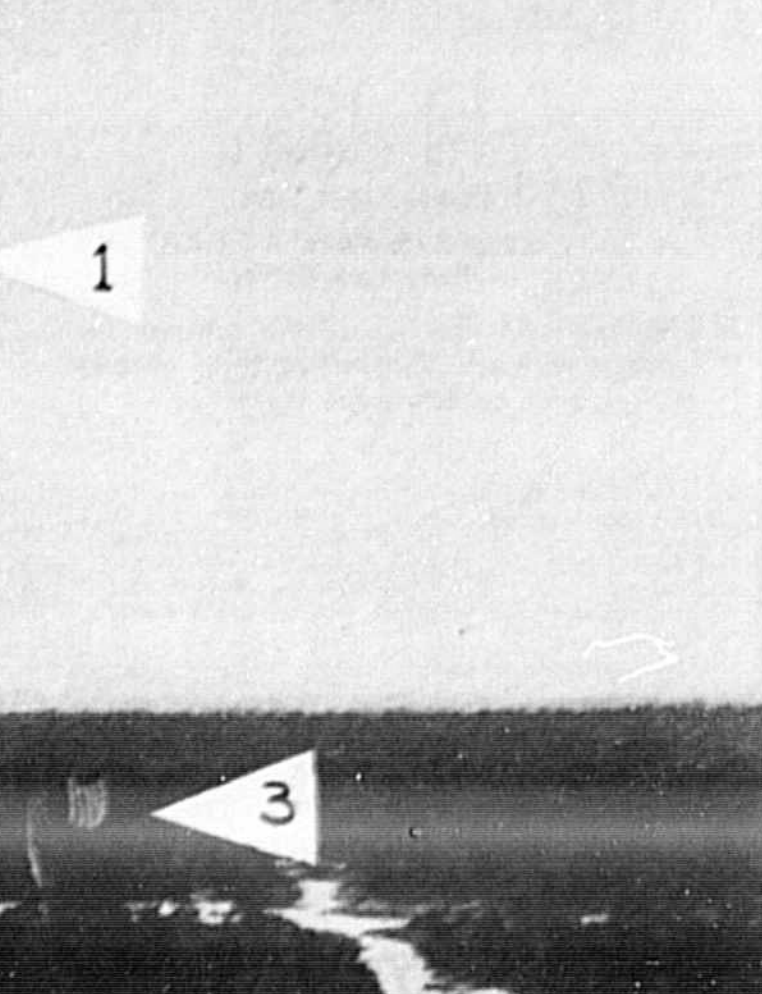

Beaches Termed Critical

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida beaches from Jacksonville south to Fort Pierce are badly eroded and in critical need of restoration, says state Natural Resources Director Randolph Hodges.

Hodges told the state Cabinet Tuesday he planned to write a "strongly worded" letter to the Corps of Engineers routinely dumps tons of sand from dredge projects into the Atlantic Ocean that could be used to help rebuild these beaches.

Hodges said the Corps, when it depends an inlet or parts of the Intracoastal Waterway for navigation purposes, takes the sand from the bottom and carts it out to sea and dumps it.

He said a good example of this practice was the recent dredging of the Ponce De Leon Inlet near New Smyrna Beach.

The Department of Natural Resources is currently attempting to get the Corps to come back and rebuild beaches north of the inlet, said Hodges.

He said these are beaches that could have been saved had the Corps put its dredge spoils on the beach in early 1972 when the project was being completed.

Of rough weather, said Hodges, he has turned the North-east Florida coastline into a disaster area. Gov. Reubin Askew earlier this month sent the National Guard to the St. Augustine area to help rebuild a badly eroded beach. Rep. Gus Craig, D-St. Augustine, told the Cabinet Tuesday that local officials spent \$5,000 within three days trying to keep back the ocean and protect their beaches.

The bad weather did not include northeast winds, famous for ripping up beaches, said Hodges. "It would have been much worse had this been the case."

Duval Judge Asks For Turner Trial

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A Duval County circuit judge has asked the 1st District Court of Appeal to lift its order staying the trial of Orlando businessman Glenn Turner on charges of selling unregistered securities.

Judge Hudson Olliff rejected Turner's contention that he had not been given a speedy trial because he was facing charges in Clearwater that hampered his prosecution in Duval County, said Olliff.

The 1st District on Jan. 21 stayed Turner's trial and gave Olliff until Tuesday to show reasons why the stay should not be made permanent.

In a written brief filed with the court, Olliff said Turner's Jacksonville trial should be allowed to begin. Olliff's brief was submitted by Asst. Atty. Gen. Ray Markey.

Turner pleaded no contest last month to the Clearwater charges involving numerous violations of state securities laws — following a mistrial in the case last October.

In the Jacksonville case, Turner faces one felony charge of selling unregistered securities. Along with co-defendant Randall E. Hubbard, he also faces misdemeanor charges of conspiracy to organize a pyramid sales club and deceptive trade practices.

The cosmetics tycoon was indicted on the Jacksonville charges last May.

Olliff said Turner's trial set for Oct. 16 had to be postponed because Turner was on trial in Clearwater at the time.

The case was then postponed to Dec. 21, but on that date it was impossible for the state to go ahead with its prosecution because key evidence was tied up in Clearwater — following the mistrial there, he said.

There was no indication of when the appeal court might rule.

Teachers Strike, Schools' Head Quits

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — For most of his 72 years, William Ross has sided with labor. But, when the city's public school teachers struck, the school board president found himself in the role of an employer.

On Tuesday, deciding his divided loyalty was untenable, Ross resigned.

"I'm really doing it to eliminate the personal element in the strike," Ross said. "I don't know if my stepping down will open the way to a settlement—I hope so—but the finger was pointing to me and I didn't like it. I was the target of personal attacks, and I want to remove that."

Ross accepted the post as school board president in December 1971 at the request of Mayor Frank Rizzo.

Since the teachers' strike resumed Jan. 8, he has been the main target of criticism by the Philadelphia Federation of Teachers in a walkout which has seen the two top leaders of the 18,000-member PFT jailed and 790 teachers arrested for blocking entrances to schools.

"Oh, I've had very much worse periods in my life in strike situations where I was defeated. But I won more strikes than I lost," said the cigar-smoking, white-haired labor leader.

But this time, Ross said, there have been personal attacks on him involving other labor unions, "as if I created the situation." For example, about 10 days ago, some 50 labor leaders met with Rizzo but Ross was not invited.

"I was wrongly maligned by other unions," said Ross, who is manager of the local council of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union. "What happened here was that I considered the welfare of the community rather than special interests."

The current strike is a defeat for the city school children, he said. "The bargaining approach by the teachers is devastating."

The strike is now the second longest teachers walkout in the nation's history, ranking behind an 11-week walkout in Newark, N.J., in 1970.

The walkout here actually began last September when the teachers struck for three weeks over pay, length of work day and assignment changes proposed by the school district, which claimed it couldn't afford the union's demands.

The school board has offered the union a \$42 million package over three years. Union demands total \$80 million.

The walkout was halted temporarily while talks continued, but no agreement was reached and the strike against the 280,000-pupil system resumed last month.

On Tuesday, the U.S. Department of Labor announced it was sending Asst. Labor Secretary William Usery to Philadelphia to intervene, apparently at the request of AFL-CIO President George Meany, who met with President Nixon in Florida on Monday.

12 Charged In Polk For Food Stamp Fraud

AUBURNDALE, Fla. (AP) — Polk County sheriff's deputies and U.S. marshals arrested 12 persons today and charged them with using fraudulent identity cards to obtain between \$250,000 and \$300,000 worth of food stamps.

Deputies said the raids, shortly after midnight, ended six months of investigations. Officers said the 12 had 75 fraudulent identity cards which they had used to obtain stamps at nearly every food stamp office in the state.

The 12, six married couples, were briefly jailed in Lakeland then taken to Tampa for a hearing before a U. S. magistrate.

Eight small children belonging to the six couples were placed in a juvenile detention home, officers said.

Let's Reminisce: March Was Kite Fun Time

Feminine logic makes its appearance early in life, and it's a rare male who knows when he's been taken and a still rarer one who manages to figure out how it was done.

Another favorite game which always appeared in March was marbles. The boys talked about "angles" and "classics," and such things, but to a girl a marble was a marble.

If some boy was lucky enough to have a piece of chalk, he drew a circle on the sidewalk, if there was a sidewalk.

Otherwise, somebody took a stick or used the heel of his shoe and drew a circle in the dirt. The players dropped on one knee and the game was under way.

Girls were almost never allowed to play. (Everyone knew that girls couldn't play marbles anyway.) But once in a while some favorite (or forward) young lady would manage to get into the game. And there were occasions when she walked away with every marble the boys possessed, her braids swinging saucily and her very back expressing triumph.

And the boys threw their hands into their pockets and scuffed their feet in the dirt and wouldn't look at each other and came to the conclusion individually and collectively that this was just one of those mean tricks life played on you and it just wasn't true that girls were better marble players than boys.

But on one game the boys really did excel and that was in spinning top tops.

No matter how carefully a girl would see the cord, she never seemed to be able to jerk it off just right and the top would wobble around uncertainly and then tip over. But a boy could make it spin and dance with no effort at all. At least, it looked like no effort. Boys never would tell how long they practiced to attain that perfection which they demonstrated in public.

Favorite sports with the girls were playing jacks and jumping rope. Some girls had short ropes which they swung over their own heads and jumped over as they swung down but it was more fun to have a long rope with two girls turning it and a third one jumping.

Of course, no boy could be caught jumping rope—that was strictly for girls and he would have been labeled "sissy" forever. But it was permissible for the boys to turn the rope, which they did as rapidly as possible, thereby tripping the girls who were trying to jump, or lashing them in the face or around the ankles.

This was considered honorable warfare in the endless battle of the sexes.

And so it went. Whoever thought March was a disagreeable month just didn't know much. March was a fun month.

Adams' Question Bothers Askew

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Reports about the Gov. Tom Adams' venture into farming — "Why no, it doesn't bother me at all. I'm just tickled to talk about my little farm," he told one reporter.

The story broke shortly after Askew had conducted a news conference last Wednesday — he holds them now every other week — so the topic of Adams' outside interests never came up.

But the next day, when a newsman approached the governor and asked him what he planned to do about the Adams situation, Askew responded, "Why didn't you ask me at the news conference?"

"Yes," responded Shevin, deadpan. "But what do I write, 'Adams' or 'state'?"

It is possible to eat as much as you wish to eat and still not get fat or increase the fat particles in your blood. It is more important to consider what you eat than how much you eat.

To illustrate the point, there are nearly eight times as many calories in a pound of raw cured bacon as there are in a pound of uncreamed cottage cheese. Bacon has 10 times as many calories as whole milk, and more than 25 times as many calories as raw pork fat. Raw pork fat has nearly 12 times as many calories as whole milk, and more than eight times as many calories as the light meat of the fryer chicken without its skin.

All those calories in bacon and pork fat do not mean these foods contain more nutrients. In fact, there are more healthy nutrients and more than twice the protein in the chicken. Many of the calories in fatty foods "don't count" — meaning that they don't count in terms of essential vitamins, minerals, and nutrients. They do count in causing obesity, fat-particle deposits in the arteries, and other health problems. Separable animal fat is almost devoid of everything except calories. Most people know that fat contains over twice as many calories as protein or carbohydrates, and that just refers to the actual digestible fat, carbohydrate, and protein. This simple fact doesn't even begin to explain the difference in the calorie content of different foods. The food we eat is composed of much more, including water and fibrous material, or cellulose. One of the major factors determining the amount of calories in a food is its water content. Raw pork fat contains only 11 per cent water. Raw cured bacon is 19.3 per cent water, while uncreamed cottage cheese is 79 per cent and the light meat of fryer chicken without the skin is 77 per cent.

Lard is a good example of how little other calories some fat contributes to nutrition. It is essentially devoid of all vitamins or minerals; it doesn't even contain any water. Lard is one of the richest foods available.

It seems as if everyone talks about calories — but just what is a calorie? It is a way of measuring energy by the actual heat it produces. The metabolism of food generates energy in the form of heat, and this heat energy is the fuel for the body. Good Public Appeal Wine Tasting Rooms

Almost all wineries who market their wine by the bottle have a public tasting room. The reasons for this free dispensing of samples are simply that it is a good form of personalized public relations and promotes business.

Buying a product at its home base or place of origin appeals to the interested visitor. "Maybe," they figure, "it's better here where it is made."

Well, no matter why they buy, they do. And tasting rooms often reflect the owner's personality and their respect for the passer-by's wallet.

Some matter is that there be maximum elbow room and a reasonable number of wines to taste.

Nonetheless, a winery possessing a "tasting room" that caters not only to utilitarian necessities but one's aesthetic sensibilities can be immortalized by word of mouth back home.

Since I've kept a file on wineries visited during the past 12 years, I now consider myself quite competent at discerning the unusual. Three such places on the West Coast:

The Jesuit owned Novitiate Winery offers tasting in a sandstone cave with the oak bar being formerly part of the deck of an aircraft carrier.

Black-robed Jesuits animatedly discuss and answer questions about wines as they offer — gratis — bread sticks and their list of 18 wines. Children are given soda pop and an appealing "please don't run on the tasting room floor" or a bar long enough to line up 40 human samplers.

Pork Pie Experience

Pork and kraut lovers will find a new eating experience served up in the form of a pie. The pork pie has a moist "crust" and is filled with sauerkraut and apples topped with melted Swiss cheese.

No one in a family can complain about eating "the same old things" when served this dish.

KRAUT-PORK-APPLE PIE
1 1/2 pounds ground lean pork
1/2 cup fresh white bread crumbs
1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs
2 eggs, beaten lightly
1/2 cup catsup
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon each: coarsely ground pepper, crushed rosemary leaves
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup sliced onion
1/2 cups well-drained sauerkraut
1/2 cup dry vermouth or 1/2 cup apple cider or apple juice

In mixing bowl, combine pork, bread crumbs, eggs, catsup, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper and rosemary; mix lightly but well. Press against bottom and sides of a 9-inch pie plate. Bake in 350-degree oven 35 to 40 minutes, or until nicely browned. Drain any excess fat from center of meat crust. Meanwhile, in large saucepan melt butter and saute onion until crisp-tender. Stir in kraut, vermouth or cider, 2 cups apple, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, thyme and sage. Cover and simmer 20 to 25 minutes over medium heat until liquid is absorbed. Stir in remaining 1/4 cup apple. Spoon kraut mixture into hot meat crust. Arrange Swiss cheese in lattice pattern on top. Brush with egg wash. Bake in 350-degree oven 35 to 40 minutes. Makes 8 servings.

Choose Wine With Caution

For those of you who know little about choosing wines but are interested in starting that drinking experience, picking the correct wine or liquor store is of paramount importance.

If you have any choice, look around. Seek out the store that has a large varied selection of wines. Make sure you at least half the supply comes from the United States. The reason for this is that it is much easier to begin to become discriminating about U.S. wines than immediately plunging into the world of imports. (Merely learning to read their labels can be a lengthy course in itself.)

Before buying, chat with the salesclerk. Honestly state your elementary status as a wine aficionado. His response is the key to whether you'll be happy with that store. The salesclerk should show interest but not be pushy; he should give you a few suggestions on wines that usually please a novice and explain why. Above all, he should not start you off in the more than \$5-per-bottle category unless the store is crowded, a 10-minute conversation isn't expecting too much. Sales personnel who love wine are a special breed and generally a joy rather than a bore, to talk with. Their enthusiasm sparks, so combine that with your own sense of feeling: "Do I trust this person's opinion?"

Once you have plunged in and bought, you can do it sample, drink and then decide for yourself if you agree with the advice given. If yes — continue going to that salesclerk for help even after you have acquired some wine expertise. If no — surely there is another store whose staff is dedicated to being dished off for you to cross.
