

## Drinking Age Going Up To 19

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — After weeks of parliamentary maneuvering, the Florida House passed a bill today raising the legal drinking age to 19.

The action appeared to seal the fate of drinking at 18 because the Senate already has approved a nearly identical measure and Governor Bob Graham has said he will sign either one.

The House approved the bill by an 82-27 vote after proponents spent weeks trying to get the controversial issue to the floor.

Both of Seminole County's legislators — Rep. Bobby Brantley, R-Longwood, and Rep. Robert Hallaway, D-Altamonte Springs — voted in favor of the legislation.

Proponents of raising the drinking age employed a parliamentary tool Wednesday to free the measure for a final vote.

Twice this session they had succeeded through parliamentary maneuvering in bringing the issue to the House floor, only to be thwarted at the last moment when the bills were yanked back into various committees.

One of the measures (HB 161), however, had cleared both the appropriations and finance and tax committees and was resting in a category of the House calendar known as "unfinished business."

As the House convened Wednesday morning, Rep. Bill Lockwood, D-Hialeah, moved to waive the rules and consider the unfinished business so he could pull an unrelated bill into his veterans affairs committee.

After his motion was routinely approved, Rep. Fran Carlton, D-Orlando, saw her opportunity and immediately moved to consider the drinking bill as well.

Speaker Hyatt Brown had no choice but to accept the motion and the bill rolled over to a final reading today.

## Juvenile Crime Rate Jumps 8% In County

Arrests of juveniles in Seminole County rose 8 percent last year, an increase of more than 4 percent, measured against the rise in population.

More children from Sanford were arrested than from any other area in the county.

These are two of the findings in a report released today by the Seminole Youth Planning Council on youth crime in the county from Sept. 1, 1978 to Aug. 31, 1979.

According to the report, made public this morning by Circuit Judge Dominick Salfi, slightly more than 2 percent of the school-age population of the county found itself in some kind of trouble for breaking the law last year.

Close to 1,600 arrests were made of people between the ages of 7 and 18, with the number peaking at 16.

Most of those arrested were male — only 330 girls were charged with crimes during the year.

Of the 1,995 charges filed against youths in 1978-79, 365 were brought against Sanford residents. Longwood youths were charged in 235 cases. Altamonte Springs juveniles were charged with 232 offenses.

The most popular crimes were petty thefts and burglaries, the report says. Grand larceny and shoplifting also were popular offenses, although youths were charged with offenses ranging from use of fireworks to murder.

Last year, three 7-year-olds were arrested, one for theft, one for trespassing, and one for shoplifting.

Two youths, one 14 years old and one whose age was not reported, were charged with prostitution. One of the prostitution suspects was male.

Five youths between the ages of 14 and 17 were arrested for use of obscene language. Nine youths were charged with armed robbery.

Only four of the 1,995 charges filed ended with the defendants found not guilty, although in 453 cases a formal declaration of guilt or innocence was withheld pending reports on future behavior.

Sixteen of the charges led to the youths going into the regular court system, to be tried as adults.

More than 12 percent of the charges filed, 254 of them, were arbitrated by the county's program designed to keep first-time offenders in minor crimes out of the court system, while still making them responsible for restitution.

Four-hundred twelve of the charges were dismissed.

## Thunder Storm Knocks Out Power, Floods Area Streets

A powerful lightning charged storm moved through the Seminole County region late Wednesday afternoon leaving many residents without power for several hours.

The storm also dumped 2.3 inches of rain on Sanford flooding streets and telephone cables.

Florida Power Corp. spokesman Tracey Smith said a total of 10,000 customers were affected by outages caused by lightning damage in several areas of South Seminole County.

More than 7,500 customers in Altamonte Springs and Forest City were hit by outages beginning at about 8:20 p.m. All of these were repaired by 8 p.m. and some were out only one hour, Smith said.

Some 2,000 customers in the southeast Seminole County subdivision of Eastbrook, where lightning hit a transformer, were among those affected.

"There were scattered outages throughout Orange (County) and south Seminole," Smith said, "and some were without power for many hours. There was a whole lot of lightning damage and one of our major power lines was knocked out. That was some kind of storm."

Approximately 100 customers in Longwood were without power for several hours earlier Wednesday afternoon after an automobile ran into a guy wire supporting a power pole at Longdale and Highland avenues.

Scott Burns, district manager for Florida Power & Light Co., reported 3,500 to 4,000 customers were without power Wednesday night in scattered areas of north Seminole and Deltona. Power was restored in most areas by midnight, but repair crews worked all night, he said.

There were some customers affected in Lach Arbor, Pinecrest and Sunland areas of Sanford, but power outages were mostly in outlying areas such as Geneva and Chuluota.

Tree damage to lines was minimal, Burns said, but lightning blew out laterals, burned transformers and knocked out two feeders. He said the storm hit Deltona about 4:30 p.m., moving in to Seminole at about 5 p.m. "There still may be one or two lines out in Deltona," he added.

While the Winter Park Telephone Co. which serves south Seminole did not have any storm-related problems, according to spokesman Brad Johnson, Southern Bell Telephone crews in Sanford were still trying to dry out cables this morning as the result of heavy rains.

Sanford Southern Bell Manager Woody Wilson said crews worked until midnight Wednesday and cleared up 200 trouble calls. He said the wet cables had caused a problem with slow dialing in the central office.

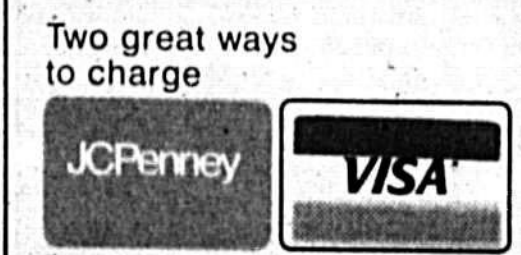
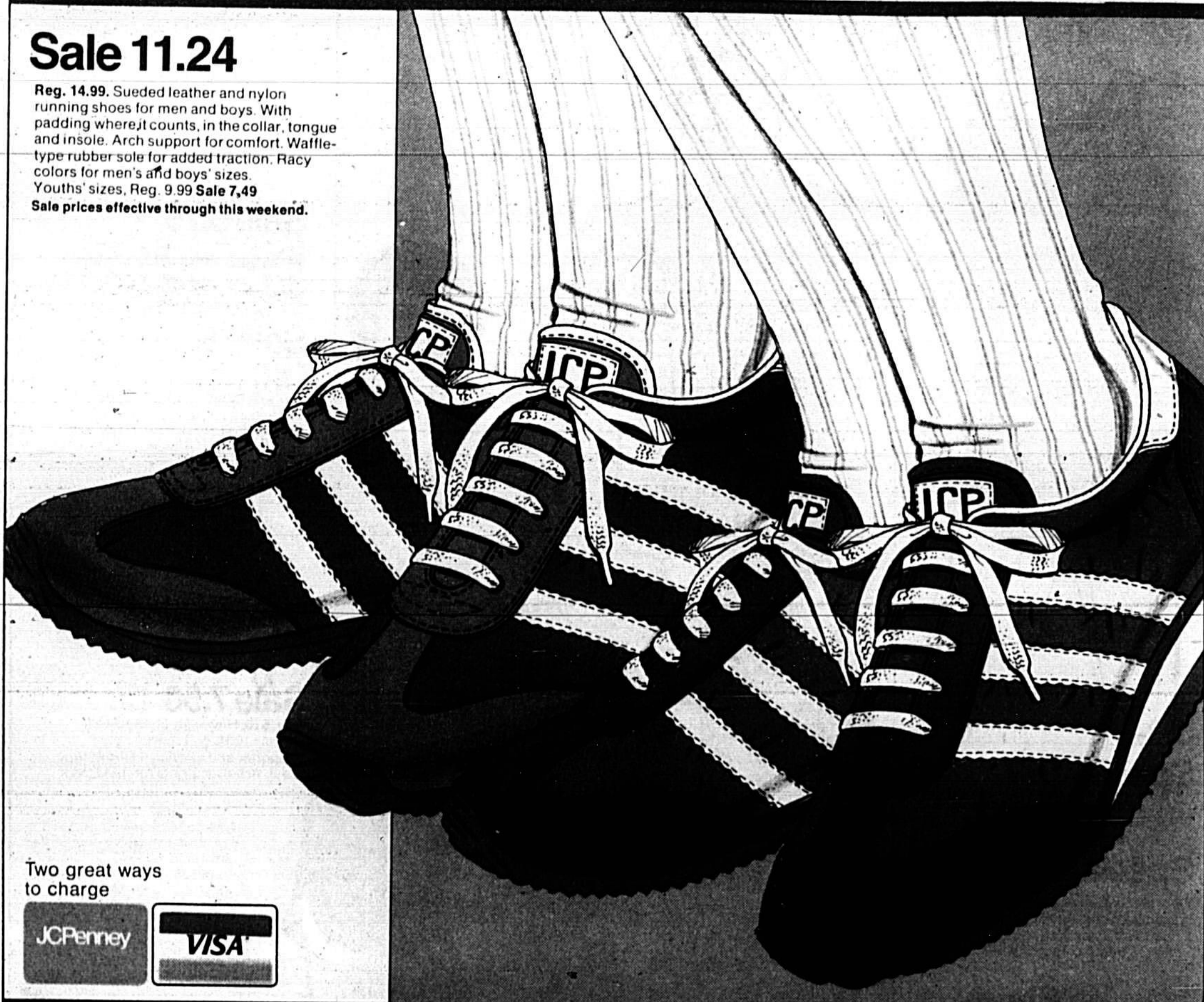

## Layer To Respond To Feds

Superintendent of Schools William P. Layer will rebut certain federal Department of Education (DOE) charges that the Seminole County school district discriminates against non-English speaking students, although School Board Attorney Ned Julian Jr. advised him against it.

In a letter Layer received May 15, the DOE Office of Civil Rights demanded that the school district explain the action it will take to correct the civil rights violations within 30 days. In 90 days, the action must be implemented, the letter said.

At the school board's regular meeting Wednesday evening, Layer indicated he would send a letter that would rebut two of the five conclusions made by DOE investigators.

"They're not asking for rebuttal," Julian said. "That's not going to get the job done. They've made their decision that what we're doing is not sufficient, whether we agree with it or not. Their findings are factual."

"No, they're not," Layer replied. "I'm going to give you some good common sense advice," Julian said. "Along with arguing with them about their report we need to give some consideration to what it says. If not we will find ourselves in a lawsuit that may take two years."

School officials acknowledge that non-compliance with the DOE's requests could cost the school system \$3 million a year in money given to it directly from that department. Federal money given to the district through the state might also be in jeopardy.

The DOE reported it found the Seminole school district failed to:

- 1) Adequately identify students whose primary home language is other than English;
- 2) Adequately assess and classify these students by the level of their English language capabilities and proficiencies;
- 3) Identify any language deficiencies by providing an instructional program designed to meet these students' special needs;
- 4) Provide students an instructional program to acquire skills and concepts necessary for promotion;
- 5) Adequately notify national origin minority group parents of school activities which are called to the attention of other parents.

Layer called the DOE "all wet" on items three and four.

"Three and four are educational conclusions they have no weight of evidence to support. They're drawing these conclusions on the skimpiest evidence you've ever seen."

Layer agreed that items one, two and five should be corrected. He said there has been no board policy on these matters.

"But it has been our practice when any person is brought to the school to enroll who is not proficient in English we try to teach that child English as quickly as possible."

"They (the DOE) have indicated to me," Julian said, "that they are going to be the judge of whether we are fulfilling our legal obligation to those students that speak English as a second language. Whether we agree or not, it's the law. Once they decide we are not going to comply, they'll refer it to the Justice Department."

"We need to do more now than fuss with them about their conclusions. Maybe we'd better spend our energies and talents trying to accommodate them," the attorney said.

But at least one school board member agreed with Layer. "It's time somebody tells the bureaucracy where to get off and not kowtow," said William Kroll.

Although board member Roland Williams said he would favor the board taking action to direct the superintendent to "follow up on compliance," with the DOE's requests, the board took no action since the DOE's letter was addressed to Layer.

"You'd better believe I'm going to respond," Layer said. "I'm the one who will get sued if I don't."

The board did acknowledge Layer's offer to bring his response back to the board for their perusal before it is forwarded to the DOE. The deadline for the response is 30 days from May 15.

## Iran Revolutionary Council To Meet Khomeini Saturday

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Iran's Revolutionary Council will meet with Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini Saturday in a session expected to deal with the appointment of a prime minister.

## South Korea Revolt Spreads

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — A bloody revolt against South Korea's military government by protesters who seized control of the provincial capital of Kwangju spread today to 16 neighboring towns and an island off the coast.

Acting Premier Park Chung-hee, named to the post Wednesday, rushed to Kwangju, the nation's fourth largest city, in an attempt to calm the angry rioters and forestall possible full-scale street battles between troops and the protesters. But there was no sign the fighting would ease.

## State Attorney Seeks Aid In Police Probe

Chief Assistant State Attorney Chris Ray said today he will be asking for assistance from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement with the investigation into purported wrongdoing by a member of the Allamonte Springs Police Department's Detective Division.

The state attorney's office was requested by Allamonte Police Chief Justice East to conduct an investigation into activities of Det. William Doyle, on May 13, Ray said today the investigator, Dan Lawrence, assigned to the case began the investigation last Thursday or Friday.

"Originally I said it would take only a week or two to conclude the investigation," Ray said today. "Now I see it will probably take longer."

Ray said it was believed it would be necessary to interview four to five witnesses. "Now it is obvious there will be more witnesses than that," he said.

He added that he is asking assistance from the FDLE. In other Allamonte Police Department matters, James Martindale, bureau commander of the detective division of the department, has submitted his resignation from the department effective June 4.

A member of the Allamonte Police Department for the past seven years, Martindale was the first detective in the department and has been bureau commander for the past six years. The special bureau has eight members.

Martindale cited what he called untrue allegations against him and one of his detectives as the reasons for his resignation.

"I regretfully resign my position as bureau commander in order to maintain my integrity and relieve my family of the undue burden to which they have been exposed," Martindale's letter said. "I feel I have been instrumental in the growth of the Allamonte Springs Police Department for the past seven years. I am proud to have been a part of it. I am disappointed that this relationship cannot continue."

The detective division has been under fire in recent weeks as a result of a television report that Doyle required sexual favors from prostitutes operating within the city and acted improperly in other matters. State Attorney Douglas Chesler's office is currently investigating the allegations.

# 2 Plead Guilty To Stromberg Burglary

Two Sanford youths have pleaded guilty to helping burglarize the Lake Mary Stromberg-Carlson plant on Jan. 17. The two unrelated 16-year-olds were released in their parents' custody pending a presentence investigation.

The teenagers admitted helping steal a 1,305-pound safe filled with more than \$260,000 in blank traveler's checks, negotiable papers and cash from the plant. Police say the safe was taken from the plant on a dolly and dragged from the area behind a Volkswagen Beetle.

Two other persons, Lance D. Butler, 21, of Sanford, a former Stromberg-Carlson security guard, and Robert P. Hughes of Sanford, are set to stand trial next in Circuit Court for the burglary.

Lake Mary police say they expect at least one more arrest in the burglary.

## Lake Mary Council To Consider Cuts In Police Agency

Reduction in the police department budget, contract award on liability insurance and the annual control agreement with the county, mandatory garbage collection and an affirmative action plan are to be discussed by the Lake Mary City Council at its 7:30 p.m. meeting today.

The agenda item expected to receive the most attention from the public is the proposed reduction of the police department to overcome a \$13,000 to \$20,000 city deficit anticipated in the current fiscal year's budget for City Manager Phil Kubles has estimated it will be necessary to cut three patrolmen.

Petitions are to be presented in the city council demanding that the police department be kept as it is. Currently the department has nine full-time officers, including Chief Harry Benson. In addition, the dispatching unit has four full-time personnel. The unit handles calls for both the police and fire departments.

Kubles has invited a representative of the county's animal control division to discuss problems the city is having with dogs roaming free in the city. Under a city-county contract, the county division is to pick up stray animals.

Liability insurance bids, which the city council has been considering for the past month, are from the Karnas agency in Sanford and Risk Management Inc., a firm established by the Florida League of Cities.

# NATION IN BRIEF

## Carter Hits Hotels, Motels For Large Boost In Rates

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The American hotel and motel industry boosted its overnight lodging rates 23 percent during the first three months of 1980 and President Carter doesn't like it one bit.

With the summer travel season just around the corner, Carter lashed out at hotel officials Wednesday and warned them he would make public those who defy his price guidelines.

"We have had a lot of trouble with many members of the hotel-motel industry," Carter said in addressing an industry meeting.

The president's Council on Wage and Price Stability promptly singled out the Hilton hotel group for special criticism, noting Hilton's hotel Division reaped excessive profits between Oct. 1, 1978, and Sept. 30, 1979. Hyatt Hotels were cited for violating price standards previously.

## Abscam Indictments To Begin

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sources say federal prosecutors have decided to seek an indictment against Philadelphia lawyer Howard Criden, who allegedly led FBI undercover agents to five congressmen in the "Abscam" investigation.

Prosecutors planned to ask a federal grand jury in Philadelphia today to issue criminal charges against Criden and three members of Philadelphia's City Council — including its president, according to the sources and court papers.

If the grand jury goes along, it will mark the first significant indictments stemming from the wide-ranging scandal that broke Feb. 2 with a splash of news letters disclosing eight members of Congress and more than 20 local politicians were implicated.

## Nations Discuss OPEC Fee

PARIS (UPI) — Energy ministers from leading non-OPEC nations, including the United States, gathered today in an attempt to cope with the new chaotic spiraling of OPEC prices.

The meeting of the 24-nation International Energy Agency came after fresh price increases by eight of the 13 member nations of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

The report by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, the OPEC's parent body, warned nations were going into debt to buy the appreciating OPEC oil, whose average price is now \$32 a barrel, with prices ranging from \$28 for Saudi oil to \$38.21 for Algerian oil.

## Head Shops To Challenge Anti-Drug Law In Courts

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — Unless the courts invalidate a new anti-drug law, Florida's so-called head shops have until Oct. 1 to clear their shelves of rolling papers, cocaine spoons and other paraphernalia.

The law was signed by Gov. Bob Graham Wednesday. Anticipating his signature, a coalition of headshop retailers hired Miami civil liberties attorney Tobias Simon to challenge it in court. The coalition, Florida Businessmen for Free Enterprise, said it was vague and outlaws equipment used for lawful purposes.

# Coast Guard Boat Captain Claims Cuban Interference

## Sealift Slows

KEY WEST, Fla. (UPI) — A Coast Guard skipper is complaining of harassment from a Cuban warship and fishing boats as he conducts his sealift rescue mission in the Florida Straits.

Capt. Alan Miller of the Coast Guard cutter Courageous said Wednesday a 200-foot Cuban submarine chaser came within 2 1/2 miles of his vessel Monday and a Navy jet was scrambled. There was no further confrontation.

Miller also complained that Cuban fishing boats sometimes come too close during rescue operations.

Meanwhile, the arrivals of new Cuban refugees slowed considerably. The figure for Wednesday was only 1,150, bringing the total since April 21 to 67,750.

Coast Guard Cmdr. Samuel Dennis estimated there were only 700 to 800 vessels remaining at Cuba's port of Mariel.

"We do see a faint glimmer at the end of the tunnel as long as we can prevent more boats from going over there in large numbers," Dennis said.

Elsewhere, 127 Spanish speaking National Guardsmen from Puerto Rico were summoned to the refugee camp at Fort Chaffee, Ark., because of thefts and disturbances.

An ocean tugboat has picked up 21 refugees and four others from a sinking ship near the Dry Tortugas and is taking them to Galveston, Texas, its original destination.

At Fort Indiantown Gap, Pa., the newest refugee camp's first reunion was held. Haglie Pons and her 28-year-old son Carlos were reunited in a chaotic, emotional scene with Mrs. Pons' husband, Carlos Sr., and another son, Ysrael.

At Fort Chaffee, Lt. Col. A.T. Brainerd reported five thefts in the Cuban area Tuesday night, and an incident in which up to 40 refugees attempted to leave the camp after the 8 a.m. curfew.

The Navy asked us if we considered it a threat and we said, 'No, apparently, they're just interested,' said Miller.

## Military Spending Fight To Begin

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House-Senate conference committee approval of a defense-heavy balanced budget for 1981 has set the stage for a major fight on military spending on the House floor next week.

The committee gave tentative approval to a \$61.3 billion budget, with an increase in defense spending that went beyond proposals rejected by the House last week.

Final committee approval is scheduled today and the House is expected to vote on the budget next Wednesday.

It was approved over the strong objection of five liberal and moderate House Democrats, who called the defense increase unrealistic and said it was achieved at the expense of important domestic spending. They vowed to fight it on the floor.

The budget contained \$15.7 billion for the Pentagon and for national security programs under the Energy Department. It was \$5.8 billion above the House proposal for defense spending and only \$2 billion below the proposal of the more military-minded Senate.

"We were prepared to go to \$15 billion," Rep. Leon Panetta, D-Calif., one of the five dissenters, told reporters. "We made clear that ought to be our bottom line."

Rep. Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., said \$13 billion was "as far as anyone can reasonably go" above their original proposal.

Panetta, Gephardt and the other three members of the group, dubbed by Gephardt the "gang of five," talked with reporters after the vote to explain their opposition.

The others are Reps. Norman Mineta, D-Calif.; Timothy Wirth, D-Colo., and William Brodhead, D-Mich.

## Miami Approaches State Of Calm

MIAMI (UPI) — Police are carefully easing anti-riot precautions while a federal grand jury begins to look into the [late] beating of a black businessman that led to bloodshed, burning and looting earlier in the week.

The federal grand jury opened its investigation into the beating death of the 33-year-old McDuffie by calling his mother, Eula Belle McDuffie. She spent 30 minutes in the jury room.

"I hope that justice will be done," Mrs. McDuffie said later. "I feel they (the grand jurors) are the last place I could stop. I pray they will bring justice."

The Justice Department also is investigating 13 other cases of alleged brutality in the Miami area.

Arthur F. Nehrbass, who heads the Miami FBI office, said a clerk received a telephone threat against the former policeman late Sunday night and notified police.

Nehrbass said it was "impossible" to evaluate the Miami FBI bureau received the following anonymous telephone call:

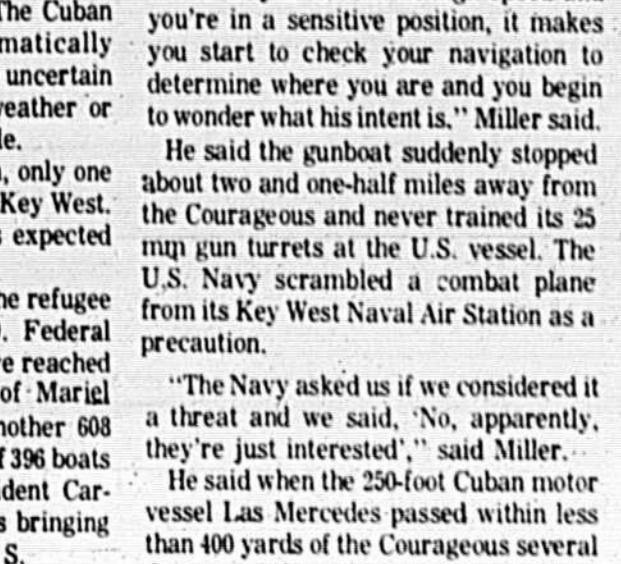

It's Losing By Default

The Carter Administration continues to fiddle while Central America burns. In congressional testimony recently, Franklin D. Kramer, deputy assistant secretary of defense, disclosed the latest evidence of Fidel Castro's efforts to subvert the non-communist governments of Central America.

These weapons, all of Soviet-bloc origin, include automatic rifles, machine guns, rocket-propelled anti-tank grenades, and demolition explosives. In response, the Carter administration proposes to dispatch only "non-lethal" military equipment — tear gas, radios, and trucks — to El Salvador's beleaguered security forces.

And even this timid response is opposed by some in the administration who believe the United States should withhold support from any government that falls short of Jeffersonian standards of democracy.

Such fastidious timidity breeds understandable contempt in Havana for the United States and its remaining friends in Central America and the Caribbean. No doubt this contributed to the recent outrageous attack by Cuban MiGs on a Bahamian patrol boat.

It is all sadly reminiscent of Mr. Carter's pathetic reaction to the 1977 invasion of Zaire by Cuban-armed guerrillas based in Angola. On that occasion, the United States sent the Zairian army field packs and rations. It was left to France and Morocco to provide the paratroop and infantry battalions that saved Zaire's mineral-rich Shaba Province from conquest by Cuban proxies.

At the moment, there is no need for American troops in El Salvador, Honduras, or Guatemala. But sending in the Marines may become the only alternative to Marxist victories in each of these countries unless the Carter administration can find ways to counter Cuban intervention. It can't be done with tear gas, although the U. S. Embassy guard in San Salvador may require new stocks just to protect the American ambassador.

What the Carter administration needs — but shows absolutely no sign of developing — is a coherent strategy capable of sealing Central America against Cuban subversion. Such a strategy would leave the Central American countries free to resolve their own domestic turmoil while the United States, preferably with support from the Organization of American States, barred Castro's troops, agents, and arms from the mainland.

Until and unless this is accomplished, the dominoes in Central America will continue to fall Havana's way.

DICK WEST Cares About Readers?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In the last decade or so there has been a multifold increase in the number of books published in this country each year. The statistics alone might lead you to believe America is in the throes of a cultural awakening the likes of which the world has seldom seen. But when you start looking between the covers, you can see this is not the case.

The majority of the books being published today, including some on the best-seller lists, don't remotely resemble literature. Even what are known in the trade as "nonbooks" are dignified with dust jackets by the score. I was talking with a local book scout about this phenomenon and suggested that the tastes of the reading public must be steadily deteriorating.

"The reading public has nothing to do with it," he replied. "The publishing business no longer is geared to the demands of readers for books. It is geared to the demands of talk shows for authors."

"In recent years, he pointed out, the talk show format has grown beyond all imagining. There are radio talk shows and television talk shows; early morning talk shows, afternoon talk shows, all-night talk shows and talk shows at just about every hour in between. "Oh, absolutely," he said. "If the number of sales ever equals the number of talk show appearances by the author, it's a best seller."

WILLIAM STEIF New Drug Cost Guide Is Ready

Back in September 1978, this column reported that the Health Care Financing Administration was ready to send a booklet entitled "Guide to Prescription Drug Costs" to American physicians, pharmacists and other interested consumers. I was immediately deluged with hundreds of requests for the free guide, which is a compilation of comparative wholesale prices of nearly 200 drugs, mostly prescription drugs but also a few non-prescription.

Names and addresses of those who asked for the guide were turned over to HCFA, which promised to honor the requests. There were two hiccups: — The Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association, composed of companies doing 95 percent of the nation's \$15 billion-a-year drug business, filed suit.

— HCFA's own cumbersome machinery slowed the work. A year ago a federal judge in Baltimore threw out the drugmaker's suit, remarking, "Agency release of this information is undoubtedly in the public interest." An HCFA official at the time said the guide's distribution would be underway in August 1979.

Now, 22 months after September 1978, the guide is going out to 420,000 doctors and pharmacists — as about 5,000 other folks who were in waiting for it. The data are based on a federal survey of wholesale drug prices — cost to the pharmacist, not to you — made in May and June 1979. So the prices are a little brown around the edges; you know what inflation's done in the last year.

Nevertheless, the guide provides a good comparison, the nation's first, of prices for the same drug made by different manufacturers. It contains 16 categories of drugs, such as analgesics (pain-killers), anti-arthritis, anti-infectives, psychotherapeutics and cardiovascular.

There's a similar range of daily-dosage prices in an even more common compound, aspirin: 1.4 to 49 cents for eight equivalent aspirin tablets. "It's a guide," says HCFA's Charles Spalding. "There may be some variations between stores, of course. It's not really directed at consumers but at doctors and pharmacists, to alert them."

But it can help "the smart consumer," Spalding concedes. "He or she must shop around." If doctors and pharmacists have any interest in all this holding down costs to their customers and they ought to — the guide can help them, too. "If you want a copy of the guide, write for 'Guide to Prescription Drug Costs,' in care of Inquiries Staff, Bureau of Program Policy, Health Care Financing Administration, 6601 Security Blvd., Baltimore, Md. 21225. Don't write me. Write HCFA. It's their long-overdue baby."

Carter Views Volcano Destruction

VANCOUVER, Wash. (UPI) — President Carter toured the devastated Mount St. Helens area by helicopter today for a first-hand assessment of the damage left by the volcano's giant eruption that took 19 lives. At least 100 are missing. Skirting heavy clouds and drizzle that hung over the mountain and nearby towns, Carter was flown over the ash and mudslides from the eruption that blew 1,300 feet off the top of the once-majestic cone 50 miles north of Portland, Ore.

The volcano itself was quiet, the earthquake activity and the steam and ash plumes diminished sharply since earlier in the week. Carter's tour was to include an hour-long stop in Kelso and Longview, Wash., where 50,000 residents were warned earlier in the week to be prepared for immediate evacuation if a mud wall at Spirit Lake high on the mountain gave way, sending millions of gallons of water cascading down the mountain toward the Columbia River.

The president was to tour a Red Cross emergency center set up at a Longview school to aid refugees from the base of the mountain who were evacuated shortly after the eruption Sunday. After returning to Portland, Carter was scheduled to fly to Spokane, Wash., hard-hit by thousands of tons of falling ash from the eruption, before returning to Washington.

An overnight rain in eastern Washington washed much of the ash deposits from Spokane's streets. However, across the state line in Idaho, the National Guard was called out to help clean up the volcanic debris. The president, who declared Washington state a major disaster area, flew into Portland, Ore., Wednesday night and met with governors Jay Lee Roy of Washington, Victor Atiyeh of Oregon and John Evans of Idaho for two hours in a federal relief center in Vancouver.

At one point during Wednesday night's meeting, Miss Ray impatiently interrupted Carter's questioning of the volcano's status to say, "This is all very interesting, but we need help." When the president asked, "What do you need specifically?," she replied by spelling out the word "m-o-n-e-y."

Carter later told the governor to "just inventory very carefully all the needs... we'll work out the costs," but announced no specific programs after the meeting. Because the volcano has quieted in recent days, the president spoke optimistically that the worst was over.

"We hope the people will not be excessively concerned about aspects of the catastrophe for the future," he said in Portland, before retiring for the night. "The ash (spread by the volcano) is not poisonous. It will not poison the land. We hope the crops will survive adequately."

The president said he was "relieved" federal experts had told him it appeared that a 20-story high mud dam formed on the north side of the mountain would hold back the waters of Spirit Lake.

Some scientists have warned that in the "worst possible" case, the mud dam could collapse and send a torrent of floodwaters through the Toutle Valley and on through the cities of Longview and Kelso, 40 miles downstream. The 50,000 residents of the two cities have been warned to be prepared for possible removal.

Dwight Crandell of the U.S. Geological Survey said Wednesday "the imminent risk of a large mudflow is not as great as we had anticipated. The lake level is not rising rapidly. If anything, it is falling."

Based on the history of the mountain, Crandell suggested the next event would likely be the extrusion of a lava dome from the crater. "Explosions and avalanches are expected in the coming weeks or months, but not like Sunday," he said. "We would not expect as violent an explosion during the extrusion of the dome."

On the flight west, presidential press secretary Jody Powell said the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers had been directed by Carter "to begin dredging" debris that has blocked a shipping channel in the Columbia River, shutting off river commerce to Portland.

Reagan Campaign Aide Anderson Carter Quits

United Press International The United Press International count Wednesday had Reagan at 389 delegates, still shy of the number necessary for nomination. Bush said he had asked his campaign manager to do a reassessment, and doesn't know what the answer will be. Asked what he is reassessing, he said, "Money. Lets just sum it up in one word. I need money to continue this race."

Reagan insiders in California said the campaign's director of operations — with the unlikely name of Anderson Carter — resigned because of unhappiness with the present campaign leadership. Carter said in a telephone interview he felt he had "fulfilled my commitment," since Reagan has now equal delegate votes to win the nomination.

President Carter booked a day of campaigning in Ohio next Thursday. The state, with California and New Jersey, will provide the bulk of delegates to be chosen on "Super Tuesday" June 3. In Cincinnati, Kennedy came close to saying Carter cannot win in November.

Independent contender Rep. John Anderson says he has completed the first phase of his exploratory candidacy and is in the race to stay. The day after multi-primary Tuesdays usually is a news conference in Ohio he is reassessing his campaign and will decide what to do within "a couple of days, two or three days."
