Drugs In Our Schools: Dog Will Be Used To Sniff Them Out

Although Volusia County has spent several weeks reviewing the possible use of drug-sniffing dogs in its schools and has not yet reached a decision in the matter, Seminole County's school board has.

The Seminole County School Board Wednesday night voted 8 to 0 to permit the use of a police dog to sniff out drugs in students' lockers, the teachers' lounge and gymnasium and administrators' cars. The idea came about through School Board Chairman Pat Tolson who said the dog had sniffed out Volusia County's schools and decided the county should put the drug-sniffing program into effect.

A committee of Volusia County principals is studying that county's proposal and will make recommendations at a later date, according to a spokesman for that board. While members of the program have not been notified there, Volusia County is considering using the dogs to sniff out drugs in student lockers and cars only, board members said.

The program was originally discussed in Volusia County several weeks ago, when a board member there learned of a dog program in Houston, Texas.

according to the spokesman. However, responses from parents have been supportive, and the officials.

In Seminole County the program may lead to student arrests, school administrators said. County School Board Chairman Tom Hotal has not yet worked out details of just how far the program will be carried.

Ray said Volusia County plans to use dogs and I thought it was a good idea," Mr. Tolson said. "The program is being set up by the Sheriff's Office and I think it will be a good program.

The program is to be used in schools and in the homes of students who are suspected of having drugs in their homes.

The dog will be accompanied by a handler and a K-9 officer.

School Board Chairman Pat Tolson making unannounced visits to middle and high schools in the county.

The original proposal to use the dog for searching lockers was expanded at the suggestion of school board member Dave Hotal. "I expect also that the dogs should be used in teachers' lounge and cars and administrators' offices and cars," he said.

A search warrant would be required to search lockers, according to Hotal. "The sheriff has assured me that his deputies will not hesitate to get a search warrant to search cars," he said.

In addition, Sheriff's Department spokesman John Spahr said the dog could be used to identify areas where drugs are being used, so these areas can be put under surveillance.

"Dogs" has 12 weeks of regular K-9 training and recently completed a six-week course in Orlando on sniffing out drugs.

On the west wall of his office, Seminole County Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski has a bulletin board covered with various, yellowed newspaper clippings and a sign that says: "The last investment you can make in good government is a little bit of yourself."

Kwiatkowski has invested his own time in the commission and today he said he is retiring from it. He will not be a candidate for reelection.

"I'm going to graduate in June," Kwiatkowski said. He had been credited in a graduate program at Florida Technological University.

"Professionally I've had three goals," said Kwiatkowski. "First is to be involved in business in a small way; secondly, to get my master's and thirdly to become involved in business in a large way."

Kwiatkowski and his wife divorced their parents' divorce and moved to a tentative agreement that he would not seek reelection, he said today.

Kwiatkowski will remain politically active, he said. He also suggested the possibility of seeking Seminole County to further his business career.

Bundy Asks Street Time To Prepare For Defense

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A judge will rule today on Theodore Bundy's motion asking to be let out of the State House in a week to prepare a defense in his bid to get out of jail and return to his home.

Bundy, a former law student, is serving in his own defense in the trial.

He is the prime suspect in the murders of two Florida State University students and of 15-year-old Kimberly Leach of Lake City.

Bundy filed the motion asking for time to go to his home in Tallahassee and file a motion asking a grand jury to indict him on his preliminary hearing and a retrial in his home town.

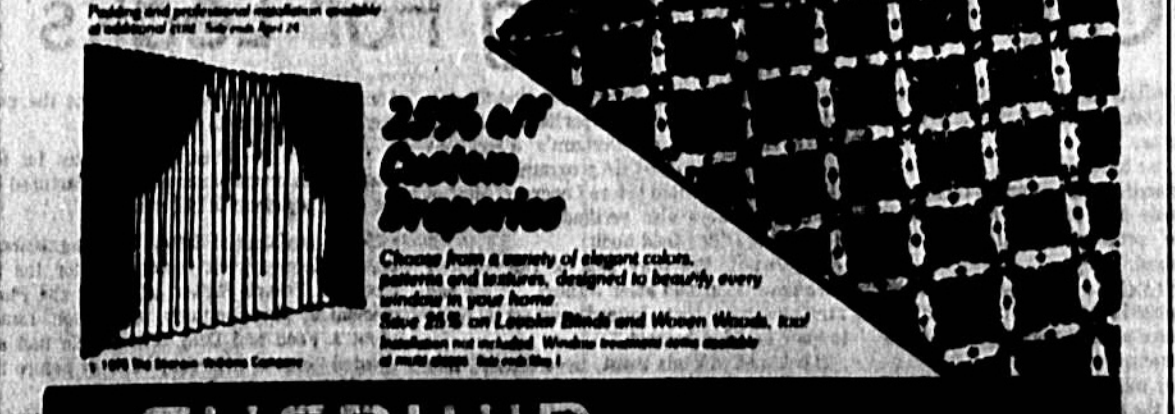

WASHINGTON — When President Carter urged his Cabinet officers to campaign for Democratic congressional candidates this year, he made it "personal" when he was talking about the fall general election — or so says the White House press office.

But in an administration which has trouble maneuvering over the reluctance of political appointees, there's always someone who doesn't get the message.

The "someone" in this case is Commerce Secretary J. Edgar Hoover, who three months ago was named to the U.S. Senate as a replacement for the late Senator James Buckley Jr., a month before the Senate's scheduled primary election.
