

Synthetic Golf Balls Coming In; Full Supply Seen For New Year

NEW YORK CITY, Oct. 3 (AP)—Synthetic rubber golf balls for civilian use will begin to trickle onto the market this week, with more becoming available about the middle of next month and a still greater supply obtainable for the winter season in

companies hoping to reach capacity production by the turn of the year, if enough trained workers can be secured.

All companies will not release the balls at the same time. Dunlop said yesterday it will release a small amount of its synthetic balls to professionals some time this week. Inasmuch as the company has no inventories and is working against production, the amount put out this week will be small, increasing as production is stepped up.

The line currently being released is the professional line, but Dunlop's store line will be ready for sale to the public no later than Oct. 20.

Spalding reported that its new synthetic ball will be released for civilian use about the middle of next month, with limited quantities to be shipped for distribution through dealers and golf professionals.

United States Rubber has started production and said it expects limited amounts to be available for play during the winter season in Florida and the West. The company said it now is engaged in reconfiguring its plants from war production, putting its machines back in place and retraining its workers.

The ball differs from the regular ball only in that it is made of natural rubber threads instead of the pre-war golf balls. The ball was described as superior to the reprocessed ball, but inferior to the natural rubber ball.

All companies admitted that the synthetic rubber ball was only a "stop-gap" ball to be produced until such time as the natural rubber again is available. With the condition of the rubber plantations in the Far East uncertain, production plans have been geared to using synthetic rubber and will continue on this basis until a plentiful supply of natural rubber is assured.

Florida Has Room For 343,362 Visitors

OCALA, Oct. 3. (Special)—Florida has overnight accommodations for 343,362 persons, according to the statistical division of the State Chamber of Commerce.

A thorough study of the needs of the approaching winter season, which is expected to be the greatest in the state's history, was made here at a Silver Springs conference, Friday Oct. 5, of the tourist development division of the State Chamber which group is headed by Joe C. Adams of Miami, who is also president of the Florida State Hotel Association.

Representatives of transportation lines, the State Advertising Commission and the State Hotel Commission will participate, as well as perhaps 75 or 100 local chamber of commerce executives.

The conference will assemble at 12:30 o'clock, and is expected to last all the afternoon.

The 2-day annual meeting of the Florida Association of Commercial Organization Executives will follow the deliberations of the State Chamber's tourist division.

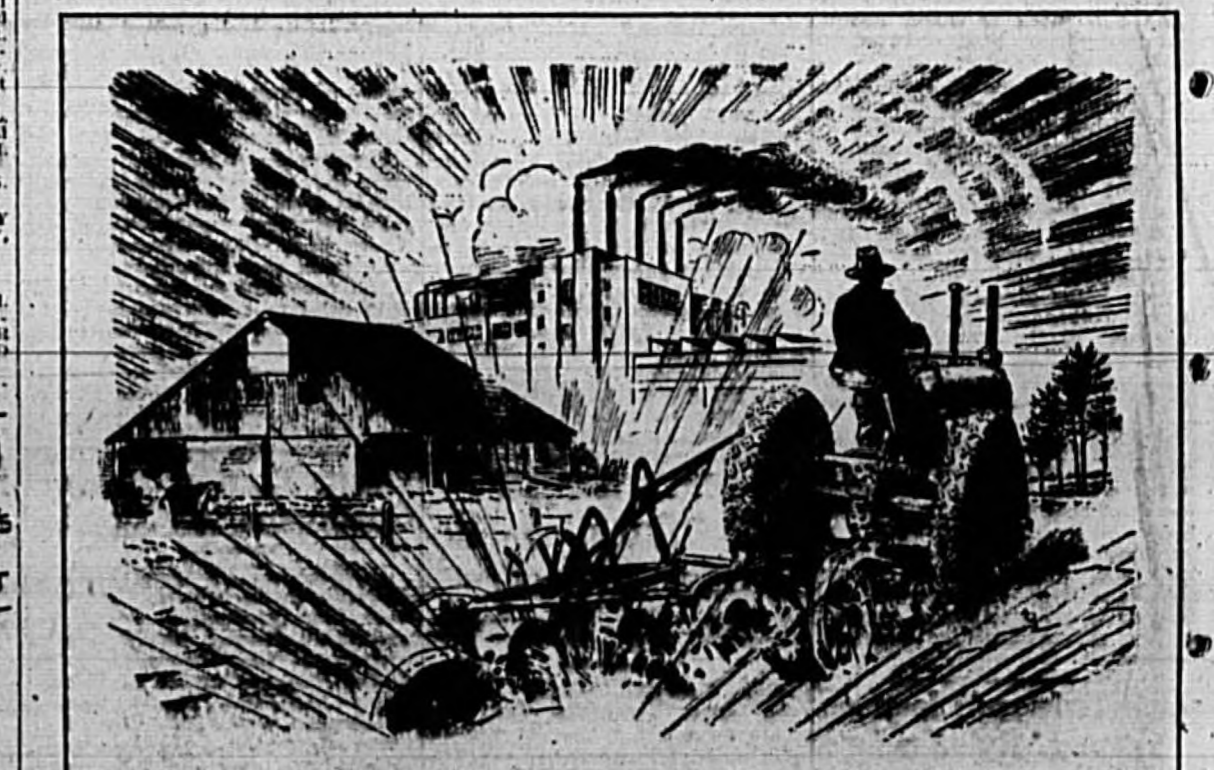

Have you done your part in this drive by the USO and the National War Fund?

Peanut Group to Confer on Year's Policy - headline. And that's no political convention either.

Just as we suspected, with this new time change, the mornings seem like all day; the afternoons are over before you know it.

Floridians are getting so hurricane-conscious these days of high water it is necessary for the Weather Bureau to deny that a hurricane is coming.

One thing we like about this telephone strike, nobody could call us up in the middle of the night to try to find out why they didn't get their paper.

The elevator strikers in New York City listened to Governor Dewey and went back to work. Anyone who can bring order out of the labor chaos in this country today deserves a lot of credit.

As long as we are talking about building some tennis courts—and somebody was—and a swimming pool, how'd it be to try to get the golf course fixed up a little bit before the winter season starts? A little agitation by local golfers along that line might do some good.

The Sanford Board of Realtors is trying to locate rooms or apartments for the scores of families coming here from Melbourne as a result of the transfer of many officers and men to the Sanford Naval Air Station.

Now that the war is over and any danger from the enemy past, the generals who led the armies are catching hell. Eisenhower is persecuting the Jews. Patton is favoring the Nazis. MacArthur is too kind to the Japs, and Bradley is in dutch with the American Legion.

An interesting story in Sunday's Tampa Tribune told how George McHenry, former Seminole County legislator, now superintendent of the Florida Industrial School for Boys, controls the sometimes difficult youths without resort to sweetboxes or other "cruel and unusual punishment" sometimes found in Florida's penal institutions.

We hope that every effort will be made by local officials to secure for the County the equipment of the Dispensary at the Naval Air Station when the Navy is through with it.

I had a conference yesterday with the Soviet press in the course of which they asked me my views about things here.

There is of course a gap between our form of Government and theirs which we can never bridge. These people have had an entirely different background from what we have had.

New Kind Of Charity

Just how irrational we have become in our economic thinking since the New Deal undertook to produce the more abundant life by creating scarcities is illustrated by President Truman's recent explanation as to who is to receive the proposed \$25 weekly unemployment compensation.

This is no bonus to soldiers who have been sweating it out in the foxholes of Iwo Jima and Okinawa. This is no pension for veterans who lost an arm or a leg at Anzio, Saint Lo or the Belgian Bulge.

It is a handout, pure and simple, to those who have been holding the best-paying jobs of the past few years. It is hush money for the war profiteers of the Second World War, who now that peace has come, are trying to create a condition of chaos by fomenting strikes.

President Truman said himself that he is not recommending this \$25 a week for everybody, not even for everybody that is unemployed. A White House statement issued Saturday said, "The President has sought to make it clear that the \$25 is a ceiling and does not mean that everybody would get \$25 a week."

This business of almost doubling the handout to those who have been receiving wages of \$50 a week or more will cost the government—should say, the taxpayers—hundreds of millions of dollars.

And they call this a humanitarian government!

Argentine Situation

Peron, it appears, needed a front in the coup of 1943. Arturo Rawson supplied that front. With him as figure-head the coup had a chance to succeed which it would not have had with Peron leading.

The Rawson group seems to have underestimated Peron's power; and for the moment it lost, Rawson was jailed, and so were the managers of the liberal newspapers.

The hopeful fact is that the Argentine people are sufficiently sick of their overlords to want to take matters into their own hands.

that Eisenhower had notified Patton of his transfer to command of the U.S. 15th army on Sept. 29. The 15th is an "army" in name only and has no occupation zone.
Come to Head
Patton was summoned from his headquarters at Munich on Sept. 29 to give an accounting to Eisenhower of his activities in Bavaria. The situation in Bavaria came to a head early last week when Patton told correspondents that complaints of anti-Nazis that Nazis were in the civil government were just a case of the "outs fighting the ins" and reminded him of the bickering between Democrats and Republicans in the United States.
The transfer relegated Patton, a pistol-packing example of aggressive warfare to the command of an "army" which is virtually non-existent. Since July, when it relinquished the Rhineland, the 15th has been a phantom army consisting of little more than a "outs fighting the ins" detachment which has been assigned to compile and write a report of American participation in the European war.
In his new post, the 15th's commanding officer, General Patton will have no authority over the German civil population. The handful of troops he will command are stationed west of the Rhine, at Bad Neuenahr near the Remagen bridge, in the center of the French occupation zone. The 15th's headquarters remained there when all its troops were discharged or redeployed in July.

there, working hard, getting no food except what the natives would give them. The result was, eating insects, lizards, snakes, and anything that they could find, dogs, cats, birds and reptiles. When they were moved to Japan they were treated somewhat better.
"After talking to so many, I came to the conclusion that the Japanese military either had to make a good face on the home-land for the 'civilians' or they could not get enough supplies to the 'soldiers' for their armies, so they had to let their prisoners look after themselves."
"When I finally got my two American lads through the line and settled in a nice clean cot, I told them that I hoped they would have a pleasant voyage and be home for Thanksgiving. One had a bad rash on his hands, but I shook hands with both of them, and they both started crying and thanked me and America, for taking such good care of them. I nearly cried too, but I had lots of work to do, so I did not have time to get sentimental."
"Prisoners said that from their camp they could see the fires of the first atomic bomb, and from the way the earth shook they all thought the world was coming to an end. It must have been terrific."
"All the women and children were put on the Consolation. I'm rather glad that we did not get the children on here, for they would have been much harder to handle than a bunch of happy men. We're steaming right along toward Okinawa where we will deposit these patients and head for Nagasaki where we will pick up some more patients. Nagasaki on the island of Kyushu was three-fourths demolished by the second atomic bomb and people are still dropping dead from it."

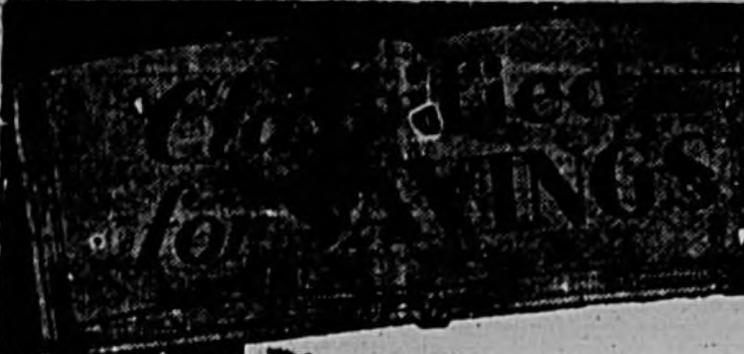

Big 5 Peace Parley Ends In Discord

(Continued From Page One) sia's insistence on barring France and China from discussions of Balkan peace treaties.

"There is good reason to believe," he added, "that with continued patience and understanding on all sides agreement on essentials can be attained."

"We are determined upon that outcome."

No date was set, however, for any future meeting and, conference circles said, it probably would not be until the heads of the governments find some solution of the procedure issue.

Until such an agreement is reached, the deputies, who have been instructed to remain in London, will be unable to deal with the major problems awaiting settlement.

The discussions began Sept. 11 with the assignment to forge the framework of the Italian peace treaty and to write the basic clauses of similar treaties for the beaten Axis satellites, Hungary, Romania and Bulgaria.

No agreement apparently was reached on any major issue.
