Dictatorial Rowers

Dictatorial powers may be granted President-elect Roosevelt after Marth 4 for the purpose of abolishing unnecessary bureaus and commissions, cutting expenses generally and in short balancing, the budget. Congress is debating the subject today, with the Democrats rather largely in favor of the proposal and the Republicans lined up against it. Recently Col. House wrote an article for These in which he relead the question. "These Americans Liberty in which he asked the question, "Does America Need A Diciator?"

.It is often conceded that the best form of government is a dictatorship provided you have a benevolent dictator. We once heard an Englishman express the same idea somewhat differently when he remarked, "The best form of government is an absolute monarchy tempered with periodic assessinations." The advantage of a dic-tatorship is that if it doesn't work you can eliminate the entire system simply by the removal of one man.

Without a shadow of a doubt a dictatorship has some

redeeming features, even the type of dictatorship which Congress has in mind when it proposes giving sertain dictatorial powers to Mr. Rooseveit. For years Congress has been debating economy and for years expenses have continued to rise. As matters now stand, only Congress can reduce expenses and only Congress can levy taxes. It is becoming increasingly evident that Congress proposes to do neither to the extent which necessity demands.

It seems reasonable enough that Mr. Roosevelt, or any ligent person; it given sufficient powers, could account plish for the federal government the task which is confronting every business man in the country, every housekeeper throughout the land, simply that of making both ends meet. Action DeemedNecessary To Avoid Inevitable Bankruptcy

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.-A plea o the government for serious consideration of the heavy prition either by way of direct or indirect action, advanced by Al-fred Speakman, farmer member for Red Deer, Alberta was greeted with approval in parliament and referred by the government to the Banking and Commerce Committee.
While admitting that the mat-

ter was highly complex and fraught with great difficulties, yet Mr. Speakman felt that further delay in dealing with it would inevitably result in bankruptcy to agriculture and to those of pendent upon that industry.

He pointed out that what was loaned in prosperous times was not money, but rather what montial commodities, potential serv-ice—and suggested that in these days of "public stress" it might be only fair to consider returning to the creditor only the same value in purchasing hower, to-gether with a fair interest.



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


