

Nixon Move On Cambodia Debate Res Demos.

Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S.D., charged that Republicans would be guilty of "treason and cynical partisanship" if they try to bring up his amendment to halt U.S. activities in Indochina without his approval.

He says he wants it considered as an amendment to military procurement legislation to be considered later and will attempt to block any effort to consider it now.

Sen. Gordon Allott, R-Colo., who had mentioned the possibility of such a move, said it would be neither cynical nor crude.

Earlier, three Democratic senators—J. W. Fulbright of Arkansas, John C. Stennis of Mississippi and Ernest F. Hollings of South Carolina—assailed Republican Sen. Robert J. Dole's successful move to have an amendment repealing the 1964 Gulf of Tonkin resolution added to the military sales bill.

Fulbright, who said he favored repeal by the concurrent resolution approved by his Foreign Relations Committee and scheduled for later action, voted against Dole's amendment "to preserve the integrity of the procedure."

But it carried by a vote of 81 to 10. Although the Johnson administration cited the Tonkin resolution in dispatching 500,000 troops to Vietnam, the Nixon administration says it is obsolete and irrelevant.

Hollings charged the Nixon administration's rejection to the entire Cambodia debate has been marked by "overkill, to prove the Congress is not necessary, to prove the President as Commander-in-Chief can do whatever he wishes."

At least four amendments to the bill remain to be considered.

Other amendments also have been introduced, but sponsors have yet to say if they will be brought up.

Republican Leader Hugh Scott expressed hope the bill could be passed by next Monday, but Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said it might even take until after the Senate's July 4 recess.

Total Yank Dead 42,754 GI Casualties Lowest In Weeks

SAIGON (AP) — Eighty Americans were killed in action in Vietnam and Cambodia last week, the lowest toll in nine weeks, the U.S. Command reported today.

The number of American wounded increased sharply from 384 the week before to 643 for the week of June 22.

South Vietnamese forces reported 286 of their men killed and 1,671 wounded last week, 119 fewer than the 405 killed and 2,079 wounded the week before.

The claimed toll of the enemy increased to 2,589 killed, from 2,079 the week before.

There was no explanation for the drop in allied casualties coupled with the increase in the enemy.

Twenty of the Americans were killed in Cambodia and 235 were wounded there, the U.S. Command said. It reported U.S. casualties in Cambodia increased since April 29 now total 331 killed and 1,477 wounded.

The weekly summary raised total American casualties since Jan. 1, 1961, to 42,754 killed and 221,701 wounded, while the allies now claim a total of 62,536 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese killed in the war.

In Cambodia, meanwhile, a military spokesman in Phnom Penh reported North Vietnamese troops attacked a major military base 27 miles northwest of Phnom Penh and fighting was continuing.

The battle was three miles from Kompong Luong, site of the Tonle Sap River and one of the links between the Cambodian capital and the country's northern provinces, many of which are now under control of the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese.

Voc-Counselors Now Required

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Bills requiring vocational counselors in every school district and junior college and delimiting the term vocational education became Florida law Wednesday.

The bills were two of 15 that became law without the governor's signature.

Vocational education was defined as education leading to a baccalaureate degree or instruction for developing occupational proficiency, motivation toward the world of work, industrial arts or vocationally-oriented home economics.

State planning council for post-high school education to review the effectiveness of state universities and junior colleges and Florida independent education committees to do much the same for private universities and colleges were written into law.

A bill requiring school boards to invest funds not immediately needed so as to earn highest possible interest rates was added to the statutes.

Maximum and minimum salary requirements for appointed school superintendents were moved by another law.

The limit at which school alterations must be approved by the State Department of Education was raised from \$2,500 to \$5,000.

Two teacher retirement laws were added to the books one defining "normal" retirement and the other specifying that junior college boards of trustees are employers in the statutory sense.

Another law clarifies confusion resulting from the 1968 Constitution by specifying school taxes can only be assessed on areas specifically mentioned in the statute.

An education television law provides that candidates shall be allowed to appear "fair, open and free discussion."

Florida insurance companies would be able to invest up to 10 per cent of their assets in stocks under another new law.

Speed limit laws were substantially reworded, but the limits were not changed.

Health insurance policies on mentally retarded and physically disabled dependents cannot be terminated when they reach the normal age for termination of children's policies.

The limit on which disputes with contractors can come under jurisdiction of the road arbitration board was raised from \$10,000 to \$25,000.

NY Builds \$1 Billion Complex

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller is erecting a spectacular complex of gleaming, marble-faced state office buildings that has soared in cost from an original estimate of \$250 million to nearly \$1 billion in eight years.

Why this project, known as the South Mall costing four times as much as expected? And the modernistic, Brutalist government to forge ahead despite obstacles and criticism?

Rockefeller enters his campaign of the mall is that it is a device to revive the state's decaying old capital city through the hype of grand-scale urban renewal.

But the shinning costs have become a target of criticism as Rockefeller enters his campaign for re-election to a fourth term.

The plan was unveiled eight years ago. Architects estimated the eventual cost at \$250 million and set a construction timetable looking to completion of the 11 buildings in 1967.

Since then the project has been enlarged and its progress impeded by political haggling and construction difficulties.

The result is that officials have put off the expected completion until 1974 and have revised the cost estimates repeatedly to the present total of \$1.1 billion.

State Comptroller Arthur Levitt, a leading Democratic critic of the mall, insists that the final cost will be closer to \$1 billion.

And, he adds, interest on borrowings arranged by Rockefeller to finance the work will push the overall total of \$1.5 billion.

Paul Getty, one of the world's richest men, has some good advice for young businessmen that applies in many respects to everyone else.

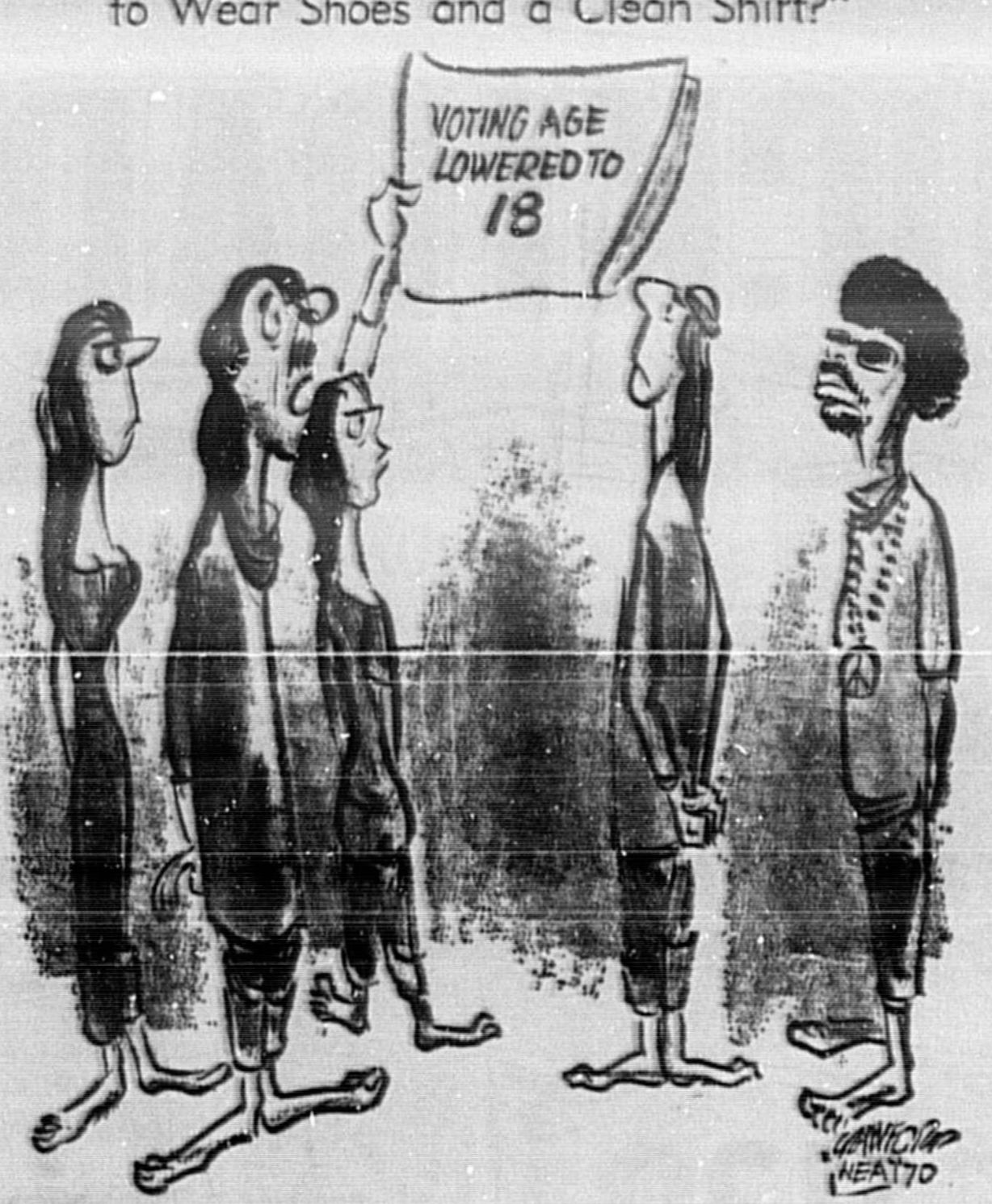

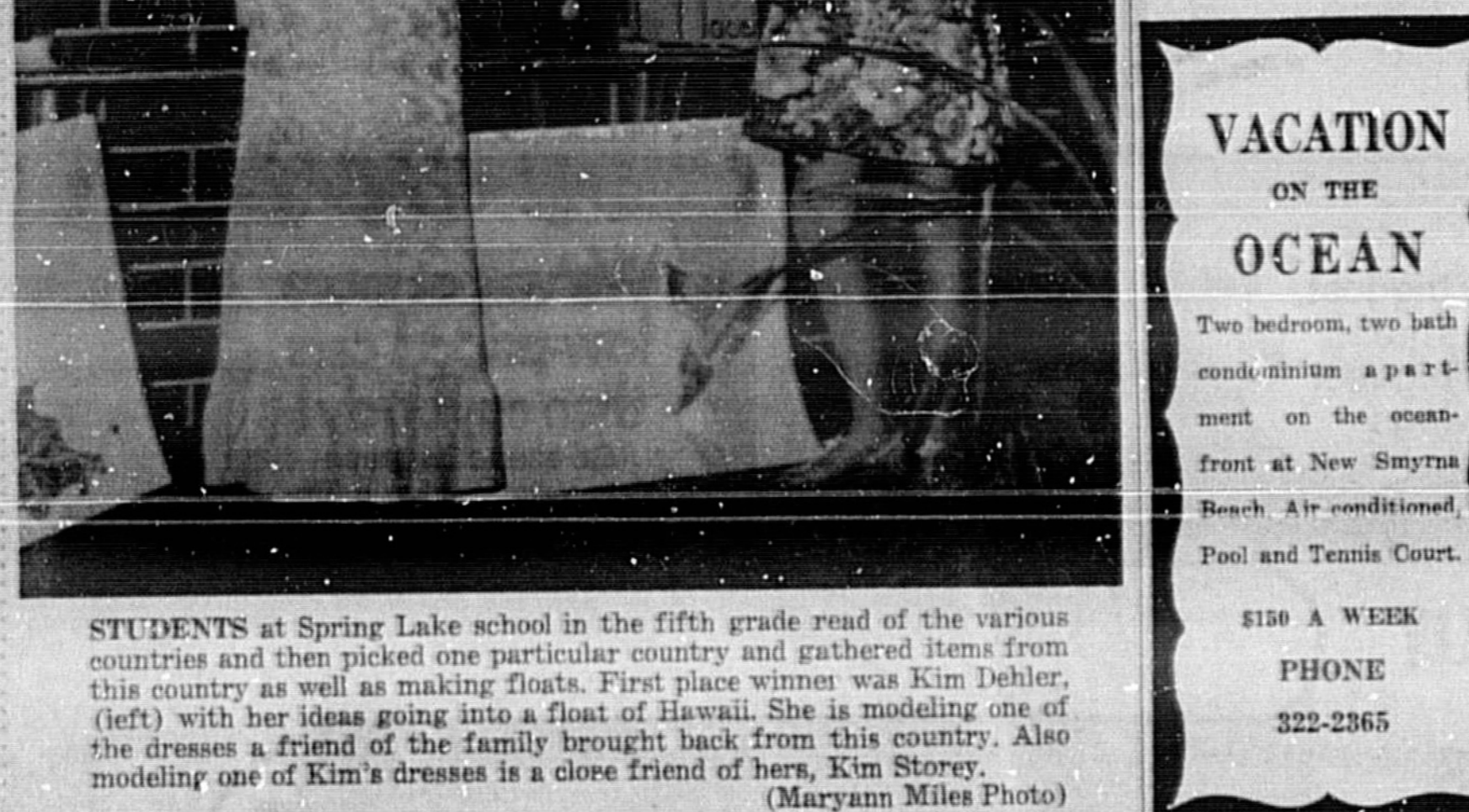

Indian Cemetery Found

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — An Apalachee Indian burial ground that could be more than 300 years old has been uncovered in an Interstate 10 construction area northwest of here. Archaeologists from the State Division of Archives, History and Records and students have roped off the 75 by 100 foot area and are digging through what is believed to be the first Apalachee cemetery uncovered by whites. Calvin Jones, archeologist in charge, said that copper and glass beads were the only artifacts uncovered in the 70-grave burial ground. He speculated that was probably because it was a Christian cemetery from the nearby, recently discovered San Damian de Escamibi Mission. "The graves don't contain any other artifacts because the priests wouldn't allow it," Jones said. "It would have been considered heathen." Nearly a dozen skeletons have been uncovered, Jones said, most of them small children. He speculated that the children could have died in a smallpox epidemic more than 300 years ago. "There are indications in the records that in the 1640s and 1650s there was a smallpox ep-

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Israeli Warplanes Hit Syrian Army Camps

TEL AVIV (AP) — Israeli warplanes attacked two Syrian army camps near Damascus today, the Israeli military command announced. The raids close to the Syrian capital were in retaliation for a heavy Syrian tank and artillery attack on Israeli posts in the Golan Heights Wednesday night. An Israeli spokesman said the air force attacked camp at Qatana, 16 miles southwest of Damascus, and Kiawah, 10 miles south of the city. He also reported an attack on another camp at Sejen, near Suwayda, 60 miles southeast of the capital. A Syrian army spokesman in Damascus confirmed the attacks on Qatana and Kiawah, saying the Israeli jets bombed and strafed the two towns. The Syrian spokesman said the Syrian air force and anti-aircraft batteries challenged the raiders, but an Israeli spokesman reported, "All Israeli planes are safe."

The Israeli and Syrian accounts of the Golan Heights battle Wednesday night differed sharply, as Israeli and Arab reports usually do. The Syrians claimed 175 Israeli soldiers were killed or wounded; the Israelis said they had one killed and seven wounded. At Basrah, a Damascus newspaper which speaks for Syria's ruling Baath Socialist party, linked the raid to the new U.S. proposals for a Middle East settlement. Observers in Damascus said the Syrian attack indicated the Damascus government will not agree to a cease-fire which reportedly is part of the U.S. plan. Syria has never agreed to the U.N. Security Council's cease-fire resolution calling for a peaceful settlement of the Arab-Israeli conflict. The Arabs claimed their tanks and other armored vehicles crossed the 20-mile cease-fire line at dusk beneath a furious artillery barrage and inflicted heavy damage on two Israeli fortifications in the heights Israel captured from Syria in the 1967 war. The Israelis said three Syrian tanks crossed the line, and that two were destroyed and the other fled. Israeli military spokesmen said their artillery, tank and air attacks silenced the Arab guns after two hours. It was the first reported attempt by Syrian ground forces to breach the cease-fire line since the 1967 war. A heavy Syrian artillery barrage on June 8 killed an 18-year-old Israeli girl soldier and wounded 19 other young Israeli troops at one of the paramilitary farm settlements Israel has established on the heights. A senior Israeli officer reported the Syrians have massed 800 to 900 tanks and 600 artillery pieces along the frontier. A military spokesman in Damascus said the Syrian strike

High Court Pondering Resign Act

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Resignations were expected to continue trickling into the governor's office today with the Florida Supreme Court deliberating the "resign to run" law's constitutionality just two days short of its deadline. The law requiring office holders seeking an overlapping office to resign at least 10 days before qualifying opens on July 7 would have a midnight Saturday deadline if upheld by the Supreme Court. Many office holders who want to run for overlapping offices were obviously waiting until the last minute to see what the court would do before submitting their resignations. Press Secretary Russell Strickton said the governor's office had received only 11 resignations through Wednesday evening. The trickle of resignations would become a flood if the court upheld the law and all the state and local officials who wanted to run for another office had to resign first did so. One resignation which the governor had not received, but which was coming, was that of Sen. L. A. "Skip" Bafalis, R-Palm Beach, who is challenging Gov. Claude Kirk for the Republican gubernatorial nomination. Bafalis said Wednesday his resignation had been mailed to Kirk. Five other state senators have submitted their resignations: Lawton Chiles, D-Lakeland; Reubin Askew, D-Pensacola; John Mathews, D-Jacksonville; and Richard Stone, D-Miami. Mathews and Askew are running for governor. Slade for treasurer, Chiles for U.S. Senate and Stone for secretary of state. Another treasurer candidate, Dade County Commissioner Tom O'Kalley, has submitted his resignation. Resignations have also been received from these local officials: Dade County Assistant Atty. Alfonso Sepe, who will run for circuit judge.

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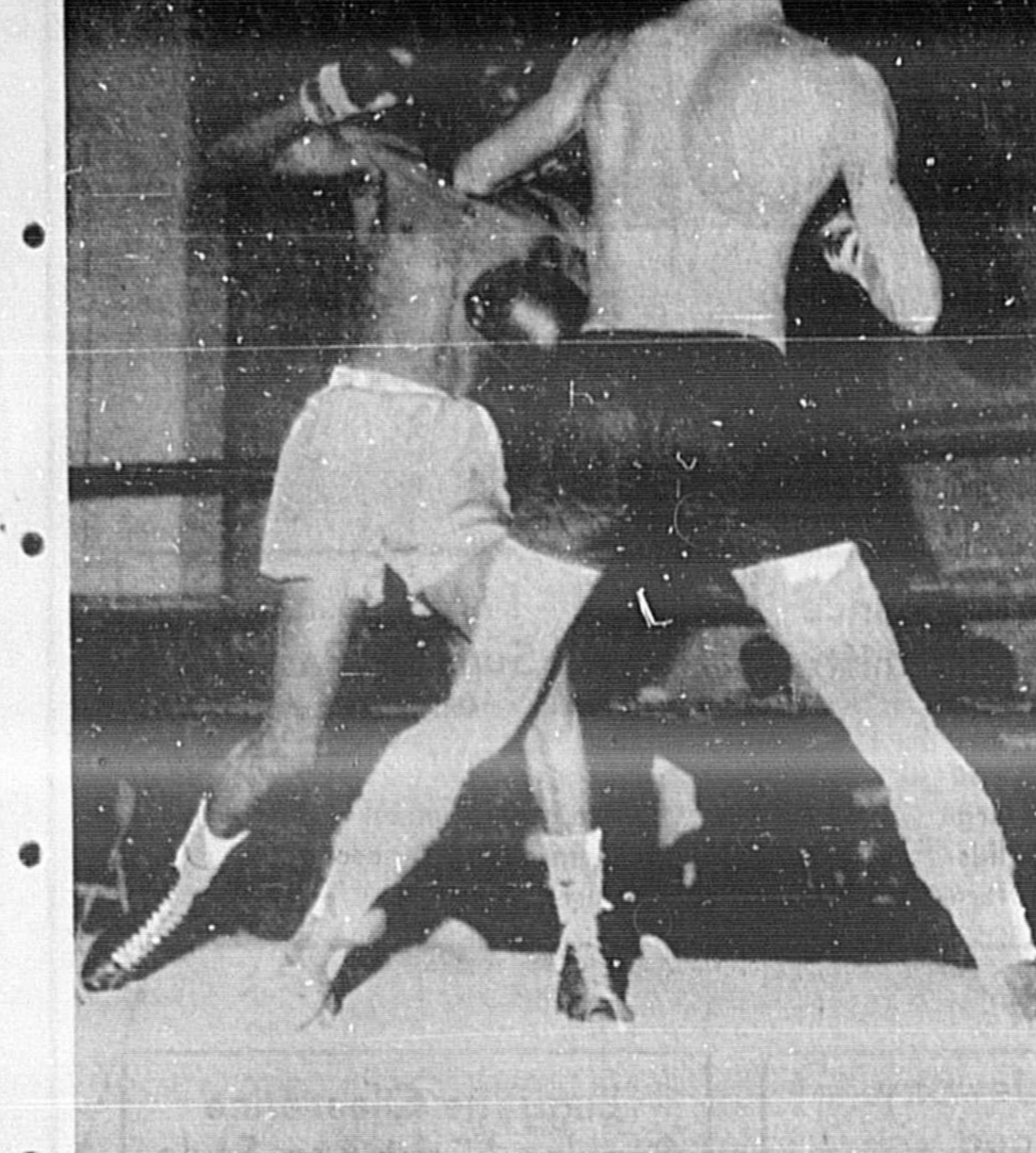

will make their home in Ormond Beach.

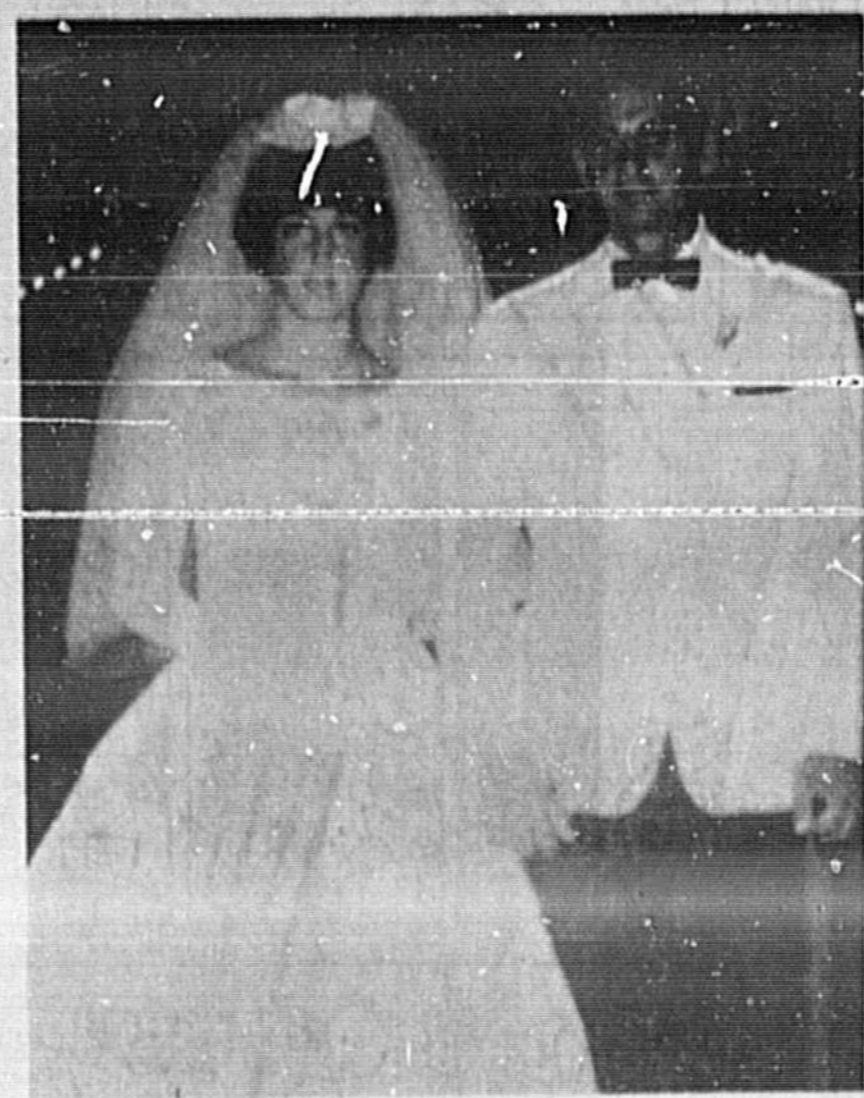

Culinary Capers

COBBLER Muffin mix and pie filling make a quick peach cobbler. In a large saucepan, combine 2 (1-pound 5-ounce) cans of peach pie filling with 1 teaspoon of lemon juice and 1 teaspoon of cinnamon. Heat to boiling. Prepare 1 (12.5-ounce) package of lemon muffin mix as label directs but reduce milk to ¼ cup instead of amount called for on box. Drop batter by spoonfuls onto boiling fruit mixture. Cook uncovered over low heat 10 minutes. Cover and cook 10 minutes more. Makes 12 servings.

FLAVORFUL Blue cheese adds flavor and protein to stuffed onions. Peel 6 large yellow onions and boil them 30 minutes. Drain and cool onions, remove their centers with a spoon and chop the centers. Toss chopped onion with 1 (3-ounce) can of mushroom bits and pieces, drained, ½ cup of fresh soft white bread crumbs, 4 slices of bacon, cooked, drained and crumbled, a dash of pepper, 2 tablespoons of melted butter or margarine and ¼ cup (about 2 ounces) of crumbled blue cheese. Mound high in onion shells and place in shallow baking dish with ¼ cup of water. Bake 20 minutes in preheated 400-degree oven. Sprinkle with additional crumbled blue cheese and bake 10 minutes more. Garnish with 3 tablespoons of chopped fresh parsley or half that amount of dried parsley. Makes 6 servings.
