### New Dryer Eliminates Bending And Stooping

A new permanent-press fabric dryer eliminates bending and stooping through a dryer basket opening 10 inches higher than previous models. The center also consists of a new self-storing rod for hanging permanent-press items, a built-in 10-inch-high storage drawer at the bottom, and a signal that notifies the homemaker when hot clothes are dry so she can remove them before they wrinkle. Other features are a complete selection of temperatures—normal, low, damp-dry, steamy and permanent-press—cross-rane tumbling that prevents the drying clothes from fraying or tearing as well as up and down collecting and automatic interior tub light. The permanent-press cycle is followed by a 10-minute cool-down period. Unit comes in white, goldtone or avocado.

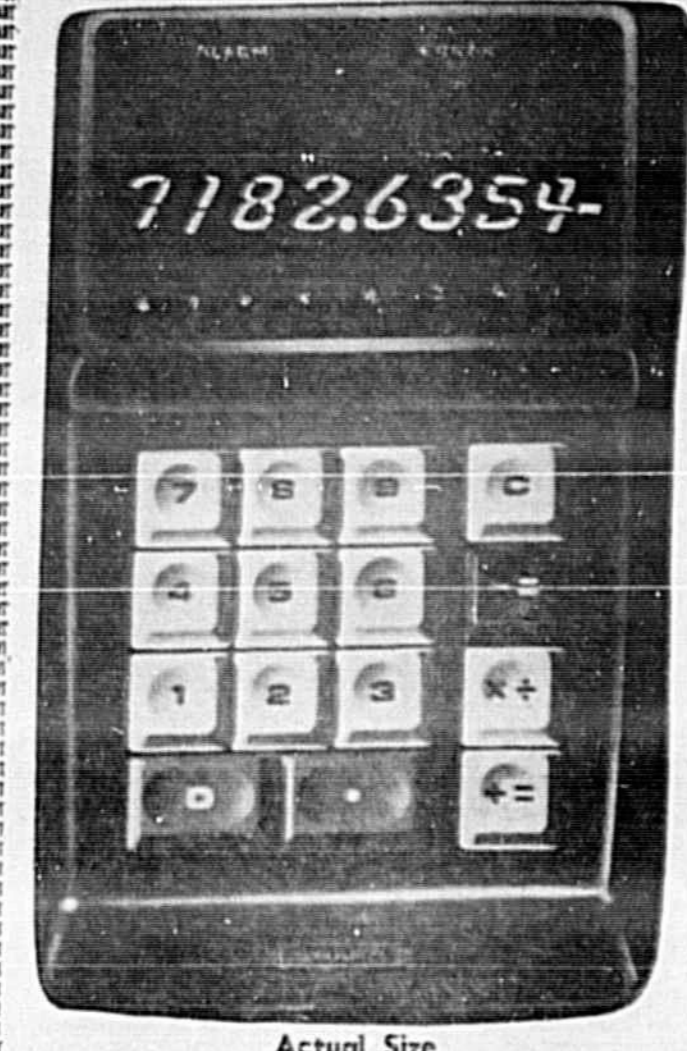

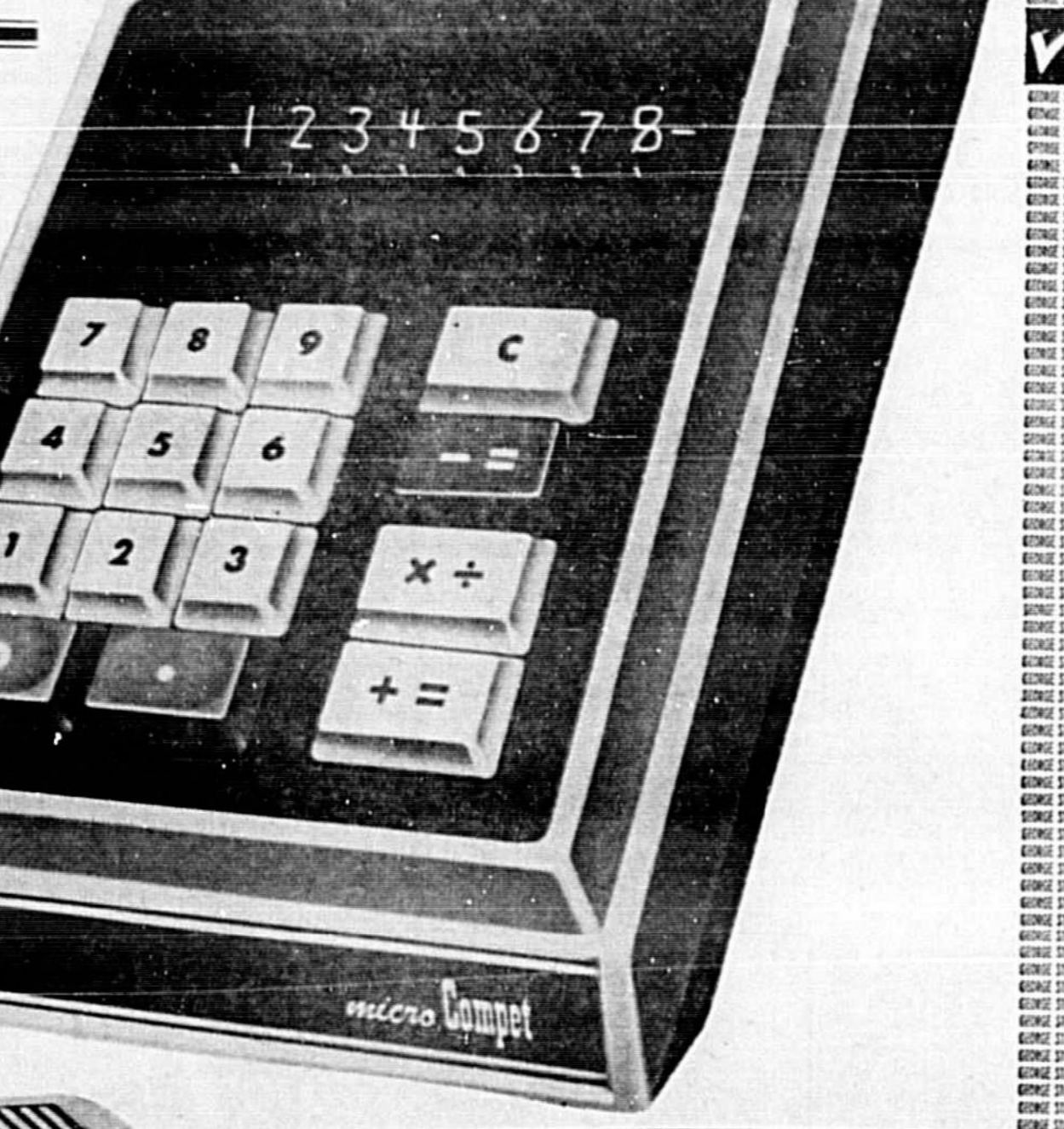

## Bill Claims State At Fault In Killing

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A state senator filed today a bill claiming the state should share in the responsibility for the murder of a Tampa woman and pay her surviving parents \$100,000 in damages. The bill, by Sen. David McClain, R-Tampa, charges the state with negligence because it set free from prison the man who was subsequently accused of the woman's death. McClain said if the suspect — Roy Carroll Paulk — had not been released from Raiford State Prison in 1970, the murder victim, Diana La Paz, "might be alive today." The lawmaker said he thought it was the first time a bill asking the state to pay damages in connection with an apparent criminal act "has ever been filed in Florida." McClain, who is also an attorney, said the state should have prosecuted Paulk, convicted of four felony crimes, under Florida's habitual offender statute, but didn't. "Under the Florida statute," he said, "after a person is convicted of four felonies, the state is required to institute a proceeding to have such a person sentenced to life in prison. This was not done in Paulk's case, although the law clearly requires it be done." He said Paulk was convicted four times between 1960 and 1967 on felony charges of breaking and entering. The final conviction, brought him five years at Raiford Prison, of which three were served.

## From McCoy To Sanford Airport Flight Diversions Are Discussed

Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) at Thursday's meeting directed SIC director David Kelley to check into the situation at Orlando regarding the number of flights, both passenger and freight into McCoy Airport with an eye toward possible overcrowding. SIC and City Commissioner Julian Stenstrom said the added flights coming into the airport with the opening of Walt Disney World might hamper the air freight traffic now coming into the Orange County air facility. Apparently, the interest in McCoy Jet Port hinges on whether the number of freight flights are increasing at such a rate that some could be diverted to Sanford Airport, which is just minutes away from Orlando and is seldom used for cargo hauling, after the Sanford Navy based closed and the air facilities were needed to the city for civilian use. Page Airways Inc., Sanford, Ala., filed last week with officials in town this week talking with the city commission and Disney representatives concerning the use of the local airport for a non-scheduled air line charter service taking passengers to Disney World. Kelley was also instructed by the SIC to talk with Inmont Corporation plant here, now in process of closing down because of national economic conditions. Anything that the firm plans to do with the building and estimated one million dollars in equipment. LONGWOOD — Plans to proceed with the separation of Longwood's water department from the city clerk's office were started at last night's meeting of the city council, with the city clerk being told by the city council to advertise in the local paper for a full time water clerk to assist in the proposed sewerage system. Walter J. Krohn Sr. has offered for sale to the city 17 acres of land for \$15,000. Mrs. Lucille Strickland appeared before the council asking that city ordinance 207 be enforced. She stated that the property adjacent to her is overgrown with high weeds, and she would like the matter taken care of as set down in ordinance 207. Samuel L. Chester has been advised to stop building on his property as he has completed a building without a building permit or waiting for permission from the council to do so at a public hearing. City Attorney Joe Davis Jr. was authorized to draw up an agreement with Lew Arnold concerning the laying of water pipe to his luncheonette. Mr. Arnold has agreed to pay costs over \$2,000. Bills were ordered to be paid including a bill for \$30,000 for water pipes. A public hearing and work session was set for July 15.

# Sanford City Commission's Hard Decision

Time for temporization by the leadership of the City of Sanford in the critical matter of uniting and consolidating every effort to attract industry is at an end.

Transition of any metropolitan area from a basic agricultural economy, artificially stimulated and depressed by the presence of an Armed Forces airfield, into the era where industrial expansion is the dominant factor is one with inbuilt difficulties and controversies.

This has been the state of affairs in Greater Sanford for at least the past decade. Throw into this stew, the unexpected spice of a fantastic explosion of population and industry along Seminole County's southern rim, and some idea of the complexity of the ingredients can be savored.

Now the decision of the board of directors of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce to present a budget to the Sanford City Commission which will embody a brand new request for \$14,000 to help fund its industrial sales effort has brought an issue, too long evaded, into sharp focus.

For this Chamber of Commerce is no usual and

community in the future. The present membership of 548 is high, based on the population of the Greater Sanford area, and the chamber has been successful in securing new members but it is doubtful that new member income can be expected to provide sufficient income to meet our needs.

"All of us benefit from the chamber's active program of work and recognize that the business and professional community provide the majority of funds to support the wide range of projects. However, we must remember that our Chamber of Commerce is not a charitable organization and should not be financed as such.

"It is most embarrassing, in view of our long history of accomplishments, to have to beg for financial help and if this is going to be the situation then perhaps the time has come when the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce shall be either properly funded to carry on its work, for the entire community, or cease to exist.

We believe it would be a disaster of almost incalculable dimensions should the unthinkable happen and the Chamber of Commerce expire because of lack

of funding by the city which has benefitted so greatly from the volunteer work of its members.

Thus we believe that the City Commission must add this factor to the others which cry for decision. One, of course, is the future of the Sanford Industrial Commission. Another is the real impact of the Sanford Airport Authority on this overall industrial opportunity.

Common sense dictates that the future of each, with the exception of the Airport Authority, must be decided on the basis of past accomplishments, present ability to perform effectively and a very difficult but very important exclusion of personality clashes from the deliberations.

We do endorse without any qualification this move by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce to secure city funds in an amount sufficient to allow all of the volunteer talent which the chamber possesses to continue working for the city.

As we said "time for temporization" is over. Let the city leadership show that they recognize this fact and are ready to make the basic decisions on which the proper growth of this lakeside city must depend!

Accounts of public apathy toward crime and lawmen have generated qualms about citizen response to violence.

We are beginning to see a reversal of that trend, a movement away from indifference toward genuine concern.

Angry bystanders in New York City turned on two men who had beaten and shot a policeman. Other instances of officers being rescued by citizens have occurred.

Private businesses and organizations are joining the fight against crime. Recently a New Orleans newspaper established a \$100,000 fund for rewards to persons assisting lawmen in solving crimes of violence.

Americans seem to be saying they will not tolerate indefinitely a resurgence of lawlessness. They are increasingly willing to assume personal risks.

They are demonstrating something of the pioneer spirit which helped end an era of border ruffianism and brought security to frontier communities.

The new frontier against crime is equally hazardous and more widespread.

And the changing mood of the people indicates they are prepared, if need be, to take cooperative action for the maintenance of their security.

### What Is "The Presidency?"

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The American people must surely be terribly confused these days about what their presidency is supposed to accomplish.

The recent disclosures of historical documents on the Vietnam war lead some interpreters to charge American presidents with arrogant use (or abuse) of their powers.

Behind a cloak of secrecy, we are told, our presidents have committed unnumberable errors. If only the public and its guardians in the Congress had known, the whole awful mess could have been avoided.

This proposition is by its nature unprovable, since there can be no replay of the war, the events surrounding it, or any other past history.

But there is a deeper issue here. The presidency, in its present swollen manifestation, is in big part a creation of the American people — including some of its cruelest and most unprovable scholars.

Many presidential scholars quickly say that Americans have made an enormous investment in their presidents.

For decades, they have been handing over the reins of government to a single state or district. They have looked to them to

rise above the bickering congressional arena. They have called upon presidents to lead, boldly. They have seen them as the only power-wielders able to act with the speed demanded in a swiftly changing time.

In this century of total war, of great depressions, of shattering and sometimes furious surprise, presidents inevitably have tried to respond to the popular summus.

A book soon to emerge will chart the responsive growth of the U.S. presidency through the growth of the White House staff establishment over the past four decades. Larger than ever today, it has nearly the character of a new branch of government.

This establishment is more than just an enlarged body of advisers. It is the need to the immense, glacier-like federal bureaucracy which is supposed to execute the will of president and Congress. It helps push Congress itself.

The American presidency, then, has grown not just in response to popular demand, but in natural offset to the frustrating immobility of bigger and bigger government.

The celebrated Pentagon papers underscore the flaws in this trend. The White House staff, indeed, the whole structure of "top advisers," is a box within a box. It is screened from the direct wrath of voters. Its crucial deliberations usually become known widely only after they have already become part of past history.

Obviously there is a dangerous remoteness in all this. Yet it is not at all clear that the key war-and-peace decisions of recent years would have been any wiser, if somehow Congress and the public had played a larger role.

Some scholars of the presidency would argue, in fact, that — for all its evident growth — the power of the presidency is seriously exaggerated. The argument is taken further, to the contention that some of the fetters which limit the presidency are placed there by the very public which has wanted the White House to run the show.

### Domestic Commentary Drugs-For-GIs Traffic Booms

WASHINGTON (NEA) — If information now in hand is correct, the heroin traffic with American troops in Vietnam is likely to get worse despite U.S. efforts.

Strong attempts will be made by the men now profiting from that trade to expand the distribution system in the United States to service the addicts they have developed in the Far East.

Some of this information comes in letters from a friend in close contact with the Vietnamese police, some from American officials charged with keeping an eye on illegal Vietnamese traffic and some from American customs officials, who make no bones about the difficulty they face in preventing heroin smuggling.

So far as can be gathered, the principal bankrollers—the men who furnish the funds and act as the bulk of the profits after agents, officials, transporters and sellers are paid off — are an interconnected group of Chinese financiers in Hong Kong, Singapore and Macao.

These men are international, with business associates in Thailand, Laos, Malaysia, South Vietnam, Burma and Communist China. In Thailand, however, the top men are themselves believed to be neither Communist nor Communist.

A friend who is an officer in the opium detail of the Thai police says that some members of the Chinese communities in several nations work together in a close "family" relationship similar to that of the Mafia in the United States, with their own codes, "kinship" loyalties and enforcement procedures.

# Polly's Pointers

DEAR POLLY: I would like to share with Mrs. J. R. my English grandmother's instructions for the proper washing of knitted or woven woollen. Use SODA (not detergent) enough to make a light suds. Immerse garment, soak for 15 minutes, squeeze water out. Rinse in quite warm water that contains just enough soap to look milky but not sudsy. Roll in towels. Block to size by pinning to a pattern on a cloth-covered board. Let dry. Woven woollens can be dried on a line and steam ironed. Never wash such things in an automatic washer or dry in a dryer and never, never rinse in clear water.

As to the things that are already shrunken, she might try washing them in soap and blocking to size. Soap-washed wool has a great deal of elasticity, especially while damp, and often it is possible to gently but firmly pull them back to shape and pin in place. Cover with a bath towel and allow to dry away from heat and sun. I have used this method satisfactorily for 40 years and the only thing anything shrank was when washed in a detergent. When last washing my wool things last and last last—FRANCES

DEAR POLLY—PLEASE tell me what I can do with the pretty ends of worn pillowcases that have beautifully embroidered and crocheted borders. Directly in the fabric so it cannot be removed for use on other such cases. All of these were made with love for me by my mother, grandmother and great-grandmother so I hate to completely discard them—JANE

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# NASA Chief Sees Space Flight Gap After 1973

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The new chief of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration says the United States may not have a manned space flight for at least five years after 1973 and he is trying to do something about it.

James C. Fletcher spoke with Governor Thursday on his first visit to Cape Kennedy since becoming NASA administrator April 27.

He noted America's Apollo moon landing program ended next year and will be followed in 1975 by three three-man flights in a small space station named Skylab. Under present planning, the next U.S. manned flight then would be in 1978 or 1979 when the first Skylab space shuttle is to be launched.

"The concern that there is this gap after Skylab," Fletcher said. "We have a lot of skilled people in the manned flight area and we don't want to just let them sit idle while waiting for the next manned flight."

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## Rodman Litigation Continues

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The question of whether a state court judge can give orders to a federal agency has been resolved by transferring litigation over the water level in Rodman Pool to federal court.

U. S. District Judge Charles K. Scott Thursday transferred the case to his court from state court at Jacksonville.

The federal judge dissolved an injunction against lowering the water level which state Judge J. L. Wadsworth issued June 2.

# U. S. Ponders Latest Peace Moves

WASHINGTON (AP) — U. S. officials say the Nixon administration is pondering the significance of a surprise new shift in the latest peace offensive launched by Vietnamese Communist leaders.

The shift is in the form of a demand for the ouster of only President Nguyen Van Thieu from an future South Vietnam government ready to negotiate an end of the war.

Previously North Vietnamese and Viet Cong leaders had insisted that not only Thieu, but Vice Premier Nguyen Cao Ky and Prime Minister Tran Thieu Khem, as well, would be unacceptable in a post-war government.

For years Communist delegates at the Paris peace talks have been calling for removal of the Thieu-Ky-Khem clique, one diplomatic informant said.

"They practically pronounced Thieu-Ky-Khem as one word. Now they've begun speaking only of Thieu."

The shift in the Communist position emerged after Madame Nguyen Thi Binh presented the Viet Cong's latest peace package at the Paris conference July 1. The proposal asked for release of all prisoners held by the Communists in the North and South by the year's end.

Authorities in the State Department have no doubt the subtle Communist move has significance. But just how much significance will be known only when some face-to-face talking begins between negotiators for the two sides.

## Economic Goals Are Abandoned

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nixon administration has abandoned, for all practical purposes, its target of a \$1,065-billion national economy this year, the most controversial forecast in its January economic report to Congress.

Dr. Paul W. McCracken, chairman of President Nixon's Council of Economic Advisors, told Congress Thursday pushing the economy toward that target in the last half of the year could accelerate inflation.

McCracken acknowledged the economy in the first six months of 1971 fell below the administration's forecasts, while inflation has continued higher and the rise of real output and employment have risen less than we expected."

In January, the administration, said GNP National Product, output of the nation's goods and services, should climb by 6 per cent this year to a total of \$1,065 trillion.

That kind of GNP growth was needed, it said, to reduce unemployment to about 4.5 per cent and inflation, as measured by GNP standards, to 3 per cent by mid-1972.

McCracken was more cautious about these predictions in testimony Thursday before the Senate-House Economic Committee, saying only that the rising rate of inflation would decelerate this year and unemployment would decline.

"There is a danger that if money GNP were now to rise, or be pushed up, to reach the targets previously put forward, that would revive inflation or at least seriously delay its abatement," he said.

Three gunmen entered the apartment and took \$2,000 in cash, personal jewels which Loren valued at \$20,000 and jewelry she had borrowed from a New York dealer.

A fourth man held four hotel employees at gunpoint while the robbery took place.

Allende made the comment Wednesday in visiting with an Argentine soccer team.

Meyer Lansky  
TEL AVIV (AP) — Meyer Lansky says allegations that he is a leader in organized crime in the United States are preposterous. He also says he will seek Israeli citizenship and fight a U.S. government bid to revoke his passport.

Lansky, who has been in Israel for more than a year on a tourist visa, is under indictment in Miami, Fla., on charges of skimming casino profits from gambling casinos operations and of refusing to appear before a grand jury.

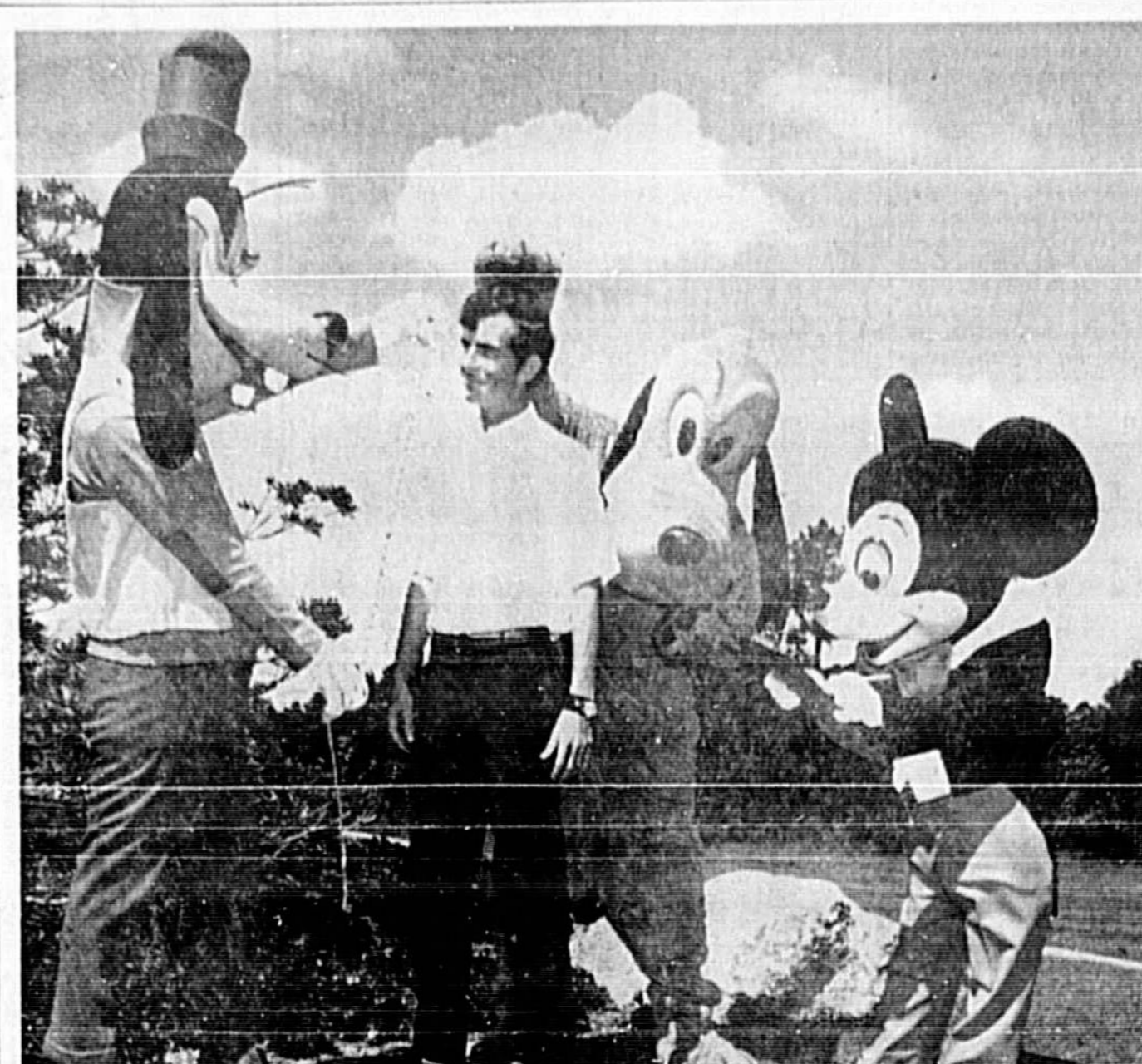

### Viet General Denies Narcotic Involvement

SAIGON (AP) — Maj. Gen. Nguo Dzu denied today that he is a "chief trafficker" in the narcotics trade and challenged his accuser, U.S. Rep. Robert H. Steele, to document his charges.

"I deny it completely," Dzu said in an interview at his home in Saigon. He said he came to Saigon from his regional command in Pleiku to discuss the charge with President Nguyen Van Thieu, a political ally.

Steele, R. Conn., told a House foreign affairs subcommittee in Washington Wednesday that Dzu is "one of the chief traffickers in heroin in Southeast Asia."

He said the general's involvement was referred to in intelligence reports to the U.S. Ambassador to Saigon, Eliot A. Holt, and in a letter from Pleiku dated last month. Steele said he was sure Dzu had been involved in the drug trade since 1963.

Dzu said Steele's charges "damage not only my honor as a general but also the honor of the Vietnamese people."

He accused "personal enemies" of distributing anonymous letters three months ago accusing him of corruption and said he believes they are responsible for the latest charge.

"But Congressman Steele did not check that before making his declaration," Dzu said. "If he has documents, he has to show me and deal with me."

The general said he and his senior American adviser, John Paul Vann, were waging a "very big" campaign against narcotics in his military region "and we got very nice results since two months. Yesterday we captured in Pleiku more than 200 kilos of marijuana."

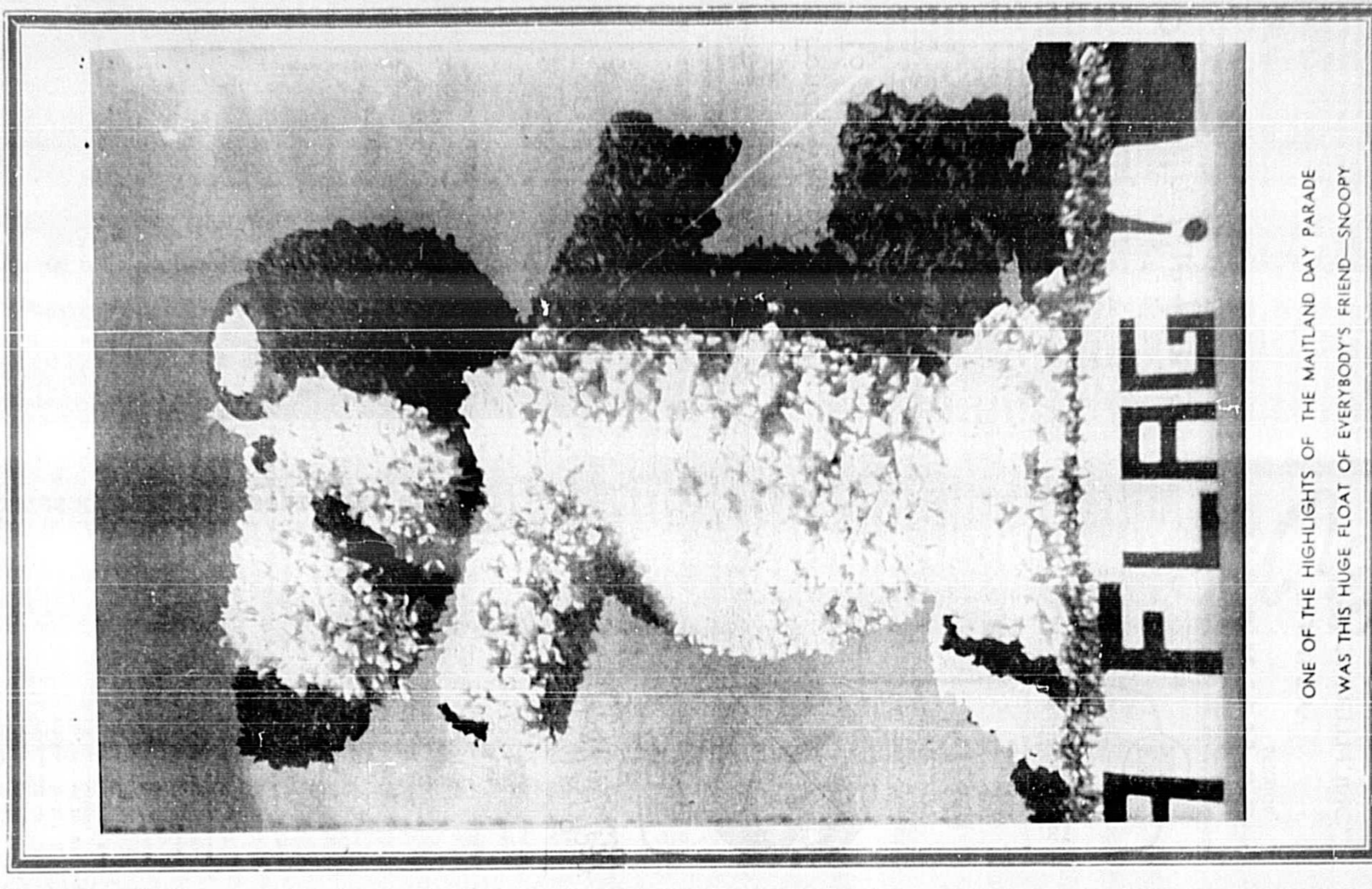

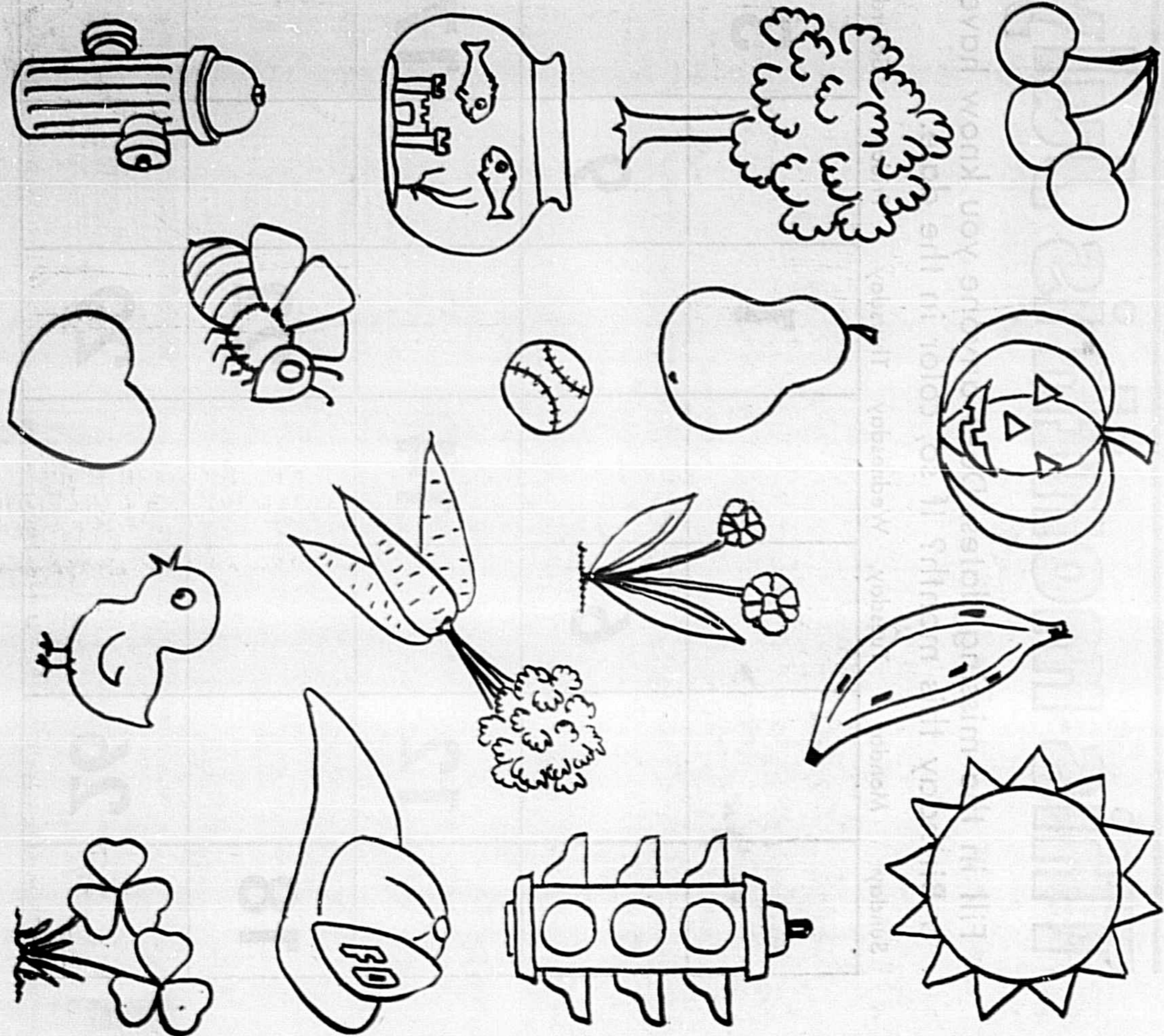

## Vihlen Solves It Oil Leak Is Repaired

County Commissioner Sid Vihlen Jr. has reported that it was called to his attention over the weekend by Wade Singletary that he and other individuals who had fished along the Lake Monroe bulkhead over the past several days had noticed that an oil line was leaking oil approximately seven to eight feet inland from the bulkhead.

The oil had killed all vegetation and apparently had soaked down behind the bulkhead and into Lake Monroe.

In addition, Vihlen reported, the heavy rains which the area has recently experienced evidently spilled a quantity of oil over the bulkhead and into the lake.

Vihlen, along with Singletary, made an inspection of the problem this morning and traced the owners of this particular dock, which they found to be Murphy Oil Company. Vihlen made another inspection of the site with George Hughes, local owner-manager of the Murphy Oil bulk plant and tank farm.

Hughes noted the problem, according to Vihlen, and immediately volunteered to call the Murphy maintenance department in Orlando and have them come over to dig up the pipe and surrounding area to verify the point of leakage and to correct the problem.

At the first inspection this morning, Vihlen said that an oil slick was found of approximately 75-100 feet wide along the bulkhead and 75 feet into the lake. Oil was noticed on the ground around the pipe within 100 square feet area. Vihlen estimated that a careless smoker could ignite the seepage and cause a conflagration which could endanger public safety.

Vihlen said that he was confident the situation and feels that periodically these companies which have docks and inlet oil piping from the docks to the oil tanks should initiate safety inspections of all joints and mechanical equipment to obviate oil leaks. Vihlen said that he was personally writing and contacting each respective company.

The commissioner noted that he hoped this would prevent similar instances and that "it is time for preventive maintenance rather than having the problem and detrimental effects and then considering the problem."

The Sanford Herald contacted Hughes this morning, and Hughes reported that a repair man from the Orlando maintenance department will be in Sanford today to dig up the pipe and "see what's up."

## Askew Orders Hospital Probe State Attorney To Investigate Actions Of Board Of Trustees

State Attorney Abbott Herring said today he received a telephone communication from the office of Gov. Reubin Askew asking him to check into the information furnished the governor relative to Seminole Memorial Hospital.

Herring said he did not yet know what was involved in the proposed probe and he would have to wait until he received written information from the governor.

The state attorney did disclose he already had talked with at least one member of the hospital staff, whom he did not identify, and advised him he had been asked to look into the hospital situation.

"I just don't know at this time what the problems are," Herring added. He said he expected to receive something in writing sometime this week from Governor Askew's office.

The hospital's medical staff has written to the governor asking that an investigation be made of the hospital trustees relative to alleged violations of the so-called "Sunshine Law" and hospital by-laws.

The by-law accusation evolved after the trustees declined to renew the pathologist contract of Dr. Fred Ionata and instead hired Dr. G. V. Garay to fill the position now held by Dr. Ionata.

Another development involving Dr. Ionata occurred when the pathologist wrote Governor Askew a separate letter, replying to a portion of another letter written to the Governor by Charles Lansing, trustee chairman, and replying to the medical staff's accusations, which accompanied the request for the hospital probe.

Ionata stated, "one member of the board says . . . there was only one disagreement and that was the board's decision to terminate the contract of Dr. Ionata." Dr. Ionata continued, "another member blazes that . . . several men jeopardize the future of this taxpayer owned institution."

Dr. Ionata commented, "It is one man that creates the disagreement between the board and the staff or is it several men, or are there other reasons not divulged by the board?" The pathologist added that in an April 1971 letter to the trustees he "did not demand more money."

He said his letter requested re-negotiation of a contract. "I had asked the board to restore the general provisions of my original contract with the hospital."

Under that contract, Dr. Ionata said, outpatient volume jumped from \$12,000 a year to \$30,000 a year in two years. "This is work referred to me from non-hospitalized patients, chiefly from doctor's offices." (Continued on Page 14A, Col. 6)

## Bandshell Pier Request To Be Aired By Council

Sanford City Commission tonight will discuss the proposed leasing or sale of the old bandshell pier, a block-long peninsula that extends into Lake Monroe at the marina site and is located at the base of Park Avenue at Seminole Boulevard.

City Manager W. E. Knowles said today that Herbert Stenstrom, Sanford real estate broker and brother to City Commissioner Julian Stenstrom, asked him about prospects for the city either selling or leasing the bandshell property for the location of a motel.

The city manager said there was talk of extending the pier in a westerly direction but added no other details are available.

Stenstrom contacted today by The Herald confirmed that a "large international chain" was interested in the pier as a site for a motel. He said the firm had been here and viewed several proposed properties, but had settled on the lake-front site as the prime choice.

Because of the preliminary discussions going on, the real estate broker declined to disclose the name of his client at this time.

Apparently the interest in building motels in the Sanford area coincides with the prospect of an influx of Disney-bound tourists. Still another reported motel deal to be consummated for an area off I-4 on SR 46, involves Holiday Inn.

Another item expected to draw interest at tonight's commission meeting is a scheduled discussion of Page Airways, Inc., Sanford Airport's fixed base operator, and Modern Air, a non-scheduled charter flight service, relative to a request by Modern Air to lease airport facilities.

The City Commission last week heard from Page representatives who advised they are in process of negotiating a contract with National Air Charter Association (NACA) for Page's Washington Dulles Airport.

Douglas Judson, Page official, stressed that at the conclusion of Dulles negotiations, his firm would attempt to work out a contract to provide the NACA service to Sanford Airport in order to bring 1,500 or more Walt Disney World bound tourists a day to the local airport.

The City Commission agenda is consideration of a contract between Gottmann, Dragash and Matz, architects for the proposed city police-security complex, which is slated to be constructed soon.

## Two Base Operators? Competition At Airport?

A decision is expected to be rendered by the Sanford City Commission tonight as to whether the city is interested in a proposal by Modern Air, Inc. for it to become the second fixed base operator at Sanford Airport.

Page Airways currently operates as the line fixed base operator. The commission met in special session this morning, but was unable to take any official action due to the absence of Commissioners Vincent Roberts and J. H. Crapps.

Al Finnell, manager of ground services for Modern Air, made the presentation to the commission. Finnell said Modern Air wants to establish supplemental (non-scheduled charter) air line services at the Sanford facility. The charter flights would be incorporated with hotels, motels, restaurants and tourist facilities as package tours.

Included in Modern Air's proposal is a request that it be allowed to service and provide ground support for other supplemental charter services that will be coming to Sanford Airport. This would introduce competition to the airport, Finnell said.

Modern Air is not particularly interested in handling the small private planes but would do so if it was required in order to become the airport's second fixed base operator.

Finnell was questioned by Mayor Lee P. Moore in Modern Air had been in contact with Page concerning Page providing the ground support for his firm. Finnell said his company had talked with Page officials in Rochester, N.Y., who had indicated they do not want to see Modern Air designated as a fixed base operator and wanted to continue to provide all ground support to allow it to recover all or part of its initial \$41,000 capital investment at the airport.

Finnell said Modern Air does not want to be serviced by Page because his company is of the opinion Modern Air could provide the services at a much reduced cost. He also said if he had to look to Page Airways for ground support that Modern Air would seriously consider looking elsewhere for a place to base its operations to handle the Walt Disney World tourist traffic.

Airport Manager J. S. (Red) Cleveland was asked by Moore his opinion of Modern Air's proposal. Cleveland said private enterprise is needed if the port is to grow and the competition "would be fine." The airport manager added that Modern Air appeared to meet all of the qualifications set by the city for fixed base operator and he is in favor of designating Modern Air as the second fixed base operator at the airport.

## Zoning Fee Schedule To Be Aired

County Commissioners tomorrow will reach a decision on a fee schedule for the zoning department. Proposals have been made to raise some fees both in inspections and in public hearings, although no firm action has been taken.

County Attorney Harold Johnson will give three reports to the commission . . . that of First Florida Utilities fencing violation, the well drillers board and heating and mechanical board and indigent defense service.

County Planner David Parr will report on federal urban highway funding and water pollution abatement study review status.

Road Supt. J. C. Lavender will report relative to Washington Heights roads.

Engineer R. C. (Cal) Conkita will discuss Ecological Utilities, Inc. plant expansion.

At 11 a.m. there will be a bid decision on the anthropological equipment and a continued public hearing on rezoning from A-1 to R-1AAA, east of Tusculum and north of Red Bug Road.
