News and World Report."

The Federal Bureau of Investigation director was asked if he had means of checking up on Communist party members "even though they have gone underground."

"Oh, yes," he replied.

The next question was: "You have uncovered agents in various parts of the United States?"

"Yes," Hoover answered. "This technique is necessary in keeping abreast with clandestine operations of any subversive organization."

The FBI chief said "all that remains of the Communist Party above ground is a self-constituted core, which for appearance's sake maintains a public contact."

A new FBI "count" of party members in the U. S., puts their total at 43,217, Hoover said. This is more than 20 per cent less than the 55,000 figure he gave newsmen last year. The Party itself has stopped issuing membership figures.

"While this has been a decline in Communist Party strength," Hoover said, "this simply means that the Party has purged itself of those concerning whom it had doubts."

He added that others have dropped out of the Party "because of the pressure of public opinion, or because of a fear of legislation which has been enacted on local, county, state and federal levels."

"I am not interested in what the United States or any other country in the world think," Hoover said. "The President said he had invited the first announcement of the discovery because he wanted to speak only to his own people, thus avoiding the course followed by politicians and newspapers in other countries of the world who lie knowingly and direct their own people and abroad."

"They have not told the first lie, and I have not told the first lie," he declared.

This action confirmed reports that Byrnes, who broke with the President after he resigned as Secretary of State, intends to play a leading part in the next Democratic convention in opposing the President — or possibly anyone the President might back to succeed him as the nominee.

The South lost its power of veto in the convention when it lost the two-thirds nominating rule. But anything like Southern unity could make its weight felt in a race where several candidates are entered. And Byrnes has demonstrated his experience and ability in the past as a worker behind the scenes.

The general political opinion around Washington just now is that the President doesn't intend to seek another term.

That opinion can change fast, however, and it might be affected if the President decides to take the case for his Administration to the country as he has in the past.

A prospective May or June tour, which might be undertaken in the guise of an inspection of military installations and defense factories, is reported under study now.

Some Democratic officials have cautioned against interpreting such a tour, however, as any clear indication that Mr. Truman is thinking of running again. These officials say his chief objective might be to gain more unity behind his foreign program.

If the President decides he won't run, few expect any announcement until he has picked the man he thinks ought to be his successor.

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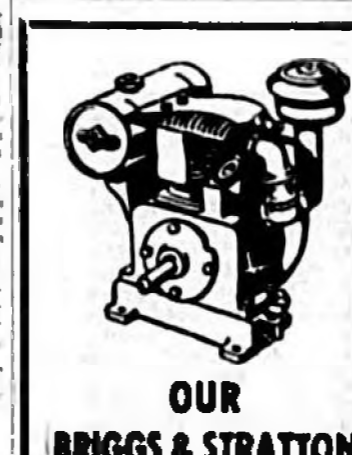

Crime Probes

(Continued From Page One) Snyder, in a statement read by Foley, told the crime probe is being set up in the revenue bureau to check on the tax returns of gamblers and racketeers. Snyder said there has not been and will not be any letup in the Internal Revenue Bureau's warfare against major league criminals. He noted it was the income tax men who bagged the late Scarface Al Capone, Chicago gang overlord of the prohibition era.

George J. Schoeneman, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, followed up Snyder's statement with testimony that his agents are now investigating nearly 2,500 tax cases "in the criminal area."

Foley, Schoeneman and other Treasury officials testified at what was billed as the crime probe's last televised hearing before the scheduled windup of their investigation at the end of this week. Several odds and ends are to be dealt with before the windup. Chairman Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said the group will decide on Friday what further action to take against three defiant witnesses who are already under \$10,000 bond each for contempt.

The three are Morris Kleinman and Louis Rothkopf, both of Cleveland, described by the committee as top rank gamblers, and Jacob (Greasy Thumb) Guzik, Chicago's "Capone" gangster. All refused to answer the committee's questions about underworld activities. Just before today's session began, three committee members disclosed to reporters they have received threats against their lives.

Senator Tubey (R-NH) said he had received two threats by letter and one by telephone. Kefauver said he had received a number of threats "in crumpled letters" but did not take them seriously. Senator Hunt (D-Wyo) said he got a warning letter against "talking my nose in other people's business" during recent hearings in Miami.

Cavorting Lion Leaps Over Cars After Escaping

PALM SPRINGS, Calif., Mar. 27 (AP)—A hungry lioness slipped out of her cage at a circus costume ball here early today and cavorted among movie stars and socialites for 15 minutes before being captured by a singer, a restaurant man and a photographer. Singer Allan Jones, Renaldo Ferrarri of San Francisco, and magazine photographer Earl Tien crowded the animal into a corner where her handlers could get a rope around her and lead her back to her cage.

It happened at a birthday party given for his wife by Stewart Hopp, Rhode Island insurance man, at Rogers Ranch club. "Just as the animal trainer was leaving the cage after his act," Hopp said, "the lioness slipped out behind him and headed for the desert. She was distracted by all the cars parked outside the big circus tent, I guess, because she started jumping over the cars as if she were a gazelle.

"If you've never seen a lion hopping over a car you've missed something. She was very casual about it. She just walked up to a car and over the top." "The lion wandered around outside for a while and then headed for the kitchen. She apparently was rather hungry. This was not pretty noisy about it all night. At the kitchen door Jones, Ferrarri and Tien, with prods and chairs, kept her cornered until the trainer could get her back in the cage. The trainer's name was not learned immediately.

Hero of the affair, said Hopp, was an elephant boy named Rudolf Hernandez. "Hernandez thought very fast. He moved one of his elephants over to the tent entrance, saying one of his beasts could whip any two lions in the world. This way he kept the people inside the tent and the lion outside where it could do little damage. "Funny thing was, everybody kept trying to peek outside to watch the lion jumping over the cars.

"John Klingling North Jr., who happened to be in town, hired Hernandez on the spot. He said that's the kind of a boy who makes a circus great." Among the celebrities who attended the party with Hopp, Hennie, William Powell, and Marilyn LeRoy and Harry Joe Brown, movie directors, Hopp said 200 persons were there in circus costume. There were three rings in the huge tent, one for dining, one for dancing and one for entertainment. The circus acts, including Tien's lion, an elephant and a chimpanzee, were in the third ring. "It was a three-ring circus, all right," said Hopp. "At least," Police were summoned but the lion was back in its cage before they could reach the club at the edge of town.

(Continued From Page One) This will be used by the Police Department as a chemical test to determine the alcoholic content of the breath of persons arrested for drunkenness. The purchase was made upon the recommendation of Chief Williams. The tests are reported to be valuable in determining the condition of diabetics who appear with symptoms similar to persons who are drunk. R. H. Beckham, operator of the Sanford Trailer Park, requested an extension of his lease ending in October, and stated that he will make improvements in the park. The Commission asked Mr. McKibbin to get more information on the matter.

The Commission ordered that lots in the Marvina second section outside the City limits be placed on the market for sale, with the exception of those lots that might be cut by the State Highway 46 extension to the lakefront. (Continued From Page One) Tuesday were within five miles South Korean troops by sundown of the Parallel in force. They dug in along the Imjin River east of Humsan. To get there they marched across Korean foothills without opposition. Allied planes Tuesday supported western front ground action. They hit gun positions, pillboxes, tanks and vehicles. Although the main U. N. line is within small arms range of 35 only one penetration in force has been reported. On the east coast, 2,300 Korean troops occupied a small island of Ieodo.

Eight Army spokesmen said the village had no military significance. On the east central front U. N. troops encountered rain and mud but no enemy as they advanced to within six miles of 38. The Red building was reported on the central front around Kumhwa. This is a road and rail center 20 air miles north of 38. Communist troops have been spotted in the area and west. Heavy traffic also was spotted on the roads around P'yongyang, the North Korean capital, and 100,000 of the 850 vehicles seen moving Monday night, 600 were headed south. This is the largest group spotted in two weeks. All were attacked. The Air Force said it destroyed or damaged about 100 vehicles, 60 railroad cars, 950 Red-occupied buildings and 30 supply and fuel dumps. It also claimed 450 Red soldiers wounded or killed. U. S. B-29s based in Okinawa struck key Red supply centers and communications hubs with about 200 tons of bombs. Heaviest hit were the east coast supply center of Hamhung and the west coast city of Hanoi.

Wonsan, North Korean port of east coast, was pounded by Navy jets Monday for the 32nd consecutive day. Sunju, farther north, was hit for the 19th straight day. Transport facilities at Chinha were also brought in flames. Total Red casualties claimed by the Allied forces Monday were 2,300 killed and wounded and 407 taken prisoner.

(Continued From Page One) manpower policy, Wilson said. The nation's progress in rearmament will be made plain in ODM's first quarterly report to Mr. Truman, due next week-end, Wilson said. He gave this clue to its contents: "I was a principal enemy, I would be frightened by our progress." It was Wilson's first meeting with reports in 12 weeks. Even before it, he had been reported by aides to be much more optimistic now than earlier over progress. A few months ago there was talk the production program would impose an austerity economy on Americans.

Wilson said there is serious doubt whether the government will go ahead with the proposed "controlled materials plan" for parcelling out basic metals to industry on July 1. He emphasized the uncertainty does not reflect any lessening of urgency in the munitions drive. The question, he said, is whether less harsh controls might be used which would have lighter impact on civilian goods production.
