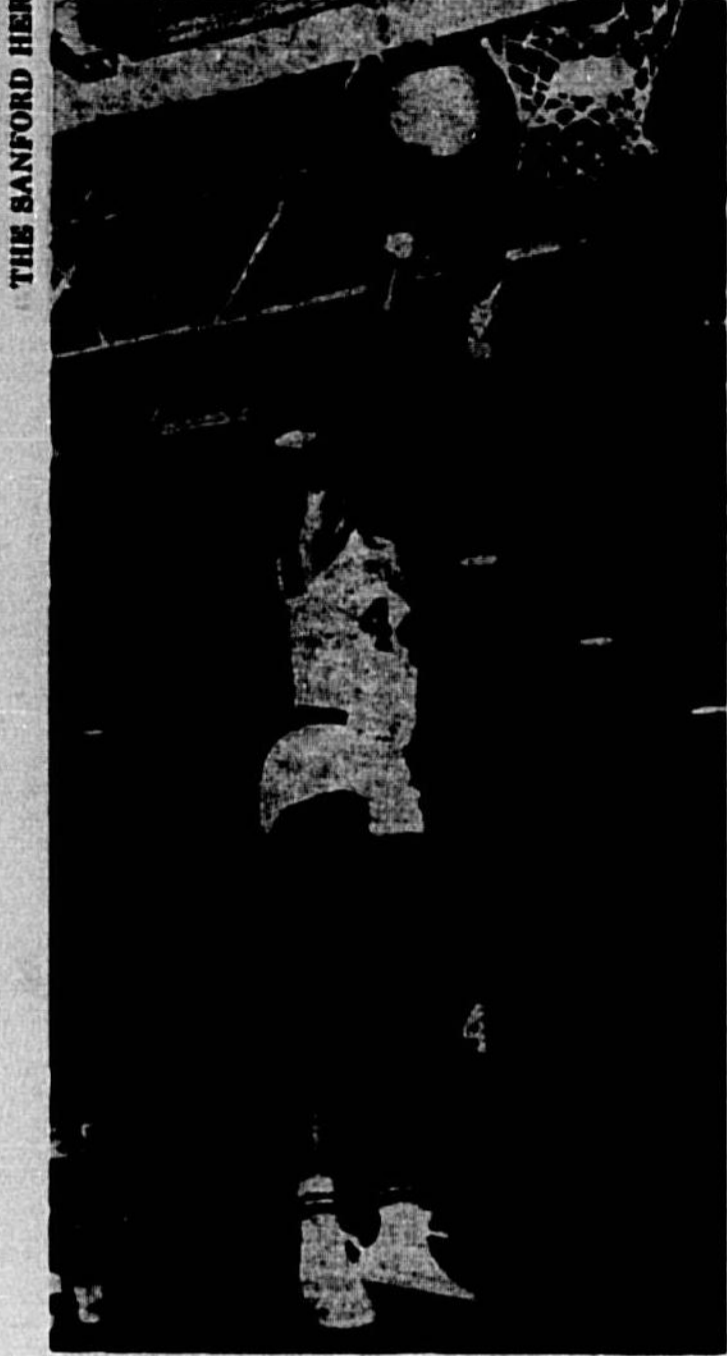
# Seminole JC; Our Pick For Fla. Champions

Coach Joe Stirling of the Raiders liked what he saw in the SJC team west through their warm-up games. Every player is in top physical condition for today's contest and the Raiders will match their sensational 24-5 mark against St. Petersburg's excellent 18-5 team.

St. Petersburg also arrived here yesterday and had a closed practice session. Raider Coach Stirling is watching the St. Pete squad closely, especially St. Petersburg's top forward Jerry Boggs, who is averaging 22 points per outing. Boggs led the West Coast team this season in scoring and the

## Montreal's Still In The Driver's Seat

Boston's nagging National Hockey League slump may be over but Montreal still is in the driver's seat in the East Division race.

The Canadiens, who took over the East lead while the Bruins were dropping four straight games, won their ninth in the last 11 starts Wednesday night with a convincing 7-2 drubbing of Detroit.

Montreal, meanwhile, rallied for three third-period goals to top Los Angeles 4-2 and end their losing streak. The runner-up Bruins trail Montreal by four points in the East race.

In other games, Wednesday, New York ripped Chicago 5-3, Toronto took St. Louis 3-2 and Oakland outlasted Minnesota 5-3.

The Canadiens rattled the Red Wings with five goals in the first period—three of them within a span of 40 seconds. John Ferguson's 22nd goal of the year started the Canadiens off and then Henri Richard, Dick Duff and Yvan Cournoyer hit the first three goals.

Richard had two goals and an assist and Jean Beliveau checked up three assists for the surging Canadiens.

Detroit dipped into fourth place in the East behind the Rangers, who lost two goals from defenseman Arnie Brown and showered Chicago's Denis DeJordy with 54 shots.

Rookie center Walt Tkaczuk assisted on four goals and the Rangers extended their home ice unbeaten string to 12 games. Bobby Hull had his third goal of the season and assisted on two others by Eric Nesteren.

"Last year's team was the greatest college team ever," he says. "He scored in every event in the NCAA meet at Dartmouth."

The Seminoles had excellent opportunity in the bottom of the sixth when they had men on second and third base and nobody out and later the same inning when they had the base loaded and only one man out. The Seminoles managed to score only one run to leave them behind 4-2.

### Herd Of Wild Mustangs Marooned

SANFORD, Fla. (AP) — A helicopter lift has gone into action in an effort to move a herd of 30 wild mustangs marooned on a wind-swept ridge east of Lake Wales.

"We had everything we could get about 20 mustangs," said pilot Byron Clark after the first flight Wednesday.

"We were on a tight schedule and had to leave," he said. "We'll go back Thursday and see if they are."

A sheriff's posse and sportsmen's club got together with helicopter service from 24

Counties to provide the lift by helicopter at a cost of \$10 per flying hour.

Counties estimated there were 20 to 30 wild mustangs marooned along a 30-mile ridge on the 3,500-foot Pine Ridge mountain.

"They're up to their necks in snow. They haven't got any food and they're down to skin and bone," he said.

Clark said he set down eight among the wild horses. "The stronger, mean ones went from the ridge, but some went from hunger, stayed only about 20 feet away."

"One group of three with a

colt were too tired to go any where," he said.

While some swept the ridge almost bare, a variety of crows saved the leaves to high ground, giving up double-deep snow which eventually trapped them on the rocky ridge with only a few tufts of grass to eat.

The posse, sportsmen and local ranchers will try to break a trail for the mustangs to walk down, but the lift was organized when it appeared they might starve first.

State law protects the wild horses, even hunted by air and ground vehicles for dog food.

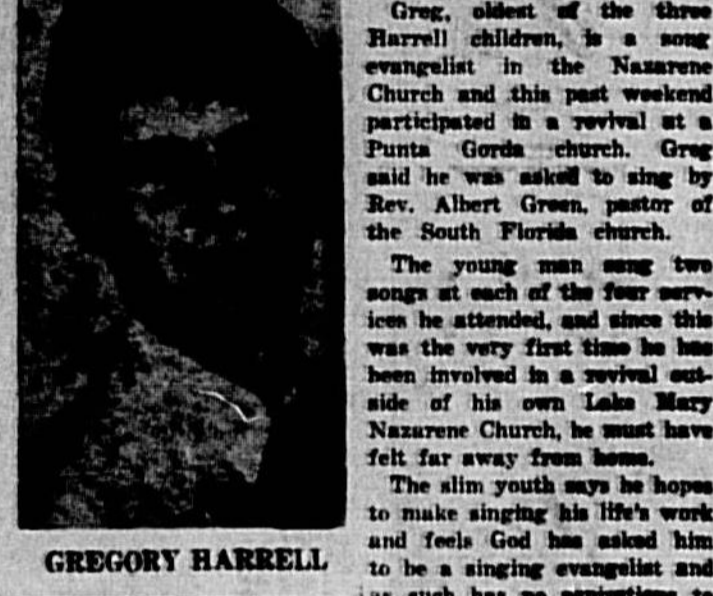
The slim youth says he hopes to make singing his life's work and feels God has called him to be a singing evangelist and as such has no aspirations to become a minister.

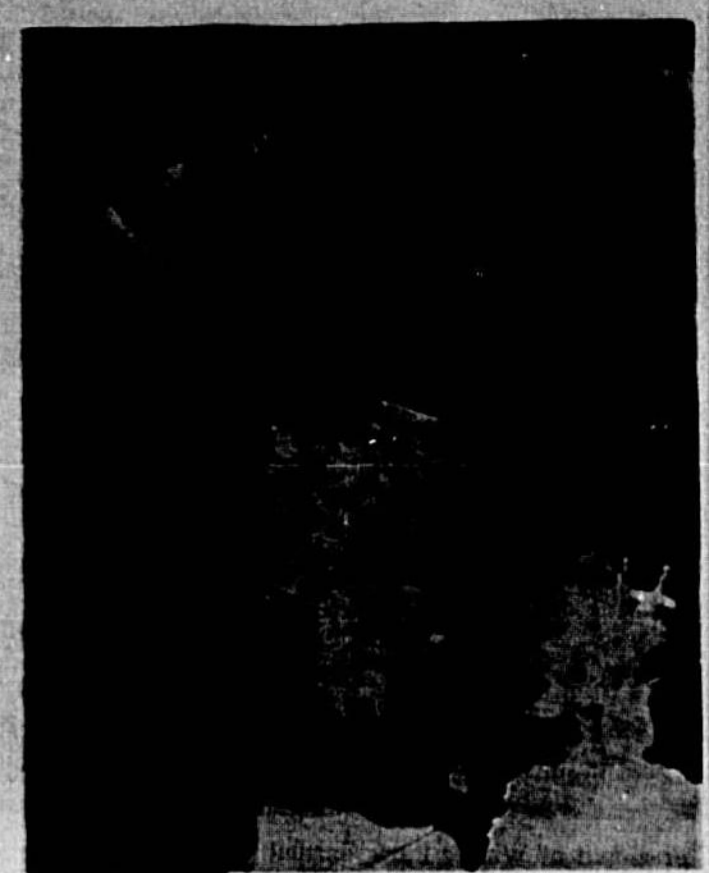

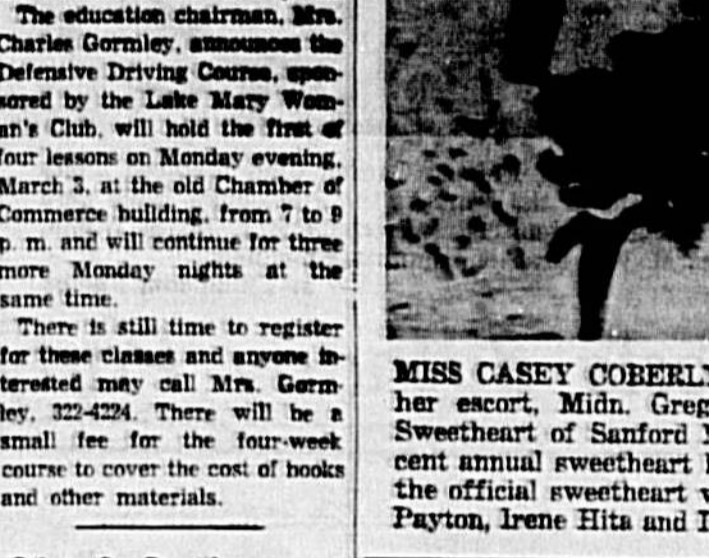

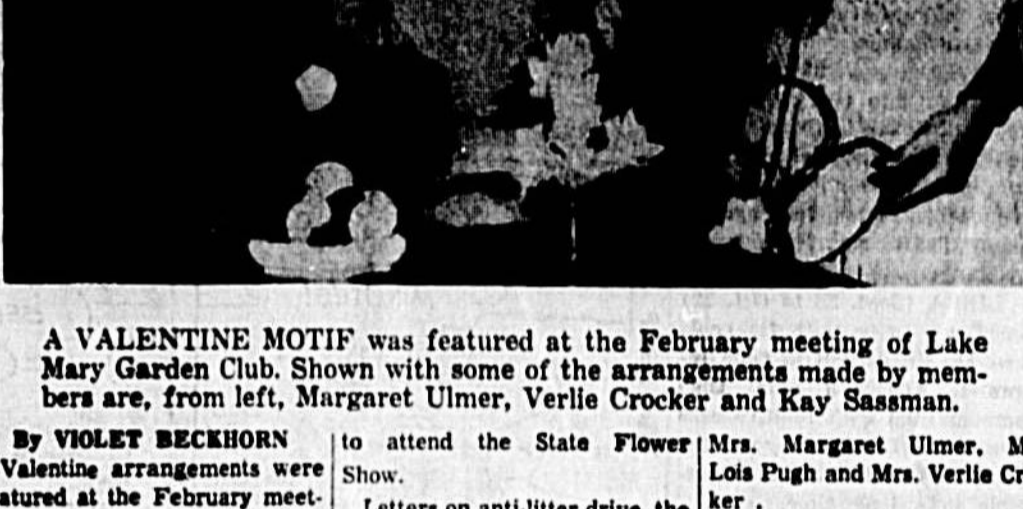

# Sanford-Orlando 'Phone Service Aired'

If there is to be any toll-free Sanford to Orlando telephone service within the near future it will probably be in the form of an optional measured service like that being studied by Bell Telephone Company in an experimental operation in Brevard County between Theville and East Galie.

This was the gist of an hour discussion of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce's projects committee meeting with telephone officials from Sanford and Orlando held at the Chamber's conference room.

Robert Shelden and William Armadon of Sanford and Orlando explained the telephone company's position regarding the chambers wish to initiate a local calling function between the two cities.

Shelden informed the ratio between the two cities is presently two calls per customer per month, and indicated the ratio should be higher for the phone company to consider the elimination of the 30 cents a call toll from Sanford to Orlando.

The proposed option measured operation would increase the monthly charges of those persons wanting to use the service approximately \$3 for residence and \$5 for business.

Shelden estimated the cost to Sanford of putting in an extended toll-free service to all 13,000 Sanford subscribers would be in the neighborhood of \$1 million and would mean an increase in the telephone rates charged all Sanford customers.

The optional measured service would not mean an overall rate increase, but would result in increased costs to those desiring the service, Armadon said.

Shelden said the telephone company would like to have more time to study the extended toll-free service and mentioned the possible installation of the optional measured service.
