Morris remains chairman of county commission

SANFORD - For the third time in his four years on the Board of Seminole County Commissioners, Randy Morris has been selected to be the group's chairman. Win Adams was chosen as vice chairman at the BCC meeting on Tuesday.

The reorganization of the board was the opening feature of the session, officiated by County Attorney Robert McMillan. Commissioner Grant Maloy began the nominations by suggesting Daryl McLain be the chairman for 1997-98.

"That would be a great honor," McLain said, "but it wouldn't be possible." McLain explained that his insurance business in Sanford kept him too busy to make the necessary appearances and extra duties required by the chairman.

Maloy tried again by suggesting Dick Van Der Weide.

"Sorry," said Van Der Weide. "I've got three part-time jobs that keep me busy."

Why not Randy Morris, suggested McLain.

The vote was, 3-2 for Morris. Van Der Weide and Maloy opposed.

A 4-1 vote gave Adams the vice chairman's position. Van Der Weide opposing, Morris made the nomination.

Being selected chairman three times put Morris in the select company with few other county commissioners. The late Bob Sturm, elected to four terms, was chairman six times and vice chairman five times.

Morris, 42, considered Sturm to be "a father figure, friend, true public servant."

In accepting the chairman's position, Morris asked for the commissioners Tuesday to allow County Manager Gary Kaiser and himself to open talks with Time Warner concerning government cable TV programming.

Van Der Weide said he wouldn't support this effort. "It isn't necessary."

The 4-1 consensus to move forward was not an official vote - merely approval for Kaiser and Morris to investigate. A formal vote would have to be taken when there was a proposal in hand. "How much will it cost is the big question," Adams said.

Cops bust tri-county drug ring

SANFORD - Seven Sanford residents Tuesday were arrested in what law enforcement said was a tri-county drug ring.

The City/County Investigative Bureau (CCIB) in association with the Drug Enforcement Administration, the Sanford Police Department, the Volusia County Sheriff's Office, and the Altamonte Springs Police Department carried out six search warrants and seven arrest warrants in Seminole County alone. The Lake County Sheriff's Office and the Metropolitan Bureau of Investigations each served one search warrant and one arrest warrant respectively in Lake and Orange counties. All accused are in custody.

At about 7 a.m., CCIB finished "Operation Country", a four month investigation targeting an organization responsible for the illegal diversion

Is Lake Mary cafe burglary connected to others?

LAKE MARY - The Cafe Sorrento at 227 N. Country Club Rd. in Lake Mary was the target of a burglary Monday resulting in a broken front door and a stolen cash register.

According to Captain Sam Belfiore of the Lake Mary Police Department the burglary occurred after the restaurant closed sometime between 10 p.m. and 9 a.m. the next day.

"Someone took a brick and threw it through the front door," Belfiore said. "As far as I know the only thing they left with was the cash register."

Joyanna Rebekah Argeny, owner of the restaurant since March, said Cafe Sorrento, which originally opened in 1978, "had never been broken into."

Argeny said the cash register, valued at about \$1,500, contained \$700 in cash receipts. The broken window in the front door cost about \$200, she said.

"I hope they catch them," Argeny said. "I'm just glad nobody was here to get hurt when this happened."

After getting over the initial shock, Argeny said she learned that two other nearby businesses were broken into the same way.

"If I would have known about these burglaries I never would have left the money," she said.

Detective Camiel Long, who is investigating the case, said there have been other similar burglaries in the county with

School has head lice under control

SANFORD - About 70 Pine Crest Elementary School students sent home last week with head lice have returned to school.

Although head lice in school children is not unusual, the number of cases was relatively high for the 900-student campus, said Pine Crest principal Barry Liebovitz.

"This is the worse case we have had in a long time," Liebovitz said, adding that the problem was under control.

Head lice are non-threatening parasites that lay eggs, called nits, in the hair.

Once spotted the nits must be treated and removed and the entire home must be thoroughly cleaned and vacuumed.

One remedy suggested by Liebovitz is to place a couple of handfuls of Vaseline on the head and cover it with a shower cap overnight. This suffocates the head lice and the nits falls off. The remedy was suggested in Parenting magazine, Liebovitz said, adding "It's a huge mess, but it works."

Liebovitz said his staff is on top of the situation and checks kids regularly. All surfaces are sprayed and the classrooms are vacuumed.

What if the Pilgrims had really landed at New Smyrna Beach...

GENEVA - What if the Pilgrims had landed at New Smyrna Beach? How different would things have been on holiday we celebrate as Thanksgiving?

Every school child learns of the plight of the Pilgrims of Plymouth Rock, who came to the New World seeking religious freedom in the early 1600s. They are taught that

without the help of friendly Indians, all might have perished because of poor and inadequate food supplies and changeable weather.

Could they have done better in the land of sunshine? And what about the Indians that befriended the pilgrims and taught them how to fertilize their crops of corn, pumpkins and beans with fish? Who would have helped the Florida settlers?

Possibly the Timucua. A

tribe of people that dated back to pre-history, the Timucua inhabited Florida and southeast Georgia for thousands of years before European contact, said Andrea Kerlinger, a living history demonstrator. Kerlinger has made it her life's work to tell the story of the little-known culture of the tribes that pre-dated the Seminole Indians.

The Timucua were among the six major tribes of the

an attraction in Tomorrowland, Disney World. Now, he helps update the 1961 Disney film *The Absent-Minded Professor* renamed *Flubber* (Two stars).

Williams plays Professor Phillip Brainard — get it? brain-nerd — who would forget his face if it were not attached firmly to front of his head. He can't even remember his marriage to his love Sara (Marcia Gay Harden) as it is their third try when the film starts. Instead, Brainard hopes to make a successful compound that will put his dwindling college back on its feet.

Actually, the formula is in the film. The professor has the heart of gold and the mind of a senile. His intentions are good and then there are the baddies waiting to wield their corrupt plans and steal Brainard's flubber, an animated green blob with a mind of its own.

The flubber looks like a green schmoo, an old cartoon character from Hanna-Barbera. In the 1961 film, it laid limp although it was ani-

dated. In the new movie — thanks to CG wizards — it's mischievous, funny and a provider of a great musical number in the mid point of the film.

The other difference in the update is that Fred MacMurrary's dog is now a flying feminine robot named WEEBO, a "batteries not included" hold over.

Basically, this film is a no-Brainard that makes Williams — believe it or not — unfunny and delivers a bread and water story. Unfortunately, Jim Carrey was not available for the film. *Flubber* requires a more visual comic presence even more so than what Williams can provide. Putting the master comedian in this type of film makes me wonder how steady and long this new alliance will be.

Alien Resurrection (No stars)? How about *Alien Deceased*? The series should have ended after James Cameron's *Aliens* when the series was on a high. Now, after the debacle *Alien 3*, we have the sequel that should finally close

the chapter on this ultimately unsatisfying series.

Sigourney Weaver reprises her role as the alien-tormented Ripley, who we thought expired with the series in the second sequel. No, they had to bring her back, and now, she is some kind of genetic experiment — a hybrid cross between human and alien. Give me a break! Play on the current curiosity and anxiety of cloning and mix it with the horror and conflicts of the *Alien* movies and you get one dreadful goulash.

Directed by Jean-Pierre Jeunet, who is a visually adept filmmaker with such eye popping flicks as *The City of Lost Children*. He is not given much latitude to apply his style here. It is basically a film where the characters go from point A to point B trying not to get gored by the aliens in-between.

Watching a documentary pocket lint may be more appealing than seeing *Alien Resurrection*, a movie that shows that in "dead" space you can hear you scream.

Carbon monoxide killed two men found on boat

SANFORD - The Seminole County Medical Examiner came back with the findings Tuesday on the two dead men found on a boat off the St. John's River. "It was carbon monoxide poisoning," said Seminole County Sheriff's Office spokesman Ed McDonough.

Patrick McKinnon, 33, of 793 Cranes Court, Maitland, and Clark Cable, 36, of 762 Rosemere Circle, Orlando, were found Monday on a

boat owned by McKinnon. When Sheriff's Office Range and Water Unit found the boat, it was listing and the generator was not working. The 29-foot cabin cruiser was moored in a cove about three miles northwest of Sanford. McKinnon's wife reported him missing to the Sheriff's Office at 2 a.m. Monday morning after he failed to return from a boat trip.

"When I asked some marine industry people, they said this is not the first time this [carbon monoxide poisoning] has happened," said Chief Deputy Steve Harriett of the Sheriff's Office on Tuesday.

pected of being the mastermind behind the ring. "He was the broker," said CCIB Agent Ed Allen.

According to agents, pharmaceutical drugs were obtained through, in most cases, legal means and then would funnel to Ganas, who would allegedly distribute them to whomever wanted them. "CCIB agents compared his store to an Eckerd Drugs," said Agent Sammy Gibson when speaking of the volume of sales and product within Ganas' store. Gibson said some of the individuals who sold the drugs to Ganas had legitimate illnesses and obtained the medication through legitimate means. Others would write false prescriptions or claim fake illnesses to get the drugs.

At a press conference held Tuesday, agents and Seminole County Sheriff's Office officials displayed their find. Most of the prescriptions and tablets presented were from various big chain pharmacies, and others came from smaller pharmacies spanning as local as Sanford to as far as Daytona Beach, for example. One bag even included seized prescription scrips and official medical papers. A certain amount of evidence was seized from each of the individuals involved in the ring.

Gibson said that most of the drugs are pain killers or "synthetic narcotics." Allen

said that most of the medication is used in the case of terminally ill patients with ailments like cancer, for instance. The agents said that those abusing the medication could grow dependent and easily addicted. Allen also said that the high from the drugs can cause a numbing effect, induce sleep and, generally, slow down the central nervous system. Street price for the drugs could range from \$3 to \$10 a tablet.

The investigation and arrests came after numerous complaints were called into CCIB and other agencies. Members from one family had gone bankrupt trying to support their habits with drugs attained through the ring, according to Allen. Through surveillance and informants, CCIB was able to gather enough information and evidence to make the bust.

CCIB agents said that this is the first round of arrests and there may be more forthcoming as the scope of the investigation widens to include pharmacies and doctors.

The others who were arrested include: Phillip Norris, 37, of 2792 Bailey Avenue, Sanford; Ron Green, 44, of 2447 Sanford Avenue, Sanford; Violet Parlier, 65, of 407 Mattie Street, Sanford; Georgeanne Nussbaumer, of 1115 Buttercup Lane, Orlando; Robin Stenstrom, of 24149 Adair Avenue, Mt. Plymouth; Henry Dykeman, 46, of 711 East Airport Boulevard,

Sanford; Sheila Lambert, 44, of 118 Fairway Drive, Sanford; and Vicki Jernigan, 33, of 449 Sand Cove Drive, Sanford. All those from Seminole County were to have made their initial court appearance at 1:30 p.m. today. Nussbaumer was booked into the Orange County Jail, and Stenstrom was booked into the Lake County Jail. Nussbaumer and Stenstrom will be transferred to Seminole County after making their initial appearances in their respective counties.

Each person is being held without bond. Chief Deputy Steve Harriett of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office said that the minimum penalty for this offense is 25 years in prison.

"I'm all for open government, but what will it cost?" Adams, for one, was convinced the board took appropriate action later in Tuesday's meeting when it ranked Deloitte & Touche over two other firms for a contract to do auditing services for the county.

The Orlando firm has served the county for the past six years.

"If you have a family doctor that you like, you don't change physicians just for the sake of change," Adams said. "It's the same way with auditors. How often do you see a Fortune 500 company change auditors. It isn't done unless there has been troubles. Seminole County has been well served by Deloitte & Touche."

Four of the commissioners gave the nod to Deloitte & Touche. Maloy choose KPMG Paet Marick of Orlando.

Senior planner Tony Mathews presented an interlocal planning coordination agreement to serve the seven cities and School Board, along with interlocal agreements for annexations with the cities of Altamonte Springs and Winter Park. Each passed, 5-0.

An error advertising the public hearings on proposed sites for adult entertainment establishments caused cancellation of a Dec. 2 public hearing. The initial public meeting will take place on Dec. 16, and a second on Jan. 13, 1998.

Awards and presentations on Tuesday included recognition of All Souls Catholic Church for 110 years in Sanford and a goodbye to Jean Hendrickson, who is retiring from the county after 19 years of service. Hendrickson was senior secretary in the Solid Waste Division of Public Works.

In an informal vote of his peers, Daryl McLain was voted the most nattily attired. His fall outfit also served him well in the Arctic-like temperature of the BCC Chambers Room.

McLain added one more explanation about why he didn't really covet the chairman's position. "I would have had to change chairs with Randy Morris," he said. "I like where I've been." - on the far right of the commission as seen by those looking at the board.

Thanksgiving: More than a holiday

Less than a year after the Plymouth colonists settled in the new land, the first American Thanksgiving was celebrated. The first winter was a dreadful, deadly one killing almost half of the colonists. Things looked up in the summer of 1621 with a bumper crop of corn harvest, after which Governor William Bradford decreed a three-day feast to be held. "The first Thanksgiving Day, set aside for the special purpose of prayer as well as celebration, was decreed by Governor Bradford for July 30, 1663" World Book Encyclopedia, Vol. 18).

In 1789, President George Washington issued a proclamation for a day of thanks; however, there was no regular day of the celebration of Thanksgiving until President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday of November 1863 as "a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father (Ibid)." Congress ruled in 1941 that this day be made a legal federal holiday.

Thanksgiving is more than a holiday!

For many people, Thanksgiving begins with turkey, dressing and cranberry sauce and ends when the favorite football team has won

or lost, after which, family and friends - who have abounded in food and fellowship - "waddle" to their homes for a good night's rest!

"If asked to list Thanksgiving traditions, many people would think of turkey, cranberries and Pilgrims but omit grateful prayers and worship services - an ironic situation for a holiday conceived by pious people as an opportunity for prayer, but a true reflection of modern attitudes. Americans know far more about the ship on which the Pilgrims sailed, the food they ate, and the clothes they wore than about the way they worshipped?" (Diana Appelbaum, *Thanksgiving: An American Holiday, An American History*).

Following the Civil War which left many people, if not all, with sparse blessings, it is recorded that some people remembered words from the *First McGuffey Reader* of their early school years which called them back to the faith: "You ask your parents for food, and drink, and books, and clothes, and when they give you these things, you thank them, and love them for the good they do you. So you should ask your God for those things which He can give you, and no one else can give you."

"I do, therefore, invite my fellow citizens, in every part of the United States, and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday in November next as a day of Thanksgiving praise to our beneficent Father who dwells in the heavens." Abraham Lincoln

Carlson hangs up whistle at Oviedo

SANFORD - After 25 years, the only person to coach girls' volleyball at Oviedo High School is stepping down.

Antia Carlson has decided to stop coaching, although the decision wasn't an easy one. "Eleven seniors are graduating from the team this year," Carlson explained.

It won't be easy for Carlson to turn her team over. Since girls' volleyball started in Florida's high schools in 1974, which was the same year female basketball and softball came in, Carlson has been involved with the program.

Her days at Oviedo High School actually began in 1969, when she was hired as a Physical Education teacher and the cheerleading sponsor.

Carlson was raised in Ohio and attended high school in California, where she played basketball before attending private school where there were no extracurricular activities.

"I have always loved activity, not being confined like in a classroom," Carlson said. "And I've always loved working with kids. I never thought I would actually coach a sport, though. That's not where my experience was."

By the time she graduated from college, Carlson's parents were living in Florida. So she moved to the Sunshine State and landed a job at the then fairly new Oviedo High School. Five years later, she was recruited to coach one of the new girls' sports.

That's when she fell in love with her new role and her new sport.

Lucy McDaniel, head volleyball coach for the University of Central Florida, brought her team to the Oviedo gym to practice and Carlson began learning.

Between McDaniel's help, Carlson's desire to learn and more than a little natural coaching ability, the volleyball program at Oviedo has been a very successful one.

With an overall record of 430-115, Carlson has taken her teams to 11 Seminole Athletic Conference championships. In district competition, her teams hold the record for the most consecutive titles with 10, earned from 1981 to 1990.

In the early '80s, Carlson also coached tennis for two years. She is a big tennis player and enjoyed pulling the double duty.

Burn out has never been a factor to this coach. Carlson said that she has been so lucky to truly enjoy what she's been doing.

What is Carlson going to do with all of her spare time now that she will no longer be coaching?

"Everyone asks me that," she said. "I'm still going to teach for at least another year. And I'm going to have to slowly wean myself from volleyball, so I intend to still attend the games...now from the stands."

After all of the years, Carlson said that the most wonderful thing she will take away from coaching will be the kids. After all, that's what coaching is all about.

The mark that Carlson has left on both Oviedo High School and Seminole County will not soon be forgotten. She was a much admired and respected staple in the volleyball community and she will surely be missed a great deal.

If anyone starts to miss Carlson too much, however, simply look into the stands...she'll be there, supporting and encouraging the program that she built from scratch.

In addition to Crawford, also scoring double figures for the Patriots were Patrice Sims (21 points), Tiaunna Briggins (15 points), and Erica Jackson (13 points).

"It wasn't a matter of turning anything around," added running back Jaime Scott. "It only mattered that we weren't going to lose."

Several months ago, when Oviedo assembled for summer practice, pulling off the state's upset of the year wouldn't have seemed possible. The Lions faced a season with a new quarterback and a new coach, Greg Register, described by his players as the complete opposite of longtime head man Jack Blanton who stepped down last season after a long tenure at the Oviedo helm.

The Lions stumbled out of the gate but managed to beat county rival and defending district champion Lake Howell in overtime. There were more speed bumps, including a blowout homecoming loss to Seminole less than a month ago, but Oviedo has improved steadily along the way and the team is confident heading into this weekend.

Scott has made most of the headlines, leading Seminole County in rushing, but that wouldn't have been possible without an undersized and overachieving offensive line. For the record, Scott promised dinner to the offensive line if the Lions go all the way.

Also, for the record, Jackson offered to chip in.

Scott also couldn't have led the county if Jackson hadn't agreed to Register's request that he switch to defense for the senior year. Jackson was part of a one-two punch last season but he took the change with grace.

"He came and asked me to play safety," Jackson said. "That was great because my goal was to do anything I could for the team. My goal was never to lead anybody in tackles or anything. We wanted a championship."

Jackson ended up leading Seminole County in tackles in his only full season on defense.

"Sometimes you have to sacrifice it for the team," Jackson said.

This time, after taking Thanksgiving Day off, the Lions will leave early for the four-hour ride and should be fresh by kickoff.

Of course, there are some doubts. Then again, this time last week, a lot of people expected Cullen to be practicing with the basketball team by now. Instead, the Lions are trying to bring the playoffs back to Oviedo next weekend.

"I'm not saying we're going to win or lose," Jackson said. "What ever happens is going to happen. Everybody expects us to lose anyway."

On that point, Jackson and the Lions are wrong.
