Civil Service Has Openings For Pupils

Federal agencies of the United States Civil Service Commission will train persons to do scientific and mechanical work in government laboratories while paying them as much as \$140 a month.

The positions are called trained scientific and technical aid, and requirements are few. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, and must have completed one unit of high school study in physics, chemistry, mathematics, biology, or general science. They must pass a written test designed to measure aptitude for learning and adjusting to the duties of the position.

The positions to be filled are in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. In such agencies as the National Bureau of Standards, the Weather Bureau, the Bellville Research Center and the Bureau of Home Economics of the Department of Agriculture, the Bureau of Mines and others. After a brief training period, trainees may become eligible for promotion to higher grade positions with prospects of further promotion.

Most of the positions pay \$1440 a year plus overtime, but some may be filled at \$1260 and \$1320 a year. For a lengthened work-week of 48 hours (including 8 hours of overtime) the added pay increases. A \$1440 a year salary to \$1752; \$1320 to \$1678.92; and \$1260 to \$1532.88.

Any student interested in Civil Service should see Mr. McKay, who has additional information.

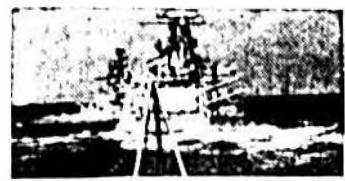

Giant R. A. F. Bombers Hit Nazi Party Shrine

Soviets Batter Germans Into Retreat Along Napoleon's "Escape Corridor"

(By Associated Press)
As giant R. A. F. bombers returned to the assault on Germany overnight blasting the Nazi party shrine at Neurenberg and hitting targets in the western Reich, on the Russian front, red army shock troops battering the Germans into swift retreat along the old Napoleon "escape corridor" from Moscow to Smolensk were reported to have captured 20 villages and taken within 20 miles of the key Nazi stronghold at Vyazma.

On the northern flank Soviet troops were reported to have reached the upper Donets River. On the Kurak-Kharlov front Soviet dispatches said the Germans were throwing strong forces into a series of furious counterattacks and a German communiqué claimed the capture of numerous towns including Valki, some 30 miles west of Kharkov, and said "the German troops are masters of the situation on the whole front."

Forcing a ring of encirclement around the German base of Vyazma, the Russians last night announced the capture of the rail town of Sychyeva after a stubborn battle of two days in which 800 of the enemy fell and before a furious Red army onslaught.

Latest reports to London indicated the Red army had pushed within 30 miles of Vyazma from the direction of captured Gshatak, which is 35 miles to the northeast. Military observers in the German position before Moscow, now crumbling away.

The booty was impressive and the list below an earlier German assertion that Sychyeva had been evacuated without opposition in accordance with German plans for shortening their lines.

A special communiqué, broadcast by the Moscow radio and recorded here by the Soviet Monitor, said the material captured included 310 tanks, 22 railway locomotives, 40 guns, eight planes, 520 machineguns and 110 railway cars and fuel cars.

Legion Auxiliary President Tells Of Child Problem

Dinner Given Honoring Mrs. Eunice Bradley At Mayfair

Stating that the foremost problem now confronting this country is that of juvenile delinquency, brought about due to lack of supervision by parents, Mrs. Eunice Bradley, department president of the American Legion Auxiliary, addressed Auxiliary members and other guests at a dinner given in her honor Friday evening at the Hotel Mayfair. Also honored was Mrs. Pauline Kirkpatrick, district president, whose husband Kirk Kirkpatrick, government inspector of Eustis, also attended.

Outlining the motives leading to the formation of the Auxiliary following the World War, Mrs. Bradley declared that the first love of the organization had been rehabilitation, designed to give help and sympathy to such as wounded and crippled men. Pappy sales helped bring in needed funds for this purpose, she added.

"Our progress in rehabilitation in the past, however, has been a mere drop compared to what we intend to do in the future to all those who come back from this war in need of such help," she said.

Nazi Document Outlines Rules For Executions

Firing Squads Told To Do Killings In "Military Manner"

LONDON, March 9. The correct procedure to be followed by the German Army in the execution of civilian hostages is outlined in a German military document that has fallen into British hands, it has been disclosed.

Mass executions must be carried out in a "military manner," the order states, and firing squads are instructed as follows:

"A. When a large number of persons have to be dealt with they are to be distributed for shooting among units.

"B. The bodies are to be buried in sufficiently deep graves. Burning of bodies is to cease. The placing of flowers on graves is to be prevented.

"C. In order to avoid unnecessary contact with the bodies, those to be shot are to be led directly to the 'edges' of their graves. In the case of mass executions it is allowable to cause the hostages to kneel with their faces towards the graves.

"D. Shooting of large numbers is to be carried out in groups of five to eight, one after the other. Those to be shot must have their legs tied to the complete story of the United States and Russia.

"E. Before the execution takes place all papers must be removed from those to be shot. A short report is to be made on the execution showing names of those shot; reasons for shooting; name of officer in charge; place; time; name of officer ordering the execution.

"F. The execution is to be carried out in a very regimental manner with an officer in charge. Two to four men to be detailed for each man to be shot. After the volley the officer responsible will, on orders from the medical officer, detail to attend, first a final shot to the body of each with the regulation pistol. Death is to be certified by the medical officer.

"G. Articles of clothing (including footwear) and personal effects of those shot will be on account given to the local population they are to be handed in to the appropriate local military authority in exchange for receipts. The officer is to be present until the burial has been completed."

Wallace Brings Russian Issue Out Into Open

Another War Looms As Possibility Unless Allies, Reds Come To Understanding

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9. (AP)—Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles today said Ambassador William Standley's statement in Moscow that the Russian people were not completely informed of American lend-lease aid so the Soviets was made without prior consultation with the government in Washington. Welles said he believed complete trust and understanding exists among the United Nations. The text of Standley's remarks was asked by cable.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9. (AP)—Vice President Wallace's warning of a possible third World War unless Russia and the Allies reach an understanding is regarded as bringing the knotty United Nations peace-making problem out into the open.

The subject has been a matter of official concern for some time. But until Vice President Wallace's speech the tendency was to avoid any public mention of it. The lack of understanding as having its effect already, at instance, in the Russo-Polish border dispute.

Admiral Standley told his press conference yesterday he did not think the Russian people had been told the complete story of the United States aid to Russia.

"I find no political motive to this," Standley said. "It is only an effort to create the impression with their own people that they are pulling themselves through by their own boot straps.

"Pointing out that a new lend-lease bill is now before Congress in Washington, Standley added that the American Congress is high-spirited and generous, but if you give it the impression that their help means nothing, they might be a different story.

"I have carefully looked for an admission in the Russian press that they receive material aid from America," said Standley. "I have failed to find any real knowledge of it."

The ambassador said the Russians were getting numerous things from the United States.

Standley said the Russian press knew very few of the facts concerning United States aid. "It is not fair to the American people to bamboozle it into thinking they're helping the Russian people," he said, "yet the Russian people have no opportunity to know they are being helped by the American people. I mean the plain American people who are doing down in their own pockets."

It was pointed out to Standley that recently several Russian generals told foreign correspondents they were getting no American help at the front except trucks.

"They are getting plenty of other kind of war material," said Standley. "If it's not at the front I don't know what they are doing with it."

The ambassador said there had been no obvious change in the exchange of information between the United States and the Soviet Union since the Washington agreement last year.

"There's no question about the Soviet trying to create the impression abroad as well as at home that they are fighting the war alone," Standley declared.

The ambassador said he planned to see Premier Stalin soon.

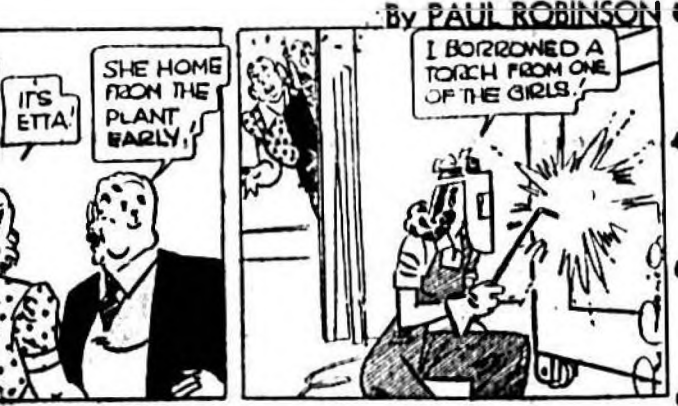
