Morales, superintendent of the 1952 elections. The state department's policy on Nicaragua is to withdraw the marines as soon as possible after the 1952 elections in that country.

ELIZABETH, N. J., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Max Schmeling, world's heavyweight boxing champion, signed a guarantee of \$10,000 yesterday for a bout in New Jersey courts.

JOE HALL TRACK STARS AS EYE ON OLYMPICS

To Forego College Competition To Prepare For Olympics

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Feb. 6.—Joseph Hall, Florida's champion track team who passed through the national decathlon last year, already is pointing for the 1952 event and the Olympics.

Most victorious in his first participation in the grueling 10-event track and field show at Philadelphia, Hall plans to forego his year's college competition with the University of Florida and prepare for the decathlon in the A. U. Meets this Summer at Lincoln, Neb.

And the intensive training program he has mapped out all works toward top competition for the international Olympic all-around championship in 1952.

Hall's absence will be a blow to the Florida track team, which under the tutelage of Coach Stirling, the Gainesville coach, has not won a dual meet in three years.

Illigis spotted Hall, a tall, graceful type of athlete, long in intramural competition early in his sophomore year. Hall had played some basketball and baseball in high school but knew nothing of other sports.

He became a star almost overnight. In his first track season he was fourth among Florida's point-scorers and a hands man in any event. And the next fall he took his first shot at football.

And last year he was the key man of the track team and a time-winner on the grid square. Together with a couple of other Florida men, he topped among Philadelphia in a dilapidated and unheated, won the high hurdles, took second in the high jump and the shot put and finished high enough in the other events to rank third at the state.

"I do not plan to compete in intercollegiate track this season, but to work on form. I hope to enter the decathlon in the A. U. Meets at Lincoln, Neb., this Summer," he said. "Next year I want to engage in football and track, using the latter as training for the decathlon of the Olympics. This is only an ambition. I may not be able to make the team."

in the trials and sometimes he encountered Thursday when he established a new lap speed record of 245 in less than an hour, over a measured mile course.

Dressed in the same dark brown golf clothes he wore when he clipped off more than 200 miles a minute in his Bluebird on the beach speedway, the veteran British driver talked freely of his experience and declared he was ready to go out and try to beat his own mark before he returns to England should beach and weather conditions permit.

He said the beach appeared to be disintegrating, however, and that he might not be able even to make an assault upon the speed record for five kilometers as he had planned.

"I was greatly disappointed that I was not able to set the record higher than I did," the slender, soft voiced Britisher said. "I am confident that if the beach had been better I could have beaten it up to 250 or possibly higher."

"Because the beach was uneven and wet in places, there was a terrific drag on the car which slowed me down very much. The power thus absorbed because of such conditions, was enormous. Then, too, the visibility was terrible. I never could see more than 300 yards ahead of me at any time."

"The flags set up along the outside of the course to aid in helping me to steer a straight course were very beneficial. I don't think I should have been able to make the speed I did had it not been for them. The red cloth bulls, eyes hung up over the course at the start and finish of the mile also were of tremendous value. They helped me to get straight as I approached the measured mile, otherwise I might have run into the soft sand."

Pausing a moment to light a cigarette, Campbell said the greatest sensation he got during his two record-breaking runs came when he shifted from second to third gear and the car fairly shot away from him.

"That feeling was wonderful—a most wonderful sensation—as the car sped away with me. Really words can't describe the wonderful sensation."
