Lodge and Son Is One Of Sanford's Leading Grocers

One of Sanford's leading independent grocery merchants, M. J. Lodge has operated the store now known as Lodge & Son, since 1925. He is associated in business with his son, Jesse Lodge, who spent three years with the Third Division Marine Corps, serving overseas for 15 months.

Mr. Lodge, a former city commissioner, opened his first store on Palmetto Avenue with his father, the late I. F. Lodge, later entering into a partnership with the late Mrs. J. T. McClain. The store was then known as Lodge & McClain.

Mrs. Lodge acts as cashier for the store while her sister, Mrs. Letha Tatum assists Mr. Lodge in other departments of the store. P. T. Lodge and Jesse Lodge handle the meat department.

Heavy Rains Spread Northern Floods

CHICAGO, Mar. 22 (AP)—Heavy rains spread floods today over lowland areas of south central New York and northeastern Pennsylvania, driving hundreds of persons from their homes.

A downpour of 2.76 inches at Cleveland, O., flooded thousands of homes in that city, disrupted transportation and power service, and did \$100,000 damage at Cleveland's zoo where many animals perished.

The Chenango and northern Susquehanna Rivers spread far out of their banks, reaching some residential area with six to eight feet of water and blocking highways.

At Vestal, N. Y., the Susquehanna was 12 feet above flood stage, and downstream at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., forecasters warned of an imminent 10-foot flood. Nine feet of water above the flood level was predicted for Towanda.

Meanwhile the Mississippi River rose approximately seven feet above flood stage at Quincy, Ill., where volunteer workers labored to strengthen levees.

The Quincy stage reached 21.3 feet, but fair weather over the Missouri and Iowa tributaries eased the threat of a levee break.

Municipal League

It is estimated from page one that taxes be enacted which will amply provide for the needs of municipalities and replace the operating revenue lost by homestead exemption and other constitutional prohibitions against taxation by municipalities.

4. That the legislature give all municipalities the general right and authority to impose whatever taxes, levies or assessments as may not be specifically prohibited by the state constitution.

5. That a constitutional amendment be proposed that will permanently grant and secure to the cities a definite part in the financial structure of the state.

The resolution was presented to the conference on behalf of its pre-legislative committee by Mayor John Marshall Green, Ocala. The committee is headed by C. Harold Hippler, city attorney of Euclid.

Adoption of the resolution was the concluding feature of the conference, which began Saturday.

Blast Wreaks Havoc In Palestine Street

JERUSALEM, Mar. 22 (AP)—An explosion wrecked the thickly populated Iraq street in the center of the Arab section of Haifa today. A government spokesman said there were "very many casualties." First unconfirmed reports said 17 Arabs were known dead and 60 injured. At least eight houses were destroyed.

Meanwhile at Lake Success, Jewish Agency leaders met in emergency session to plan their fight on the new United States proposal for Palestine trusteeship. Informed quarters said the entire Palestine situation was under review in the light of last Friday's announcement that the U. S. was dropping its support of the Palestine partition plan.

It is estimated from page one that our trouble, for if the situation continues to worsen and we continue to hope for the best while doing nothing unpleasant, we may lose freedom.

Compton declared that UMT would give America twofold insurance coverage.

"In the first place a strong military posture will be a deterrent to actions of any nation which might provoke war.

"In the second place, if war should occur, then we would have a much better chance of coming through successfully and at less cost."

Questioned about President Truman's request for a limited draft law, Compton said he believes the proposal is a wise one. He endorsed action to bring the armed forces up to authorized strength.

The commission he headed foresaw a possibility that it would not be possible to recruit enough men to fill up the armed forces, he said, and therefore it urged prompt action on universal training.

"Perhaps the delay has been too long and this other supplementary move (a draft) should be taken in the light of world conditions," he said.

Senator Baltunzall (R-Mass.) wanted to know whether the country could bear the cost of universal training on top of what it is already spending for the armed forces.

Compton said it could—that "the amounts we have been talking about, while large, are small compared with what we spend on luxuries each year."

000,000 pounds. The market price of lard jumped up 6 to 8 cents a pound.

Parks said the department investigated "rumors" of a leak and made a report on its findings. But, he said: "The report did not reveal the source of the leak."

The House committee is making a general inquiry into speculation on commodity markets with particular emphasis on the question whether anyone has profited from "inside" government information.

Park's testimony came after Andersen introduced a market letter sent out by G. G. Lusk of Greenville, Miss., last Sept. 9, one day ahead of the department's public announcement that export quotas would be raised.

The Lusk letter cited "rumors of leaks" that the department's

secret allocation would amount to 450,000,000 pounds of fats and oils. Parks said the actual figure was 452,000,000 pounds. The letter quoted probable lard allocations of 75,000,000 pounds compared with the official figure of 74,500,000 pounds.

France Wishes To Allow Italy Control Of Libya, Others

The western allies proposed the return of the free territory of Trieste to Italy last Saturday. Yugoslavia countered yesterday with an offer to relinquish her claims on Trieste if Italy will give up Gorizia, to the north.

The spokesman said: "It is clear that Italy cannot accept the separation of a part of Italian flesh bartered for another part of Italian flesh."

The Italian answer came only a few hours after great throngs roared "Viva Trieste" welcomed Premier Alcide de Gasperi and Foreign Minister Count Carlo Sforza back to Rome.

The spokesman emphasized that the Italian government has received no official word of the reported proposal regarding Gorizia. He said he was speaking entirely on the basis of press reports.

Asked what other hopes of treaty revision there was in regard to the Italian colonies, the spokesman said: "On the part of France, the thesis has been confirmed in the most absolute manner that she wishes to give Italy administration of Eritrea, Somaliland and Libya."

Russia also has stated willingness to have administration of the colonies revert to Italy. The United States is also believed to go along with France. The British position has not been made clear.

The spokesman stressed the importance of the Trieste development as a basis for general revision of the peace treaty. He said that before and since Italian ratification of the peace treaty, its eventual revision had been the Italian government's aim.

He said he hoped Russia would go along with the western powers' Trieste proposal. Revision of the treaty by restoration of Trieste to Italy by the spokesman said, could be the guarantee of peace and that sincere collaboration which Italy desires with neighboring people.

vacillating and inadequate. Dewey replied, "No," when asked if the nation were on the verge of war.

The Governor asserted the Truman Administration had "deliberately allowed" Russia to retain territory freed by the U. S. Armed Forces.

He said the Truman regime "has failed to recognize the nature of this (Soviet) movement in the past, or has been unwilling to admit it."

"In either case," he added at a news conference, "the American people are entitled to know the full story."

Dewey said Truman's address to Congress last week "was a good statement as far as it went" but "there was not a full and frank disclosure of the extent of the international situation which affects our interests."

The Governor proposed specifically a "large increase in our air forces," a rebuilding of the U. S. Intelligence Service, and an acceleration of America's diplomatic efforts.

Concerning the U. S. partition to the United Nations for abandonment of the partition plan and substitution of a U. N. trusteeship, Dewey said:

"The situation is deeply saddening to all of us and is an illustration of the bungling which takes a strong position without thinking through the means of carrying it out or the implementation of the policies worked out in advance."

"I prayerfully hope that a sound solution which will preserve the objective of a Jewish homeland and a place for the displaced persons will now be developed."

WASHINGTON—There's a fortune in fish-heads in Alaska and another fortune in fish-tails, fins and viscera.

As of now it's being dumped into the sea or allowed to rot at the canneries. Estimates of its potential value range from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 a year.

Experts say that about 30 per cent of Alaska's annual salmon catch of 360,000,000 pounds is waste—head, collar, tail, liver and other offal. Government chemists and biologists have determined that this smelly cannery garbage could become a great source of:

- 1. Proteins which may be used as food or for medicinal purposes.
- 2. Oils and vitamin A.
- 3. Meal for the rearing of fish in hatcheries, which in itself is a rising young industry.

In an effort to salvage this waste material and to promote a year-around industry in Alaska, the Commerce Department's Office of Technical Services and the Interior Department's Fish and Wildlife Service are conducting a \$47,000 research program.

First reports tell of investigations by bio-chemists Charles Butler and David Miyachi at Seldovia, Alaska; G. Iver Jones and Edward J. Carrigan at Seattle, and Roger E. Burrows and Neva L. Karrick at Leavenworth, Wash.

Rural Common Sense

Spring-time is a busy season indeed for Florida farmers. Corn, peanuts, cotton, tobacco, and vegetables are being planted. Citrus fruits are being harvested from trees that carry the bloom of next season's crop.

There are many things to keep the farmer busy, and there are some details to which he will do well to pay particular attention in this spring of 1948. The State Agricultural Extension Service lists a few of them:

If there is doubt about adequate pastures for livestock during the summer, spring is the time for planting temporary pasture crops such as cut-tail millet.

Feed is high and all available is needed for animals and poultry. None can be spared for rats, as rat control is necessary for maximum benefits from feed.

Four out of 10 pigs fattened are lost before they get to market, which means waste of feed, loss of profit to supply a meat-hungry nation, and generally economic loss to the farmer.

Food for the family is or should be the first consideration of the farmer, and the home garden should be given much attention now.

Insect pests and diseases become more active with the coming of warm weather, and the wise farmer will be ready to combat them.

The farmer and his family are being called on to produce large crops to help feed this country and to help in the European relief program.

Planting work. Lake Butler, Fla.—Union county farmers are busy preparing land and planting spring crops.

Physicians say the heart is the strongest and toughest of all the vital human organs.

70 Year Old Ship Lookout Has Never Been To Sea Once

BAITIMORE—Walter Gellbach's slip comes in every day, but he has yet to go aboard.

Gellbach, Baltimore's 70-year-old ship lookout, spends eight hours a day thinking, talking and dreaming about ships.

From a shack on north point, at the harbor's entrance, he keeps tabs on port traffic, notifying the maritime exchange in downtown Baltimore of each arrival.

This gives notice to customs men, ship chandlers and agents that their ship will dock within the hour.

Gellbach's travels are by proxy aboard tramp steamers spotted through his marine glass and duly recorded in his log.

He goes through the day in a locker by the window, warmed by a kerosene stove, keeping a lookout for tugs, steamers, barges and tows.
