(AP)—Clemenceau, France's premier, believes that settlement of the debt of the United States, not only carried out but that France's independence has made an appeal to Coolidge in an attempt to place the debt upon a basis. He says the debt is empty and that payment in the form of a loan is necessary because of the shape of the debt.

'Preparedness True American Principle'
Citizenship Must Be Coordinated, He Says Before Large Crowd

Declaring that a danger stage is at hand in the national life of the United States because of organized efforts that are being made to inject pacifist ideas and ideals in our histories, even to the extent of abolishing all forms of military training, James E. Barton, National Adjutant of the American Legion, in addressing the state convention of the American Legion here today, sounded a warning appeal in favor of continued preparedness.

True American Principle
"It is for that purpose for the defense of these things, that America is prepared. A democratic nation like the United States, with a people intent upon peace so long as peace may honorably be maintained, does not develop means of defense because it believes in war. It develops them to defend itself and its institutions and its land and its people against attack from aggressive nations bent on conflict and on conquest."

(Continued from Page 6) Kingdown, between Dover and Deal, and walked happily ashore. Then she touched bottom at the glare of huge bonfires built along the beach to guide her toward the chalk cliffs.

She had brought ashore with her a record of 14 hours 31 minutes for the swim and pleased with her achievement.

Notwithstanding the long time she had been in the water, Miss Ederle required no assistance when she landed. She even desired to take the water again and swim out to the tug which had conveyed her across from France.

In the first five hours she was also miles out in the channel. The wind was kicking up somewhat choppy seas. They seemingly did not deter her, for she kept steadily on, notwithstanding an adverse tide.

At 9 o'clock in the evening she was two miles out from shore, plugging along with a determined idea to finish her task. The bonfires and the searchlights showed her the way and 40 minutes later she walked up the beach.

She is the sixth person to swim the Channel. The five others were men. Her time of 14 hours and 31 minutes bettered that of any of the male swimmers. Tirabochi, the Italian, previously held the record of 16 hours, 23 minutes, in covering an estimated distance, as he was carried hither and thither by the tides, of 27 miles.

Webb Miss Ederle's Trainer Capt. Matthew Webb of England, who, in 1875, was the first man to cross the Channel, swimming from Dover Sands, England, to Sapperton, France, was in the water 22 hours and 45 minutes and swam approximately 30 miles.

Henry Sullivan of Lowell, Mass., crossing from Dover to Cape Gris Nez. He had to swim 45 miles.

EXPECTED LITTLE BY CATHOLIC BAN

Two Protestant Churches In Mexico City Hold Their Regular Services Sunday Without Any Interference

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Official announcement that the government intended to enforce the religious regulations upon Protestant churches just as upon Catholic churches has had little outward effect. Mexico City's two Protestant churches carried out the usual services yesterday and no move was made to interfere with them.

Goodly number of worshippers entered the priestless Catholic churches for prayers. Tranquility prevailed everywhere at the commencement of the second week of the deadlock on the religious situation between the Catholic churches and the government. No disorders were reported from any part of the republic.

Both Sides Stick To Guns Today The Catholic Episcopate, Which Withdrew the Priests from the Churches and Suspended Services in them as a Protest Against the Government's Religious Regulations, Gave No Sign of Abandoning Its Passive Opposition. The Government, on Its Part, With Equal Firmness Maintained That It Must Enforce the Constitution of the Country.

The people seemed resigned and patiently await developments in the situation. Meanwhile, many of them are reducing their expenditures in accordance with the economic boycott called by the National League for Defense of Religious Liberty, hoping to bring about depression in business conditions of sufficient scope to cause the government to modify its religious attitude.

With regard to Protestant churches it is explained that the government in announcing it, does not mean that it will immediately seize convert Protestant church properties, but would reserve the right to do so in the future under the constitution that all church property belongs to the nation.

Protestant Ministers To Register All Churches and Pastors Will Be Required to Register and Give to the Municipal Authorities an Inventory of All Church Property

It is the belief of the Catholic Episcopate that several government leaders have been automatically excommunicated from the church by reason of their attitude in the religious controversy. This opinion was expressed in a statement submitted by Dr. Alva Taylor, editor of "The Christian Century," in the United States.

Reply Made To Minister MEXICO CITY, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The Catholic Episcopate today gave a statement to the Associated Press in reply to one published in San Francisco by Aaron Suenz, Mexican minister of foreign affairs. Senor Suenz declared there was no persecution being carried out by the Mexican government.

But that the attitude of a "subversive character," that the different religious elements had been assuming in Mexico compelled the government to enforce the provisions of the Mexican law dealing with religious affairs.

The statement of the Episcopate says it respects the Mexican constitution and laws which do not oppose the dictates of reason and the positive rights of the church. It expressed the hope that the proposed congressional enactment of religious regulations will not constitute a new obstacle to a speedy solution of the conflict.

French Cannot Stick To Debt Agreement, Says Clemenceau

(Continued from Page 1) The former premier asserts that trial solutions or preparation for solution of debt questions between the United States and England, England and France, and France and the United States, have not brought about a good state of feeling, and adds:

"We are debtors; you are creditors. It seems to me regarded as merely a matter for the creditor's department. But are there no other considerations to be taken into account?"

The former premier tells of the suffering of France during the World War and asked where France failed to fulfill all the demands of duty.

"Yes," he declares; "we have thrown everything into the abyss of blood and money—as England and the United States did on their side but it was France's territory that was devastated scientifically. For three deadly years we awaited this declaration from America—'France is the frontier of Liberty.' Three years of blood and money oozing from every pore."

"As Russia did, America has made a separate peace with Germany without even the slightest suggestion of an adjustment with her comrades-in-arms. Today, a treaty peace between the allied and associated powers is being dictated."

"I will not stand here and argue that every phrase is correct," he said. "Or that the 'she' and 'he' is in every place it should be."

The lawyer took exception to a statement of Mr. DeCotter that he would advise a client who came to him not to pay the tax, because no lien was established. "I say that would be bad advice for a lawyer to hand out."

Can take case to high court. If the Commissioner and Tax Assessor are "interested parties," they can go to the high courts and find out the constitutionality of the act, Mr. Housholder said, and it cannot be reached under the guise of commissioner and assessor.

He quoted a ruling to the effect that every law on the statutes must be presumed constitutional and every executive must carry out the provisions of the law unless it harms his person, or the law is declared unconstitutional by the courts.

"It is always the little fellow who wants progress," Mr. Housholder said. "It is the big fellow who does not, because he always has what he wants. It is the big fellow who is fighting this act."

He asked the question whether the Assessor or Commissioners have any personal interest in coming into court. "I submit that they have not and they don't claim it," he said.

Spent assessment district net on the Florida statutes, Mr. Van Agnew said, summing up his case, have been passed upon by the Supreme court and adjudicated. The St. Johns Navigation act is based upon the same principles that are involved in the special assessments passed upon the high court, he said.

Citations Necessary 20 Years Ago. Citations section 22 of the act, the lawyer and opposing counsel had much to say of the appointment of administrative officers by the government.

A new act was adopted and it has stuck, he added.

What finer thing than for them to cherish and revere that memory and to draw from it inspiration that they, too, when the hour comes and duty calls to them—at home, on farm or in factory, in the counting-house or afar upon the bloody field where war hobs away—shall honor that call and answer as their forefathers answered it?"

"Thinking citizens of America abhor war, and rightly. But the present agitation of the extreme pacifist has passed the bounds of reason. Clinging vaguely, uncertainly, ineffectively after the final ideal of peace, it has lost contact with this world in which we live and soared into the dim shadow-land of unreality, of 'things as we should like them, and not as we find them, to be.'"

"We must look to our security. We must look to it that this nation survives to carry on its tasks and give effect to its ideals through generations yet to come, its power for light and good with the years. To that end we must have, we are constrained by the working of world forces to have, these armies and armaments upon which we must depend for peace and life if it will."

Must Coordinate Citizenship. "But, going due thought to these things there are other things also which we must not forget, things which transcend in importance these latter are. For these things which I have in mind are of the very spirit of a people, and not merely instrumentalities of its will."

"When all is said and done, the best security that a nation can possess is the ability to coordinate its citizenship and its resources, at all times, whether of prosperity or of danger, of emergency or of peace. America has a table and a responsive government, a government which has endured for nearly a century and a half of uninterupted growth. It is today a great and mighty nation. It will be made better by those who give consideration, and in proportion as they give consideration, to its security, to its security, from the communist, the fanatic and the revolutionary within, to its security from the hatred of the destructionist from without."

French Cannot Stick To Debt Agreement, Says Clemenceau

(Continued from Page 1) The former premier asserts that trial solutions or preparation for solution of debt questions between the United States and England, England and France, and France and the United States, have not brought about a good state of feeling, and adds:

"We are debtors; you are creditors. It seems to me regarded as merely a matter for the creditor's department. But are there no other considerations to be taken into account?"

The former premier tells of the suffering of France during the World War and asked where France failed to fulfill all the demands of duty.

"Yes," he declares; "we have thrown everything into the abyss of blood and money—as England and the United States did on their side but it was France's territory that was devastated scientifically. For three deadly years we awaited this declaration from America—'France is the frontier of Liberty.' Three years of blood and money oozing from every pore."

"As Russia did, America has made a separate peace with Germany without even the slightest suggestion of an adjustment with her comrades-in-arms. Today, a treaty peace between the allied and associated powers is being dictated."

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Tacna-Arica Dispute Explained To Press

LIMA, Peru, Aug. 9.—(AP)—President Leguia today told the Associated Press that the return of the disputed provinces of Tacna and Arica, now held by Chile, to Peru was the only solution for the long-standing dispute between Chile and Peru. He added that Peru was willing to enter a fair plebiscite at any time to decide the question of ownership.
