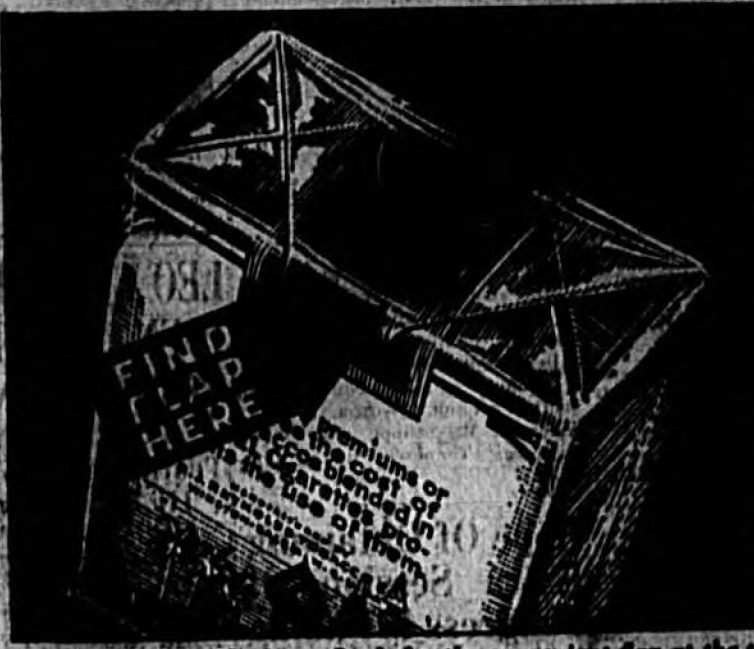

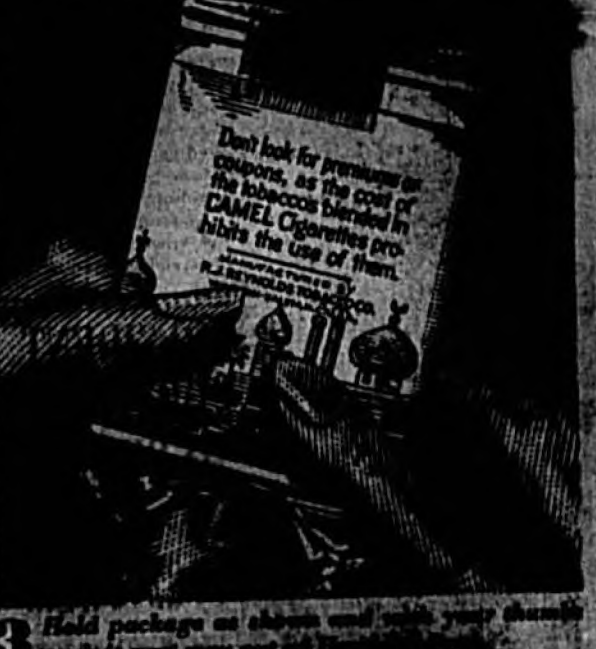

**COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AND SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS NOMINATED BY COURTS AND LARGE WITH FOUR-YEAR TERMS**

There has not been the desired efficiency and economy in the operation of county governments all over the state. The boards having most to do with the cost of county government are the board of county commissioners and the board of public instruction. In most of the counties of the state, the members of these boards are nominated from and by the electors of the respective districts, and the term of office has only been two years. There is a division of opinion as to whether or not the interest of the county is best served by the system of nominating these officers from the districts by the electors of the districts, instead of by the electors of the county as a whole.

The county commissioners are to be a county commissioner, and not the district commissioner. The same can be said with reference to members of the school board. It will also be observed that a member of one of these boards is nominated in June, elected in November, and takes his office in January. For a considerable portion of the first fiscal year he serves, he must operate under a budget prepared by the former board, and already largely expended. He is a member of the board many months before he begins to operate under the budget with which he had authority to do so.

The temptation of a trade or district advantage would be great. Such a system is not likely to lead to good government. There has been a feeling throughout the state that if these officers were nominated from and by the voters of the county as a whole, and if the term of office were increased from two to four years, the county government would be more efficient and probably better men would offer for the places.

The primary aim and objective is to present a program to bring about a measure of tax relief at the present time. However, we should like to look to the future. We believe that an income tax is the greatest one which can be imposed upon those who are able to pay, and that the greatest benefit from the government. We therefore propose and recommend a constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to levy an income tax effective three years after the adoption of such amendment.

(Continued from Page One) The use of the new refrigerator cars, which carried perishable fruits and vegetables to markets, has been reported. Officials of the North American Car Corporation then constructed refrigerator equipment which was installed in a standard size car, and was successful in their first shipment. Since then five cars have been constructed similar to the first one, and they are being used in various sections of the country. In February, a carload of Florida oranges was shipped north, and what was said to be a successful practical demonstration. Officials of the car company prevailed upon American Fruit Growers to accept the car, and the celery was loaded this morning and will leave for Chicago tonight, the first ever to be shipped in this type.

They found at St. Thomas an expectation of more federal help with the advent of Civilian Gov. Paul M. Pearson, who is addressing himself to improving the tax system and, in other ways of increasing revenues. The President remained in his cabin during the morning drill in which the port side guns were trained on the destroyer Dupont seven miles away. The 14-inchers swung easily around and tilted at various angles but no firing was done. Mr. Hoover walked the quarter deck alone and with friends saw-

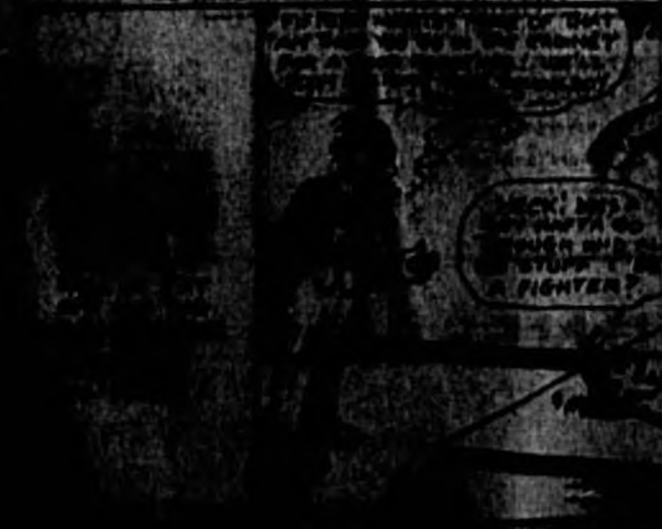
