

Heart disease killing Barron

TALLAHASSEE - Divorce records unscaled Wednesday by the Florida Supreme Court show Sen. Dempsey Barron suffers from a degenerative and debilitating heart disease that may prove faul within five years.

The records also show Barron maintained what his divorce trial judge called a "defacto marriage" for 11 years with his longtime Senate aide. Terri Jo Kennedy, named as a defendant in divorce proceedings brought by Barron's wife of 34 years.

The relationship was formalized in a Jan. 23, 1986, personal services contract, later ruled fraudulent, that transferred an interest in Barron's Wyoming ranch to Kennedy in exchange for medical, domestic and "other duties as may be assigned by ministra 10 percent.

Arguments filed by Barron concede he began sexual relations with Kennedy around 1976. But the nature of their relationship changed after a 1981 heart attack, which could have killed him within 30 minutes had be not received emergency care.

Medical records revealed Barron suffers severe and progressive cardiomyopathy, a degenerative disease of the heart muscle, complicated by high blood pressure, diabetes and

Barron's doctors say he has from live to 15 years to live.

Gallagher wants tougher HMO standards

"Many of them (HMO's) have had a problem," Gallahgher said Wednesday, noting that the five companies placed in

receivership last had claims pending in excess of \$200 million. Gallagher said the Legislature and the insurance commissioner's office had taken some steps to tighten controls on the industry, but he did not think they had gone far enough.

New depression forms near African coast

MIAMI - Hurricane Heiene churned aimlessly in the middle Atlantic - far from land - today as forecasters watched a tropical depression that formed. Wednesday off the coast of

At 6:00 a.m. EDT today, the center of the new system, the 1988 Atlantic-Caribbean hurricane season's 16th depression. was located about 900 miles east southeast of Barbados.

Maximum winds were 35 mph and it was moving west about 15 mph. Little change in strength was expected today said forecaster Gil Clark at the National Hurricane Center in Miami.

He said another tropical depression that formed Tuesday near the Cape Verde Islands off the coast of Africa was downgraded Wednesday to a tropical wave, and was moving west around 20 mph

\$350 million estate dispute nears end

WEST PALM BEACH - The dispute over Henry Ford II's estimated \$350 million estate moved one step closer to a resolution this week.

Retired Palm Beach County Circuit Judge Robert Hewitt was appointed as the "guardian ad litem" for Ford's four minor grandchildren. He will review an agreement reached last Sunday between the estate's three trustees and the grandchildren.

The appointment of a guardian came Tuesday witco in Figure settlement collapsed when attorney James Weber, representing six grandchildren, insisted that a guardian was needed to represent the four minors.

Hewitt, 71, a retired judge who works as a mediator and isiting judge, is expected to propose and present them to Circuit Judge Vaughn Rudnick, who will decide whether to incorporate those changes in the trust.

The grandchildren will benefit from the trust money after the death of Ford's widow, Kathleen Ford. The trust provides Kathleen Ford with a minimum of \$1.5 million a year, plus income derived from investments.

Discovery: 'Like driving a new car untested'

TITUSVILLE - Jim Mahler, a retired mechanical engineer and schoolteacher from Flat River. Mo., had a riverside scat for today's scheduled launch of the shuttle Discovery and says he has mixed feelings of confidence

"I'm real anxious where they have made so many changes." he said, referring to the hundreds of modifications made to the shuttle since the Challenger disaster 32 months

"It's almost like driving a new car untested, with all the changes," he said. "But it'll go all right. I am amazed how it took them so long to recover-The American people need to get behind the program. The Rusidans have had people up there for years.

Mahler and his wife, Lillian, who now live at Ormand Beach north of Titusville, were joined by Dr. G.H. Huck and his wife. Ruth, of Flat River, Mo., in sharing a large motorhome parked in a grassy spot behind a motel for \$50 a night.

Both couples have witnessed the launch of manned spaceflights before. The Hucks were in Titusville for the hirst manned flight to the moon in 1969, and the Mahlers say the experience of seeing the 1981 launch of the first shuttle mission so inspired their daughter, Mary Mahler, that she now is an acrospace engineer with Northrop Corp. in California, with a master's degree from Georgia Tech.

The Hucks and Mahlers were in the forefront of the influx that chamber of commerce officials

predicted would be 1 million viewers for the liftoff from Kennedy Space Center launch pad 39-B. 10 miles to the east and clearly visible to the naked eye across the Indian River.

Shuttle rebirth mirrors Apollo program after fire

CAPE CANAVERAL -NASA's valuant efforts to rebuild the shuttle program from the wreckage of Challenger mirrors its struggle of 20 years ago to land a man on the moon after a fire killed three Apollo astronauts.

"I've been through this before." Dale Myers, NASA's deputy administrator, sald Wednesday, one day before Discovery's scheduled launch. "I was there during the Apollo

Space pioneers Virgil I. 'Gus' Grissom, Roger Chaffee and Edward White were engulfed by flames that swept the interior of their cramped Apollo 1 space capsule in a routine launch pad test Jan.

Sooner or later, inevitably, we're going to run head-on into the law of averages and lose somebody," Grissom wrote in a manuscript completed weeks before his death and quoted in the book 'Heroes in Space" by Peter

The official 3,000-page report on the fire described the capsule as a fire trap with hatches that took 90 seconds

We had the same problem of first the recognition of the

tragedy that was involved and then the development of the practical program of getting ourselves into a sale condition." Myers said.

Almost 21 months later. astronauts Walter Schirra. Donn Eisele and Walter Cunningham blasted off on Oct. 11. 1968, ir. a rebuilt, redesigned Apollo command dubbed Apollo 7 and its success led to later Apollo missions that placed 12 Americans on the moon by 1972.

In a recent interview with United Press International. Schirra compared the aftermath of the Apollo fire to the flight of Discovery - 32 months after Challenger plunged into the Atlantic Ocean with six astronauts and schoolteacher Christa McAulisse.

Schirra said the shuttle program fell apart on that black day in January 1986 "by the urge to fly and meet a schedule, and that changes decision-making dramatically. They call it real-time decision

"Well the real-time decision to launch that Challenger that day was the most disgusting thing I've ever seen." Schirra said, adding the process was even more primitive in his years as a Mercury, Gemini and Apollo astronaut.

Statewide survey: More prisons needed

JACKSONVILLE - A statewide survey sponsored by a law enforcement lobby group shows Florida residents want more prisons built, longer agnicaces for career criminals and less probation for repeat The poll, released Wednes-

day, was conducted by Libby Research and commis by Strikeforce, a legislative lobbying group formed early this year by Florida Citizens against Crime. The survey showed 72 per-

cent of the respondents thought more prison space was needed in Florida. The current inmate population is about 35,000 and the Legislature earlier this year approved the construction of 4.200 new prison beds.

Florida's overcrowded prisons have prompted state Department of Corrections of ficials to implement the new 'early release" law a number of times in the past few months.

Florida is under instructions from a federal judge to lewer

its prison population if the number of inmates rises above 95 percent of capacity.

About 12 percent of those polled said the state did not need new prison facilities. The poll also showed 84.

percent of those surveyed inought caree, adult constnate should receive longer prison

When it comes to dealing with hardcore youthful offenders. 85 percent of those polled thought judges should have more leeway in sentencing young lawbreakers to longer terms in secure detention facilites

The poll also showed the majority of the respondents thought there should be less chance for probation offered to repeat offenders.

Strikeforce is a non-profit group organized in January 1988 by the Florida Citizens Against Crime in Tallahassee.

The group also wants to repeal or drastically modify state sentencing guidelines. push for additional prison construction funds and improve laws for dealing with repeat juvenile offenders.

Lawyers in babyswitch case stop cooperating

TAMPA - Attorneys for a Pennsylvania couple and the legal father of the child they believe is theirs intend to con-titude plans to have a blood test done on the unidentified girl living in southwest Florida, but have stopped cooperating with

Baltimore attorney Melvin Ellin said he plans to ask the U.S. Circuit Court in Sarasota to order a blood test on the child if her father refuses to supply a blood sample Ellin represents Ernest and

Regina L. Twigg, a Langhorne, Pall couple which has filed a \$100 million suit in federal court alleging they were victims of an intentional baby switch.

Ellin said there is a "highprobability" the girl is the Twigg's missing child.

"On Monday morning, Tuesday at the latest, we are filing a petition in court mandating that this child be tested," Ellin said.

Meanwhile, Tampa attorney Dale Swope, in a prepared statement, said it is unfortunate. that Ellin refuses to cooperate, but he plans to ask the girl's legal father to comply with the request for a blood test, but under his rules.

We were and are willing to participate in genetic testing with the Johns Hopkins facility Mr. Ellin has used, but we insist that it be done in absolute confidentiality." Swope said. Ellin also said Swope failed to

comply with a previous agreement to furnish records from Hardee Memorial Hospital in Wauchula where the girl was born 10 years ago. "There will be no further

discussion with the father or the father's attorney," Ellin said, "A petition will be filed in Sarasota County Monday morning." Ellin notified Swope Wednes-

day of his plans to file suit for the blood test next week.

"It apprears this confidentiality request is the source of dispute with Mr. Ellin, Our primary concern, indeed our only concern, lies with the

daughter of our chent," Swope said in a statement. The woman reading it declined comment on what Swope meant by the confidentiality request. Said Ellin, "That is nonsense

because we've known the identity of this little girl and his father for weeks and we haven't released it voluntarily. Swope has said he believes the

girl is the father's biological daughter.

Higgins, county agree to payment settlement

SANFORD — Seminole County commissioners agreed Wednesday to accept Marvalyn Higgins willingness to settle for \$9,000 in lieu of foreclosure to resolve a \$116,780 fine.

Higgins, who angered her Lowery Drive neighbors in Oviedo last year for living in a utility shed on her property in their exclusive neighborhood, offered assistant county attorney Lonnie Groot the settlement earlier this

The Code Enforcement Board has fined Higgins since April 1987 in an effort to get her to comply with county minimum house size regulations.

Higgins refused to comply and did not appear at several code board hearings scheduled to consider her case. The board began fining Higgins \$50 a day in May last year and

Groot said the settlement was fair because the county couldn't expect to gain more than the \$18,920 assessed value of the lot if it was sold. Groot said Higgins told him she has a buyer for the lot.

"What we have is \$9,000 and we get a new owner," Groot said.

Higgins was unavailable for comment, but in a Sept. 19 letter to Groot, she wrote she thought the settlement amount was fair because it represented a \$50 amount for the six months she lived on the property.

Although commissioners Fred Streetman. Bill Kirchhöff and Bob Sturm approved the action, commissioner Barbara Christensen voted against it.

Leaders to teach students about business

WINTER SPRINGS - The fifteenth annual Lake Mary Elementary "Business and Educa-tion Day" will kick off in the school's auditorium Oct. 14.

The event, launched by five chambers of commerce. Seminole County and local businesses, is a unique joint effort to teach both students and teachers about how the free enterprise. system works.

"It's the only program I'm aware of that the chambers work together on one project," said Linda Sawyer, curriculum specialist for career development at Keeth Elementary School in Winter Springs.

Registration for the event will be between 8:30 a.m. and 9 a.m. at the Lake Mary Elementary School, which was chosen for its central location. At 9 a.m., a speaker from Sea World will begin the program in the auditorium with a talk about the importance of planning for the future.

About 230 teachers and students representing 46 schools in Seminole County will be guests of approximately 50 businesses to sharpen their awareness about the free enterprise system. in the area. Shepard contended Supervisor of Elections Sandy Goard discovered several ballot errors which raised questions about the outcome of the election. Goard originally found six ballot errors - including non-city residents who were given city election ballots and city residents who weren't given the city ballots in four Oveido precincts

Goard subsequently found two additional similar ballot errors and assistant county attorney Lonnie Groot discovered another one while reviewing the election. roster Wednesday after the hearing before Leifler.

Candidates avoid Nicaraguan issue

Scarcely a word has been uttered on the presidential campaign trail about the deteriorating situation in Central America.

As with most issues, George Bush and Michael Dukakis are poles apart, with the vice president committed to providing military assistance to the anti-Sandinista Contras in Nicaragua and his Democratic rival advocating a cutoff of American aid. But, with the presidential contest now mired in the intellectual equivalent of a food fight, neither candidate has outlined for the voters a comprehensive policy to stabilize the region.

Meantime, the Reagan administration's attempts to resume shipments of arms and ammunition to the Nicaraguan resistance have been neutralized by the Democrats on Capitol Hill. For the moment, both the White House and Congress seem content to let the standoff continue until a new tenant occupies the Oval Office.

Consequently, a dangerous drift of events in the region threatens to confront the next president with an escalating crisis and no consensus among the American people or in Congress over how to deal with it.

For the past year, opponents of Contra aid have relied on the Arias peace plan as a substitute for arming the resistance movement. Today, however, the Arias agreement is in tatters, shredded by President Daniel Ortega's betrayal of his signed pledges to implement democratic reforms.

After the regional peace treaty supplied a political rationale for lawmakers to halt American military supplies to the Contras. President Ortega safely launched a crackdown on civil liberties that openly repudiated the agreement, made a mockery of the militarity weak democracies of the region. and consolidated the Sandinistas' grip on

Thus, when opponents of the Managua regime held a large rally in the town of Nandaime earlier this summer, government security forces attacked the demonstrators and arrested scores of them. Thirty-nine of the demonstrators remain behind bars as political prisoners. So much for the Sandinistas' commitment to democracy.

The government crackdown also targeted the independent newspaper La Prensa and Radio Catolica, the church's broadcast outlet in Managua. Both news organizations have had their service sharply curtailed by the Sandinistas, despite President Ortega's signed promise to allow freedom of speech and the press.

The recent decision by the Contra leadership, under prodding from Secretary of State George Shultz, to resume negotiations with the Contras is little more than a bid to cover the administration's policy vacuum. No one expects the Sandinistas, in the fortified position they now hold, to agree to anything other than the Contras' surrender.

As the months have slipped by, Soviet arms shipments to Managua have increased and hopes for democracy have dwindled in proportion to the decline of the Contras. At the same time, the military threat posed by Nicaragua to its neighbors has grown. From a U.S. perspective, these ominous circumstances strongly suggest that Central America is one festering problem that the winner in November will no longer be able to

TV is the key campaign tool in '88

WASHINGTON (NEA) - Presidential campaign planners from both parties are in agreement on one point: More than ever before, televition is the dominant factor in this year's

Almost every poll confirms that neither George Bush nor Michael Dukakis has been able to build a significant base of hard-core supporters.

A majority of voters are leaning one way or the other based on what amounts to surface impressions. They are getting these impressions from television

Since the 1970s, newspaper coverage of candidates has become less important as voters increasingly get most of their information about a campaign from television. Thus, candidates direct most of their time, money and effort toward how the campaign looks on the evening news or in their own paid television advertising.

This reliance on television has become even more pronounced in the 1980s - Ronald Reagan raised it to an ait form in 1984.

Reagan's media advisers realized that the substance of what a candidate said was less important than the setting in which he said it. That meant making sure he only appeared before adoring audiences

Further - on the assumption that viewers don't really pay attention to what is being said in

that 90-second bite on the nightly news - it also meant making sure he only was seen against backdrops that carried their own silent messages.

In short, visual Impact became the

goal. This has become known as "photoopportunity campaigning," and since most of the media severts surrounding George Bush are veterans of the Reagan campaigns, it has been central to the Bush effort this year. Each day of the

speaks Bush campaign is without an meticulously scripted American flag with the key event in the picture staged early enough to allow television

networks time to edit and transmit their stories. Audiences are carefully chosen. Almost without fail, they are white, conservative and guaranteed to cheer in all the right places. Extraordinary amounts of time and energy are

Bush never

put into ensuring that the backdrop against which Bush is speaking projects just the right image. This year it has meant that Bush never speaks without an American flag in the picture.

Above all. Bush is kept away from reporters. and press conferences are out of the question. Roger Ailes, the media guru behind Richard Nixon, is the man calling Bush's media shots this year. He says that reporters' questions would only "clutter" Bush's message


That this strategy is working is borne out in the polls.

Can tax hike be avoided?

WASHINGTON-It says a lot about the moral and intellectual climate of Washington, D.C., in this election autumn that Robert S. Strauss. the veteran Democratic official, has set off a fair-sized flap just by telling the truth. His crime was that he violated the conspiracy of silence in both parties aimed at disguising budget and deficit realities from the voters until after Election Day.

What happened was this. Strauss, a former Democratic Party chairman and senior Carter administration official, is co-chairman of the bipartisan National Economic Commission, It is mandated by Congress to draft recommendations for the next President on the fiscal problems he will face at the start of his term. His Republican counterpart is the equally respected Drew Lewis, a former Reagan administration Cabinet member.

The commission has kept a deliberately low profile, hoping to avoid the slings and arrows of the presidential compaign. But last week Strauss, a voluble Texan, broke the pledge of silence in an appearance at a Washington economic conference.

He says he said no more than the obvious: that the commission had made no decisions, but if it were going to fulfill its mandate, it would have to focus on possible cuts in defense. and entitlement programs, including Social Security, because that is where 75 percent of federal spending goes. And if deficit reduction goals could not be met by trimming those programs, then the commission would have to find the least objectionable way to raise taxes.

Now, those may be "obvious" realities to Strauss and others, but they are realities politicians in both parties have found it convenient to deny. So when the economic reporters from major papers who were covering the conference filed stories about Strauss' comments, a fuss errupted.


As Strauss well knows. Social Security is the ultimate sacred cow, considered untouchable by both parties. As he also knows, George Bush has said repeatedly he will "never" raise taxes and Michael Dukakis has said he will resist such a step until he has exhausted every other possibility. So when the story hit the papers. Strauss was subjected to a series of ritual denunciations. Both presidential campaigns said they would look with disfavor at any such proposals. Sen. Daniel P. Moynthan (D-N.Y.) and AFL-CIO President Lane Kirland, both commission members, said they would resist any curbs on Social Security benefits.

Strauss got on the phone with decisionmakers in both campaigns and key fiscal policymakers in Congress, trying to put out the fires his unguarded comments had started. When I talked with him late in the day, he said carefully, "I hope it doesn't scuttle it." Sen-Pete Domenici (R-N.M.), former chairman of the Budget Committee and a key GOP member of the commission, was more worried. "It shouldn't harm the (chances of gaining) consensus." he said, "but it might."

In all of this, no one said Strauss was wrong. Defense and entitlements do cat up the budget. If cuts can't be made there, revenues will have to increase, or the debt and its annual interest burden will continue to mount. But Washington is unwilling to face those

What makes all this so odd is that many of the voters tell interviewers like myself that they expect taxes to go up, whoever wins in November. The deficit is a threat to the economic future, they say, and so they are prepared to accept both spending cuts and higher taxes-so long as the burden is fairly

The rest of the feat goes back to the "Tax Revolt" that began with California's Proposition 13 property-tax rollback referendum in 1978 and spread to other states. But that revolt has long since run its course. In the September issue of State Legislature magazine. Steven D. Gold, director of fiscal studies for the National Conference of State Legislatures, writes that "tax-revolt fever has died down" in the last few years. State tax revenues per \$100 of personal income (a good, uninflated way of measuring tax burdens) dropped from a historic peak of \$7.09 in 1978. the year of Proposition 13, to \$6.46 in 1983. But by 1987, they were back up to \$7.03-almost where they were when the great revolt began.

Cold's analysis shows that local tax burdens dropped sharply (18 percent) in the first five years of the Tax Revolt, but now have come one-third of the way back.

What is most relevant for the federal experience is the fact that the state personal income tax burden in 1987 was 19 percent HIGHER than it was in 1978.

Union leader asks for help

workers who load mail trucks for a living think their union is in the grip of organized crime. A recent letter to FBI Director William. Sessions charges the mob may have already infiltrated a Postal Service union.

George Baker, president of Mail Handlers Union Local 300 in New York City, wrote the letter asking Sessions to place the local in a federal trusteeship and shield it from organized crime.

The Mail Handlers Union serves 42,000 Postal Service watchmen, messengers and mail handlers. It is a division of Laborers International Union of North America that oversees several different types of labor unions, most of them representing construction workers and other heavy laborers.

Pederal investigations over the past several years have turned up information that indicates certain LIUNA of ficials have long been influenced by organized crime. And the New York local of the Mail Handlers wants out from under that influence.

Our associate, Jim Lynch, obtained a copy of Baker's letter to Sessions. In It. Baker says that the FBI has been shown documents "that with proper investigation and

concentrated review may expose one of the largest scardals ever to hit the U.S. labor movement Baker adds, "I am requesting that your agency look into the possibility of having the federal government place Local 300 into trusteeship immediately before LIUNA or its friends take control of the Local and destroy all the information that we have painfully gathered over the years."

This cry for help should come as no surprise to Sessions. At a congressional hearing in April, he testified that for 11 years the FBI has been investigating possible Mafia control of LIUNA. In the meantime, the same LIUNA leadership continues its reign. An FBI spokesman refused to comment to us about the investigation.

A President's Commission on Organized Crime in 1986 outlined some of LIUNA's past problems. LIUNA General President, Agnelo Fosco, was indicted in 1981 in a case involving alleged pension plan swindles. He was later acquitted. LIUNA General Secretary Treasurer, Arthur E. Coia, has been indicted twice and then acquitted of racketeering charges involving union benefit funds.

The Presidential Commission also noted that Fosco has the power to spend union funds and award patronage jobs in the union and that some of those jobs have gone to people with known ties to La Cosa Nostra organized crime syndicate. Fosco gave the job of union "special international representative" to Al Pilotto and Matthew Trupiano. Pilotto, according to the commission report, was a Chicago boss of La Cosa Nostra and was convicted on racketeering charges involving health and welfare funds of a LIUNA local. Truptano was a St. Louis boss of La Cosa Nostra, the commission reported.

"Although LiUNA has not achieved the notoricty of the Teamsters' Union," the commission report said, "it is nevertheless a union with clear ties to organized crime." And, the commission noted, "the government has done little to end organized crime's hold over LIUNA."

In the case of the Mail Handlers, tailure of the federal government to oversee LIUNA may have jeopardized \$1 billion in the Mail Handlers' benefit plan. That plan covers 500,000 federal workers including the mail handlers and thousands of other federal workers who have epted to join the plan.



Guerrilla bomb kills 35, wounds 156 in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghantstan - A doctor described as "a bloody mess" the deadliest guerrilla attack on the capital in the 9-year-old civil war, in which a rocket fired by Moslem rebels killed at least 35 people and wounded 156.

Soviet sources in Kabul said Wednesday that of the 16 rockets fired by the guerrillas on Kabul, one exploded between a crowded bus stand and a row of taxis in the heart of the city during the evening rush hour.

The attack Tuesday came as Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze hinted at the United Nations the Soviet withdrawal from Afghanistan was Jeopardized by arms supplies to the U.S. backed rebels. Shevardnadze was called home early to attend an orgent meeting today of the Politburo, possibly on Afghantstan.

Soviet sources said Tuesday's downtown rocket attack was the bloodiest ever on Kabul by the Afghan Moslem guerrillas, who are armed by the United States, China and Iran in their 9-year-old war against the Soviet-backed

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42 ethnic Albanian separatists arrested

BELGRADE. Yugoslavia - In one of the targest roundups of ethnic Albanian separatists, police arrested 42 people suspected of being members of an underground organization plotting to overthrow Yugoslavia's communist regime.

Police said Wednesday the detentions followed the deployment last week of 300 federal police in Kosovo province to bolster local police in the event of violent ethnic unrest between Albanians and Serbs.

The group of detainces, including 22 university students and seven girls, was arrested in the southeastern province, site of ethnic tensions since Albanian separatists led violent riots in 1981. Kosovo is about 90 percent ethnic Albanian. Federal police modeling with land public

Macedonia, rounded up 42 people and seized five handguns and two shotguns, a police statement said. It said the group was plotting to overthrow the communist leadership in the federated nation of six republica.

Police said those arrested, aged between 20 and 35 years, had distributed leaflets throughout Kosovo earlier in the month calling on ethnic Albanians to join in armed rebellion against Serbs. The Albanian separatists hope to join. Kosovo and lands adjoining the republic to neighboring Albania.

Kosovo is an autonomous province in Serbia. the largest Yugoslav republic.

Police said the ethnic Albanian separatists organized with the aim of hostile activities and spreading national and religious hatred in multi-national Yudoslavia

Tibetan leader urges dalai lama to reconcile

BELIING - The senior Tibetan Buddhist leader in China today urged the dalai lama, Tibet's exiled god king to return home two days before the anniversary of violent riots last year in the Tibetan capital that left six dead.

The invitation to reconcile with the communist government in Beijing followed an anti-Chinese protest Tuesday in the Tibetan capital of Lhasa by a small group of Buddhist lamas. The pro-independence rally set the stage for Saturday's tension-filled observance of mafor anti-Chinese demonstrations

About 10 monks, calling for independence and for the release of colleagues jailed after previous demonstrations, marched Tuesday once around the Jokhang Temple in central Lhasa before police moved in to break up the protest.

There were unconfirmed reports at least one person was arrested.

The panchen lama, the highest-ranking Tibetan Buddhist leader in China, said he had called on the dalai lama to return to China "to contribute to the development and prosperity of Tibet," the official China Daily newspaper reported today.

The extled spiritual and temporal leader of Tibet fled to India in 1959 with tens of thousands of followers after an abortive rebellion against Beijing in which at least 84,000 people

"What is the use of making a noise abroad?" the panchen lama told the dalat lama, his immediate superior, in a telephone conversation earlier this


"Persisting in antagonism will do nothing for Tibet nor the whole country, and there is no hope of success," the panchen lama said.

Beijing last week extended its first invitation to the dalai lama to hold talks, on the condition he drop the idea of independence a move apparently intended to offset pro-independence violence on the anniversary of last year's bloody Oct. 1 riot.

The dalat lama accepted the offer, but repeated a call for self-government within China a proposal effectively rejected Tuesday by a senior Chinese leader.

Neither Beijing nor the panchen lama specified whether the datat lama would be allowed to live in Tibet if he returns, or merely permitted to make brief visits to his nomeland from Beiling.

Brawley asserts 'I'm not a liar

NEWARK, N.J. - Tawana Brawley used her first news conference to challenge a reported grand jury finding that she fabricated her story of being abducted and raped by six white men, saying she has not lied to anyone, "most of all my

"My name is Tawana Brawley and I'm not a liar and I'm not crazy," declared the 16-year-old former checrleader from Wappingers Falls, N.Y. She vowed Wednesday not to break her long allence about the controversy that has galvanized racial tension in New York until the state attorney general steps aside.

The New York Times reported Tuesday that the grand jury empaneled by New York Attorney General Robert Abrams concluded there was no factual basis to Brawley's allegations that she was kidnapped and raped. The newspaper also said the grand jury believes Hrawley made up the story.

But Brawley's advisers contend that the rape investigation has covered up-information-implicating white authorities in Dutchess County, 75 miles north of New York City.

Third Mexican convicted in killing

LOS ANGELES - A federal prosecutor says he hopes the conviction of a third Mexican in the torture slaying of a U.S. drug agent will send a message to drug lords, but the defense lawyer maintains his client was an innocent victim of a system bent on revenge.

Drug trafficker Jesus Felix Gutierrez, 38, was convicted Wednesday of arranging the escape from Mexico of a drug baron suspected of masterminding the slayings of Enrique Camarena of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency and his pilot.

The same federal court jury earlier convicted two codefendants of direct participation in the slayings of Camarena and Alfredo Zavala Avelar near Guadalajara, Mexico, in February 1985. The verdicts followed an eight-week trial.

Besides the three tried in Los Angeles in the Camarena case, five other men have been tried in Mexico and are in jail awaiting verdicts and sentences.

Jurors to decide Globe-King trial

BOSTON - Defense attorneys today in the libel case of former Gov. Edward J. King were hoping jurors will agree that a Boston Globe columnist was driven by "anger and hostility" when he accused King of pressuring a judge to change a controversial rape decision.

The Superior Court panel was to receive the case today after instructions from Judge Joseph P. Lynch. In Wednesday's closing arguments. King's attorney accused

former Globe columnist David Farrell of inventing the 1981 charge.

But Globe attorneys suggested the one-term governor waged a public pressure campaign against the judge, then shunned traditional avenues of public comment and sued the newspaper that had long been a thorn in his side.

The trial focuses on a Nov. 8, 1981, Farrell column accusing King of telephoning Judge Herbert Abrams to demand he change the suspended sentences and \$500 fines given five men who pleaded guilty to raping a former beauty queen and leaving her naked by the road.

The judge revoked the sentence four days, later following a firestorm of criticism and a news conference in which the governor called for two agencies to investigate.

GREENWOOD, S.C. - Houpttal officials say that despite efforts to get a court order to give blood to a critically injured child who was a victim of a gunman's rampage at a school, the child's condition continued to deterio-

A spokeswoman at Self Memorial Hospital said late Wednesday that Tequila Thomas, 8, was in "very critical" condition and "her condition is deteriorating."

Earlier Wednesday, hospital officials had to go to court for an order to give the wounded girl a transfusion, which doctors believe prevented the child from dying, said Dan Branyon, a hospital spokesman. The child's parents, who are Jehovah's Witnesses, objected to the transfusions on religious grounds

Thomas was wounded in the neck and hand in the shooting at Oakland Elementary School Monday.

Classes were to resume today at Oakland Elementary, with police officers stationed at the school.

The alleged gunman, James William Wilson, 19, who had been hospitalized with mental problems in the past, was charged with murder Monday night. He was committed Tuesday to a state mental hospital in Columbia for a 15-day psychiatric examination ordered by the court.

Police have not revealed a motive as to why the gunman picked the school for his rampage, which killed Shequita Brudley, 8, and wounded 10 others. Wilson had been reading about mass killers before the shootings occurred, his grandmother, Gladys Wilson said.

Funeral services for the Bradley child were scheduled at 2 p.m. Friday.

Doctors at the hospital began giving the wounded girl blood when she was first brought to the hospital early Monday afternoon.

A White House spokesman said the OMB director's position requires Senate confirmation but Wright would be appointed acting director and "no decision has been made on a nomination."



The Heat will begin its first NBA season this fall. The team's first practice will be Oct. 6.



Flo steals the show

Griffith Joyner shatters world mark in 200

SEOUL, South Korea - The world's fastest woman set two world records today to join forces with her equally talented sister-in-law and the best wemen's basketball team, providing a feminine touch to soothe the bruised pride of the U.S. Olympic forces.

One day after the U.S. men's basketball team was embarrassed by the Soviet Union. Florence Griffith Joyner and Jackie Joyner-Kersee each won their second gold medal of the Games and the women's basketball team brought home the gold with a 77-70 victory over Yugoslavia.

Griffith Joyner, whose husband Al is the brother of Jackie, set her first world mark of the day with a time of 21.56 seconds in the semifinals of the 200 meters, and less than two hours later she lowered the record to 21.34 in blowing away the field in the final.

After crossing the line well in front of Jamaica's Grace Jackson

and East German Heike Drechsler, Griffith Joyner knelt to her knees, clasped her hands and pointed her long nails skyward. She then was carried off by her husband.

"When I got out of the stack I toid myself to stay in there," said the 28-year-old Californian. "From there on in I felt very good and I just

it was fine, better than fine. can't compare it to anything and I'm not finished yet.

Joyner-Kersee, billed as the 'world's greatest female athlete." wasn't even the most spectacular member of her family today, but she was good enough to add the long jump title to her gold medal in the heptathlon.

Joyner-Kersee cleared 24 feet, 3 1/2 inches on the fifth of her six jumps to beat out Drechsler and Galina Chistyakova of the Soviet Union. All three women have either held or shared the world record in

"Her lifetime came together on that fifth jump," said Bobby Kersee,

her husband and coach. "Her dream, her Olympic desires.

"We're buying a new house and I'm going to build a special shelf in the living room for the gold medals. Those are the most important things in terms of materialistic things in our life.

Bobby Kersee handed his wife an American flag and encouraged her to take a victory lap, commenting later, "That girl is so humble, it's a shame. But her husband takes care of that for her.


'She said, 'No that's cocky,' but I said, 'Jackie, you worked for it, you've earned it. Give the people your victory lap."

"I never thought I'd take a lap." she said. "I asked Bobby if he was supposed to be on the track. I didn't want them to take my gold medal away.


That short, fat kid has grown into a 6-3, 228-pound mountain of muscle for Lake Howell High School and is one of the most heavily recruited players in the

Finding caloric values for food done in lab

DEAR DR. GOTT: How were the caloric values determined for

DEAR READER: The caloric values for foods were obtained in a laboratory by measuring the heat given off when the foods were burned.

A kilocalorie, the unit commonly used in the study of metabolism, is the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of one kilogram of water one degree centigrade (from 14.5 degrees Celsius to 15.5 degrees Celsius). Meticulous studies have shown that one gram of protein yields four kilocalories, one gram of carbohydrate yields four ktlocalories, one grain of alcohol seven kilocalories and one gramof fat nine kilocalories. This why dietary fat is so fattening: gram for gram it produces more than twice the calories of protein and carbohydrates. DEAR DR. GOTT: During the winter I have so much electricity in my body I get shocked, regardless of what I touch, I've tried rubber-soled shoes, but no luck.

DEAR READER: 'stually static electricity is not in your body, it's on your body. When humidity is low and you walk across the carpeting, the action of your shoes brushing against the material causes the formation of a static charge. When you touch an object of opposite charge (or ground), the static electricity on your skin jumps to the object, causing a spark. This is completely harmless and poses no health hazard whatsoever.

Because rubber tends to increase the buildup of static electricity, rubber-soled shoes make for bigger and better sparks. (Remember when, as a child, you rubbed balloons on the carpet, then they stuck to 7 Soft-spoken

the wall? This was static electricity.) Your best bet to avoid this unwelcome stimulation is to increase the humidity in your house during the winter months.



For the purposes of this subsection, the term "pledged revenues" means all revenues pledged to the payment of debt service, excluding any pledge of the full faith and credit of the state.

ARTICLE VIII

SECTION 3. Taxes: exemptions .--

(a) All property owned by a municipality and used exclusively by it for municipal or public purposes shall be exempt from taxation. A municipality, owning property outside the municipality, may be required by general law to make payment to the taxing unit in which the property is located. Such portions of property as are used predominantly for educational. literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes may be exempted by general law from texation.

There shall be exempt from taxation, cumulatively, to every head of a family residing in this state, household goods and personal effects to the value fixed by general law, not less than one thousand dollars, and to every widow or widower or person who is blind or totally and permanently disabled, property to the value fixed by general law not less than five hundred dollars.

(c) Any county or municipality may, for the purpose of its respective tax levy and subject to the provisions of this subsection and general law, grant community and economic development ad valorem tax exemptions to new businesses and expansions of existing businesses, as defined by general law. Such an exemption may be granted only by ordinance of the county or municipality, and only often the electors of the county or municipality voting on Such after the electors of the county or municipality, and only after the electors of the county or municipality voting on such question in a referendum authorize the county or municipality to adopt such ordinances. An exemption so granted shall apply to improvements to real property made by or for the use of a new business and improvements to real property related to the expansion of an existing business and shall also apply to tannible personal of an existing business and shall also apply to tangible personal property of such new business and tangible personal property related to the expansion of an existing business. The amount or limits of the amount of such exemption shall be specified by general law. The period of time for which such exemption may be granted to a new business or expansion of an existing business shall be determined by general law. CIVIL TRAFFIC HEARING OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Courts. -- The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts of appeal, circuit courts and county courts. No other courts may be established by the state, any political subdivision or any municipality. The legislature shall, by general law, divide the state into appellate court districts and judicial circuits following county lines. Commissions established by law, or administrative officers or bodies may be granted quasijudicial power in matters connected with the functions of their offices. The legislature may establish by general law a Civil traffic hearing officer system for the purpose of hearing civil traffic infractions.
