## Limit On Visitors 'At Wekiwa Park

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Visitors to Wekiwa Springs State Park near Apopka, will be limited to 1,000 a day, Natural Resources Director Randolph Hodges said today.

Hodges said the limit — beginning Saturday — would be enforced to comply with county and state health regulations.

Hodges said since the park opened last July, more than 389,054 persons have visited it, and as many as 5,000 in a single day.

"The park does not have enough sanitary facilities to accommodate the crowds it has been experiencing, and only limited picnicking and parking areas are available."

Wekiwa Springs is located off U.S. 441 four miles from Interstate 4, in central Florida.

This has proven to be a very popular "picnic area" for many residents of Seminole County, especially so with the closing of the former Sanlando Springs.

The choice for spending a pleasant day of outdoor activities had been either the Atlantic Ocean beaches of New Smyrna or Daytona, or many of the lakes which dot the countryside.

Wekiwa Springs was an immediate success where-in on opening day, thousands converged on the scenic spot.

# Peace Plan Is Offered

## Includes Prisoner Release

PARIS (AP) — The Viet Cong submitted a new seven-point peace plan today offering to release all prisoners taken by the Communists in the Vietnam war if the United States agrees to withdraw all its forces by the end of the year.

The plan calls for the gradual release of the prisoners simultaneously with the American withdrawal.

The plan was submitted to the 19th weekly session of the Vietnam peace talks by the Viet Cong foreign minister, Mrs. Nguyen Thi Binh.

Basic conditions for ending the war were unchanged from all previous Communist proposals submitted to the long deadlocked conference. They were total and unconditional withdrawal of all American forces and establishment of a coalition government.

But Mrs. Binh said if the United States agrees to fix a deadline for total withdrawal of all its forces by the end of this year, the Communists will agree on a cease-fire with the withdrawing American forces and to "the liberation of the totality of all soldiers and civilians captured in the war."

The two above mentioned operations the American withdrawal and the liberation of prisoners will begin on the same date and end on the same date, Mrs. Binh said.

She stressed that her proposal included release of the prisoners held by North Vietnam.

The new aspect of her proposal was a flat commitment to match American withdrawal with release of the prisoners, and a timetable for the release procedure geared to the withdrawal of forces.

Previously North Vietnam and the Viet Cong had said that they would negotiate the release of the prisoners after the United States set a date for its final withdrawal.

North Vietnamese negotiator Nuan Thu gave his approval to Mrs. Binh's proposal, saying it "perfectly reflects the entire Vietnamese people's aspirations for peace, independence and national concord. It responds to the interests of both Vietnam and the United States."

Most of Mrs. Binh's seven points were Communist proposals repeatedly rejected by the United States and the South Vietnamese government. They included the removal of President Nguyen Van Thieu and Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky and a permanent ban on all American military aid to South Vietnam.

## With Complaints On Board Staff Writes To Askew

A registered letter listing complaints and grievances against the Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees made by the hospital's medical staff was mailed this morning to Gov.

Reubin Askew at Tallahassee.

This was disclosed by Dr. John Johnson, hospital chief of staff, who advised the letter called for an investigation into the actions of the trustees.

The physician, who is a hospital radiologist, would not dis-

close what the letter contained, explaining he wanted the governor to receive the correspondence before he divulged its contents to the press.

However, the Herald has learned through reliable sources the letter contained a pro-

clamation outlining alleged violations of the hospital bylaws of the trustees and accusations hospital board had violated the so-called "Sunshine Law" which forbids closed or secret meetings of public records.

A cover letter was also included, which was signed by Dr. Johnson, chief of staff and the medical group's secretary. Mentioned also was the situation surrounding the replacement of the hospital's pathologist Dr. Fred Ionata, whose contract expires July 13, and will not be renewed.

Dr. Johnson said today, "The letter hopefully would be in the hands of the governor sometime Friday, before the July 4th holiday." The hospital staff chief pointed out the urgency of the situation as it relates to Dr. Ionata, since his contract expires in two weeks.

The trustees hired Dr. G. V. Garay as Dr. Ionata's successor to head the hospital's pathology department. However, according to Charles Lansing, trustee chairman, this does not mean that Dr. Ionata cannot use the medical facility for pathological purposes; however, the pathology department will be under Dr. Garay's direction.

Previous to the medical staff action that precipitated the letter to Gov. Askew, a number of hospital staff members have indicated they would not use Dr. Garay, but would send their work to Dr. Ionata.

Chairman Lansing Wednesday told The Herald that the trustees are accused of violating the bylaws as they relate to Dr. Garay, since the trustees did not obtain the views of the medical staff before hiring him.

## Angry Uproar At Altamonte Meet

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS—Angry fulminations ensued between Mayor Lawrence Swofford and Byron Kimball yesterday during a public hearing on rezoning which almost didn't get "off the ground," and which saw "wall-to-wall" citizenry at City Council chambers in opposition.

There was a momentary delay in the hearing due to "a little hang-up," according to Swofford, who said that the legal advertisement had been "misplaced." Subsequently it was located for a two acre tract of land located at the Winter Park Telephone Company on Sanford Avenue. The rezoning was requested by Dr. J. W. Hickman for C-2 warehouse to C-3 manufacturing. Initially the request included six other lots, which were later withdrawn by Council.

Dr. Hickman failed to appear in the hearing, and there were no others favoring the rezoning. However, approximately 50 residents were in opposition, and presented a petition to Council representing many others.

Kimball expatiated that the

rezoning had "been a problem before council time and time again" and questioned whether because there was no zoning commission at the time Dr. Hickman's application was filed, council exercised its own prerogative to place the matter for hearing.

Kimball continued that Swofford owned part of one of the blocks (which had been withdrawn) and asked if it were not true that the mayor had a manufacturing plant there which would benefit from the rezoning.

Swofford countered that he did not, and Kimball noted that the matter was "spot zoning." The angry verbiage continued with Kimball insinuating that Swofford intended to "take care" of his property and Swofford retaliating that he was asking "no special favors."

Kimball then delivered the coup-de-grace by stating that the hearing had not been posted in three public places as required, and a legal opinion was requested of City Attorney S. J. Davis. Davis said that there was no problem if council denied the request Kimball suggested that the people be sent

home by the council moving for denial. However Swofford said that if the hearing was not legally posted it would have to be "done again."

According to Kimball the surrounding zoning was R-1AA and that C-3 carried all types of categories which would change the whole nature of the area. He also cited that drainage from the resulting industry would emanate to Lakes Adelaida and Florida.

Swofford told Kimball that when he requested a zoning change for the Water Bennett Company "it was O.K. when you were getting the fee." Swofford maintained that the hearing should be continued.

One citizen who did not identify himself, objected to the garrulous exchange between Swofford and Kimball and told council to "stop beating around the bush." He went on to say that Dr. Hickman did not appear in favor of the rezoning and that, conversely, there were many

## City Council Moves To Establish Board

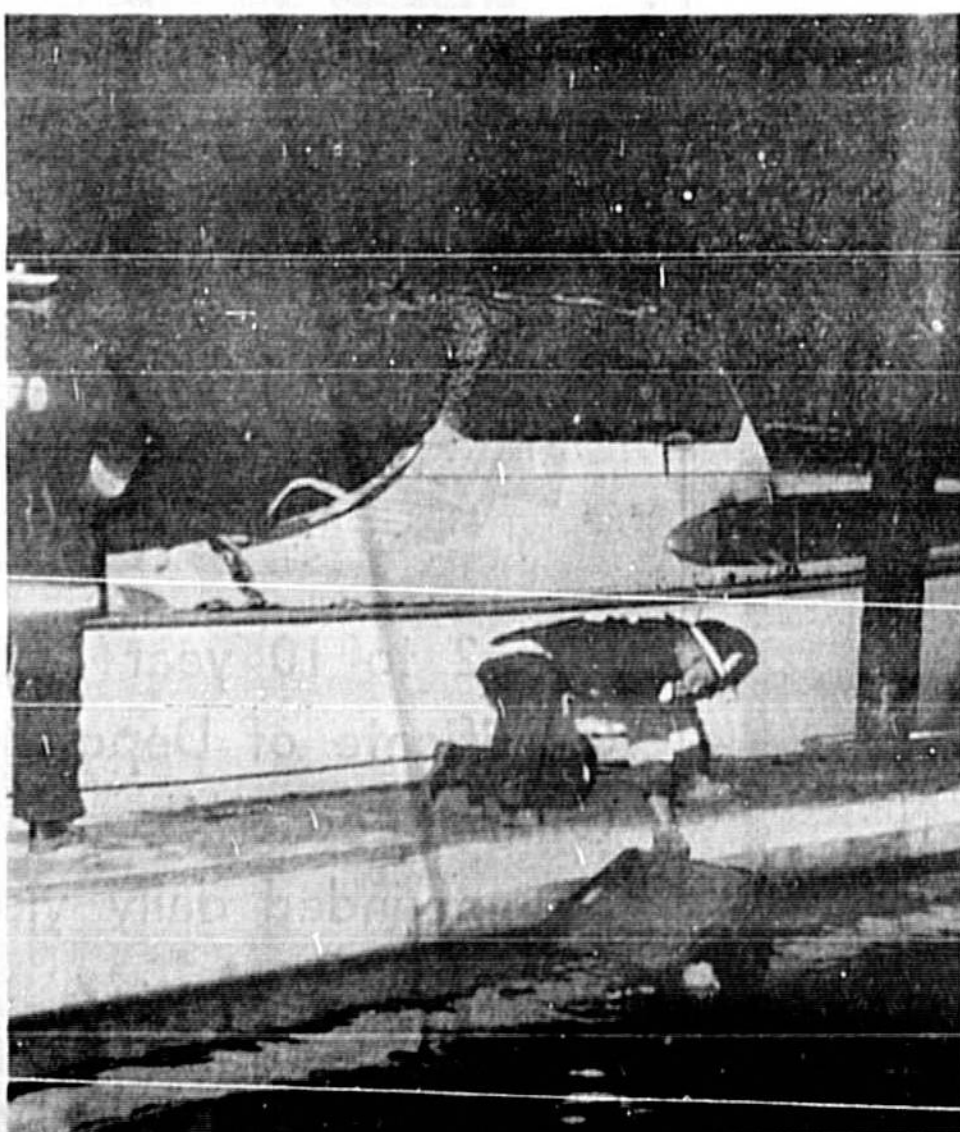
ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Attuned to one of the foremost problems of our time, City Council yesterday moved toward establishment of an environmental and pollution control board by authorizing City Attorney S. J. Davis to draft an ordinance defining the illegal limits of pollution and setting forth penalties.

The matter was brought to the attention of council by Councilman Thomas Radloff, who favors a committee to investigate the problems of pollution of lakes and streams in the municipality. He continued that with the continued annexation which the city has

been experiencing, controls were indicated. Davis noted that the city already had an ordinance governing burning, etc.

Radloff expressed that population density centered around the lakes in the area and that the city should get on the "ground floor" with an environmental control board. Continuing, Radloff noted the problems city was experiencing with zoning matters, in which, he said, inequities were being corrected.

It was suggested a meeting between the pollution control board and the newly appointed zoning board. However, Mayor (Continued on Page 3A, Col. 1)

## Litigation To End? Marina Lease Is Finally Sold

Sale of the marina properties owned by Monroe Harbours Inc., was finally completed Wednesday night in an official with Sperry Rand Inc. of New York. The transfer was made at the Sanford Atlantic Bank to Charles Rockwell, who left immediately for New York, according to Richard Dunning, manager of Cobia Realty Inc., Sanford manufacturer owned by Ashland Oil Company of Kentucky, which also owned the marina dry storage building and other lakefront properties under the name of Monroe Harbours Incorporated. Exact purchase price for the former Monroe Harbours holdings was not disclosed, but it has been reliably reported the amount was in excess of \$250,000. The sale, which was expected to have been completed last Friday, was held up after Rockwell was unable to arrange a \$100,000 loan from the Sanford Atlantic Bank for use in capital improvements and operating expenses, until the Sanford City Commission, in a special Wednesday noon meeting agreed to subordinate the mortgage city-owned land, upon which the marina is situated. Dunning said the sale is effective today, but added that Monroe Harbours Inc., would continue operating the marina until Rockwell's son-in-law Jack Kistmuller, who is vice president and general manager, arrives in mid-July to assume control. The present eight employees working at the marina will be retained by Rockwell, Dunning disclosed. "Mr. Rockwell will seek to get the sunken docks restored and has plans to lay out the west marina harbor for more docks," Dunning added. The Cobia manager said the suit involving Ashland Oil Company and the city over responsibility for restoring the docks, which sank a year ago, will continue unless Rockwell asks that it be dropped. City Attorney W. C. Hutchison said today the city would be agreeable to the dropping of the suit, but stressed there must be some agreement made whereby the docks are restored and operating. The possibility still exists that the city and Rockwell may be able to enter into some agreement whereby an arrangement might be worked out whereby the docks could be restored and expanded under a financing plan which would lumber Rockwell in a long agreement similar to a plan that was almost effected between the city and the former operators, but fell through according to Hutchison, when Ashland Oil Company would not agree.

## Holland Awarded Millwork Bid

School Board has accepted the low \$186,436 bid from Dick Holland Inc., of Orlando for millwork to go in Forest City Elementary and Walter A. Teague Middle Schools. The opening of bids was held Tuesday afternoon at the School Board office, with Eagan Kelly, architect for the two schools. Holland was the only bidder for the project, but there were two letters from other firms indicating they did not wish to bid for the work. Kelly reported the amount bid came within two percent of the costs estimated for the project by him. In another action, the Board sold to the highest bidder an outdated school bus that was considered unfit to carry children. The winning bid was \$277 and it was made in a letter from Dorothy Bowen of North Orlando. Board took action on a recommendation from Supt. John Anzel that shelve plans for a new elementary school to be located on Red Bog Road in South Seminole. Reason for the action, according to Board Chairman A. F. Keith, was the lack of sufficient school construction money coming from the state. Keith said the school was to have been financed on state funds based on the average daily attendance (ADA) basis. What normally would have been an \$800 ADA increase has been cut to \$290, which has the effect of allowing only \$300,000 for the estimated \$700,000 school. Keith stressed this action would have no effect on the other schools now being constructed in the county. In another action and on a motion by Vice Chairman Jean Bryant, the Board approved budget committee's recommendations that provide vocational buildings at Lyman High and Oviedo High Schools at costs of \$37,570 and \$18,785, respectively. A budget committee request for \$71,000 expenditures to provide driving training facilities at Lyman High and Oviedo High and to improve existing driver's range at Seminole High Schools was tabled on a motion by Dr. Stuart Calpepper until more information is known about what monies are being provided in the schools' budget cuts to cuts made by the legislature.

## Altamonte Needs City Clerk Again

ALTAMONTE'S PLYNN S. S. The municipality is currently minus a city clerk, although speculation was that City Council would appoint one at its meeting yesterday. The situation has arisen over the resignation of former clerk, Rodney Laver, who has accepted a position as the county's administrative assistant. Laver was supposed to have been on hand through yesterday's meeting but was conspicuously in absentia. Laver joins the "parade of clerks" which the city has experienced in the last two years, having had five resignations. Mayor Lawrence Swofford declined to discuss an appointment until a later date. In the interim, council approved the appointment of Mrs. Betty Davis as acting clerk. She presently serves as secretary to the mayor and to Supt. of Public Works Donald Bundy. Swofford told council that "we may have a special meeting to appoint a clerk." In another matter, Swofford reported to council upon a recent trip to Atlanta by municipal officials to negotiate bonds for the sewer system. Swofford termed the bond closing successful and said that the officials brought a check for the balance of the \$95,000 loan with them. The grant money, he said, would be paid by requisition later, but that no state funds had been received as yet. The city, he told council, has received an advance of \$123,000 from HUD grant and the bond issue of \$623,000 has been refinanced in Atlanta at the present interest rate. Council authorized the destruction of the redeemed bonds which were literally "chopped up" at the Federal Reserve Bank in Atlanta.

Lawrence Swofford said that the zoning board would meet next week, and he did not see how a simultaneous meeting could be accomplished in this time. Radloff mentioned the continuing zoning problems each week experienced by council and said that area residents feel that council is encroaching upon their property. He stressed that tight zoning regulations were needed and that the zoning board was a good idea because it was "insulated" from the day to day problems experienced by council. Mayor Swofford countered that 95 per cent of the city would be unaffected in zoning matters, but Councilman Dan Dorfman cited that the remaining five per cent is the "most controversial you'll see." Council then authorized Davis to prepare procedures for the zoning board to follow. Swofford requested that the attorney also be authorized to draft an "updated" sign ordinance, which is most comprehensive. Swofford disagreed and said that large billboard advertisers were not expressly covered. Council voted against the matter, with Swofford voting the lone affirmative. Council said that "other things are more important at 6 1/2 a page."

State Running On Credit  
**California Budget Unapproved**

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The State of California was a poorer power today—one of the world's richest governments without legal authority to spend a penny, asking its 18,000,000 employees to work as volunteers. It happened at the stroke of midnight, when the state entered the new fiscal year without a budget for 1971-72. The state continued to run on credit and good faith while a legislative budget committee of four Democrats and two Republicans worked in closed session on a compromise \$7 billion plus budget to send to Republican Gov. Ronald Reagan. Reagan originally proposed an austerity spending plan of \$6.74 billion. He threatened late Wednesday to slash as much as \$600 million from the spending document when he gets it. The conference committee's compromise budget must get a two-thirds vote in each house of the Democratic-controlled legislature before going to the governor. On 6 April, 1964 you published General of the Army Douglas MacArthur's Farewell address to the Corps of Cadets at the U.S. Military Academy, West Point. His effort, as a military leader, to alert the Country and guide his subordinates sounded a clear, clean bugle call with notes of DUTY — HONOR — COUNTRY.

Would it not do the same today?

General MacArthur foresaw today's needs of LEADERSHIP: The above words provide a rallying point to instill courage and hope. They build the character of the custodians of our nation's defense and teach them to be officers and gentlemen.

LOYALTY: The code those words perpetuate: "It is the story of the American man-at-arms. His name and fame are the birthright of every American citizen."

UNITY: An indivisible nation we will rise or fall as such. Our captains, civilians and military, hold this destiny in their hands and nothing sustains them like Divine guidance.

WINNING: Is the fixed, determined and inviolable mission of the profession of arms. Let civilians argue process of government, deficit spending, federal paternalism etc. the soldier knows there is no substitute for victory.

For hundreds who scoff at these words, the General knew that legion held them high — on land, at sea and in the air.

I commend, for your consideration, a 4th of July, 1971 page carrying General of the Army Douglas MacArthur's Message.

## Early 'Scoop' Damages Hunt

Sheriff John Polk has accused an Orlando newspaper story of hampering an investigation by the sheriff's department into the reported attempt by narcotic racketeers to make a "drop" at the Osceola Airfield, now being used by the county for a landfill.

The premature disclosure by the newspaper story, which told of an attempt by a twin-engine aircraft to transfer drugs believed to have been flown in from off-shore islands to a camper type truck, was hampered earlier when the County Road Department called the sheriff's office to report the bizarre happenings involving the camper and airplane and the report was "snafued" in the dispatcher's office.

According to Polk, who issued a written statement on the situation today at "approximately 12:35 p.m. Wednesday, my office received a call from the County Road Department stating that a camper type truck had been on the Osceola Airfield and had left in a hurry.

"A few minutes later, a second call came in stating that an airplane has landed and taken off after meeting the truck. The Osceola Airfield is closed and for a plane to land there under these circumstances, is certainly reasonable grounds for suspicion of illegal activity."

Polk said he was not aware as to the amount of time that elapsed between the truck leaving and the call received by his office, but said he had investigated as to why cars were not dispatched.

The sheriff said disciplinary action had taken place, but would have been taken regardless of the incident at Osceola Airfield, but in any situation a citizen requests help and a car is not dispatched.

"I feel that the story in the Orlando newspaper has hampered our investigation, but an investigation by my department into the airplane landing at the airfield is continuing," Polk added.

(The Sanford Herald was aware of the incident, but at the request of the sheriff declined to reveal any particulars allowing the drug drop to occur, thus allowing the arrests of the sellers and smugglers of the narcotics.)

## Teachers Will Give Up Raise So New School Can Be Built

William (Bud) Leyer, Milwee Middle School principal and member of the school budget committee, now involved in the task of selecting priorities for a school building for the 1971-72 school budget, at this morning's budget committee hearings, disclosed that the school teachers in the county would be willing to eliminate their request for a pay raise this year.

Leyer, who is a member of the Sanford Education Association (SEA) teacher union, said the teachers' raise, which has already been tentatively approved by the budget committee could be eliminated if ways could be found to pare down other budget requests to allow for the construction of the Red Bug Road Elementary School, which was shelved by architects after the School Board agreed with Supt. John Angel there was a lack of sufficient funds to construct the \$700,000 facility in South Seminole.

School budget committee composed primarily of SEA members had previously approved the pay raise for teachers which would cost \$310,000 and raise the beginning teacher index from \$8,300 to \$8,400 a year.

Leyer, who spoke for the pay increase at previous budget committee sessions, this morning said he thought enough money could be found by eliminating certain budget items to allow for the construction of the much-needed school.

Leyer said there were some budget items that could be reduced or put off and he mentioned \$100,000 allotted for purchasing new school sites; \$700,000 for new driver educational ranges as new programs that could be postponed for another year.

School Board Chairman A. F. Keith, who was the lone budget committee member to vote against the pay increase, told Leyer "I appreciate your most generous offer, but I believe we have made real progress in spending money in much needed areas of the county."

Keith added it was not just a problem of a much-needed school, but felt "we must weigh the progress we have made." He added he did not think it would be possible to weed-out that much money.

The budget committee voted to accept the motion by Leyer to go over the budget for possible cuts. A list is being made where possible cuts can be made, but today, no actual budget slashing was made in 11 areas.

## Bernovich Indicted By Grand Jury

Dennis L. Bernovich, 26, 512 Myrtle Avenue was indicted by a Seminole County grand jury Thursday charged with the rape of a 19 year old Sanford girl on May 2.

Testimony was given yesterday by the victim, her mother, Sgt. William Lykens, Sanford detective, and a man who entered the home as the rape was in progress.

According to Sanford detectives, the discovery of several suspicious articles in a car belonging to Bernovich led to his arrest.
