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Polio Protection

Poliovirus is one of the mysterious diseases. Despite long and patient research, the exact causes and the exact means by which the germ is transmitted are not known.

However, the experts have narrowed the problem down. They say that certain precautions will greatly reduce the danger of contracting the disease.

Dr. John A. Tomney, professor of contagious diseases at Western Reserve University, recommends that families do the following:

Wash all fruits and vegetables. Wash all dishes thoroughly.

Do not use water which is not an approved source. Kill all flies in the house.

Cover garbage cans tightly. Do not swallow water while swimming. Stay away from polluted streams and beaches.

Avoid fatigue. It lowers resistance to disease. Avoid sudden chilling. Do not plunge into cold water on hot days.

Cover mouth and nose while sneezing. Avoid tonsil and adenoid operations of possible.

Call a doctor at the first sign of illness. It is important to be on the alert for such symptoms as drowsiness, fever, indigestion, headache, pain in muscles, difficulty in swallowing or coughing.

Most hospitals in the country are now equipped to take care of patients with the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Only one case in four results in permanent paralysis. If parents keep their heads and act quickly, the chances are in their favor that a child will get through a case of polio all right.

Pete Coper, Gainesville, Wins Open With Score Of 290

Clyde Terwillegar, Jr., young pro of the Seminole Country Club carded a 308 for 72 holes at the Florida Open in Clearwater which ended yesterday after three days of play, to place sixth among the pros and ninth among the approximately 600 players.

During the second day of play Terwillegar scored a hole in one on the 149 yard sixth hole. This was the feature event of the tournament. Terwillegar, besides shooting the only hole in one made during the tournament, shot a low 69 for 70 the same day. His other scores being 79 for the first day, 79 the next, 85 for the first 18 holes on the last day and 74, the last 18. His prizes consisted of a registered set of woods and a golf bag.

Rangy Pete Coper of Gainesville cracked par with a 71 in the final 18 holes to win the tournament with a 72-hole score of 290.

His victory gave him top prize money of \$333 in savings bonds. Two amateurs, Charlie Harper of Jacksonville with a final 73 for a total of 296, and George Bolesta of Tampa with a 76 for a total of 301, placed second and third.

Denny Champagne, Orlando professional, took second money although he finished fourth, and Bud Tuttle and Dave Bride, the two half of the Bolesta brothers, earned third money while finishing fifth. Champagne put together a 75 for a 302 total, and Bolesta a five-over-par 77 for a 303.

Clyde Uina of West Palm Beach had a 74 for 304, Ward Rogers of Clearwater carded 75 for 305 and Earl Christiansen of Miami a 76 for 306. Leo Walters of Thomasville, Ga., 78 for 309 and Lloyd Sparrow of Bradenton a 79 for 310 total.

Other Sanford golfers participating in the tournament were Harry Tooke, G. W. Spencer and E. R. Smith, all amateurs.

Lind Weber, manager of the Mayfair Inn, revealed this morning that he plans to leave Sanford shortly for a business trip to Boston and other New England spots. Last season the Indians set up Spring quarters in Deland, however, it is felt that Deland does not have facilities that could adequately handle two baseball squads at the identical time.

Weber declared yesterday afternoon that he had been given information while discussing Spring training activities with a club owner recently by telephone that the Chicago White Sox are not too happy with their Spring training site on Catalina. It may be possible, according to Weber, that they might be interested in moving to Florida and "I'll try to catch them in Boston and discuss the situation with them there," he added.

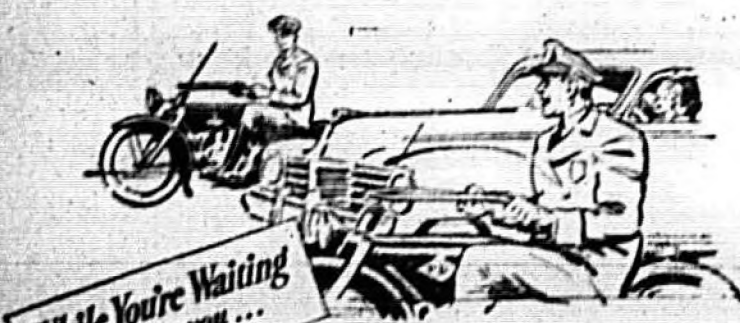
